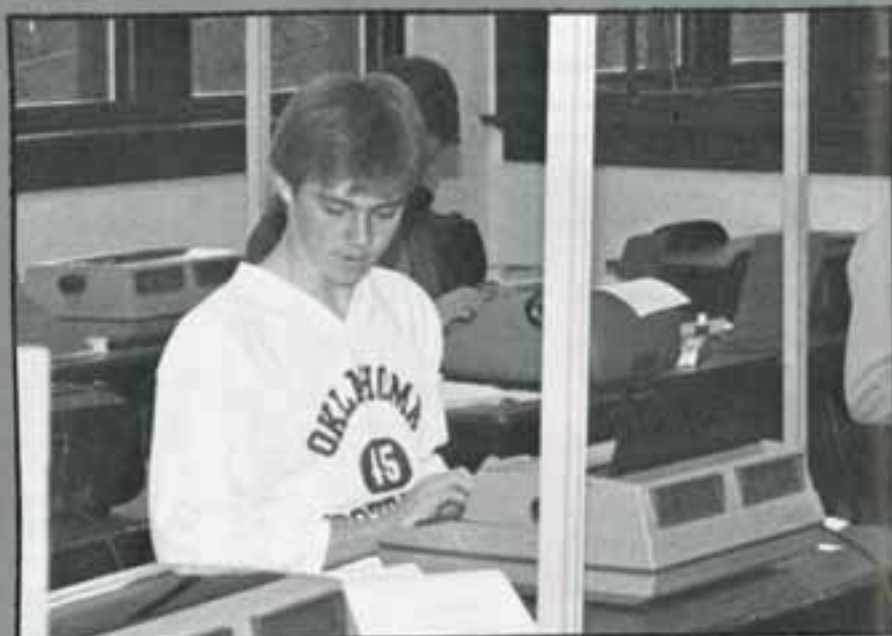

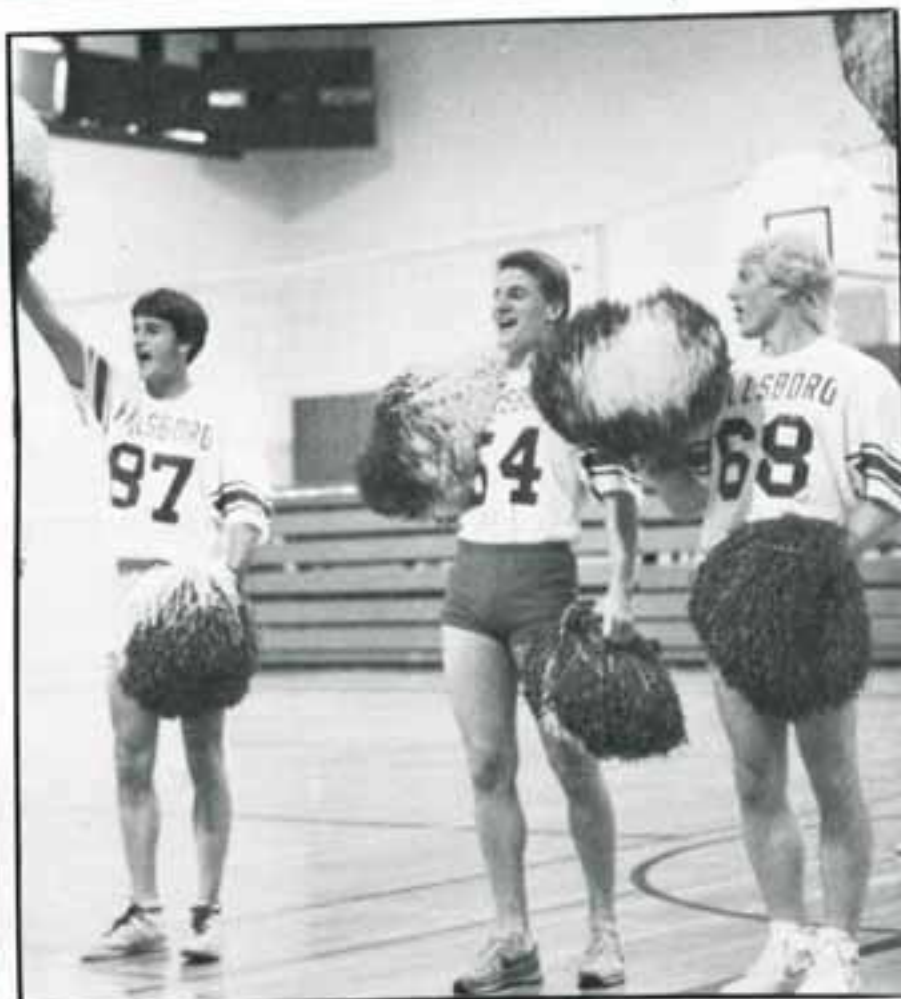

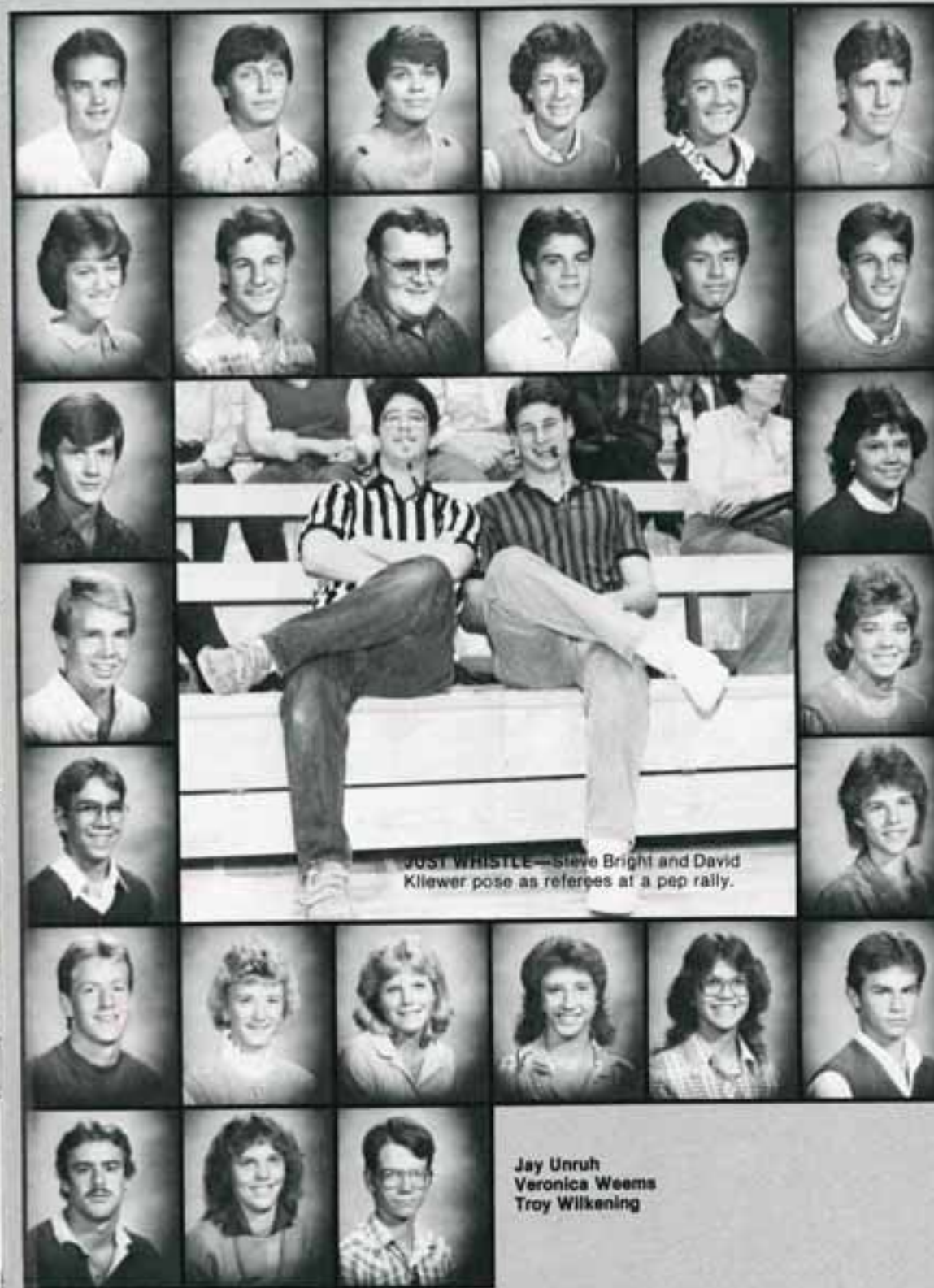

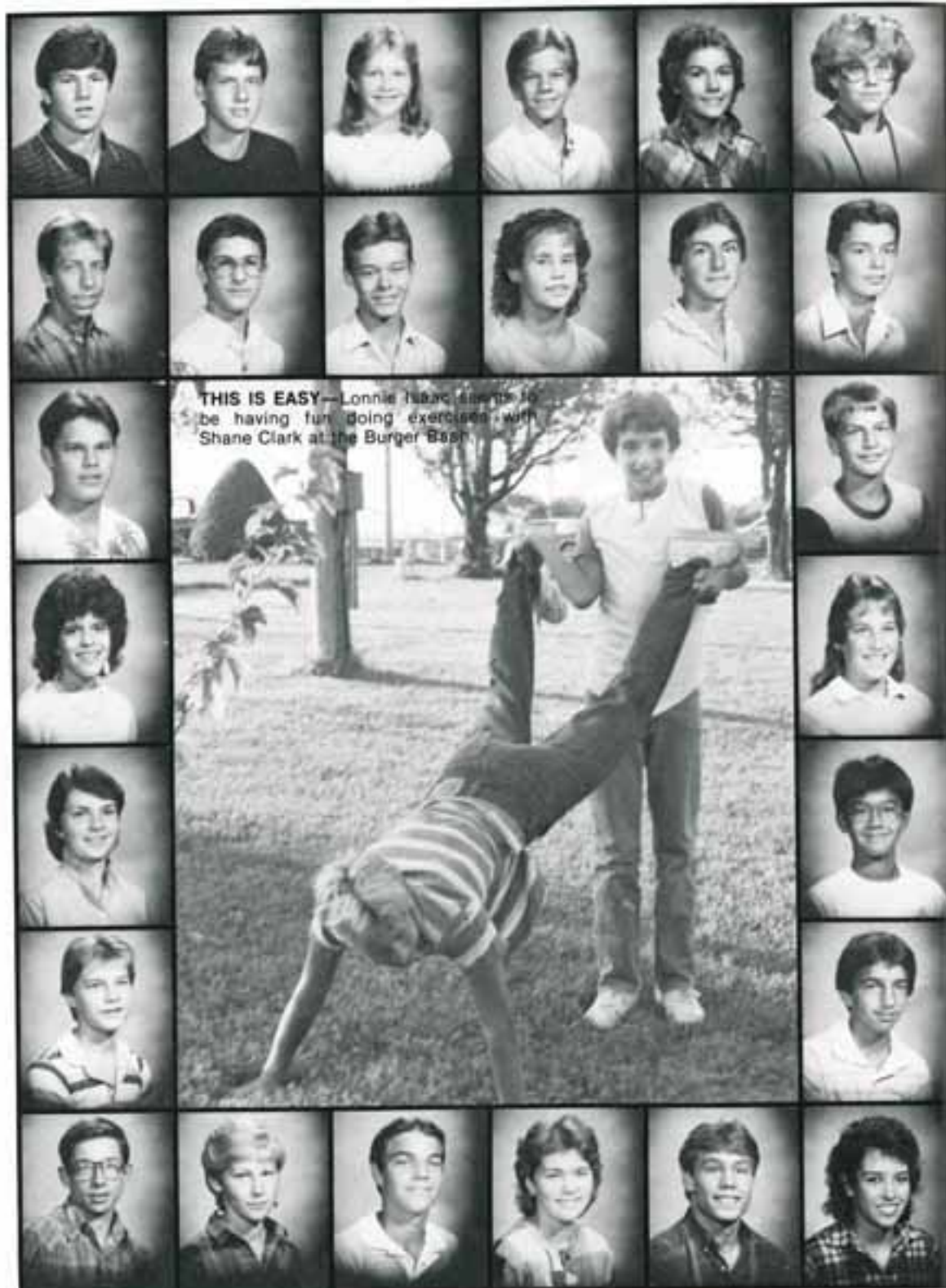

Teachers get involved

Faculty members not only taught various subject matter during the day, but many also worked in extracurricular activities. Faculty members could be seen coaching, sponsoring classes, activities, and organizations, and attending school functions. The seventeen teachers on the staff at the high school were highly visible and an integral part of all school activities.

In addition to their school responsibilities, teachers also had to maintain state teaching certification requirements. Some faculty members attended classes during the summer months and during the school year. There were also those teachers who sponsored activities during the summer and at-

tended camps and workshops with their students.

Sharon Loewen, a second year teacher, said, "I think Hillsboro High School students are lucky to be able to go to a small school. There is more individual attention between students and teachers, and friendships are much closer." Class size at the high school was relatively small, and most teachers felt that this was a definite advantage for them and their students.

Mr. Paul Janzen, alias P.J., has taught in this school system for twenty-seven years. P.J. said, "One advantage many of our students have is the caring and concern of their parents. This concern is often expressed in their attitudes and behavior."

