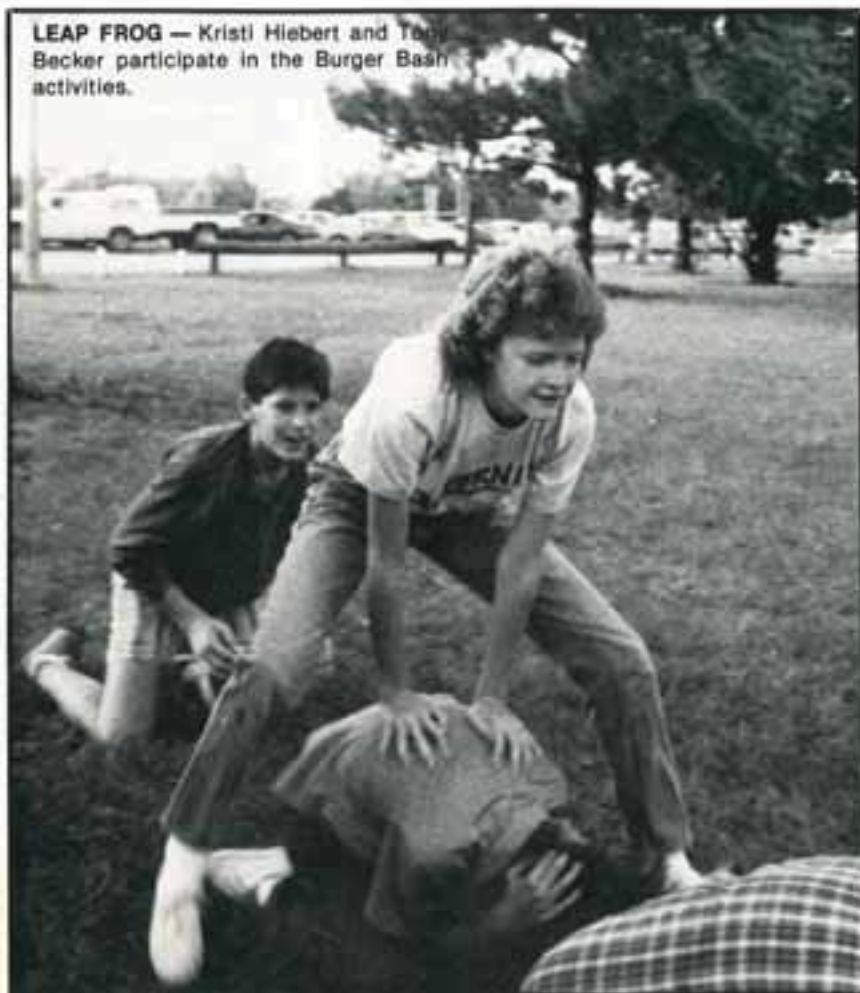

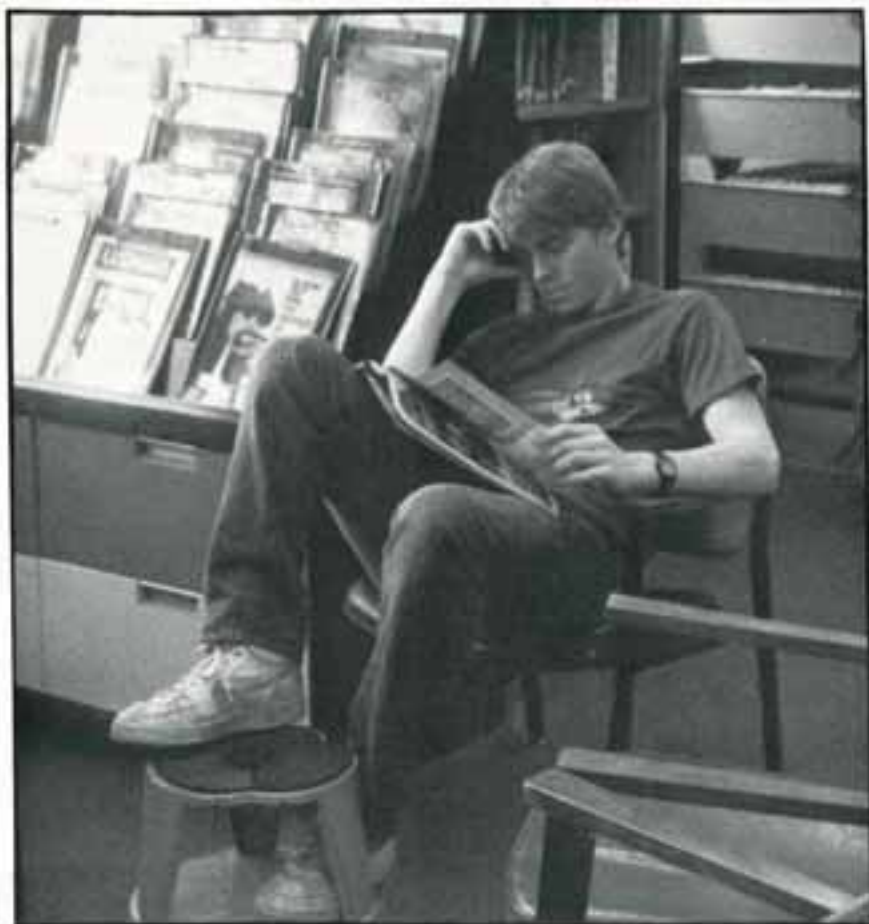

The Game of Life

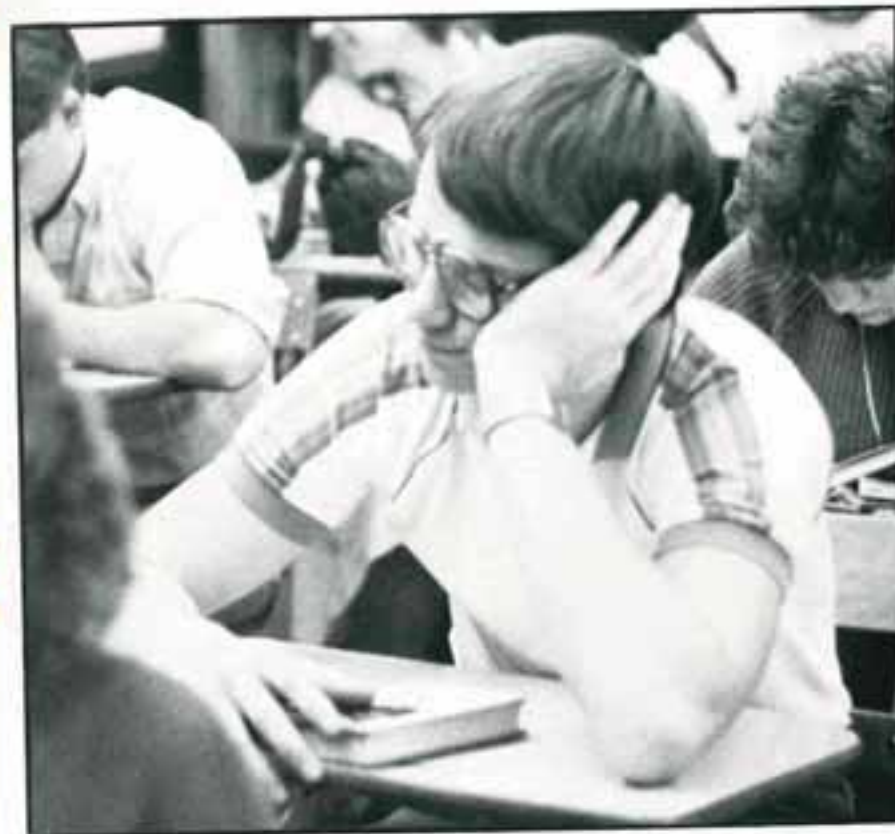

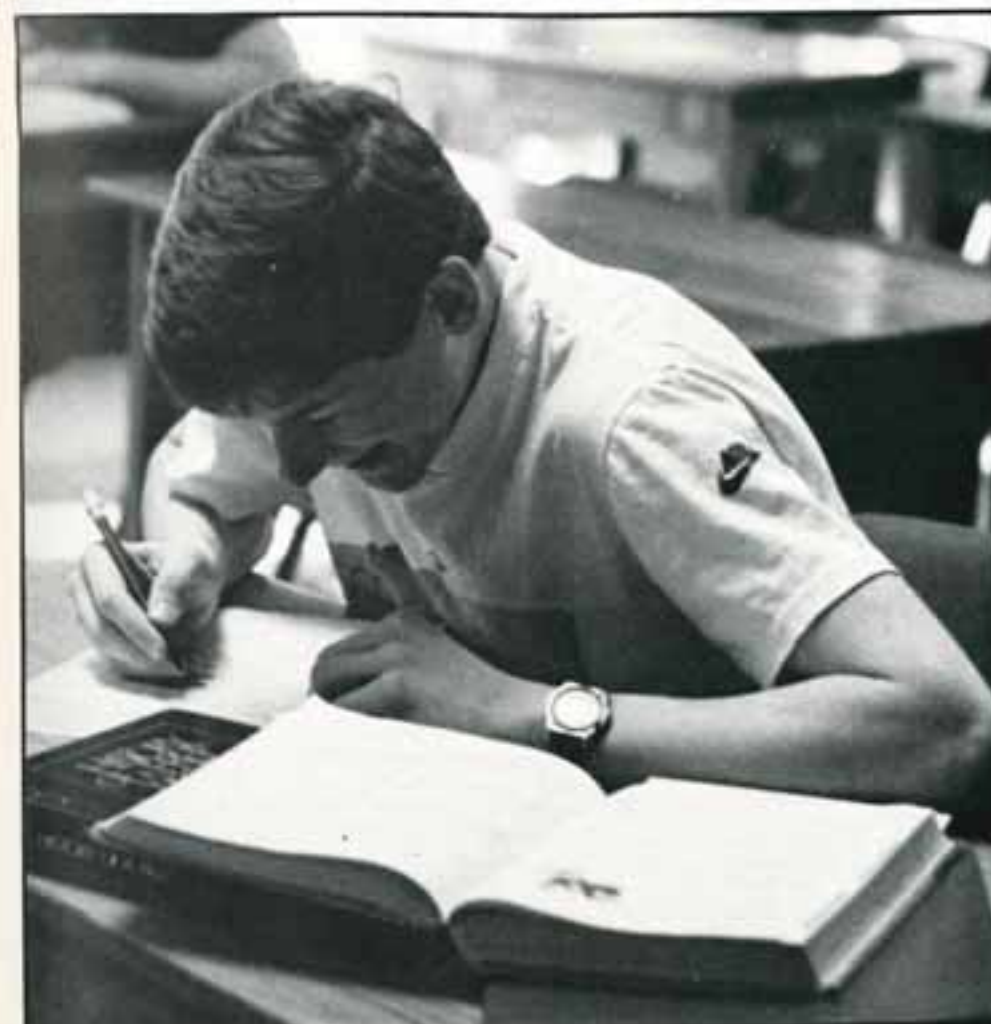


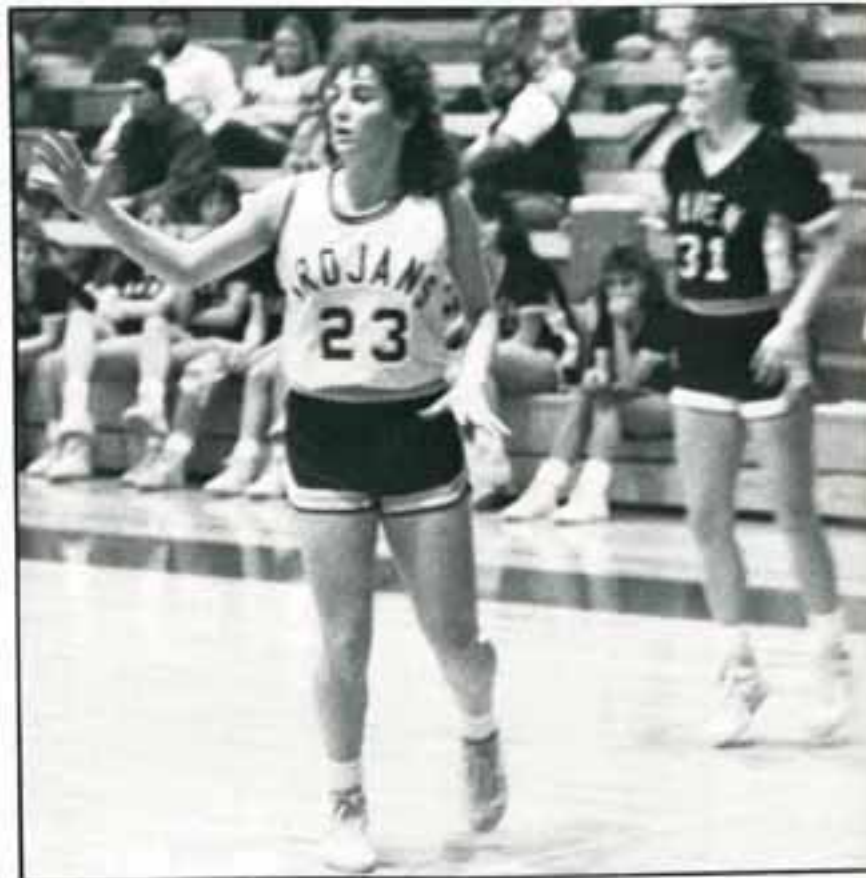

Regional Champs

The varsity football team finished the year as district champions, bi-district champions, regional champions, sub-state runner-up, and Mid Kansas League champs. Coached by Don Penner, *Hutchinson News 3A* coach of the year, and assistants Terry Hill and Max Heinrichs, the team finished first in the MKL Division II with a record of four wins and no losses; overall the Trojans won eleven and lost only one.

The only loss of the season came in the sub-state game at Smith Center. Smith Center defeated the Trojans with a score of 36 to 0 and went on to be class 3A state champions. "The highlight of the season was the Hesston game," said co-captain Jeff Kroeker. "It was the toughest game we had, and the win meant we could go on to bi-district."

Many individual players received

Seniors earning Mid-Kansas League Division II honors were David Kliever, first team center and kicker and honorable mention linebacker; Rich Loewen, end and honorable mention punter; Kendall Heide first team quarterback and honorable mention defensive back; Rusty Thomas, honorable mention split end and defensive back; Jeff Kroeker, first team offensive running back and defensive linebacker; Jay Unruh, first team defensive lineman and honorable mention offensive running back; Bob Cummings, first team offensive guard and honorable mention defensive lineman; Brad Burkholder, honorable mention offensive guard; and Todd Hein, honorable mention offensive tackle. Junior Darren Blochlinger received honorable mention MKL Division II offensive tight end. All-

