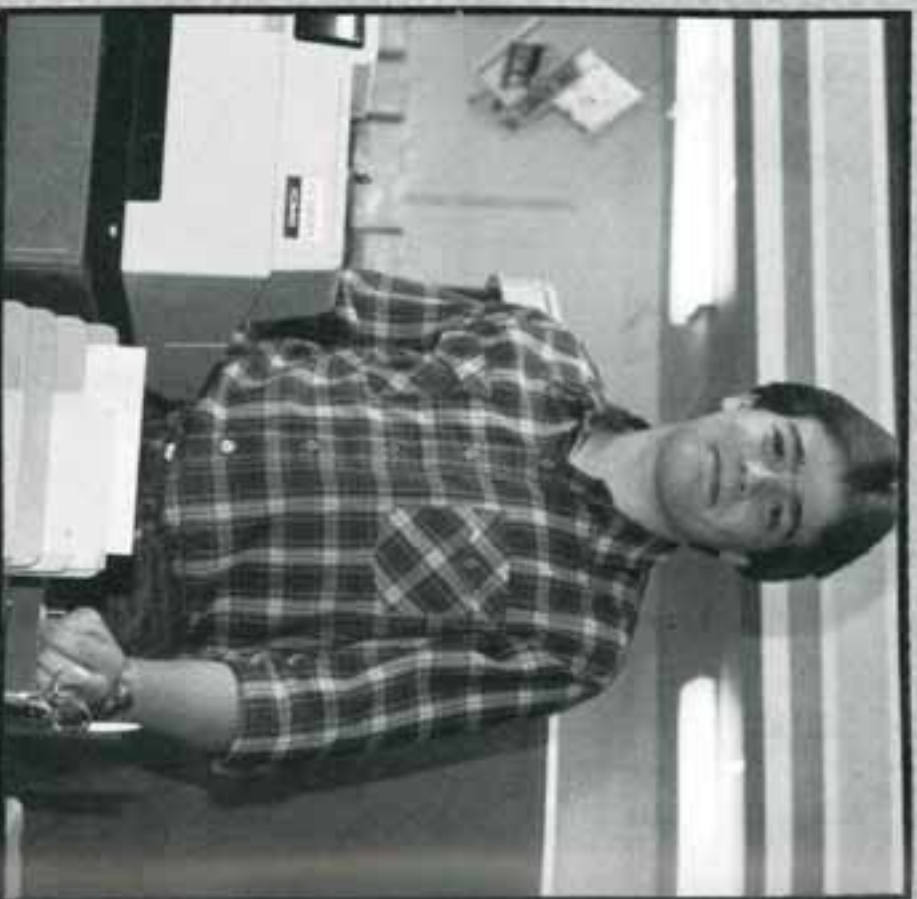

