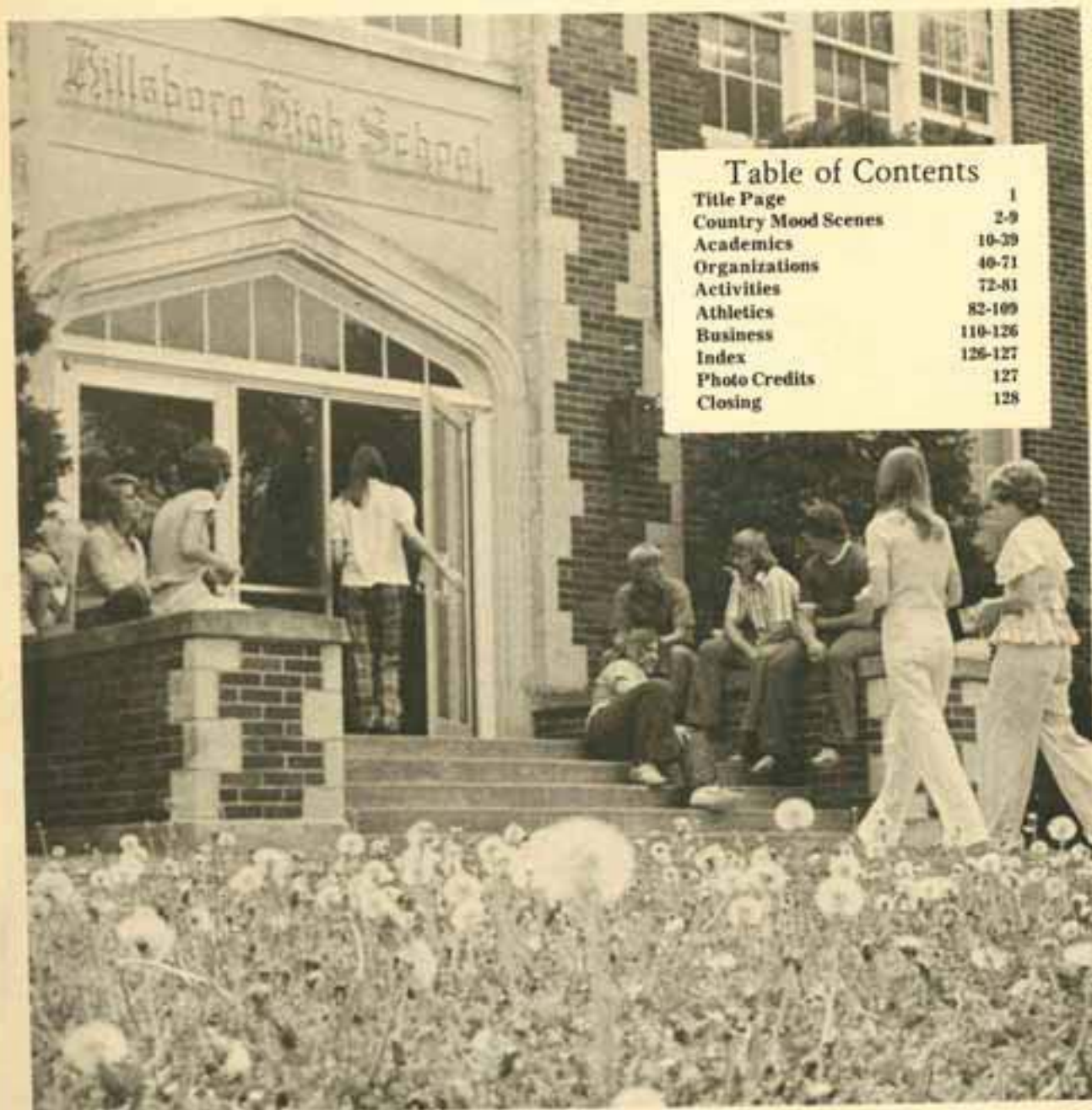

Each day last week brought fresh reports of layoffs—massive ones in the auto industry and lesser ones in plants producing products as varied as textiles, electric organs and bicycles. National car slump minimized locally

Hillsboro is considered to be a "stable community with diversified industries," and one in which "the population will continue to climb," according to a recently completed Engineering Economic Study made by the United Telephone Company of Kansas, Inc. The study, conducted by Glen Haslett, commercial engineer, was based on discussions with developers of housing, owners of land, city officials and various United employees.

