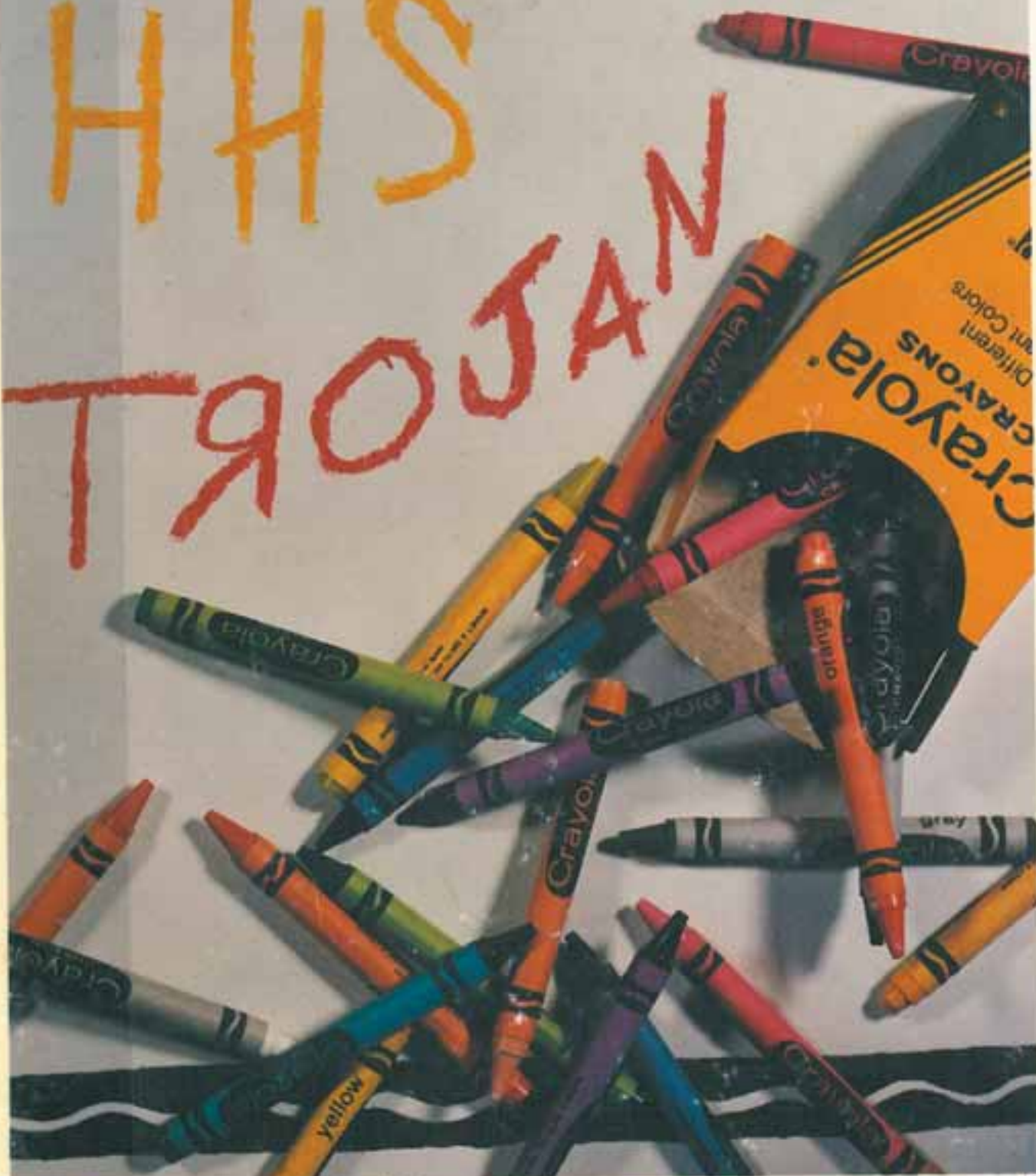

As a whole, this will hopefully add a sunny glow to the enthusiasm and encouragement of learning at H.H.S.

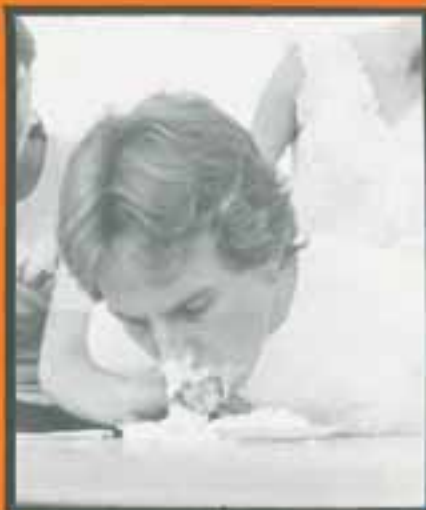

they were putting up a good fight, they were defeated by Stockton.