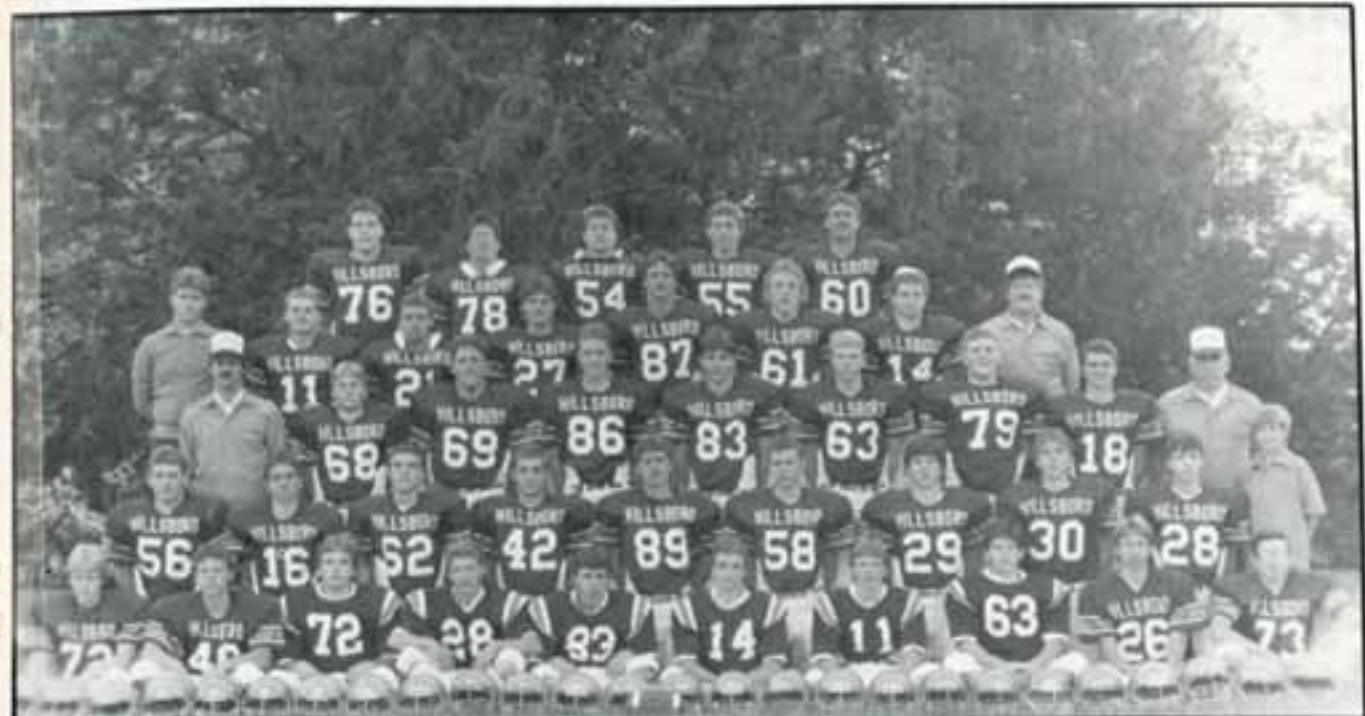

The junior varsity football team coached by Max Heinrichs and Terry Hill finished their season with a record of six wins and two losses.