"The city's planning committee is working hard to maintain job opportunities for the youth in an attempt to keep them in the community," he said. The Industrial Development Committee has a 160 acre Industrial Park at the northeast edge of the city, equipped with railroad spur and utilities. Twelve industries, and the potential for more, are being attracted to the area. A new apartment building and the conversion of the hotel to apartments were cited as boosts to the...

Haslett also commented on the plans for enlargement of hospital facilities, and mentioned expansion of the mobile home court located at Birch. Haslett said that Hillsboro for its part in the PRIDE state in last year's approximately 88 percent of the homes in Hillsboro are served by telephones. In December of 1974, the exchange had 215 business telephones and 1,207 residence main telephones, the study said. This was a 3.2 percent gain over telephones located in Hillsboro in 1973. The study cited the population of Hillsboro as 1,200.

Floyd Winter, a local construction man, has already begun construction on a storage room, located in the southeast corner of the main high school building. Other improvements have been started on the west building.

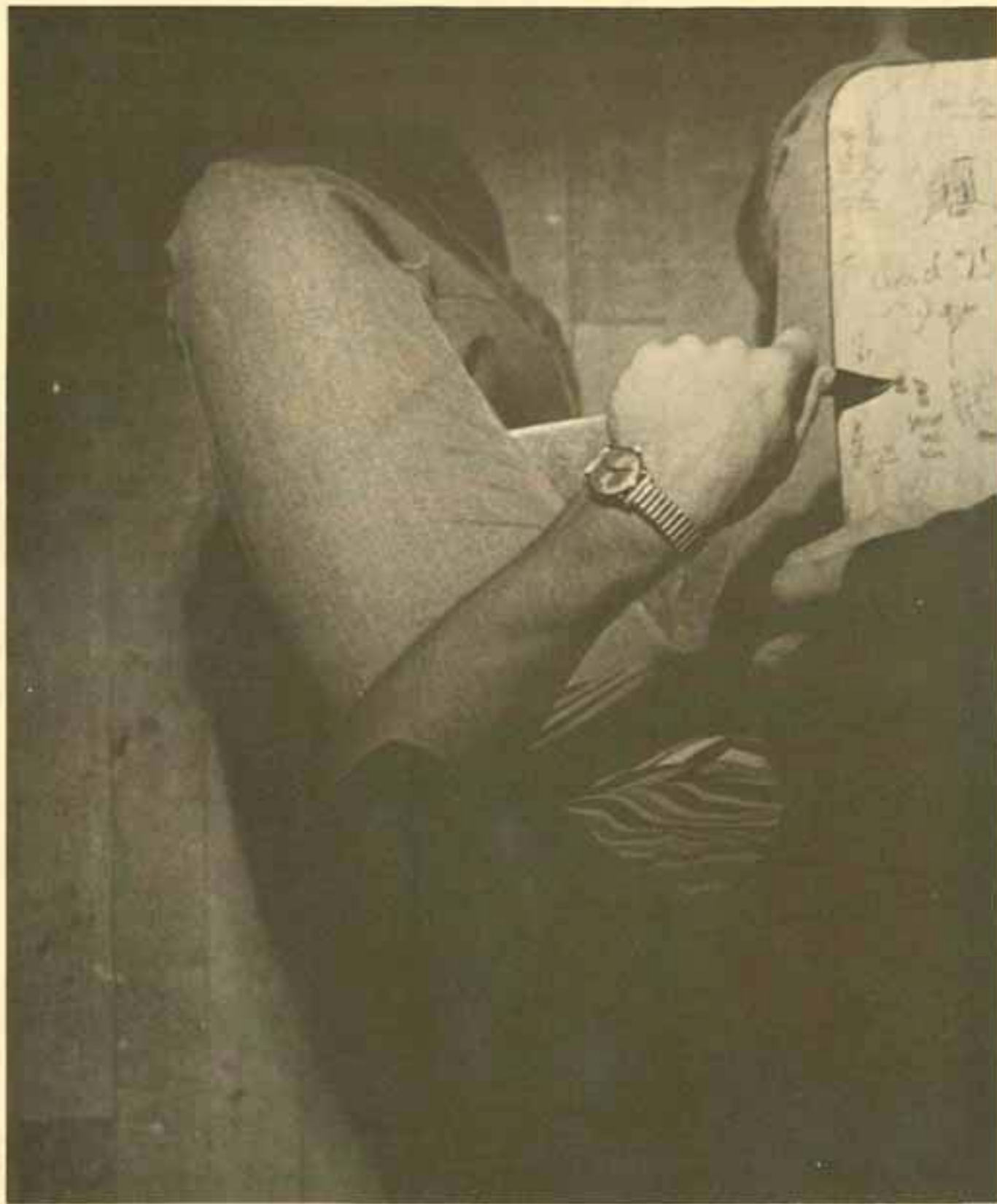

The Juniors found themselves among the most active people in the school. Besides the classwork and studying, they were leaders both in clubs and in sports.