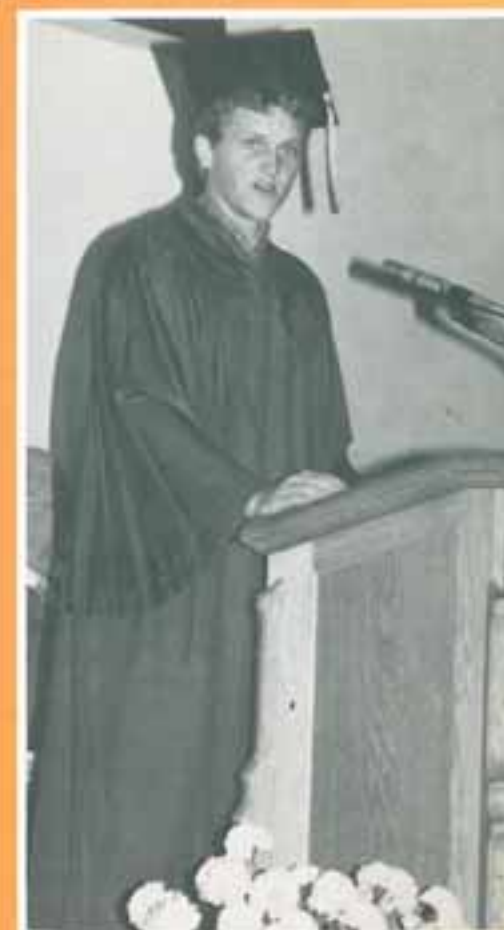

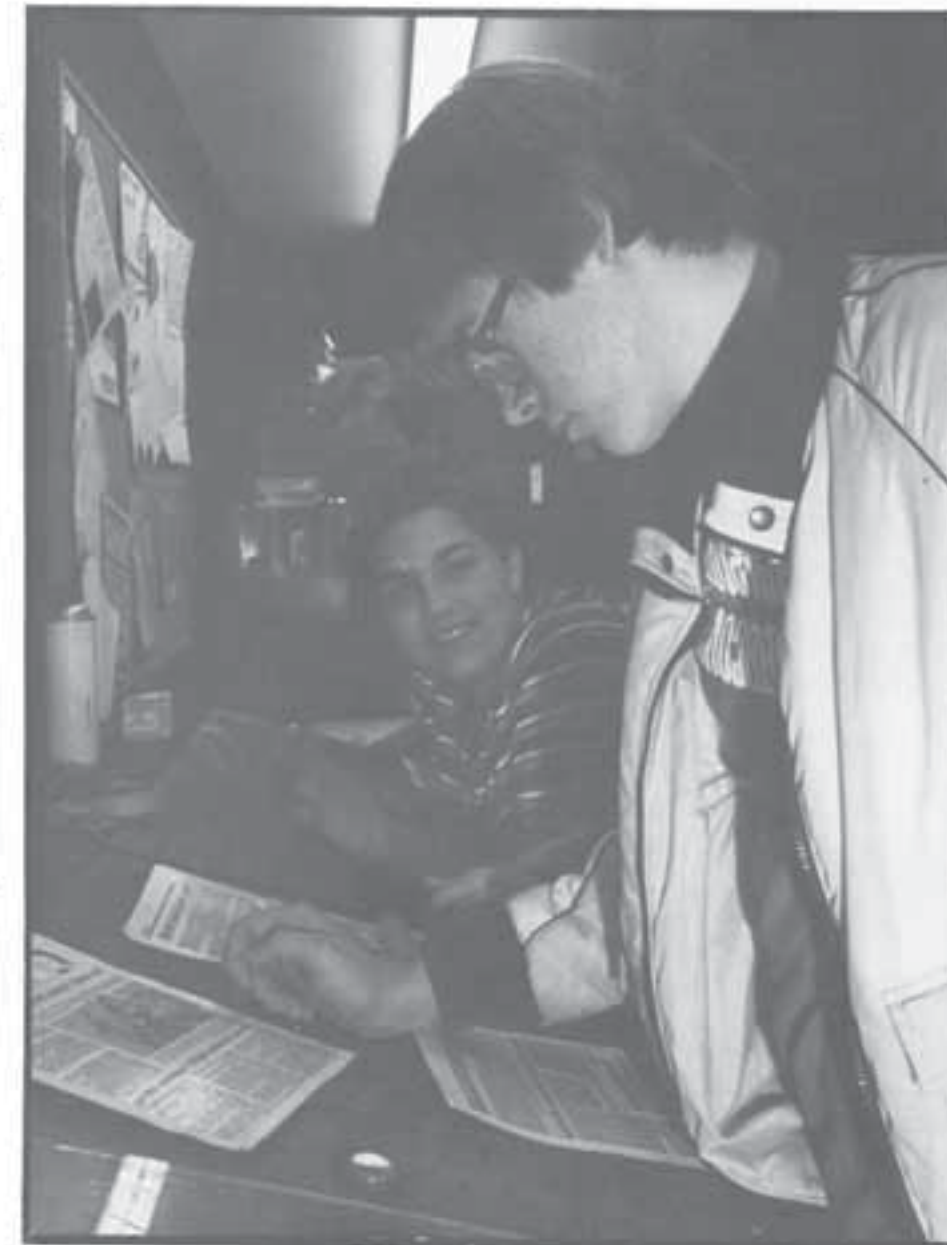

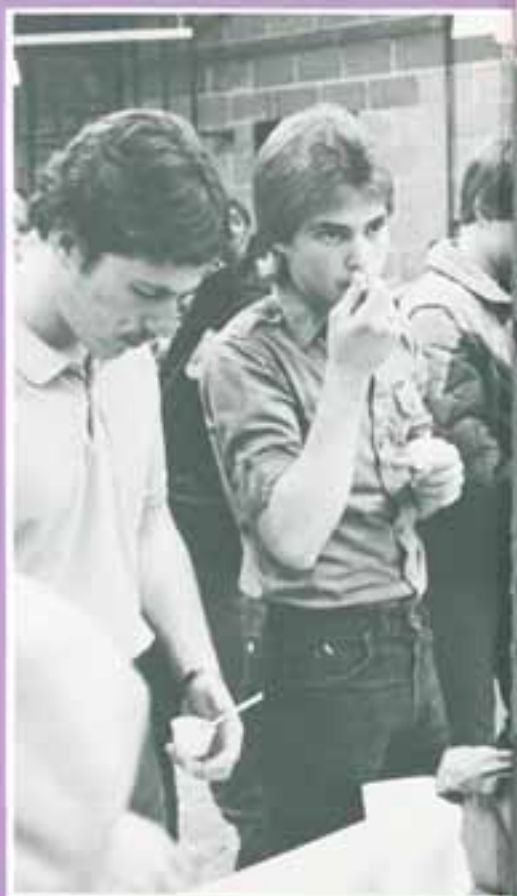
In the Dairy Products judging, the A team was sixth. Rex Steiner was high individual and Angie Wirbert was tenth.

