Being free, learning to know yourself, and being with others all make summer one of the nicest times of the year.






Thirteen students went to Emporia State Teachers College one Saturday to attend a social studies




Thirteen proved to be an unlucky number for the freshmen football team as they lost all four games. With only thirteen players, most of the team had to play the entire game.








Madrigal Brings Back Old English Customs




With the beginning of school, the students began adjusting to a new director, Mr. Jernstad, and his methods.






Forensics Team Has Good Year

The four-man team placed sixth at the regional meet.






The tennis team, under the direction of Superintendant Bray, brought home several medals during the season.





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
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