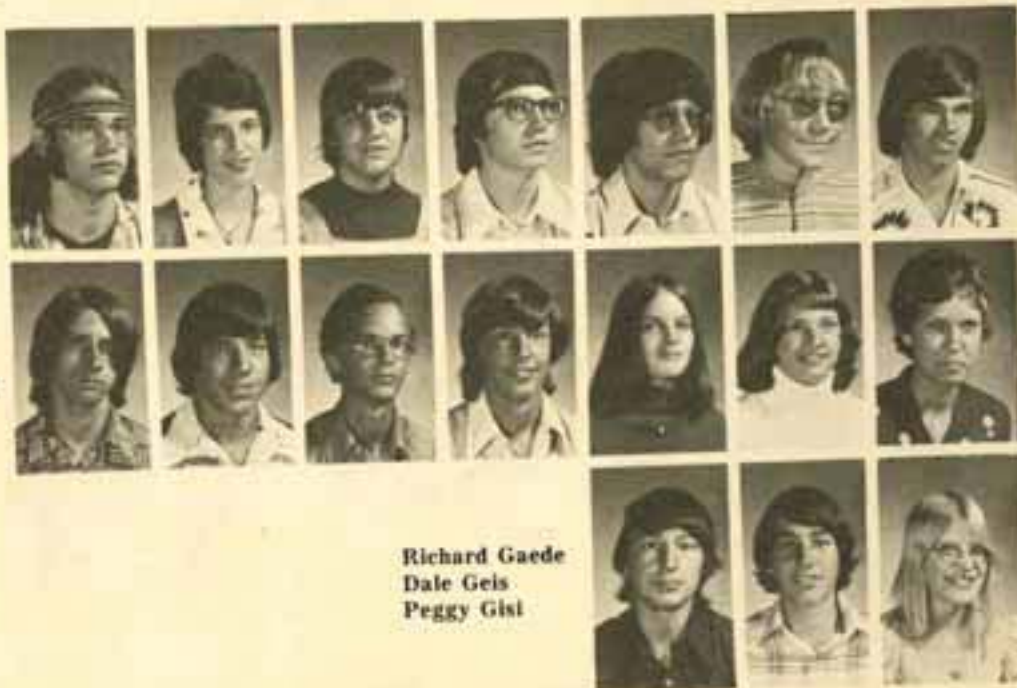

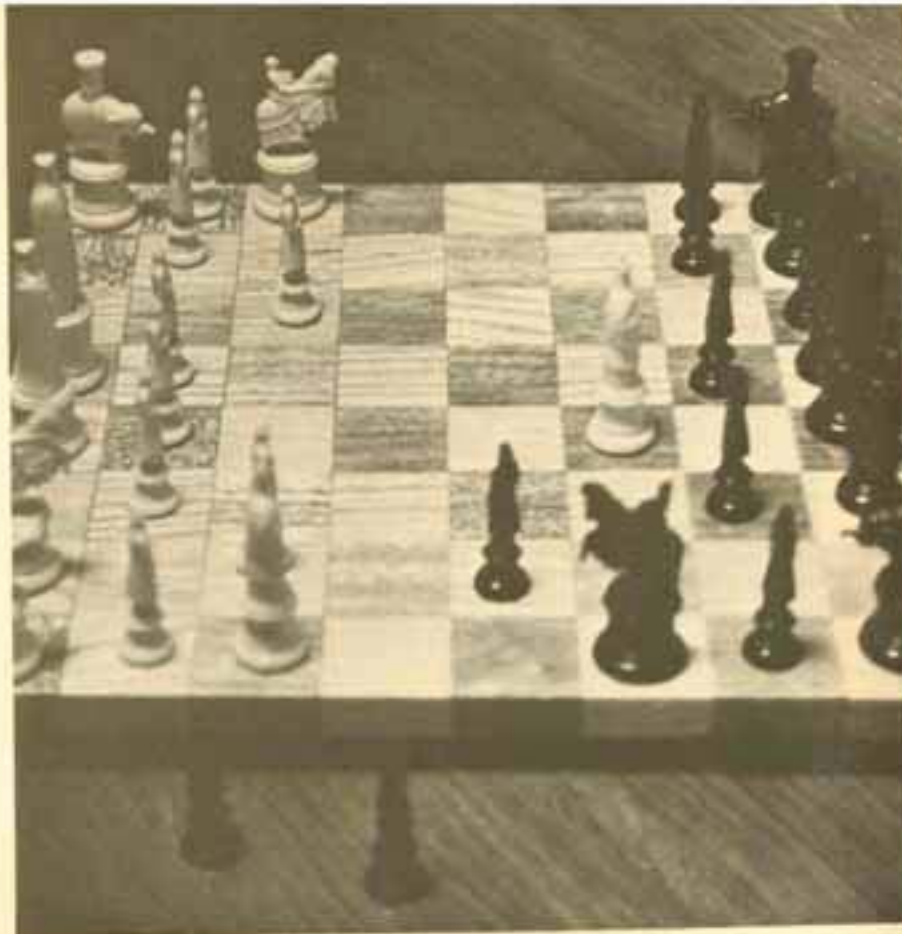
Club Holds Year Long Tournament

The debate team of Ricki Wiebe and Jack Thouvenell brought home a medal from the Chapman debate tournament. The third place award is the first medal received by the debate program.