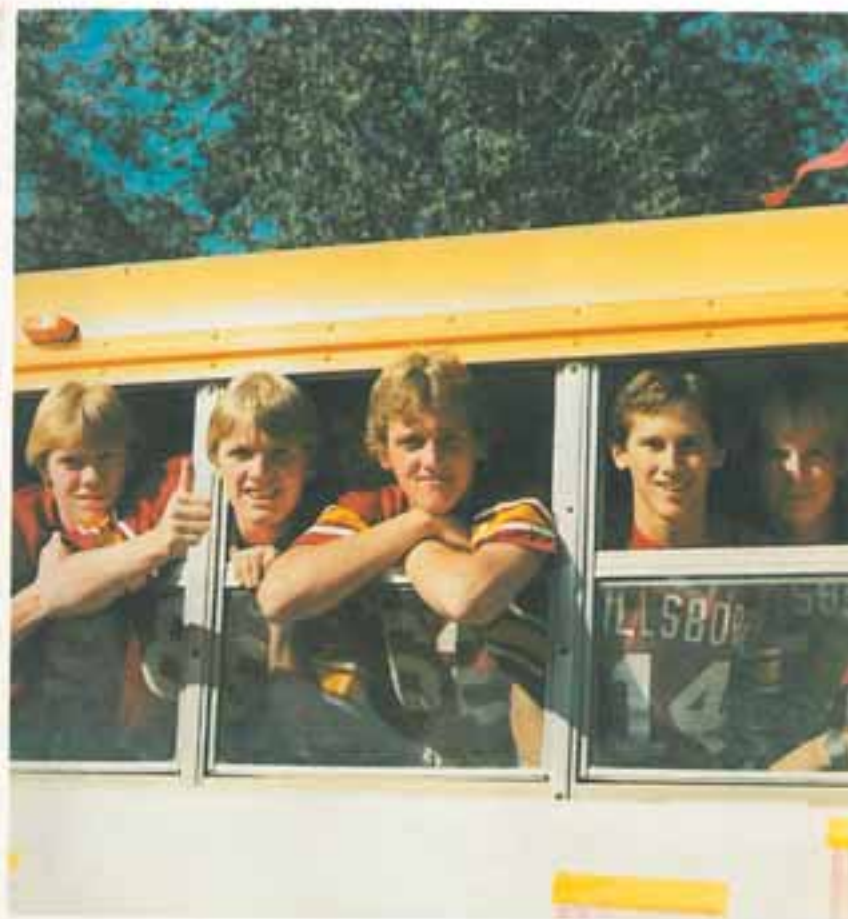

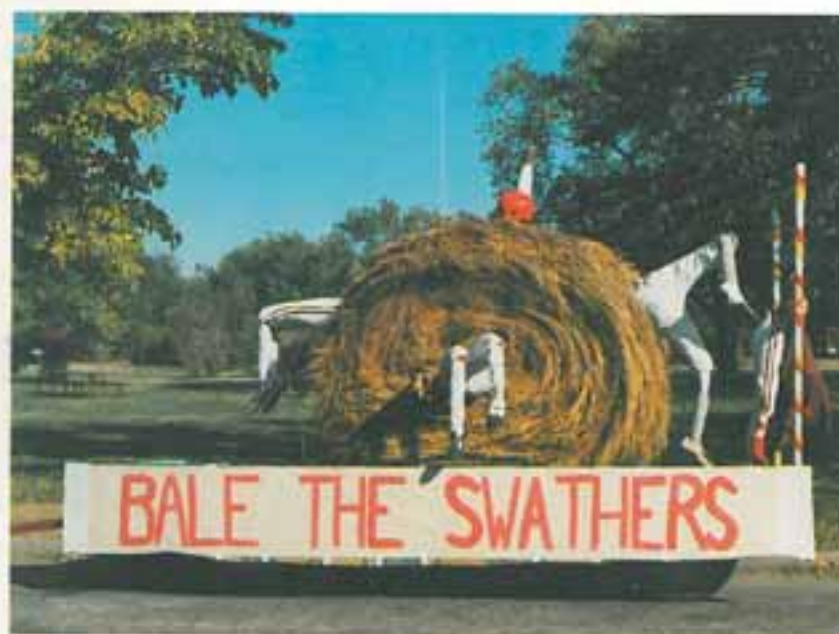

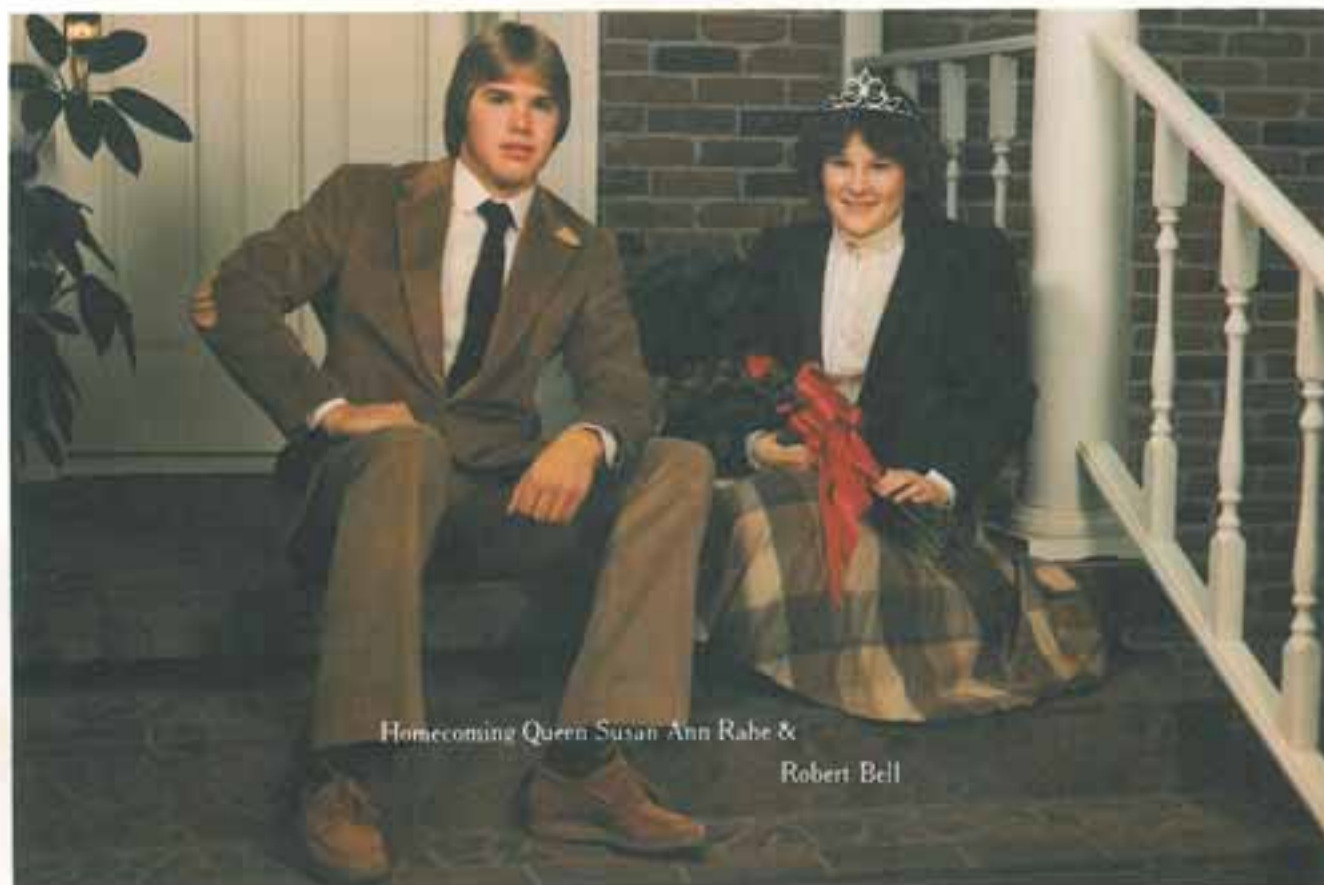

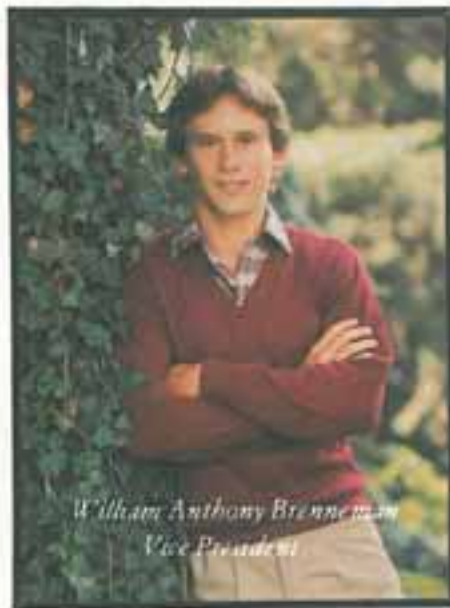

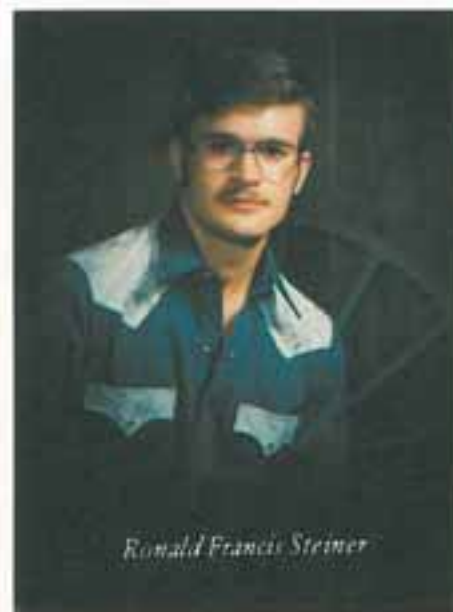

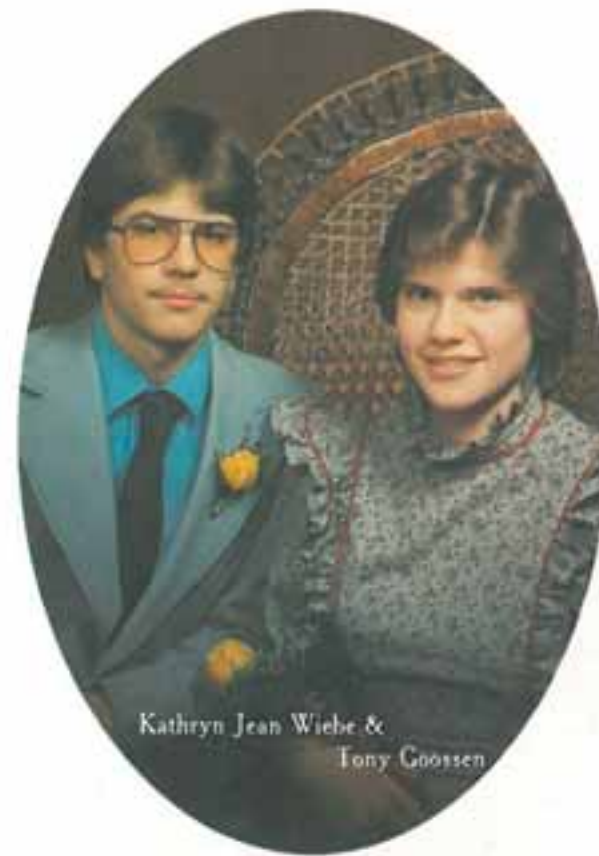

The Hillsboro High School Trojans finished the promising season with a record of 8-2, coached by Don Penner and assisted by Art Balzer and Bud Keller. The year was highlighted by wins over Clifton-Clyde, Moundridge, and Halstead, and a third trip to state play-offs.

Even though the first game was lost to Herington, the Trojans easily rolled over Clifton-Clyde the next Friday and avenged a loss to them last year. A week later, Hillsboro hosted Moundridge in a tough game. Going into the last quarter, the score was tied twenty all, but with a drive that took ten minutes off of the clock, Hillsboro won the game. The biggest showdown came when Halstead came to Hillsboro. The game was 7-14 until Stan Frantz blocked a Halstead punt at their end of the field. The ball ended up in Jon