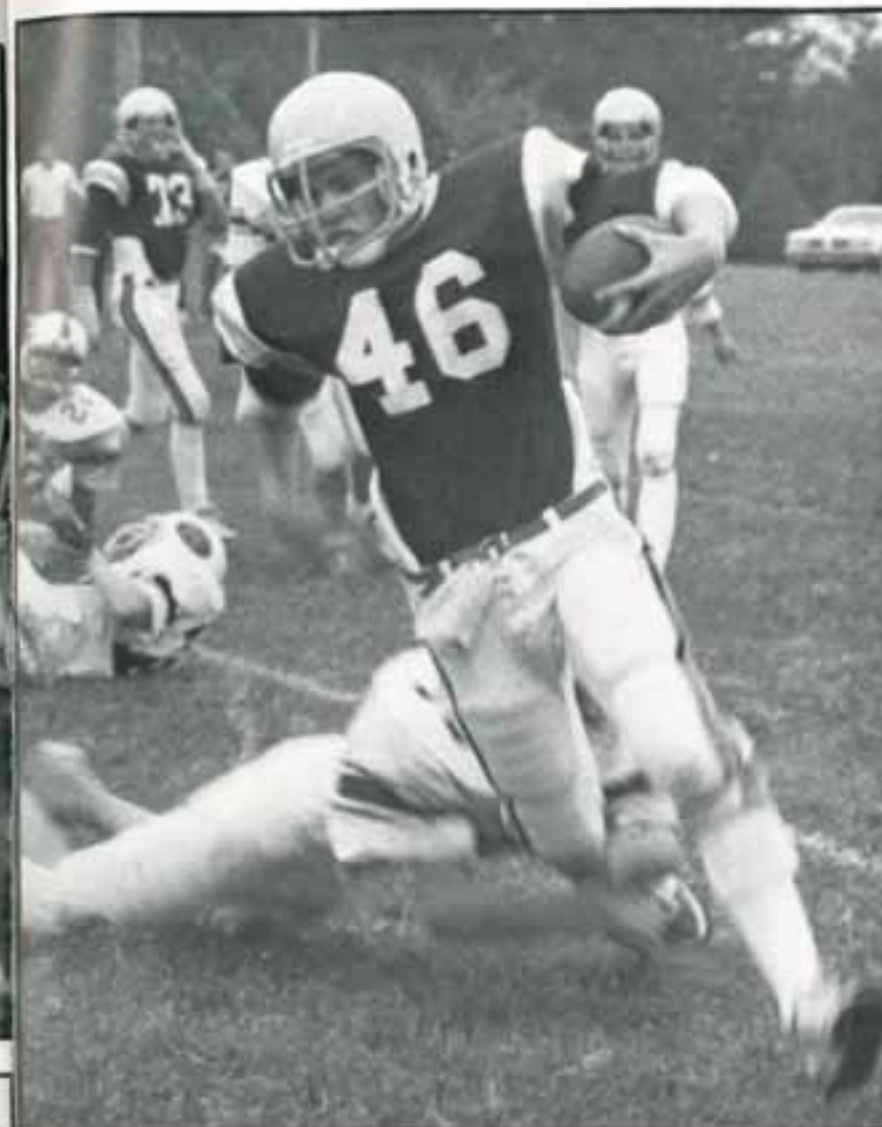

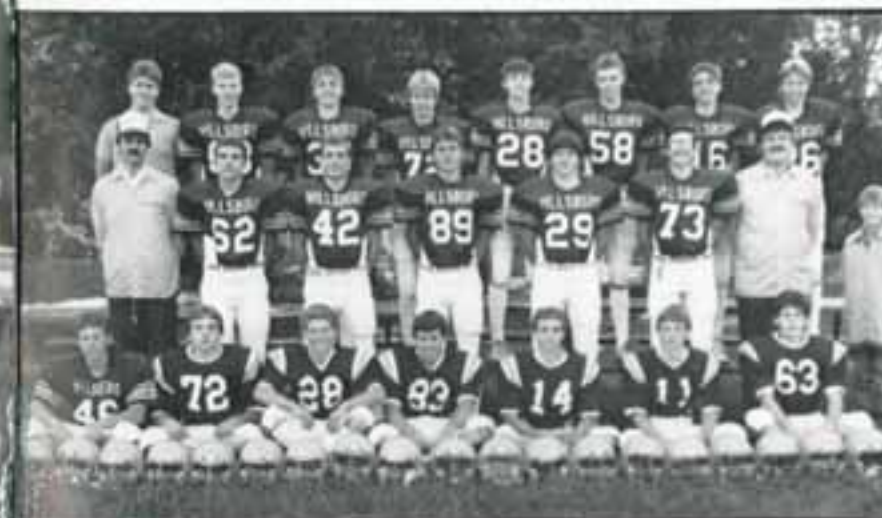

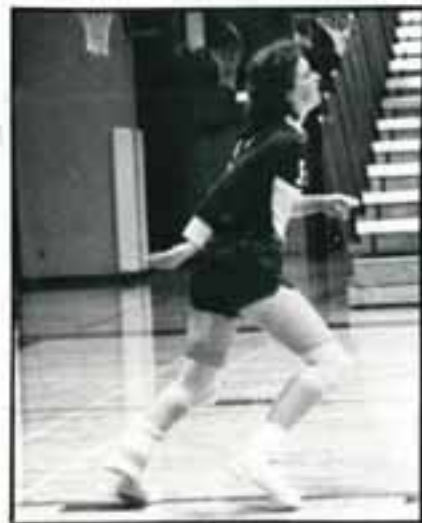

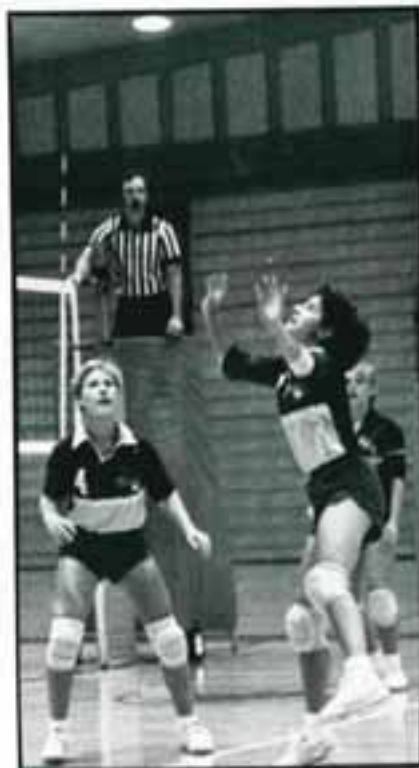
as Most Improved were Denise Miller and Shawna Siebert. Carrie Dalke was voted Most Inspirational.