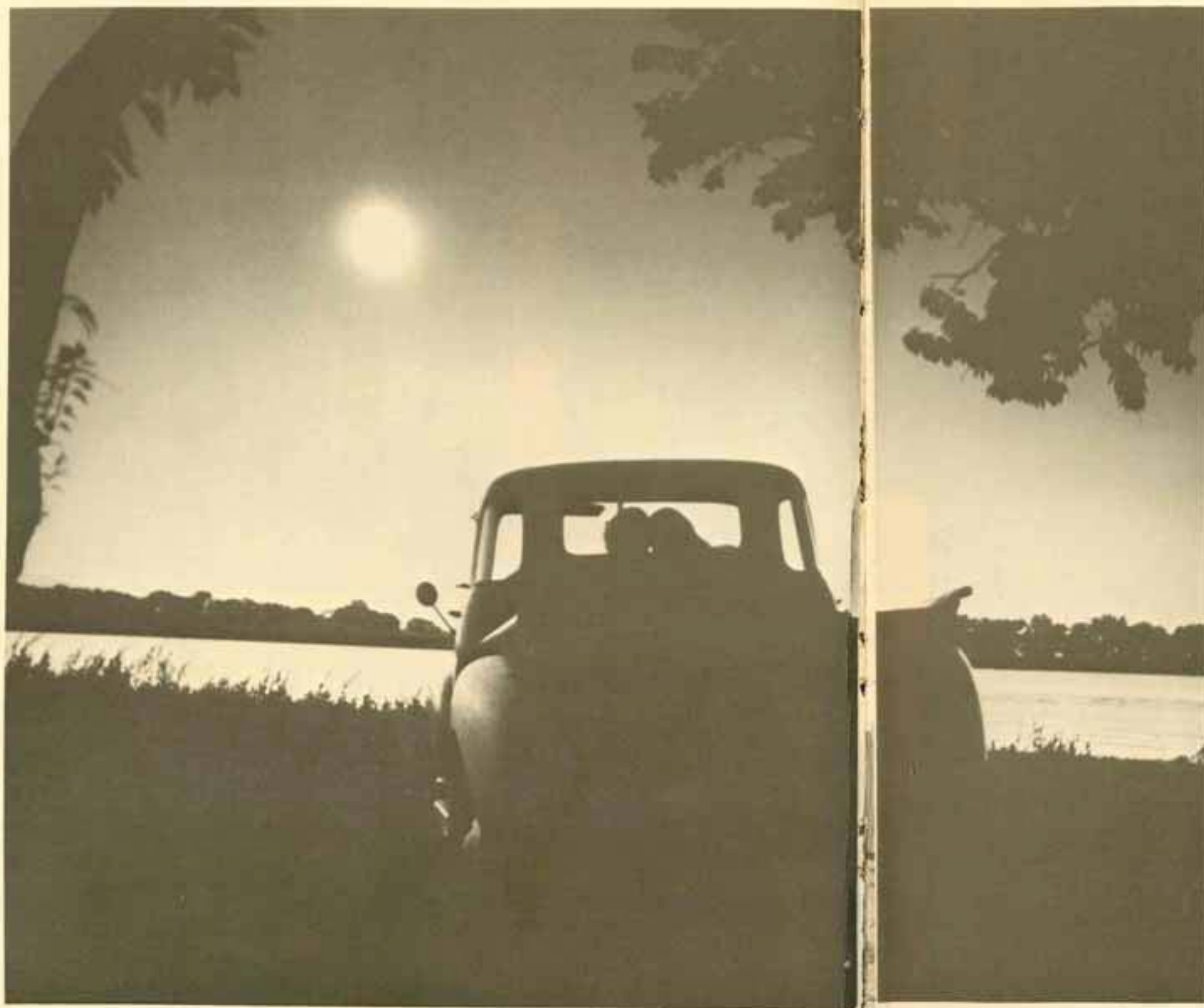

4-H Building Chosen For Banquet



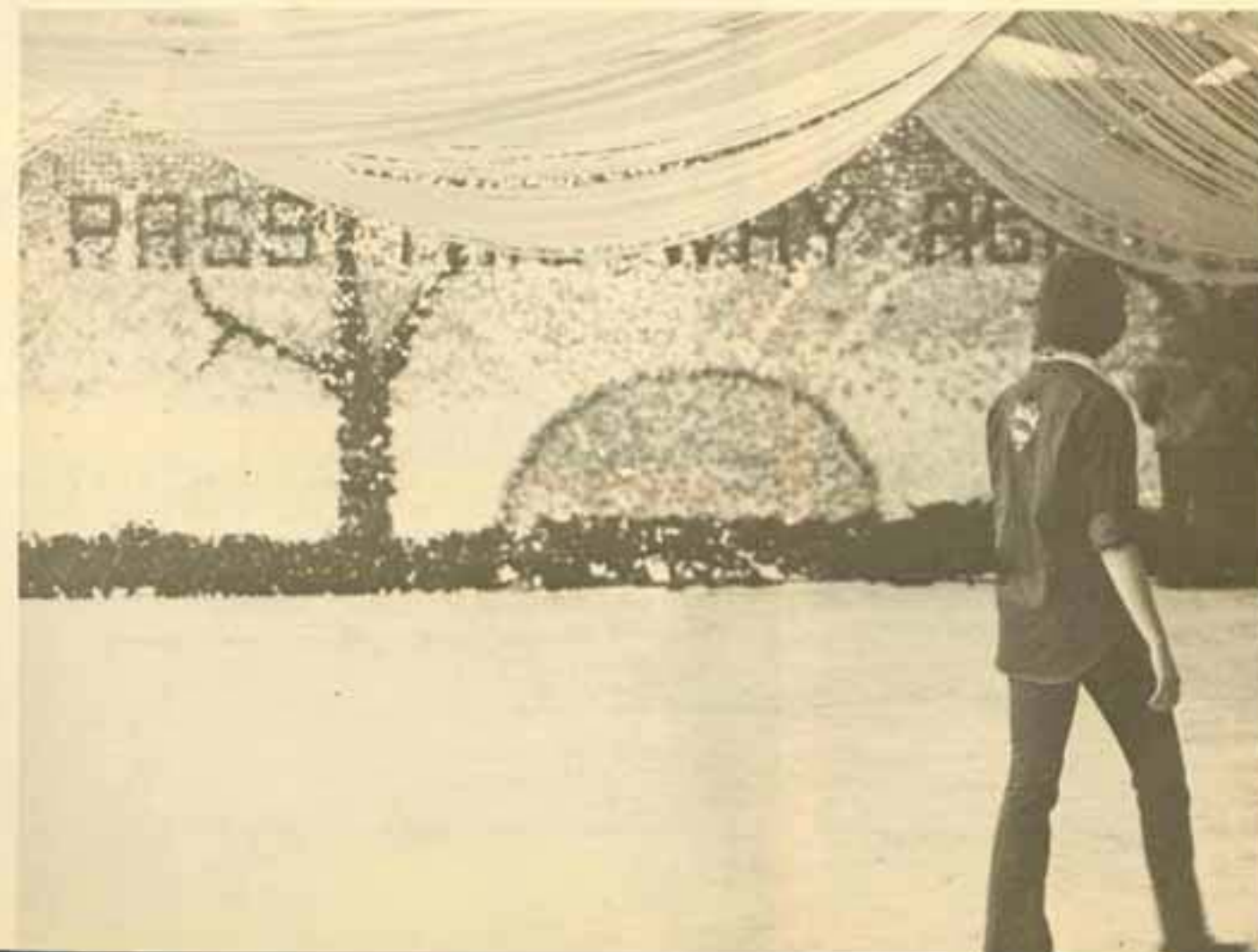
The 4-H Building on the Marion County Fairgrounds was the site for the Junior-Senior Banquet May 3.