Loewen's hands and he ran it in for a touchdown to tie up the game. The final three points came in the final seconds of the game when Kris Decker kicked a thirty-four yard field goal. But it was called back because of a penalty against Halsted. Kris made the 29 yard field goal for his second try. Coach Penner said, "This was the most satisfying game he had ever coached."

After Hillsboro won the MKL and District, the Trojans played Clearwater in the bi-district play-offs. A year earlier Hillsboro played Clearwater at home also during bi-district play-offs, and won 28-0 but this year they lost 7-10 in a hard fought game.

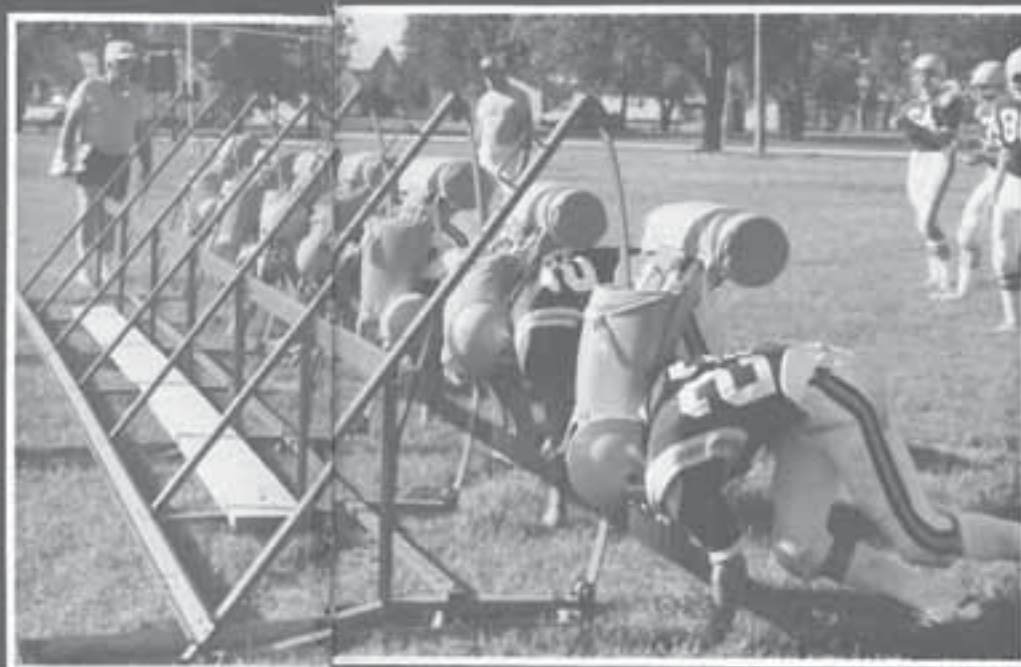
The Trojans offense compiled a total of 2881 yards while the opponents tallied only 2138

Doyle Jost passed for 181 yards, and Kris Decker and William Brenneman followed with 146 and 145 yards.

and two sacks. Craig Ratzlaff had five interceptions, and Dennis Heide had five fumble recoveries. Also, Stan Frantz, Myron Hamm, and Scott Kelsey each had one blocked punt.