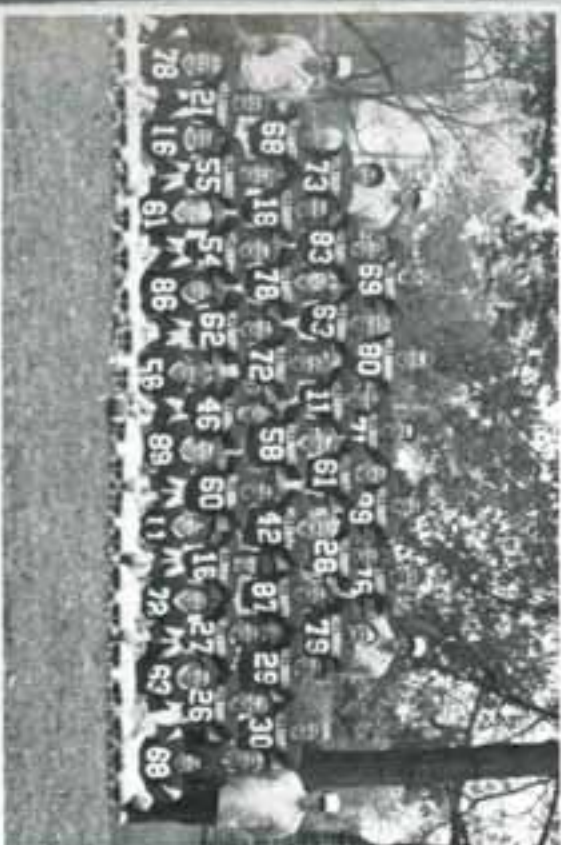
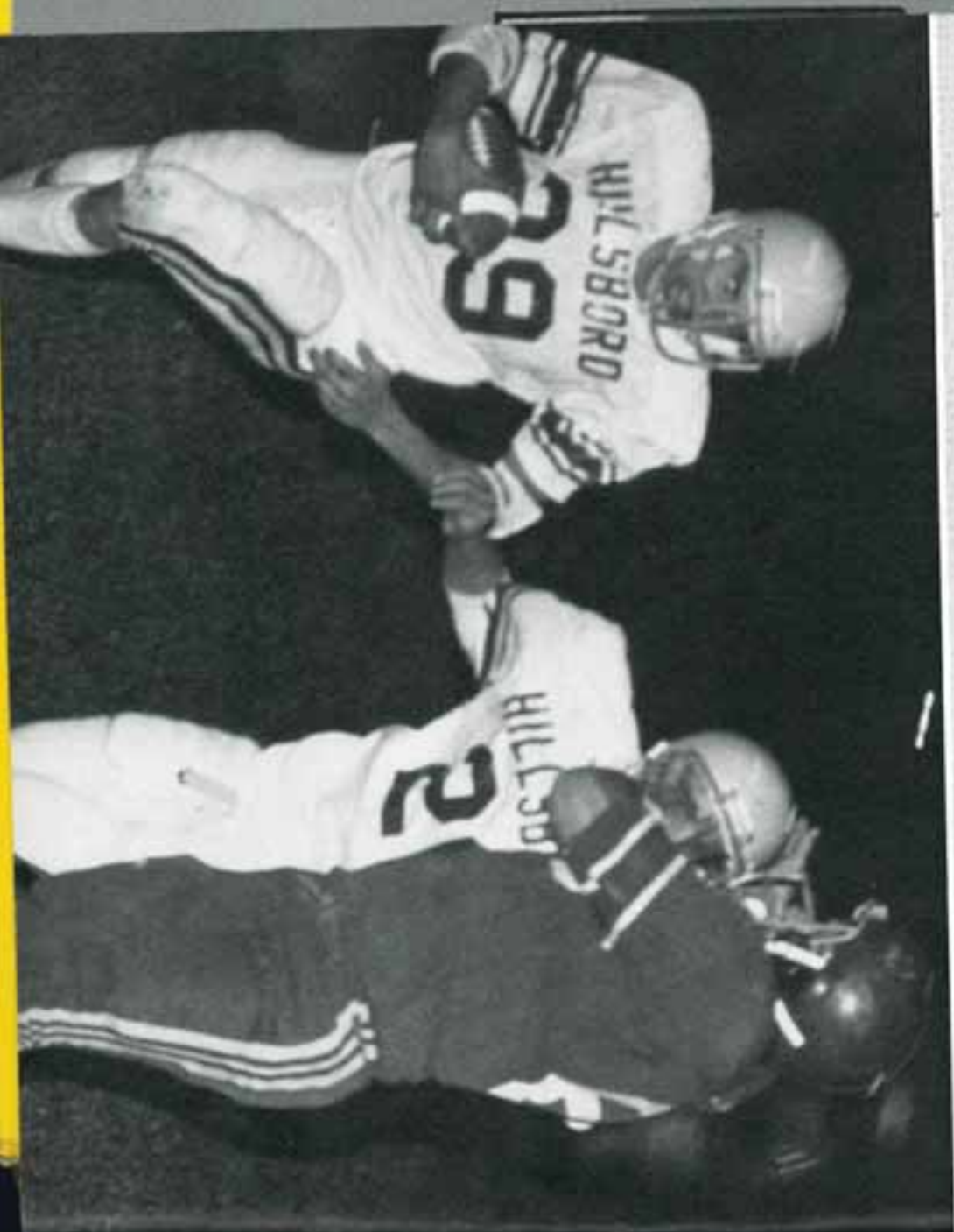