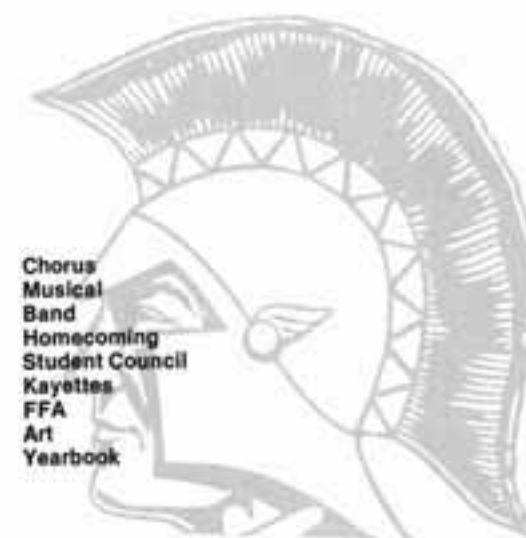

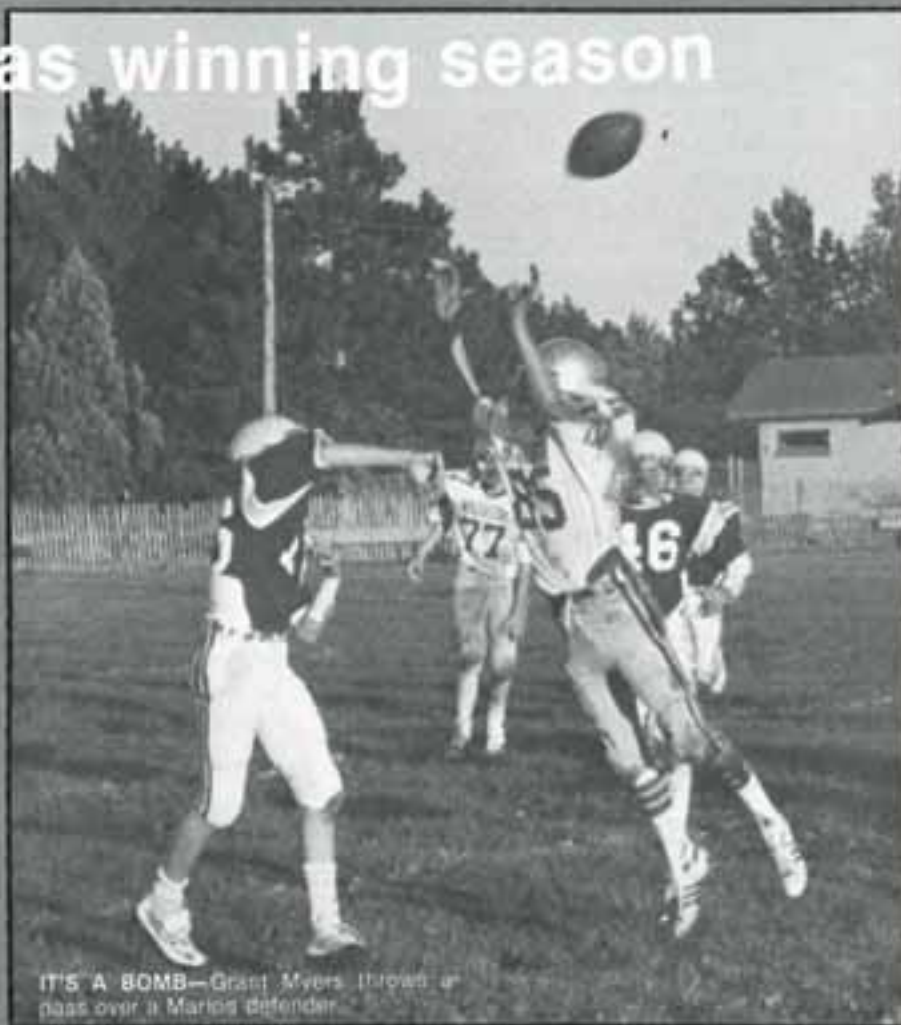


JV team has winning season