The rushing attack on offense was effective thanks to the blocking provided and the defense was able to stop other teams because of the aggressive players. It was a fun and exciting season for the coaches and players with the only disappointments being the losses to Herington and Clearwater.

# Sub-State Champs

...for the first time since '74.

The varsity basketball team, headed by first-year coach Bud Keller, experienced the best season Hillsboro has had since 1974. The team took third place in the state that year.

Hillsboro began the season at Berean Academy and came home with a 47 to 26 win. They held Berean to 5 second half points that included only one field goal.

The second game against Marion was not quite as rewarding. The team was expecting an easy win and came home two points short.

After the Marion loss the Trojans began a streak of wins that carried them into the Canton-Galva tournament. After an easy victory over Goessel, the Trojans ran into a scrappy team from Centre. This game was a challenge and the fourth quarter was a bad one for the Trojans. William Brenneman and David Ediger each scored free throws to keep the Trojans close. With some good defense the Trojans pulled this one out 31-28.

The championship game was against the number one ranked team in class 2-A, Canto-Galva. The gym was packed-to-overflowing and the spectators were full of spirit. At the half, the Trojans found themselves behind. During the third quarter the Trojans pulled ahead 33-30. The fourth quarter proved to be fatal to Canto-Galva as the Trojans knocked off the number one team in Class 2-A, and soon to be 2-A State Champions, Canton-Galva, 37 to 35.

Homecoming with Moundridge was another thriller. William Brenneman put this one on ice with a last second jump shot after driving the length of the floor through a

maize of defenders.

The Trojans racked up four more wins before the big game with arch-rival Hesston, the number one ranked team in Class 3-A. After being postponed twice by foul weather, the Swathers proved to be too much for the Trojans winning 64-48. After this disappointing loss at Hesston, the Trojans picked up two more wins before their season league finale with the Swathers.

For many Trojan fans this was the highlight of a very successful basketball season. Hillsboro beat Hesston, the number one ranked team in class 3-A and soon the be class 3-A State Champions, just as handily as they had defeated the class 2-A State Champion Canton-Galva.

The Trojans began Sub-State play at home against a Marion team that had defeated them earlier in the season. Hillsboro won with little trouble 58-28. From here it was on to Herington to face Minneapolis. Trojans win 48-42. This victory set up the final against Alma-Wabaunsee which had defeated Riley County. Things did not look very bright for the Trojans when Jon Loewen and Stan Frantz fouled out in regulation

play. Hope for a trip to the State Tournament began to slip. The Trojans fans began to leave the gym at Herington showing little faith in a team that had been winners throughout their careers. David Ediger, Troy Weibert, and Kris Decker entered the game with the Trojans down by two. Dennis Heide was the first hero as he hit the jumper from the corner to put the game into overtime 33-33. With Decker leading the way and Weibert's tenacious defense the Trojans outscored Alma 7 to 5 in the overtime to earn a berth in the class 3-A tournament.

On to Hutchinson and the first round game with

Stockton. As the first half came to a close in the Hutchinson Sports Arena, the Trojans had a comfortable 12 point lead. After holding Stockton's big pivot-man to two points in the first half he broke loose for nineteen in the second half. The Trojans lead all the way to the 1:42 mark of the final frame when Stockton pulled off the come-from-behind win over the Trojans 49-47.