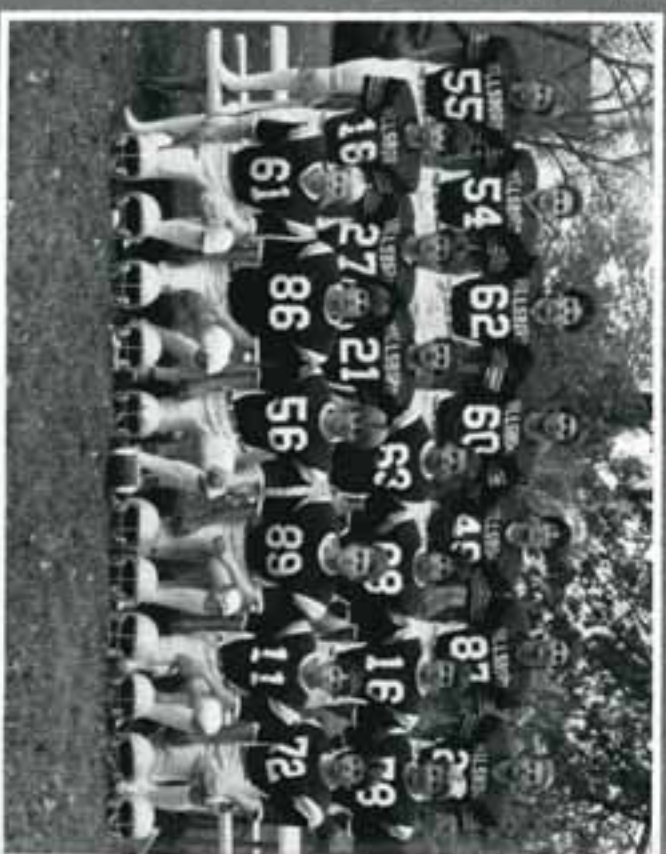

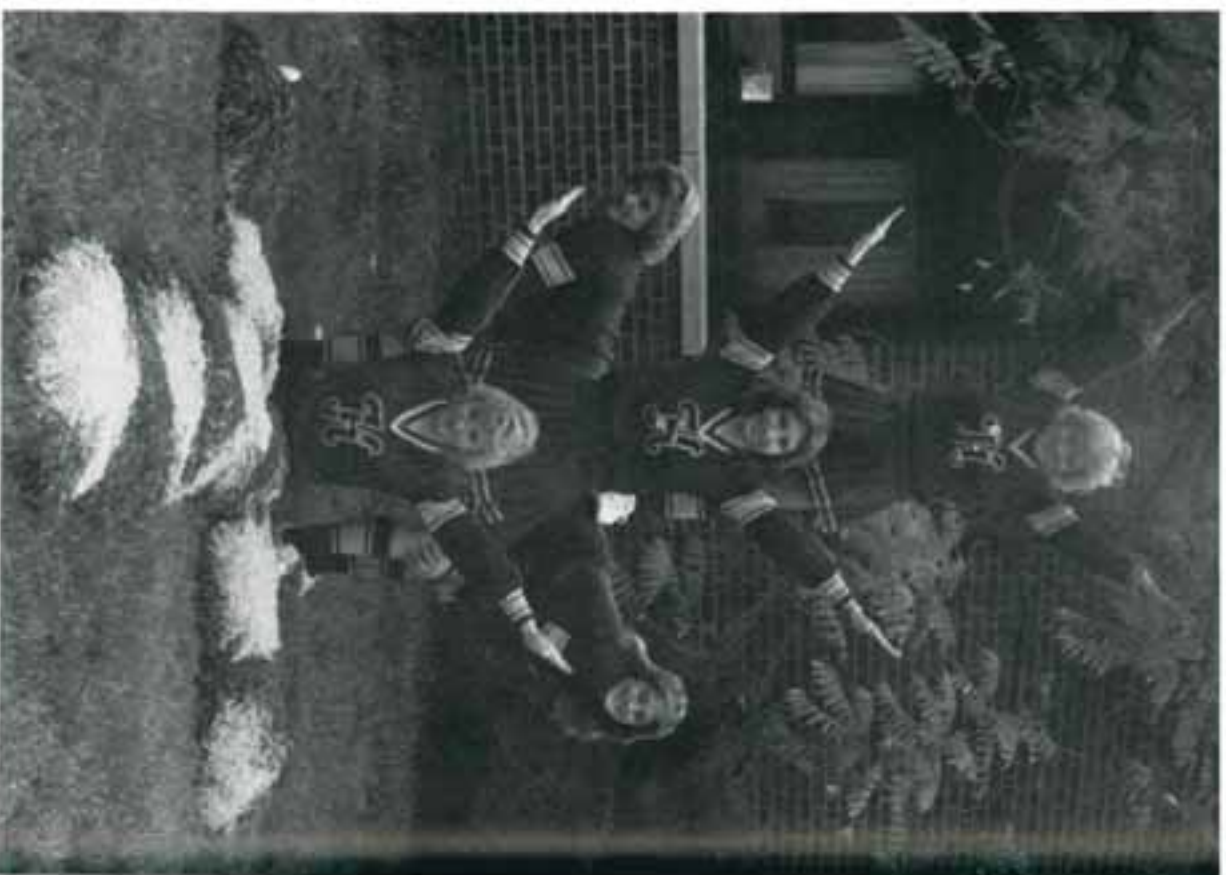


Spirit Soars

Varsity Has Strong Finish

The Trojan boys' basketball team completed their season with a 500 record of 11 wins and 11 losses. The Trojans were 8 and 6 in the MKL giving them a fourth place finish. "We were somewhat inconsistent early in the season; however, we won 5 of our last 7 games which is the mark of a successful team. I believe how a team finishes shows its character; and in our case, our team proved it was one with pride and courage," Coach Terry Hill said in summarizing the Trojan year.

