






The 1982-83 school year began with a very ambitous start with the addition of a new kitchen and Commons area together with the remodeling of the science, math, and home economics facilities.








Two class competitions were won by their class. Kay Suderman and Warren Unruh came in first in the scooter race, and Brenda Klassen won the Valentine




















Anticipating




Experience Gained










The next meet was the Hesston Invitational. Jason Vajnar was low for Hillsboro with an 82. This gave him a 7th place finish.





Debaters Win Sweepstakes