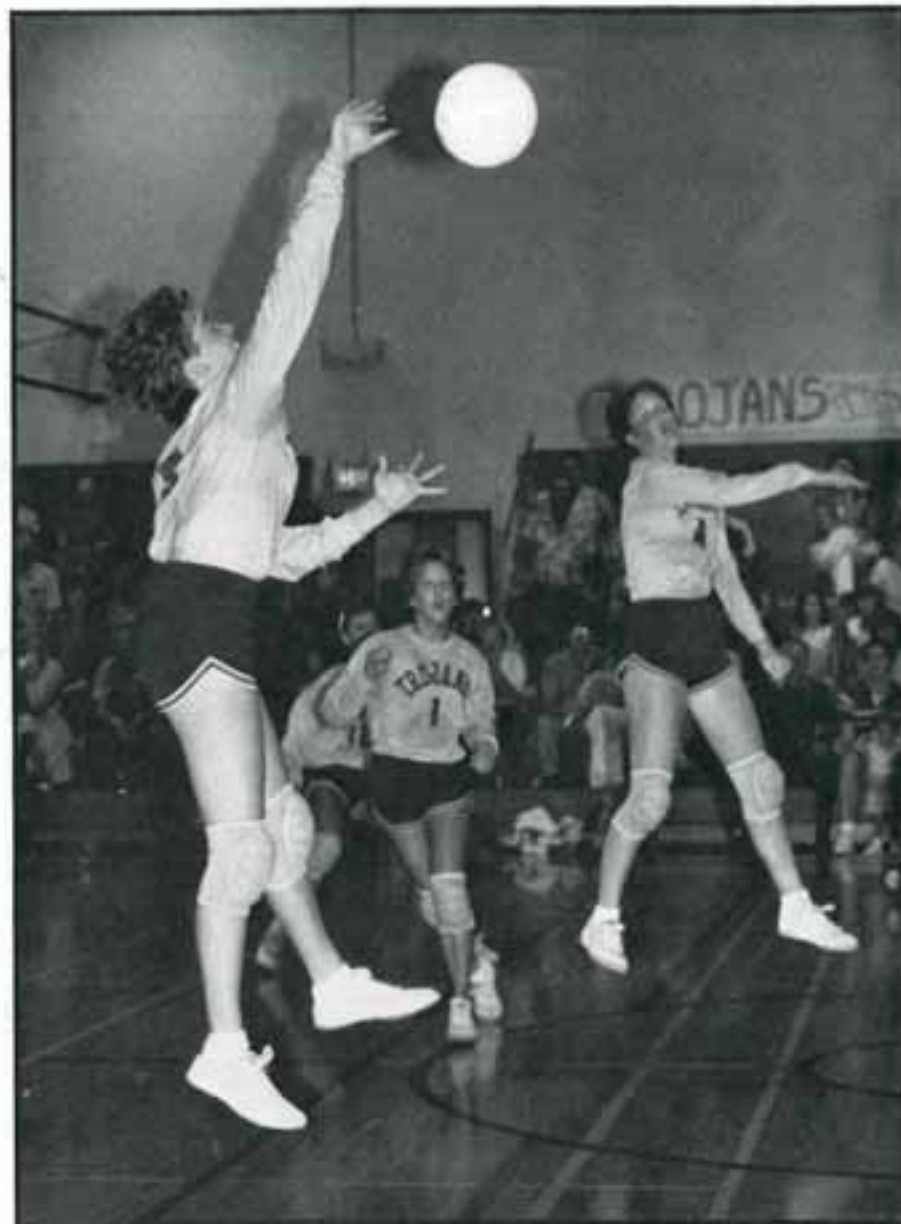

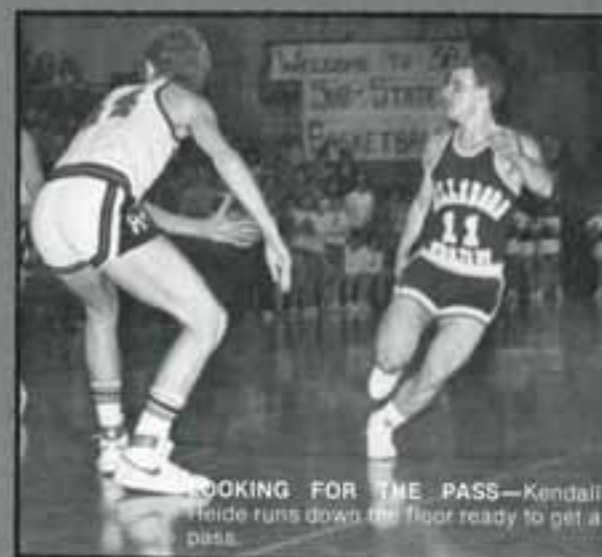

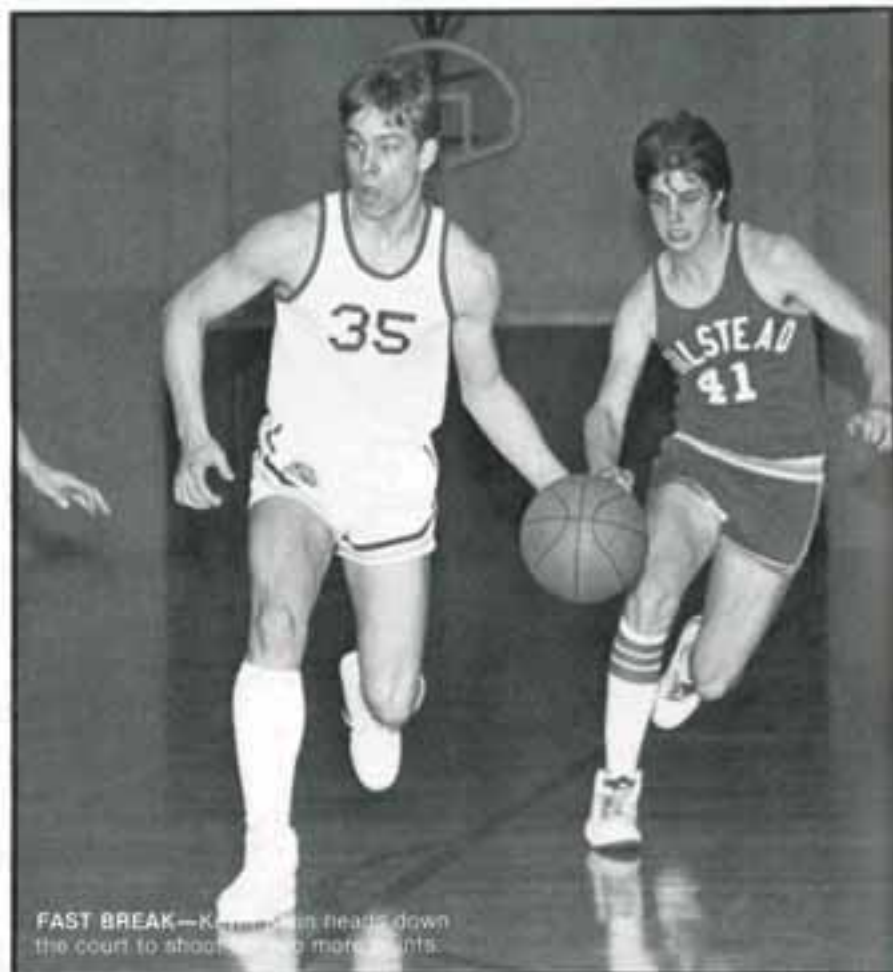