Highlights of the season included wins over league champion Moundridge and state ranked Remington. The varsity boys' basketball team advanced to the semi-finals of sub-state play but was defeated by Southeast of Saline who later advanced to state competition.

Several Trojans had impressive individual statistics in the league. Senior Doyle Jost led the MKL in offensive rebounds, was third overall in total rebounds, and second in shooting percentage. Senior

Dale Klassen finished tenth in league scoring with an 11.5 scoring average. Junior Mike Brenneman led the league in free throw shooting percentage, was sixth in shooting percentage, and sixth in scoring with a 15.6 average. Junior Jason Valnar finished third in the league in defensive rebounds and fifth in total rebounds.

Doyle Jost was selected by his teammates as the Most Valuable Player and Most Improved Player; he also was named to the all Mid-Kansas League team. Junior Todd Arnold was selected as the team's Most Inspirational Player. Mike Brenneman was recognized by being selected to the all MKL first team, all-area second team, and all-tournament team in the pre-season Council Grove Tournament.

Seniors Doyle Jost and Dale Klassen agreed that playing together as a team had given them a successful season and that it had been fun playing together.

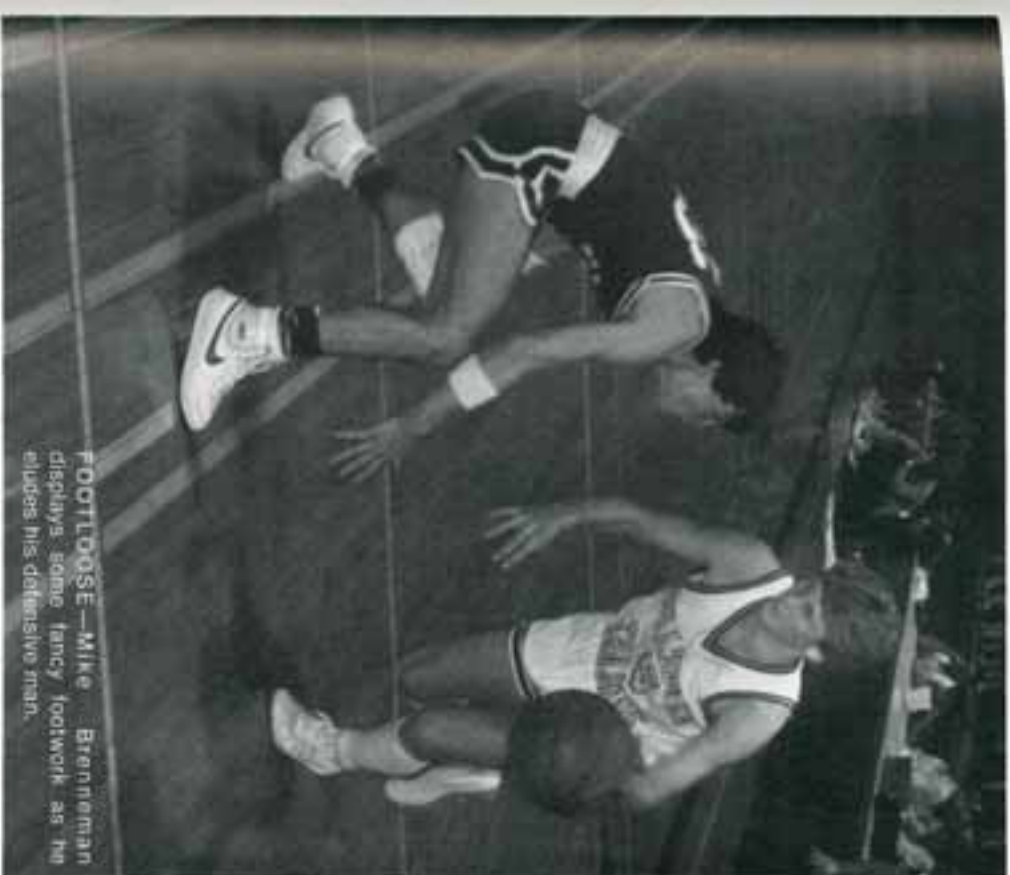

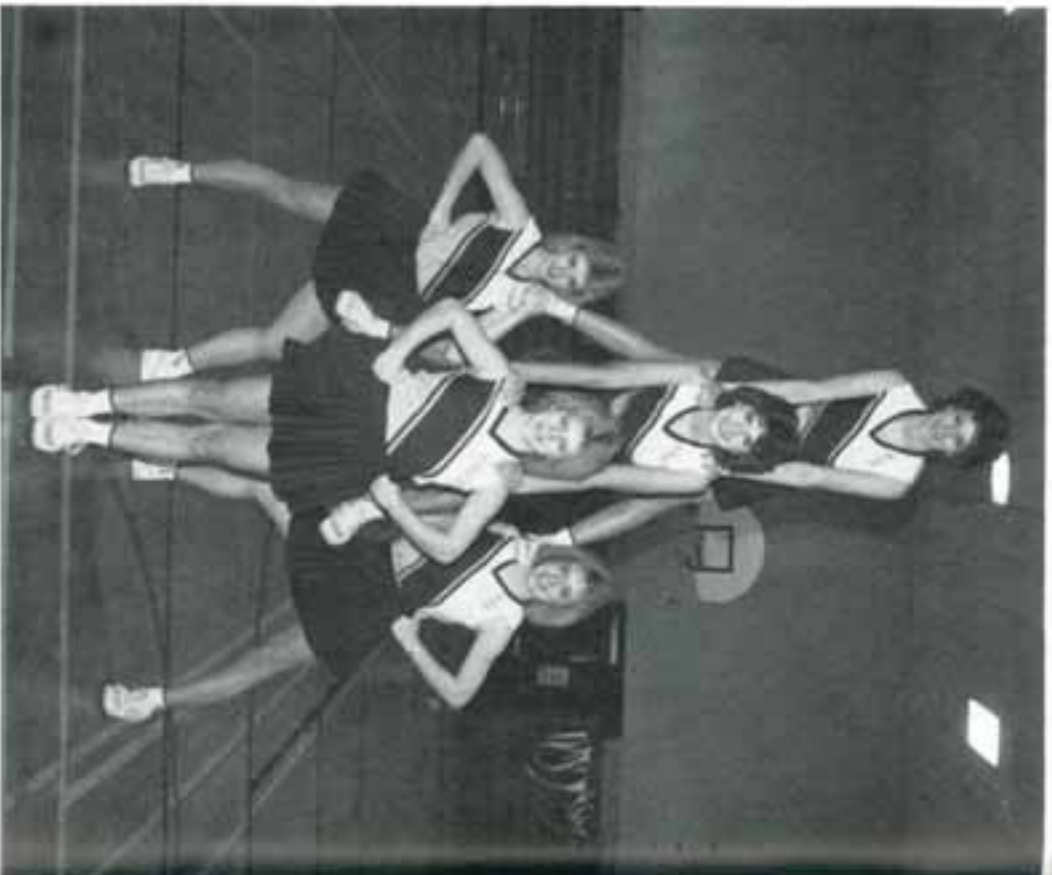


We've Got...