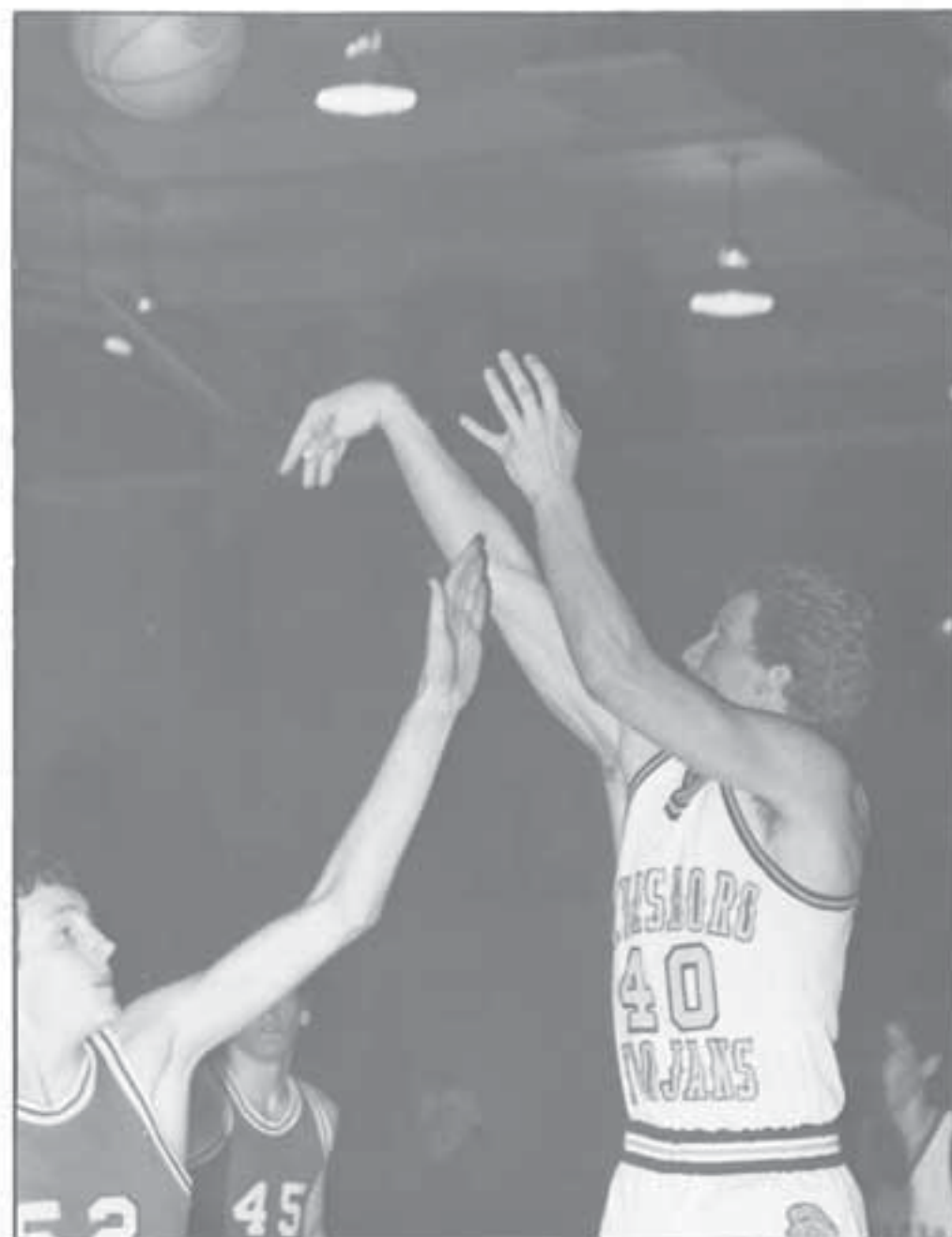

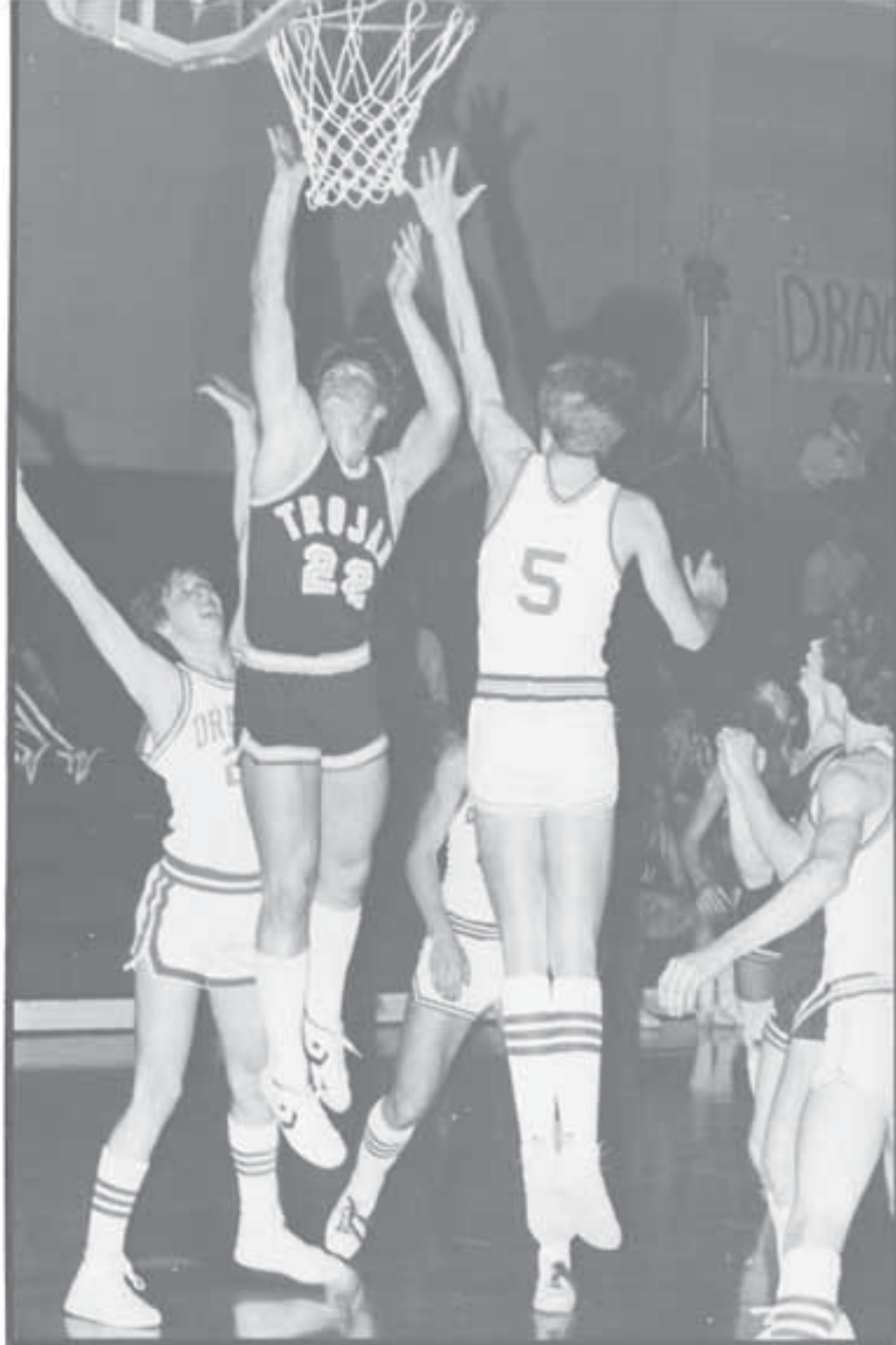
