# Trojans Make 'Final Four'

The Hillsboro High School football team had a very successful season, finishing the year with a record of 9 wins and only 3 losses. The Trojans were coached by 15th year head coach Don Penner and assisted by Jerry Jones and Art Balzer.

The Trojans were led in scoring by Dale Hillard who had 90 points. He was followed by Dennis Heide with 74, Kent Jost 48, and Terry Frantz 42. They were led on the ground by Dale Hillard and Dennis Heide who rushed for 1203 and 930 yards respectively. Other leading ground gainers were Kent Jost with 377 yards and Terry Frantz with 271. In the passing division they were led by junior quarterback William Brenneman who was assisted by Frantz and Hillard. Brenneman combined for 410 yards of the total 807 yards gained in the air. The top pass receivers were Frantz, Jost, and Jay Schroeder.

The Trojan's regular season of nine games was marred by only two losses. The first loss was to a tough Clifton-Clyde team at the far-away town of Clyde. The

next loss was the big showdown at Hesston. With Hesston ranked number 1 and Hillsboro also ranked in State, the stage was set. The game was close, and it looked like Hillsboro would win, but when the gun sounded, Hesston had taken a 14-6 victory. However, on the last game of the season Hesston was defeated by Halstead setting up a three-way tie for first in our district. A magical flip of the coin and Hillsboro was in the playoffs and Hesston and Halstead were out.

As the playoff unfolded, Hillsboro was matched against Clearwater. Clearwater proved overmatched, and Hillsboro took an easy 28-0 victory. Next we were slated to play a tough Belleville team. The game was close throughout, but with just seconds left on the clock William Brenneman hit Terry Frantz with a pass in the end zone for the victory. The next game was semifinals of state. It was a home game against Hoxie. It was a tough, hard-fought game, but when everything was over Hoxie had pulled out a big win.

This year's Freshman-Sophomore football team, coached by Art Balzer and assisted by Jerry Jones and Don Penner, finished the season with a perfect record of 7-0.

The Freshman-Sophomores acquired a total of 1461 yards rushing and 430 yards passing. Robbie Delk rushed for 913 yards, and Paul Reimer received passes for 191 yards.

The top scorers were Robbie Delk with 83 points, Rick Medley, Joel Schroeder, and Paul Reimer tied with 36 points each. Doyle Jost's passes resulted in a total of seven touchdowns.

Joel Schroeder had four kick-

off returns for 86 yards, and Robbie Delk had nine punt returns for 176 yards.

Leading the team in kickoffs was Steve Hann, who kicked 35 times for a total of 1434 yards. In punts, Robbie Delk led with a total of 13 punts for 382 yards.

Leading tacklers were Corey Jost and Scott Kelsey each with 10. Assisting were Jarrod Youk and Rich Medley, Youk having 34 assists and Medley having 31.

"This was a glorious season," boasted Coach Jones. "Not five or six or eight players, but a team of twelve good Christian young men. This was championship Hillsboro basketball: running to victory at Canton; constantly rated as one of the best teams in the state by all of the papers; and opening the season with consecutive wins. The explosive offense was the third highest in school history hitting at 65.6 percent per game, and the crunch bunch on defense permitted only 48.8 percent a contest. It was a thrilling team to watch, a great team to coach, and a fun team to play on--the team of '82."

The dynamic team proved its ability by setting several school records. These included fifteen consecutive wins in a row which enabled the team to hold tenth place on the win-loss record with 17-4; third highest scoring

team with 65.6 percent per game; and earning the place of second for scoring 94 points against Centre.

Terry Frantz also set new records for freethrows with 88 percent and shooting eight for eight from the field in the game against Sedgwick.

Several team members were selected for the Canton-Galva All-Tournament Team. They were Terry Frantz, first team, and Kent Jost, Jay Schroeder, and Stan Frantz, second team. Stan Frantz and Jay Schroeder were also selected to the All-Conference Team. Jay Schroeder also received an additional honor by being selected to play on an All-Star Team of various players from around the state.

Coach Jones proved to be a top-notch coach by having 97 wins and only 52 losses. He was greatly appreciated and will be missed by all.