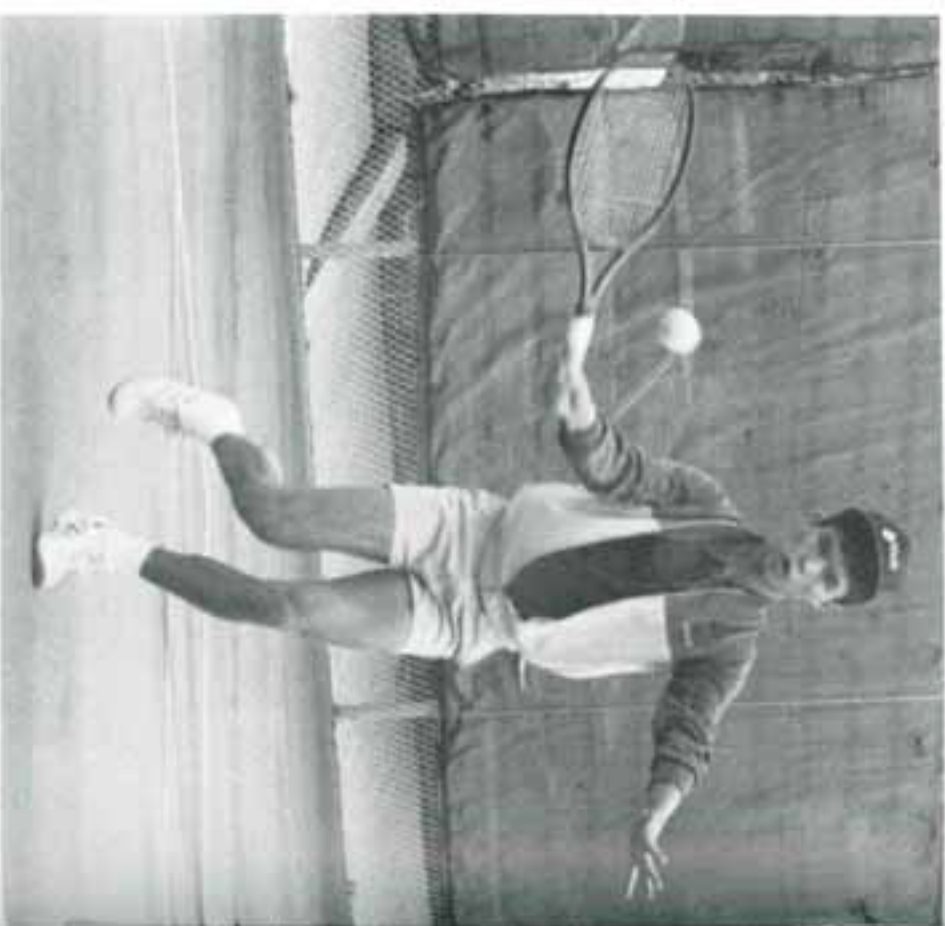

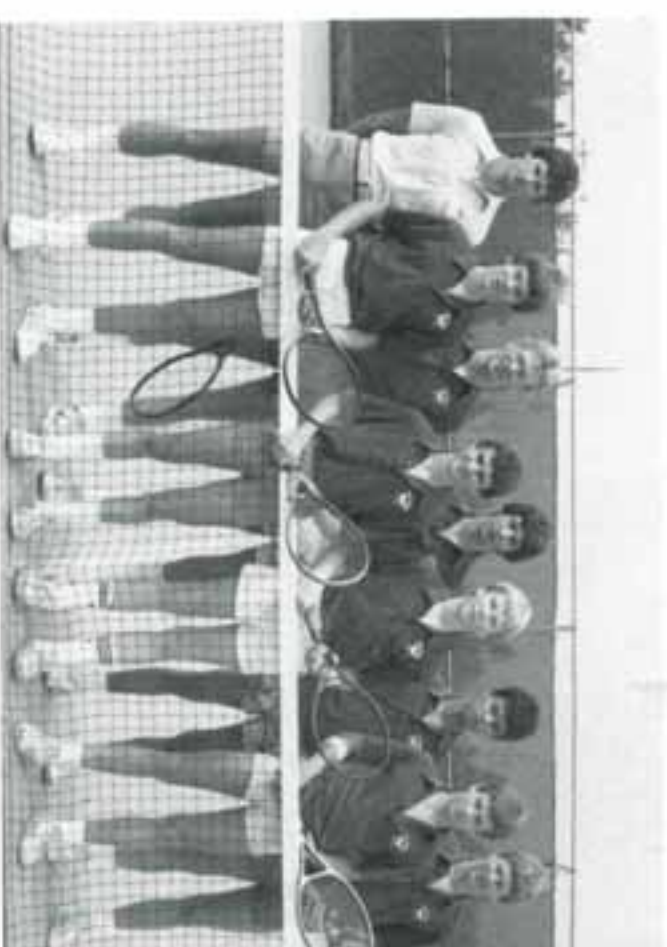

Girls Break Records

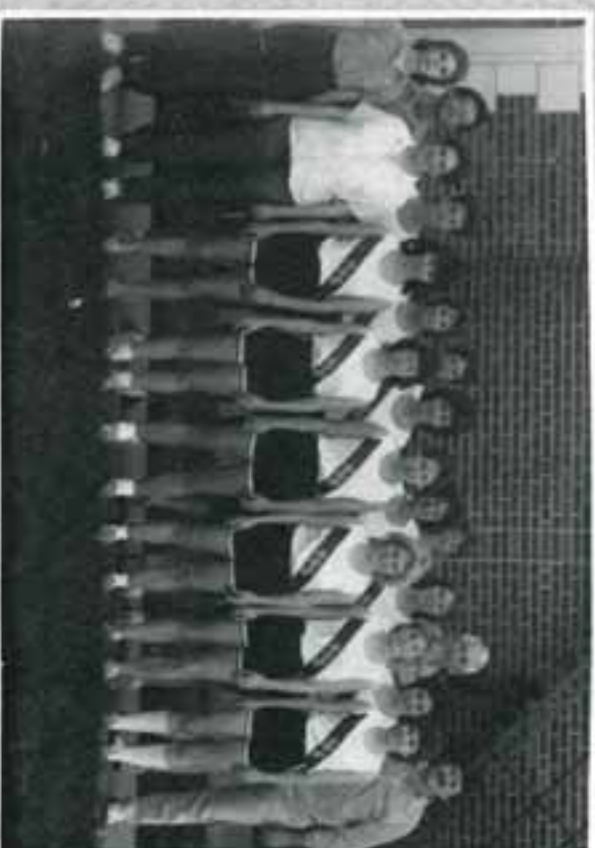

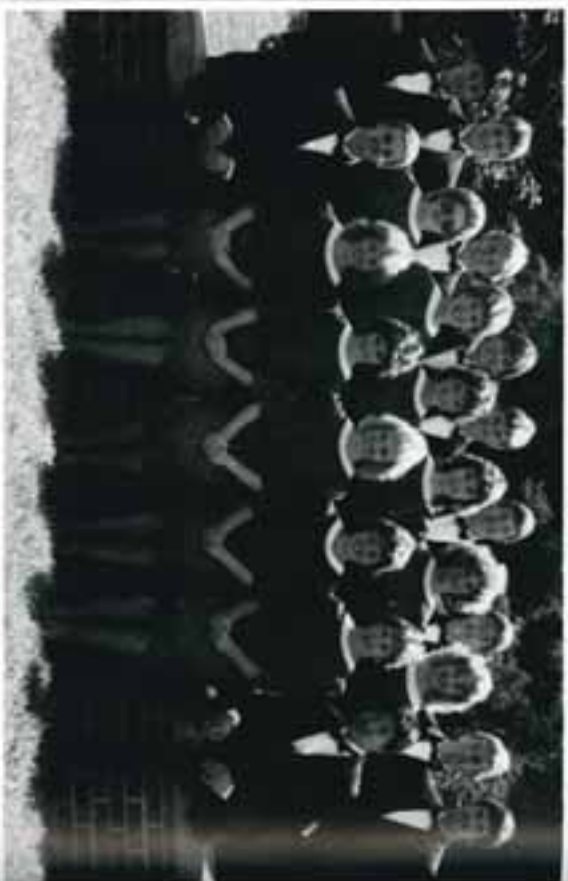

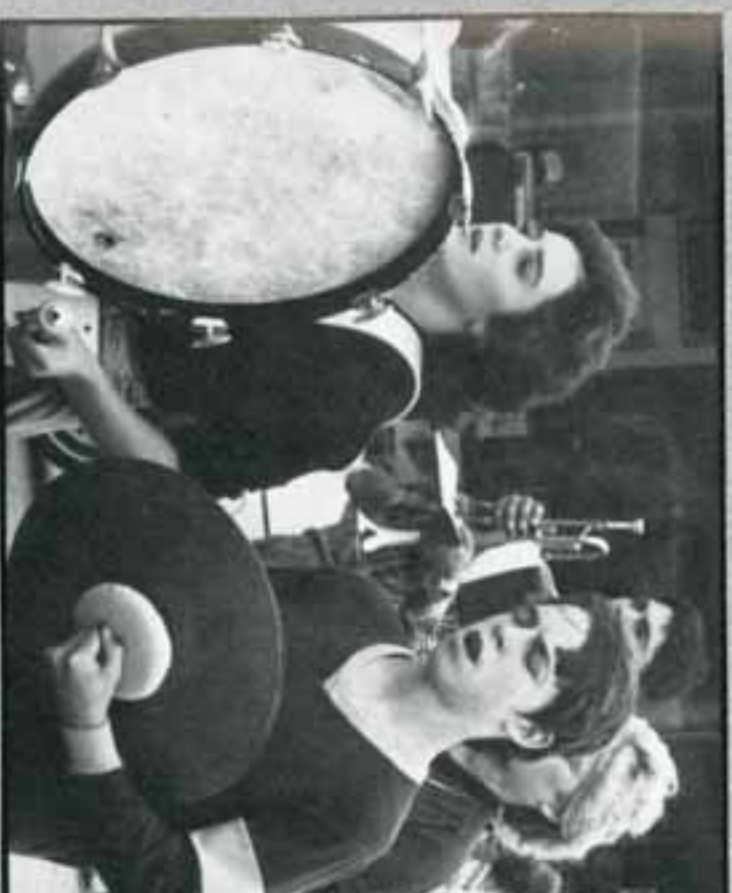

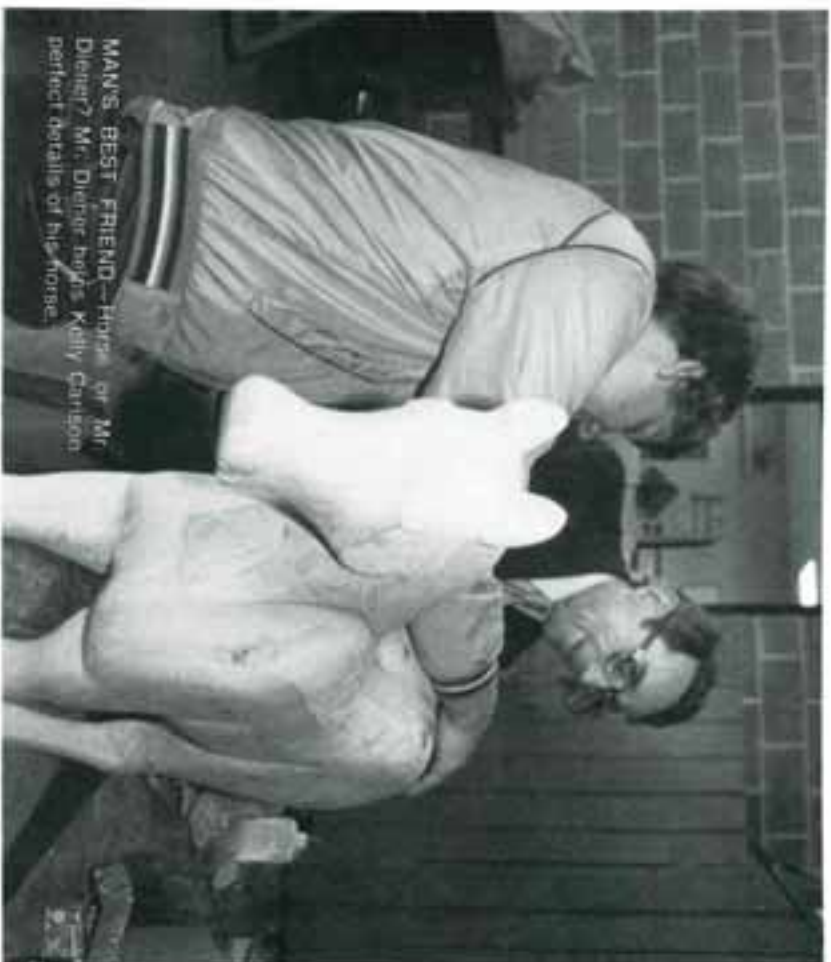