Windy Day Sets Apart Graduation

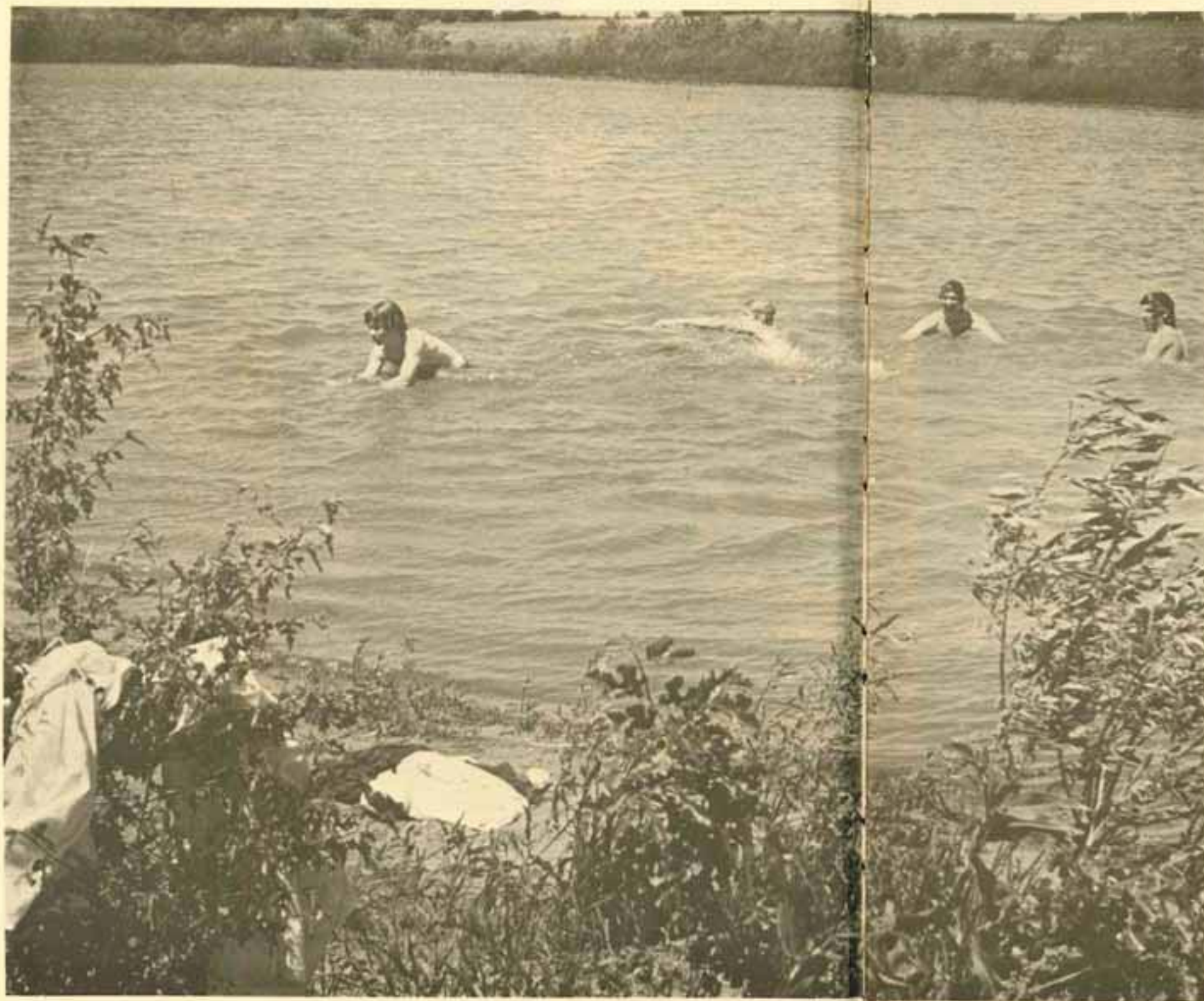

Robert Prieb was selected as unanimous choice to the all-CVL team and the most valuable player. Steve Reimer earned an honorable