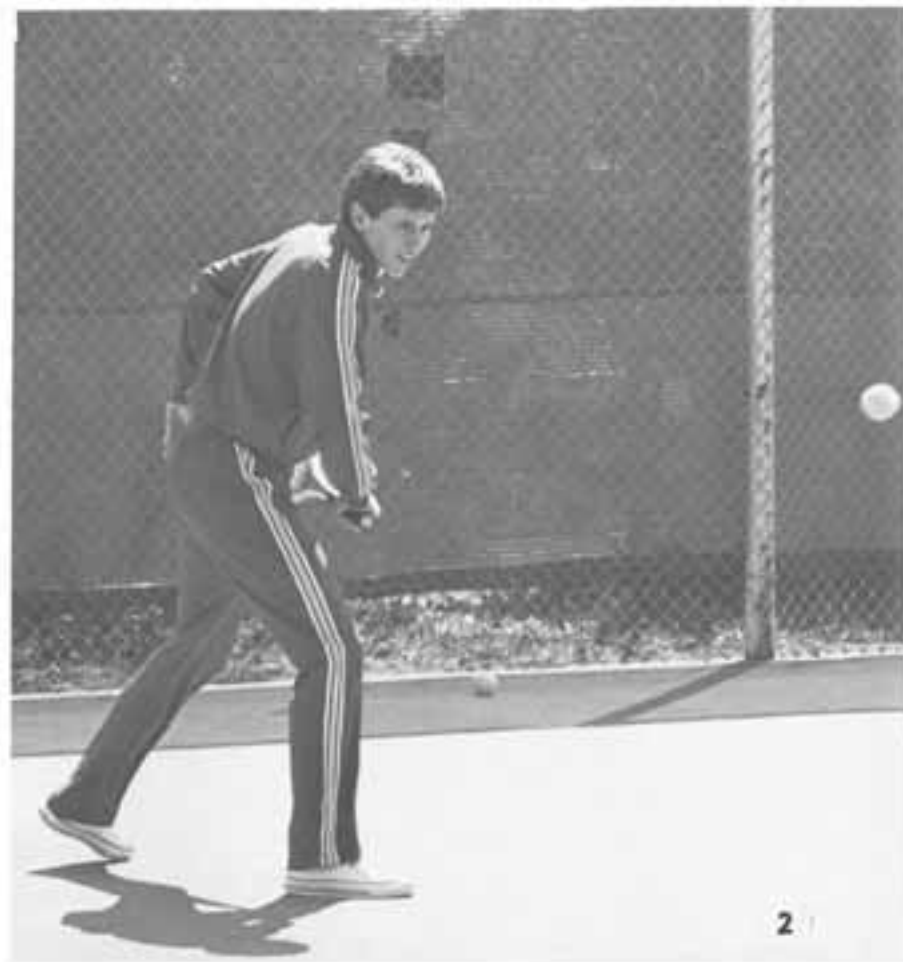

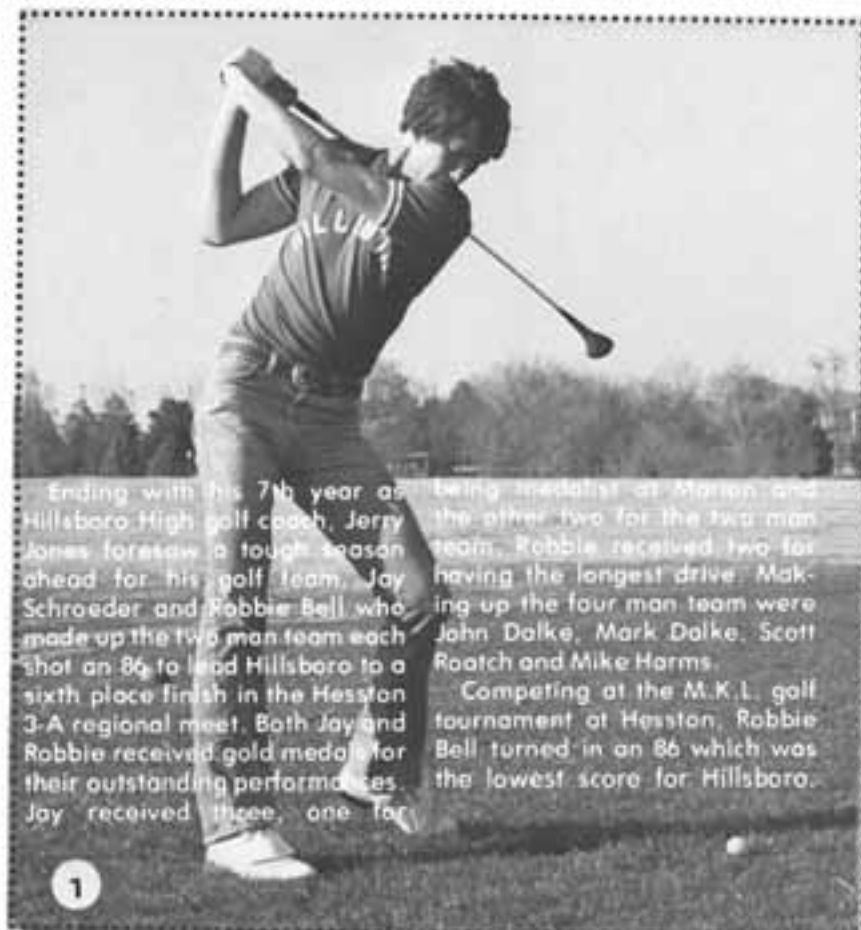

The Hillsboro debate squad ended the 1981-82 season with an excellent record.