Frosh win

The team voted Sherri Duerksen

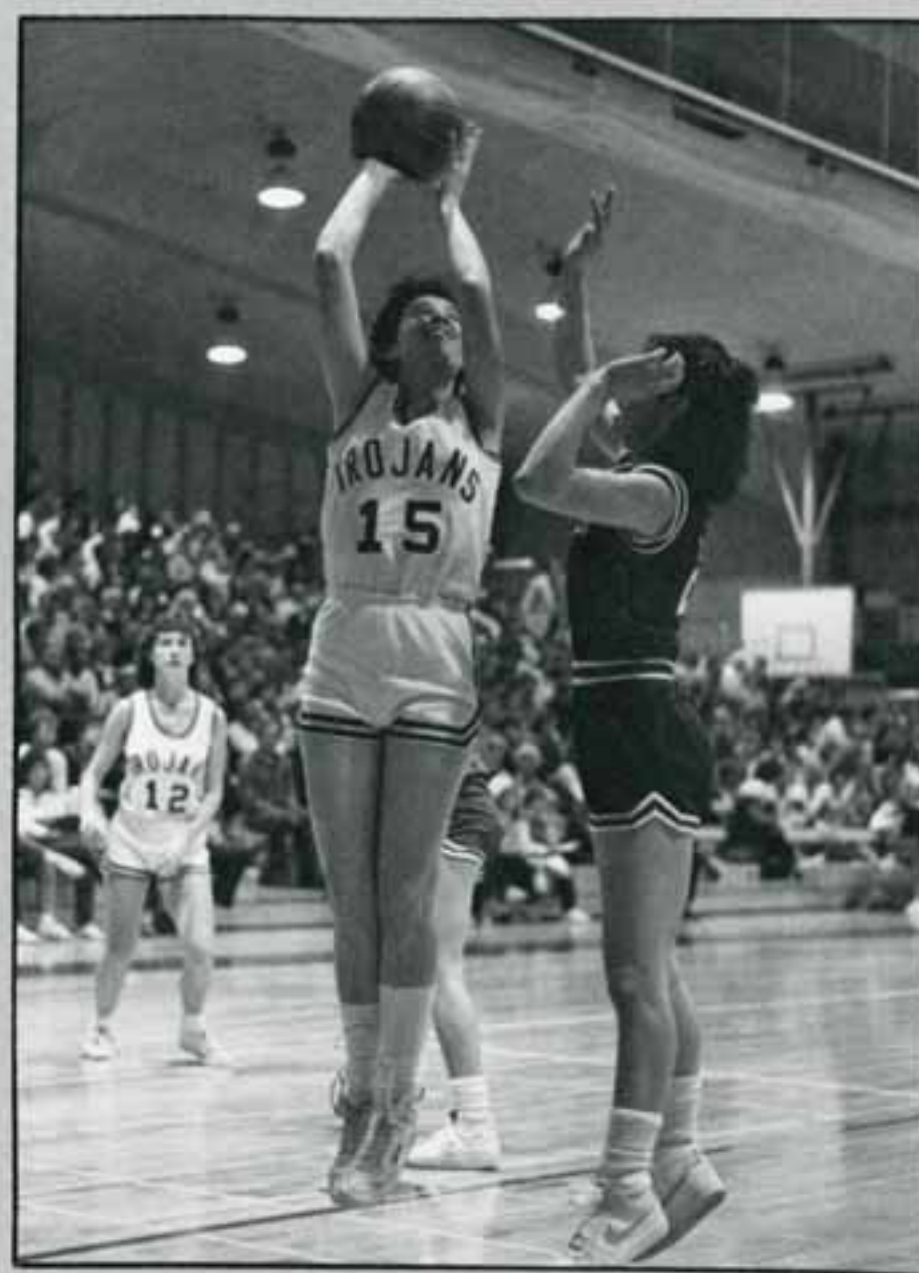

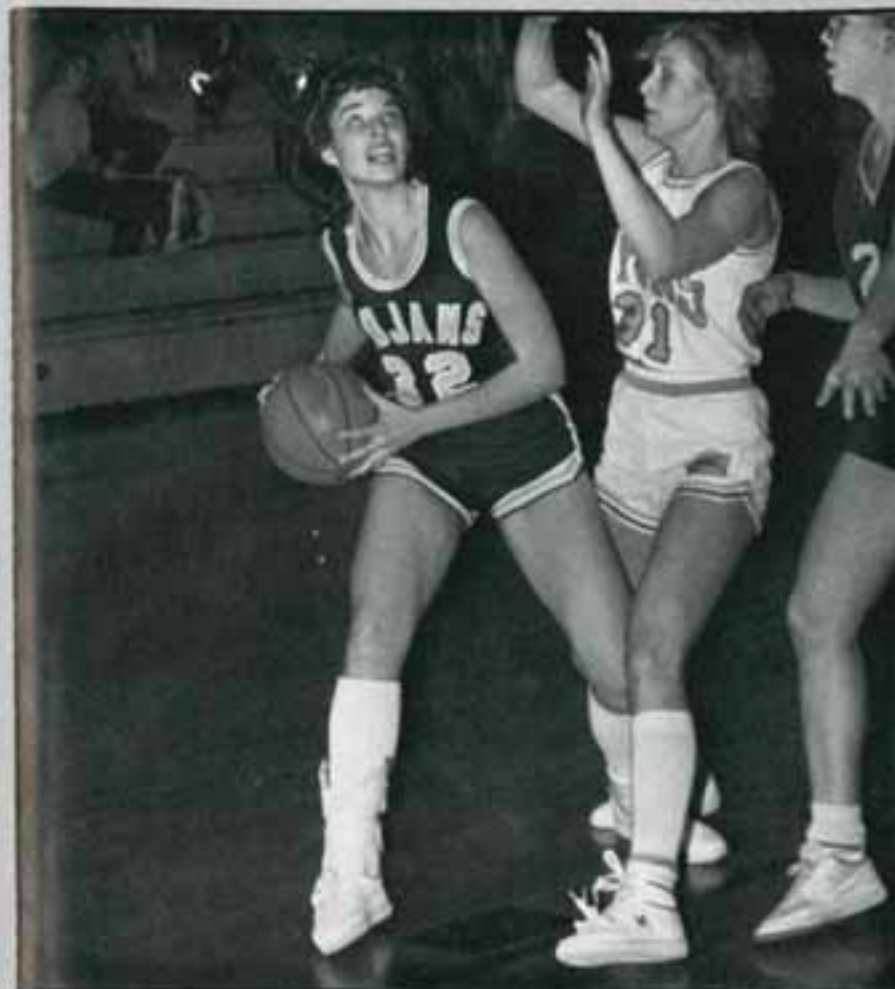

Coach Heinrichs said, "The junior varsity showed improvement by working hard and working together."