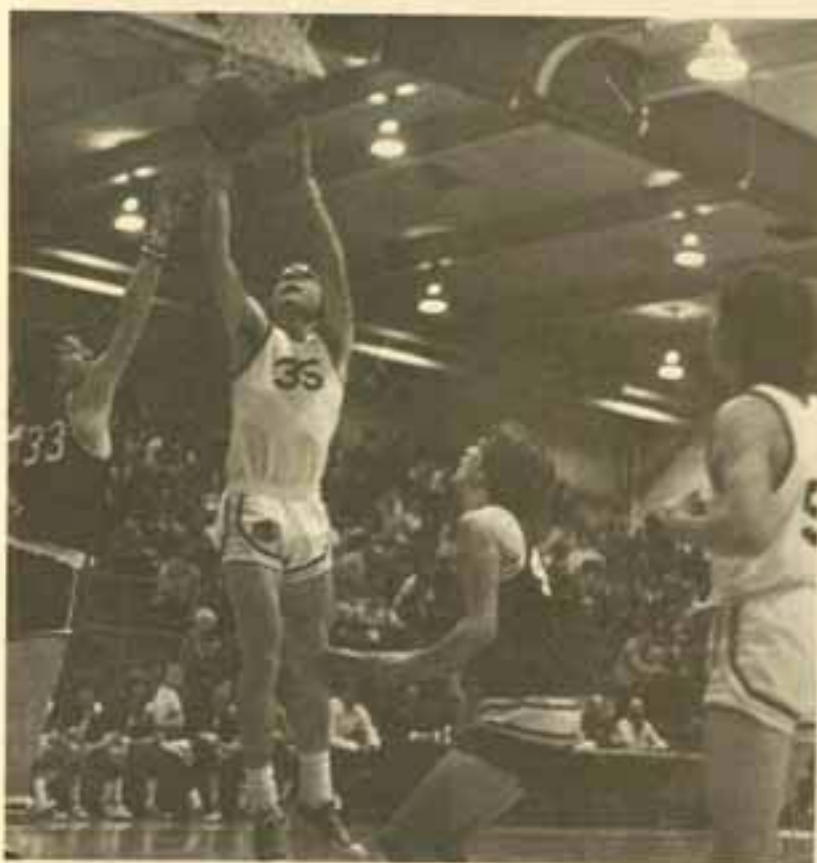
mention to the all-CVL squad.

The B-team squad finished with a 3-6 record.