The Agriculture Structures and Electrification team of Alex Herbel, Kris Bartel, David Hein and Bentley Richter received 1st place with Herbel high individual, Bartel 2nd high, Hein 3rd high and Richter tied for 4th. Individually, Steiner placed 4th, Bartel 8th and Blochlinger 9th. The Agriculture Power and Machinery team received 5th place. The Dairy Products team of Warren Unruh, Kenny Steiner and Scott Blochlinger and the Poultry team of Cindy Pankratz, Rex

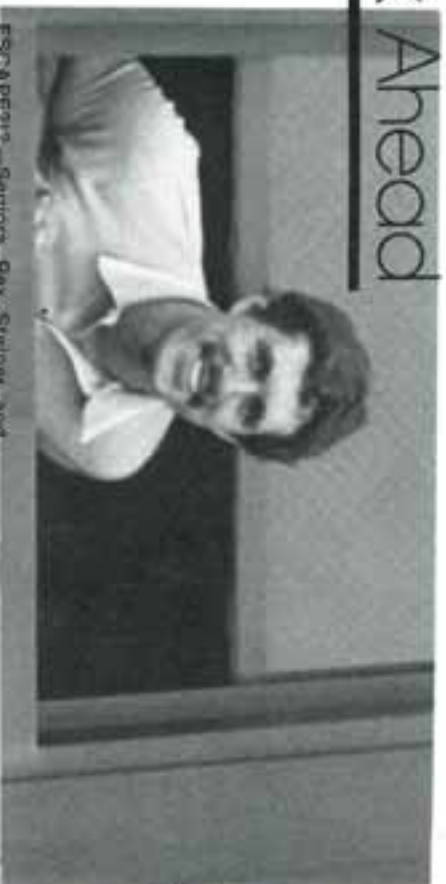


Seniors