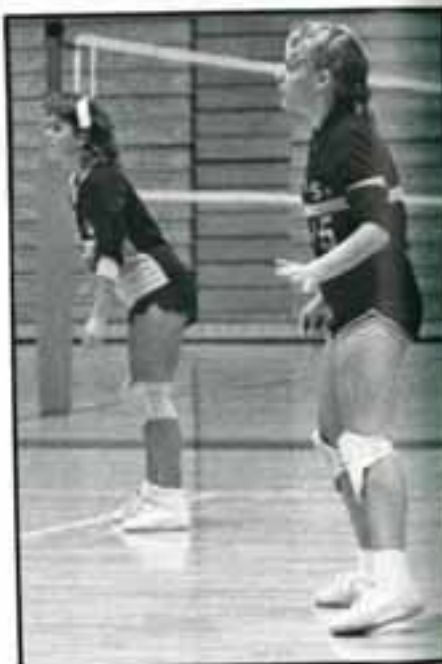

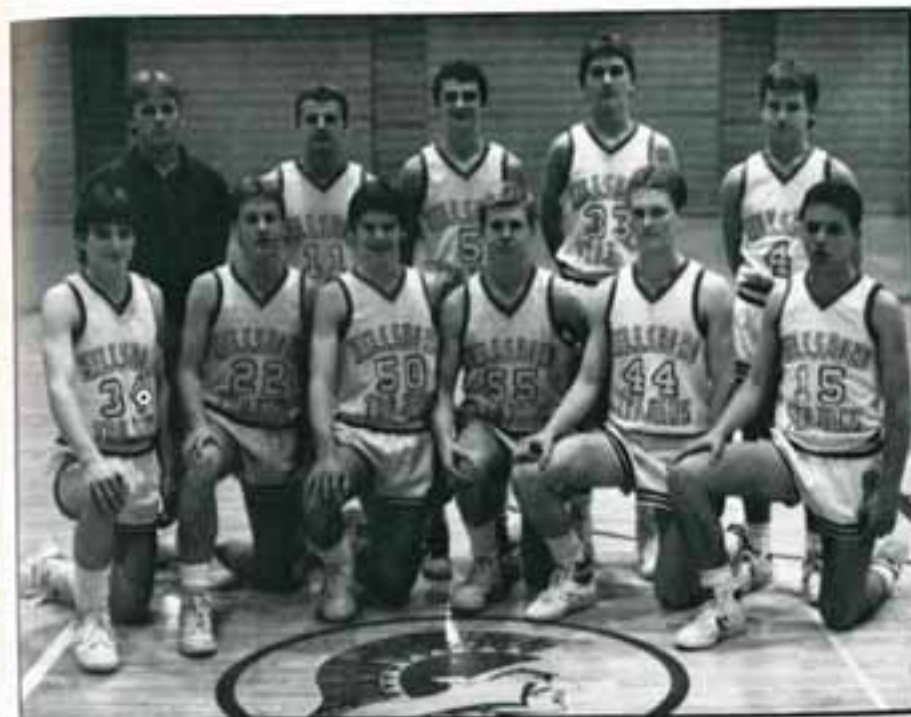

Second at Sub-state

The Trojan boys' varsity basketball team enjoyed a highly successful season, finishing with 17 wins and 6 losses. The season ended with a disappointing loss to Belle Plaine in class 3A sub-state championship play. However, accomplishments for the year were many and there was much to be proud of. "The effort put forth by this group of kids was second to none," said Coach Terry Hill. "They earned the recognition they received by being aggressive and determined to win."

The boys finished 4-4 in Mid Kansas League Division II and 8-4 overall in the MKL. Highlights for the season included winning the Council Grove Tournament championship, handing Haven its only league loss in an overtime game at home, and advancing to sub-state championship play at Bluestem-Leon. Senior Doug Nickel said, "I really enjoyed my senior year of basketball. The coaches, fans, parents, and cheerleaders greatly contributed to our successful season. I feel lucky I was able to compete in such a supportive atmosphere."

Senior Kendall Heide was named first team all-tournament team at the Council Grove Tournament and honorable mention at the Adolph Rupp Tournament. Heide also set a career record with 326 assists for a season and was invited to play in the Thresher Classic All Star game at Bethel College. Senior Rusty Thomas was named first team all-tournament team at the Council Grove Tournament and voted most inspirational player by his teammates.

Junior Darren Blochlinger was named honorable mention all-tournament team at the Council Grove Tournament, first team Adolph Rupp Tournament, first team Division II MKL, first team all-North Central Kansas class 2A-3A, and all-state class 3A. He set new high school records for single game rebounds, 24 against Ulysses; season total rebounds, 287; and season field goal percentage, 60.3 percent. Darren Blochlinger was also voted most valuable player by the team. Junior Matt Vajnar was named honorable mention all-tournament team at the Adolph Rupp Tournament,

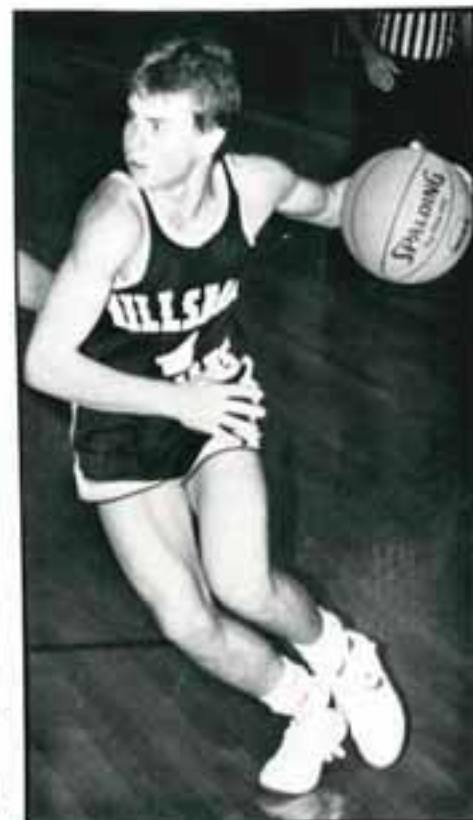
honorable mention Division II MKL, and honorable mention all-area. He was voted most improved player by his teammates.