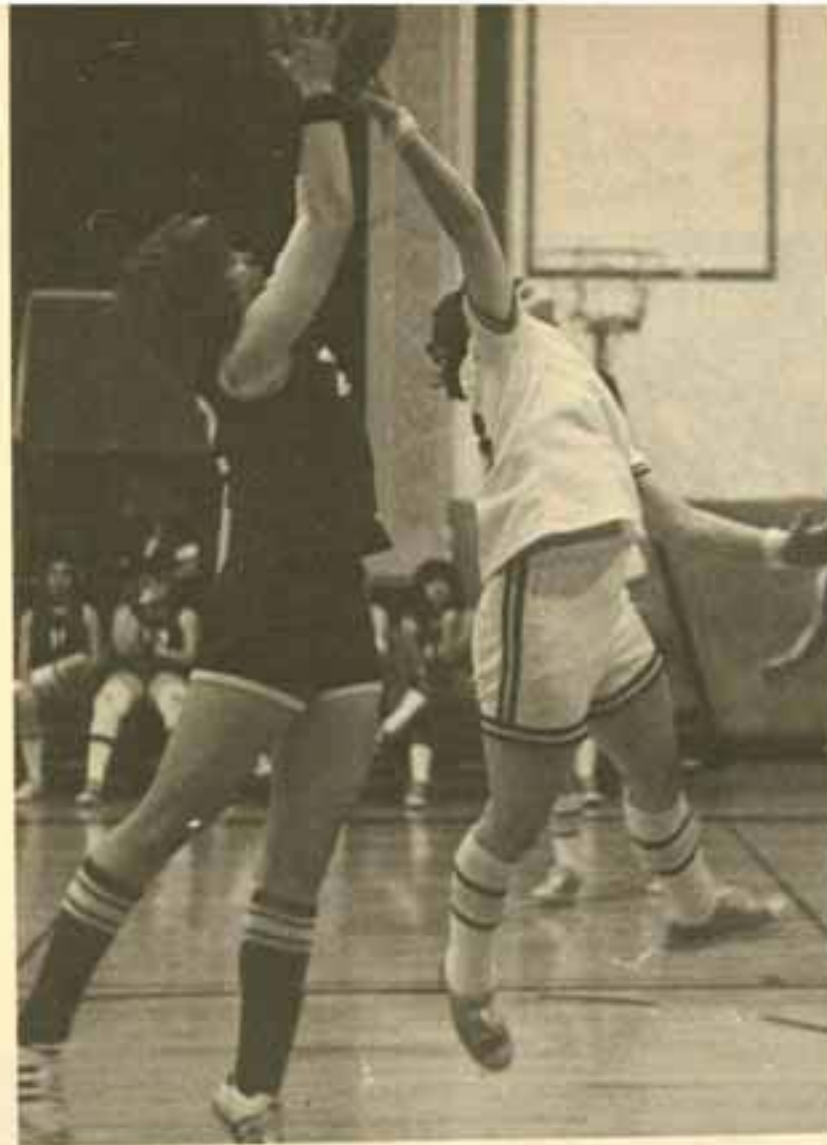

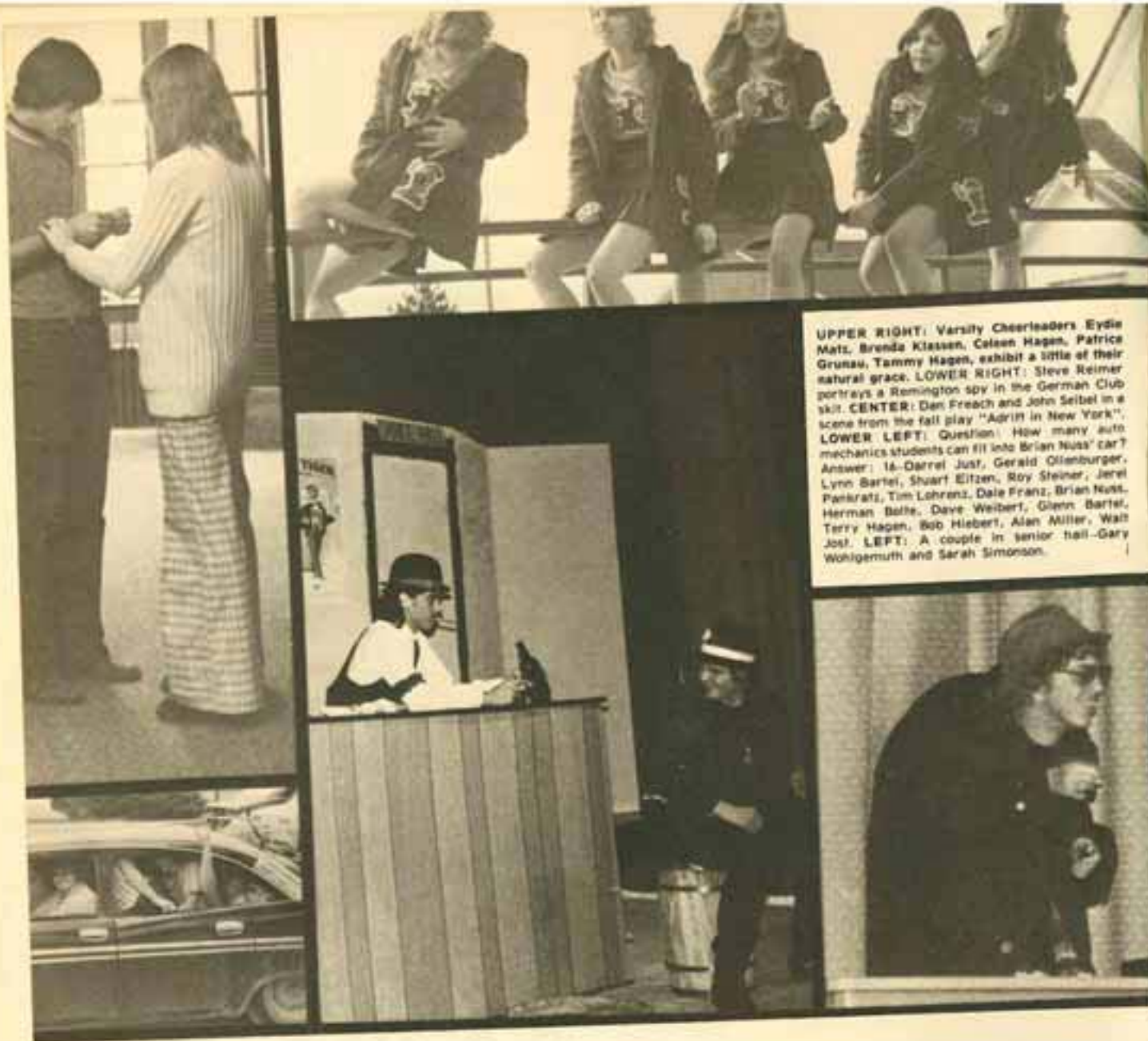