## Experience Gained

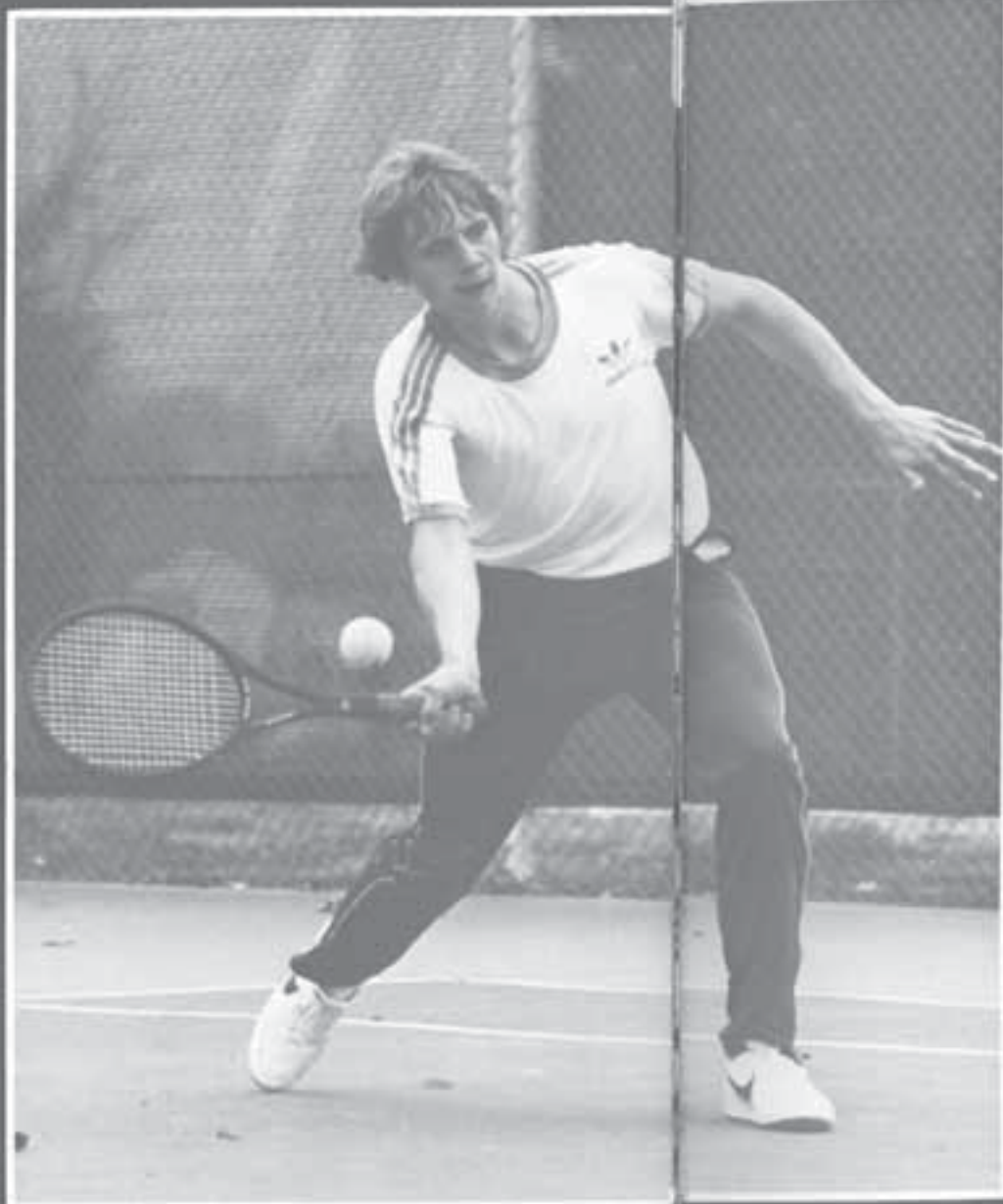

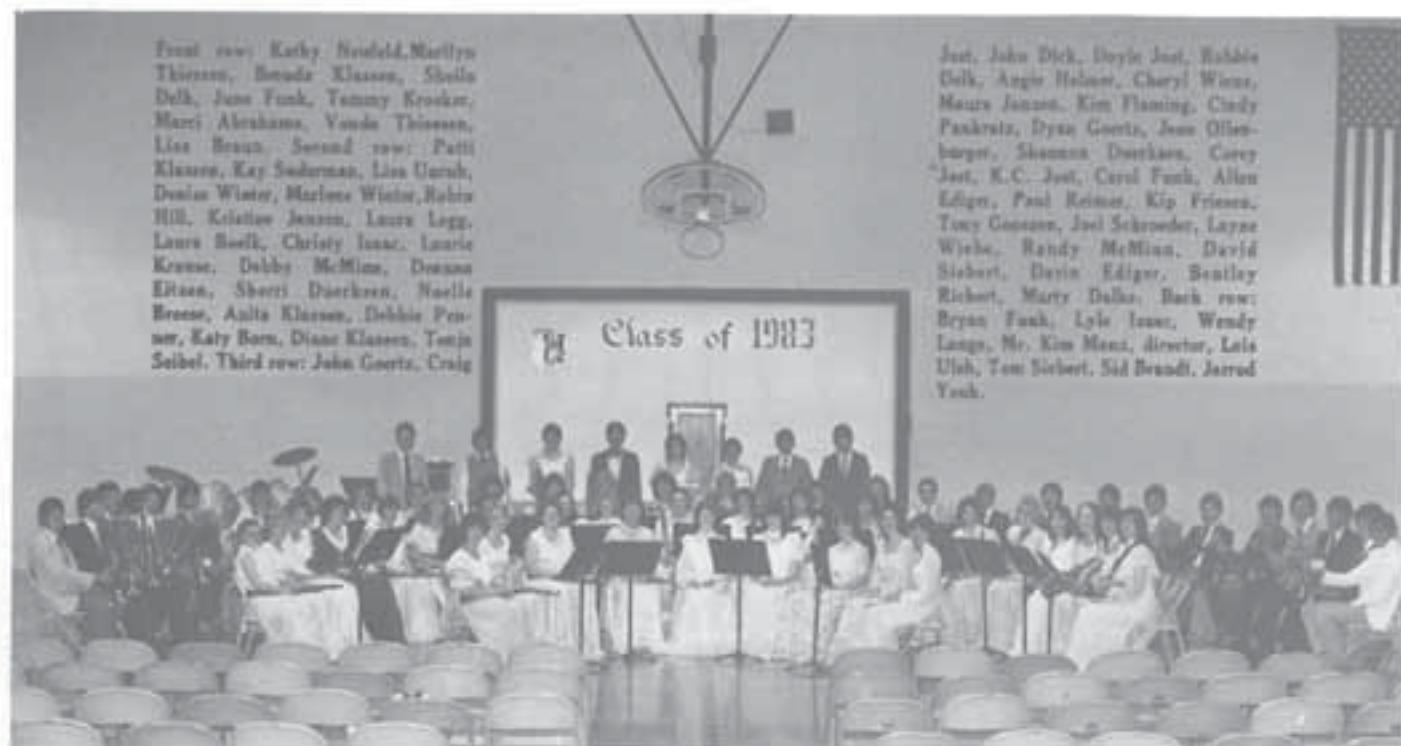