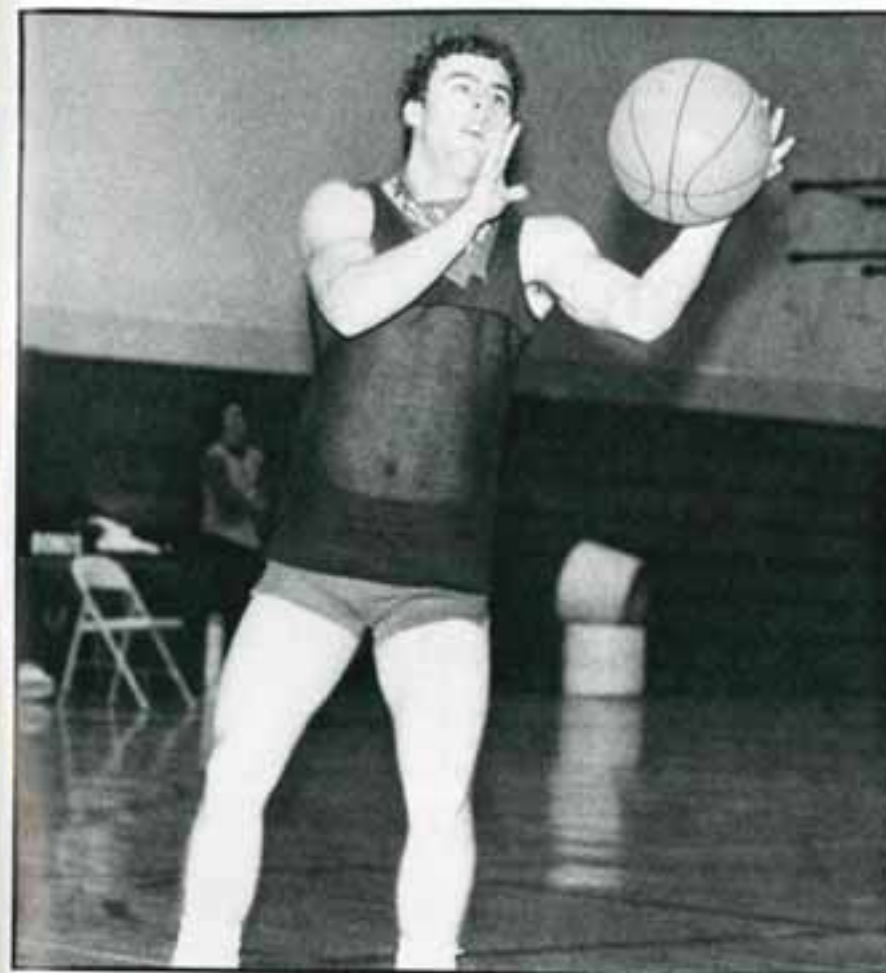

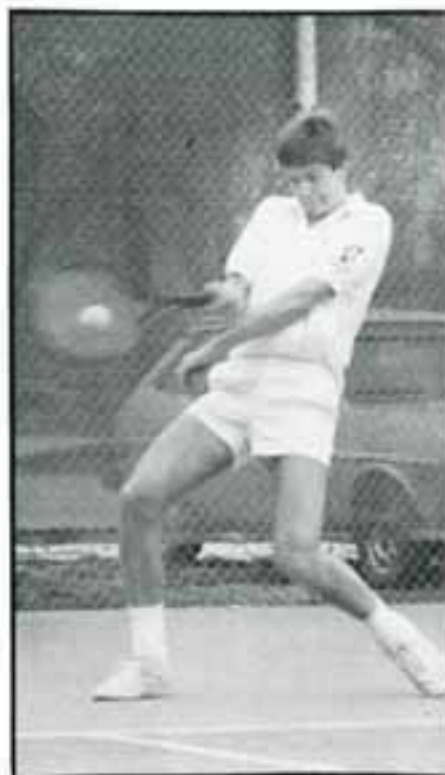
David Kuo ended the season with a 12-7 record. Lonnie Isaac's record was 11-7. Playing number 1 doubles, Brad

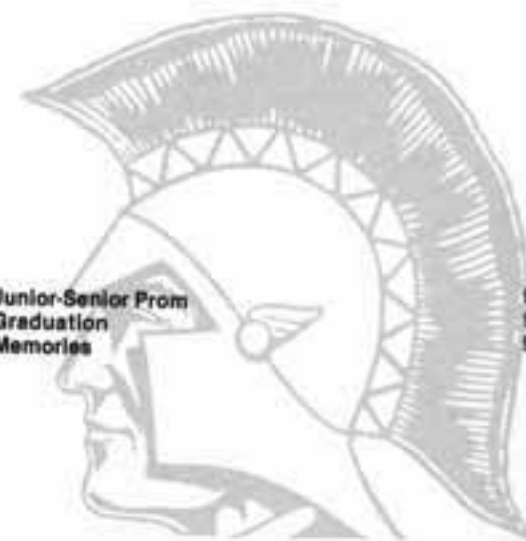

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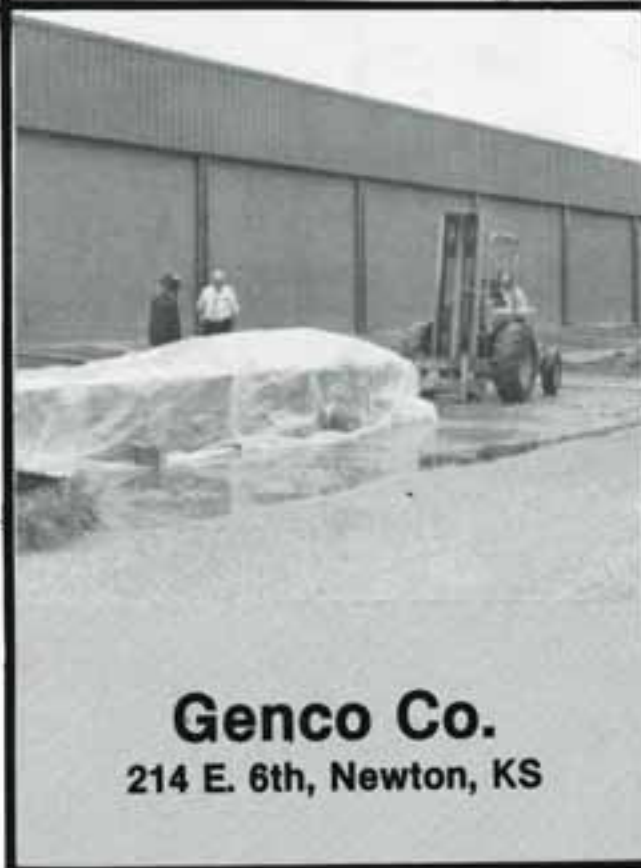
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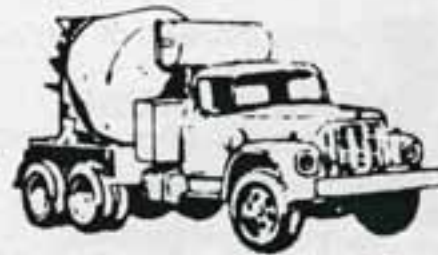
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