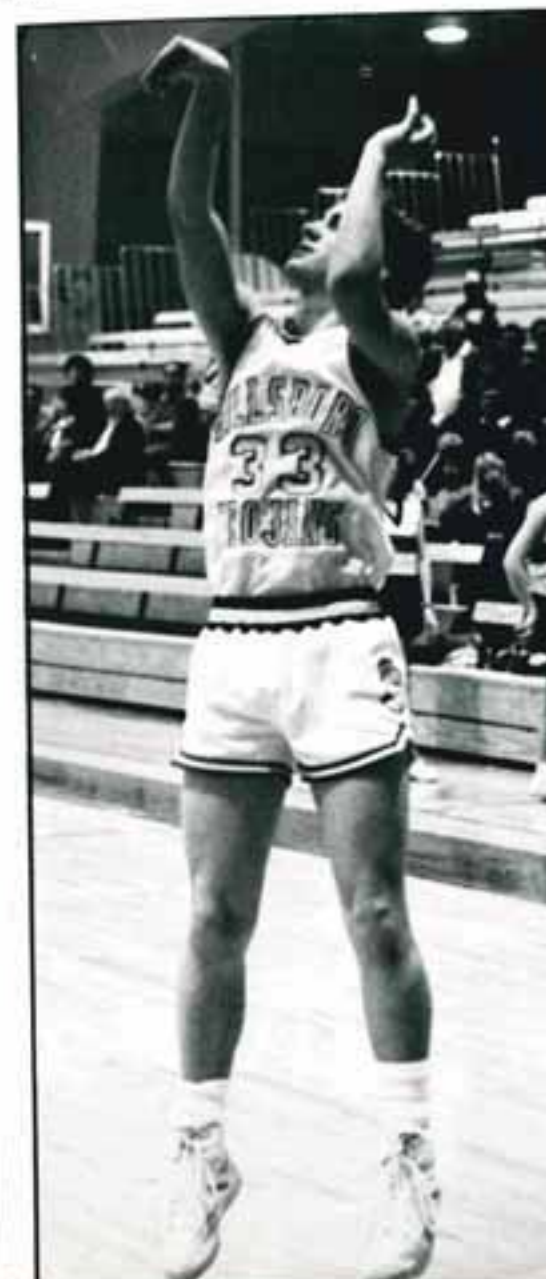
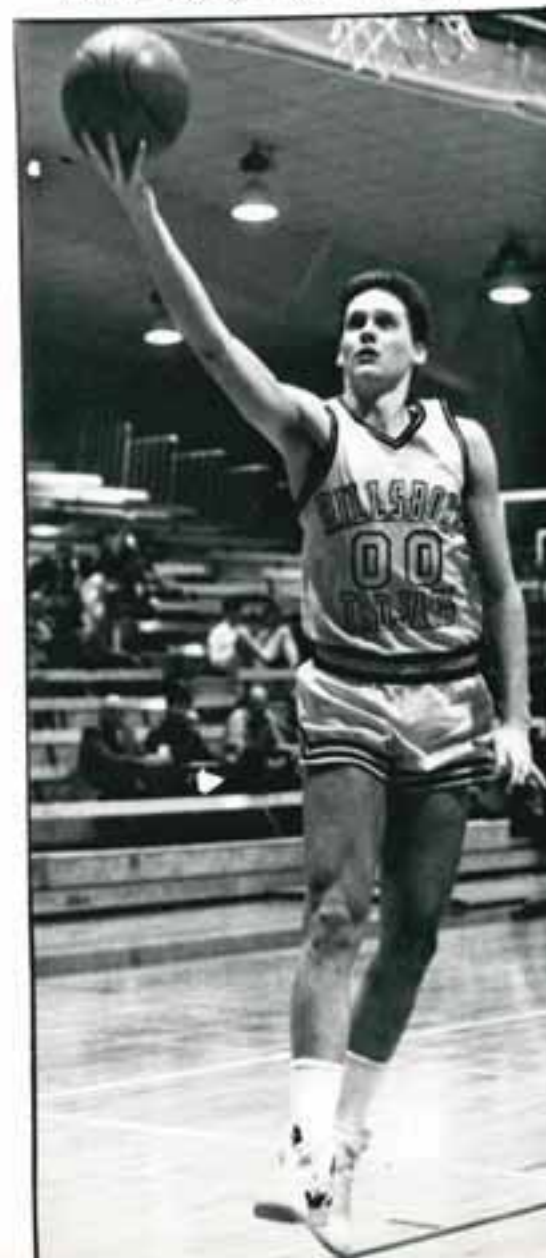
Other successes were in the

Susan Decker said, "Basketball was obviously the highlight of our year. We had a great season which helped us to make it to the State Tournament. The season began with the girls winning first place at the Council Grove tournament. At the mid-season tournament at Berean