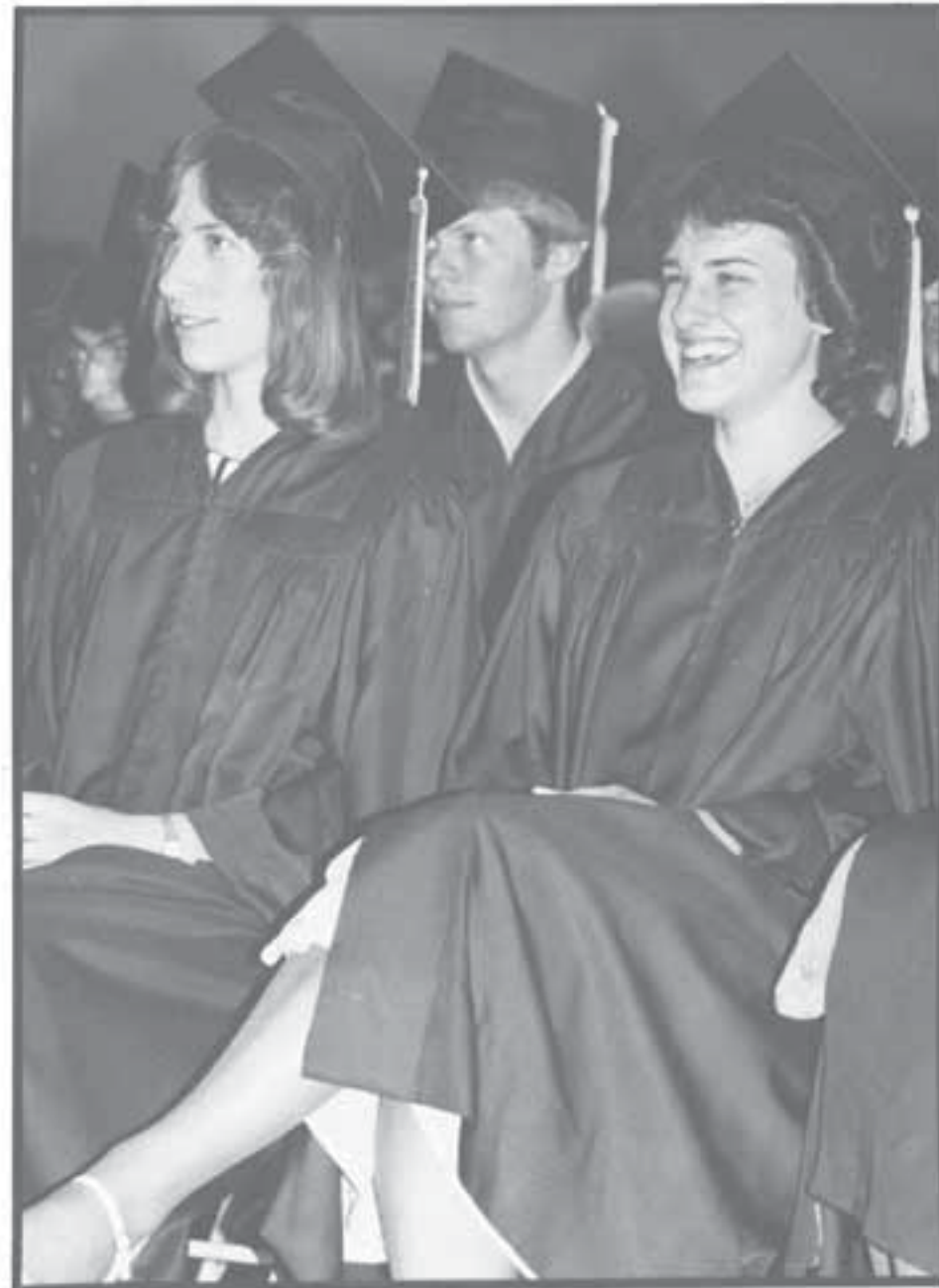

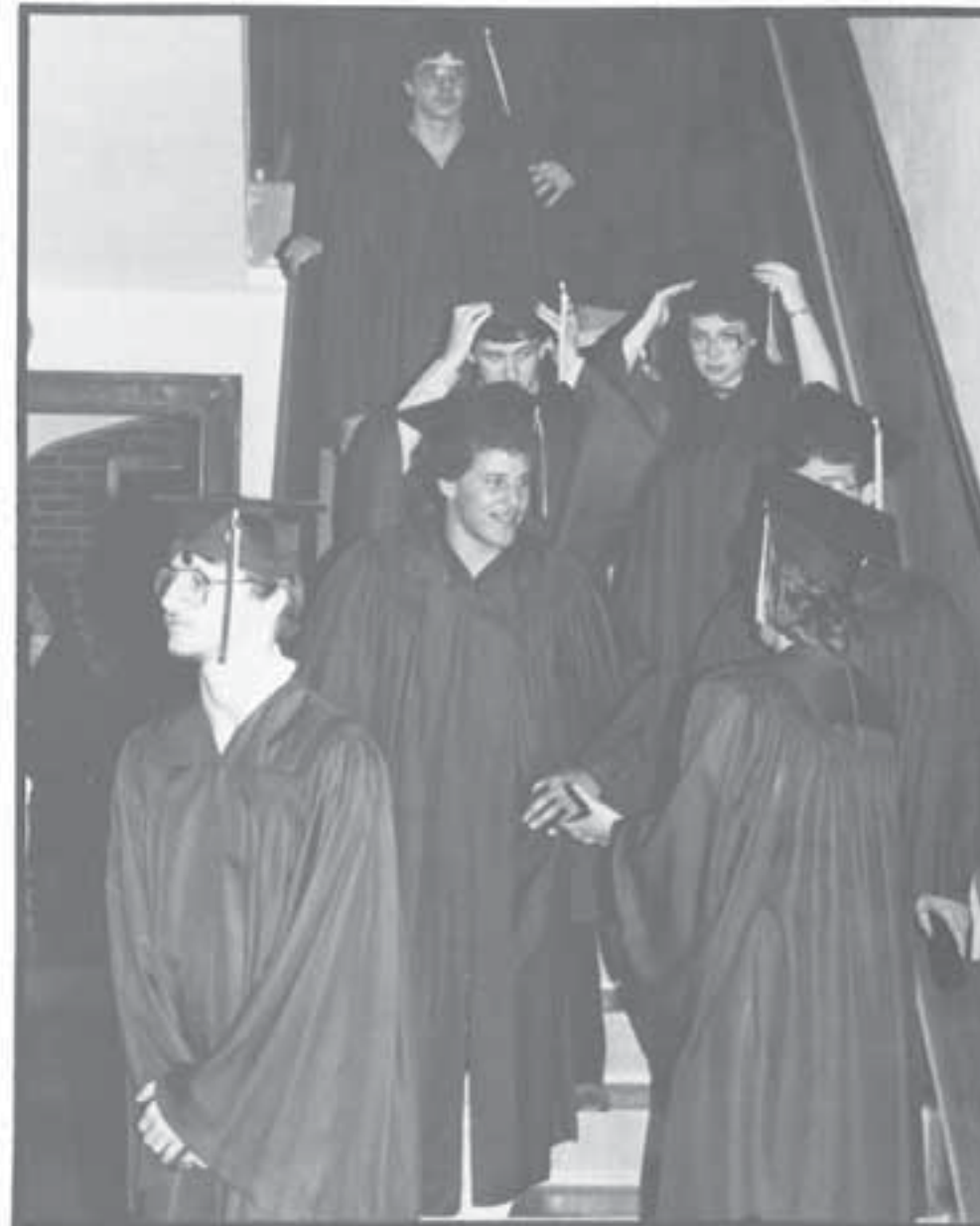