"The Novices were a pleasant surprise," said Coach Bruce Clary. Their first trophy was won at Centre, where Kirk Gillet and John Klaassen received first place with a record of 5-0. At the next tournament, which took place at Wichita Heights, three teams played roles in bringing home the Sweepstakes Award for the highest combined record. Their best tournament of the year was the Mid-Kansas League Tournament. There, they took first place with an 8-0 record and 26 speaker points (only two away from a perfect record).

The experienced debaters also had a successful year. At their first tournament, which took place in Osage City, Todd Jost and Mark Seibel finished second, losing in finals to the team which later won state championship. 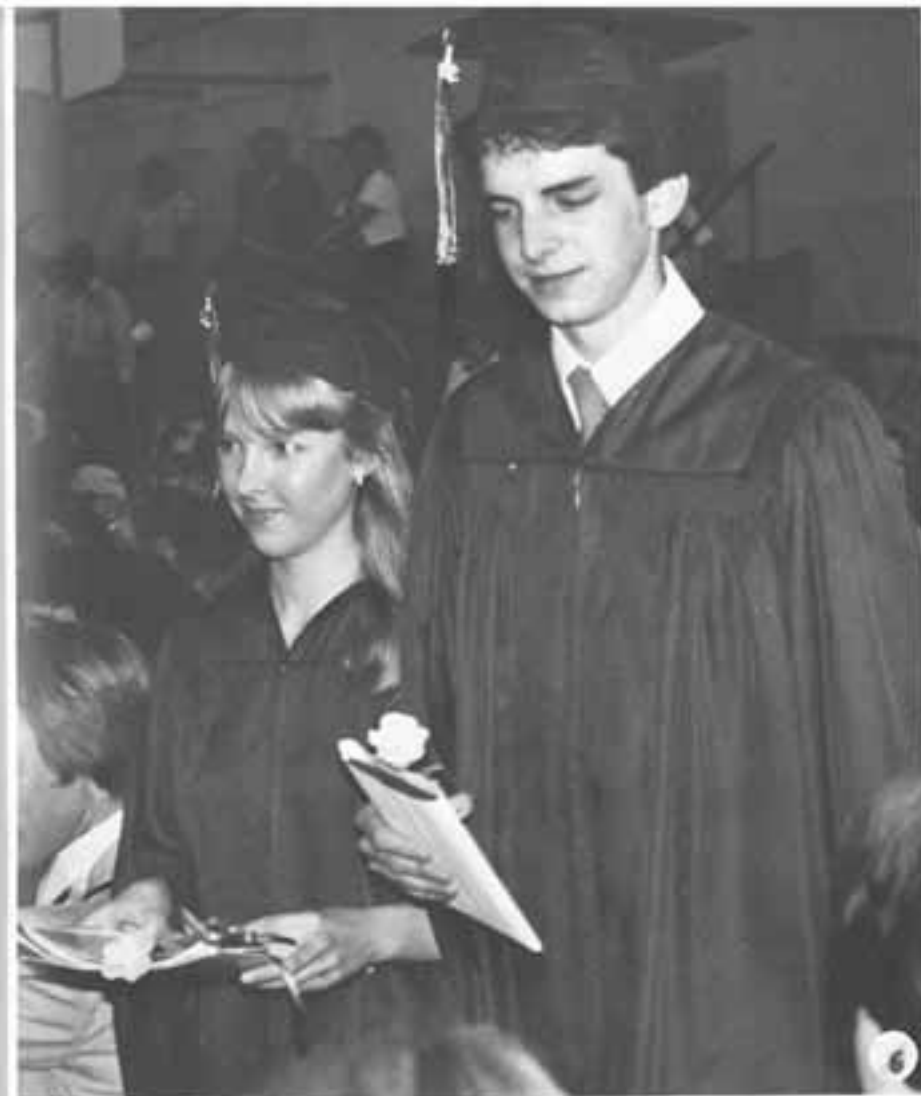
School board members were making plans for improvement in the school. These included the remodeling of the science lab and the designing of a new commons area which is to be built between the high school and

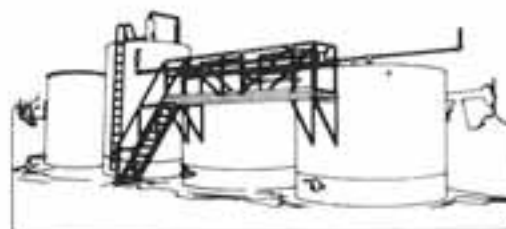