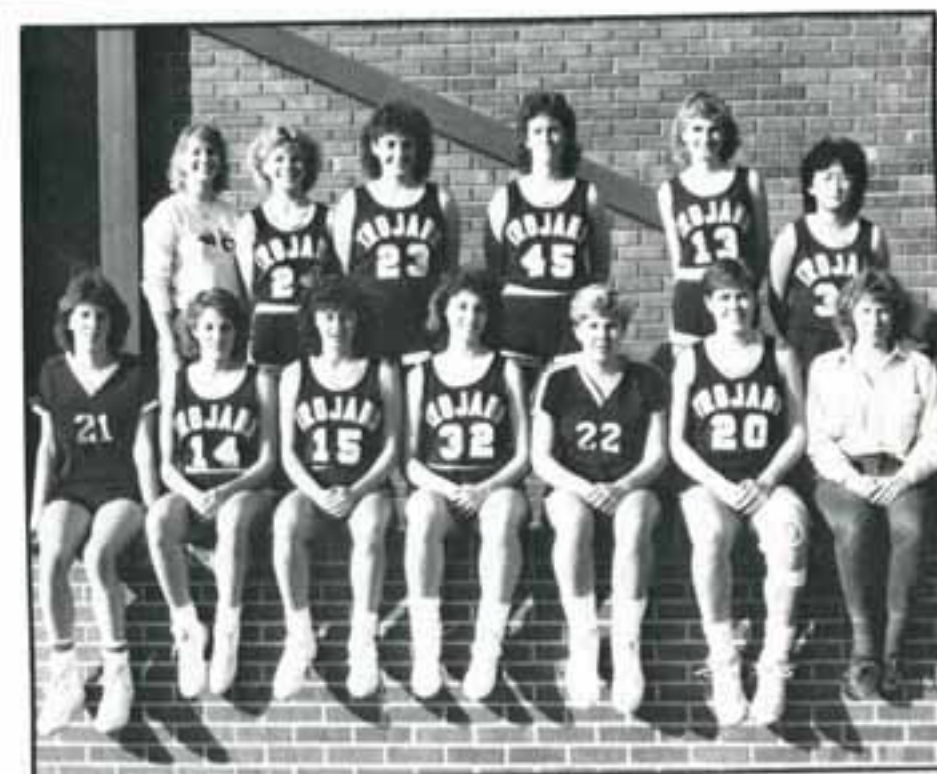

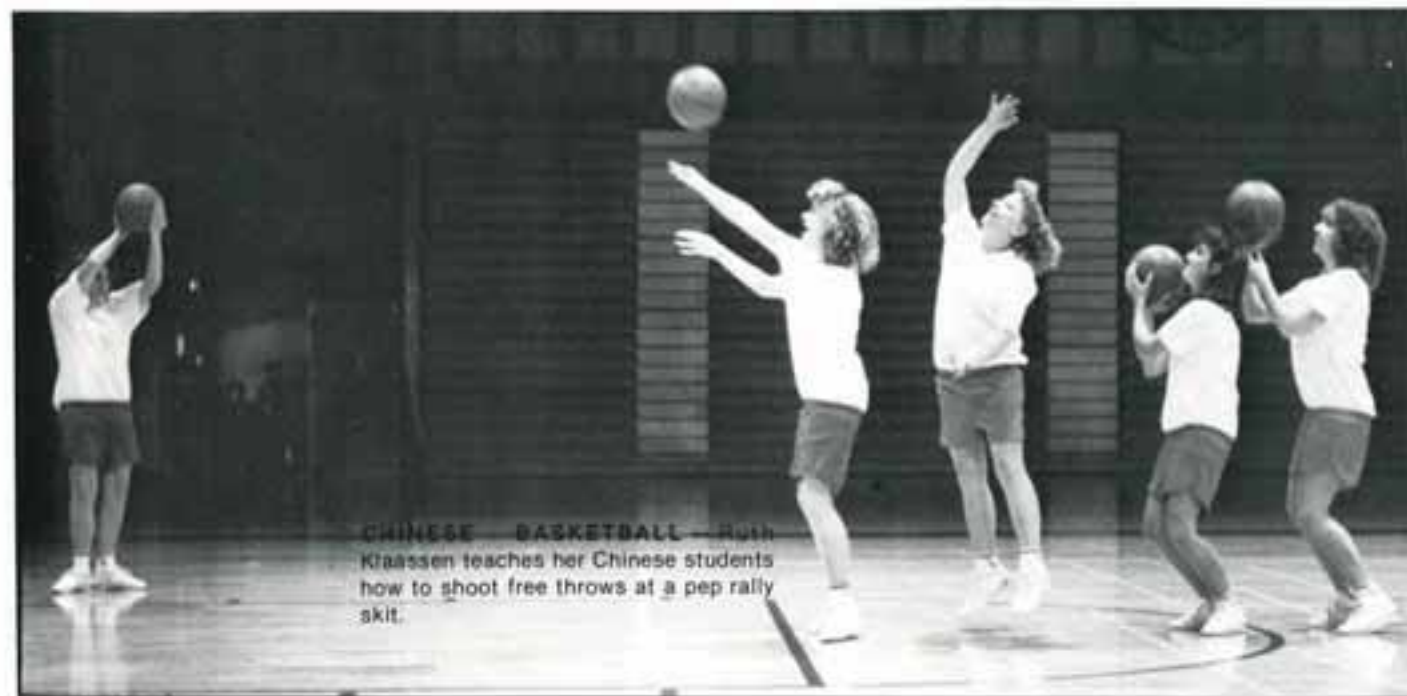

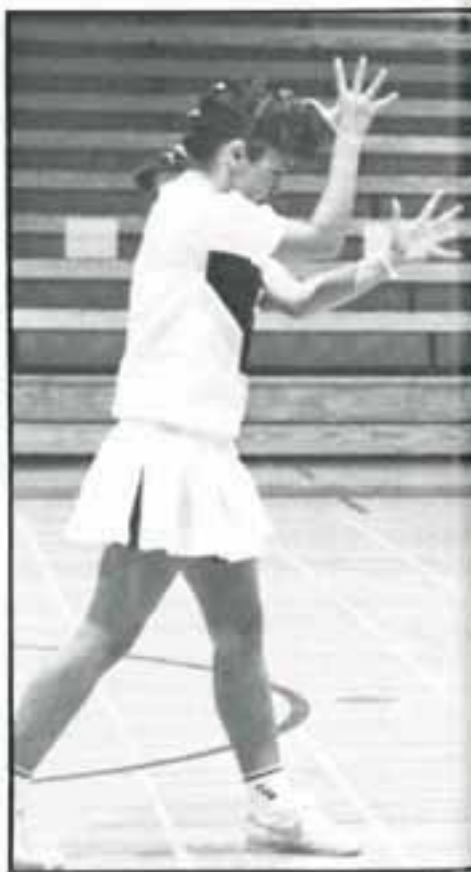

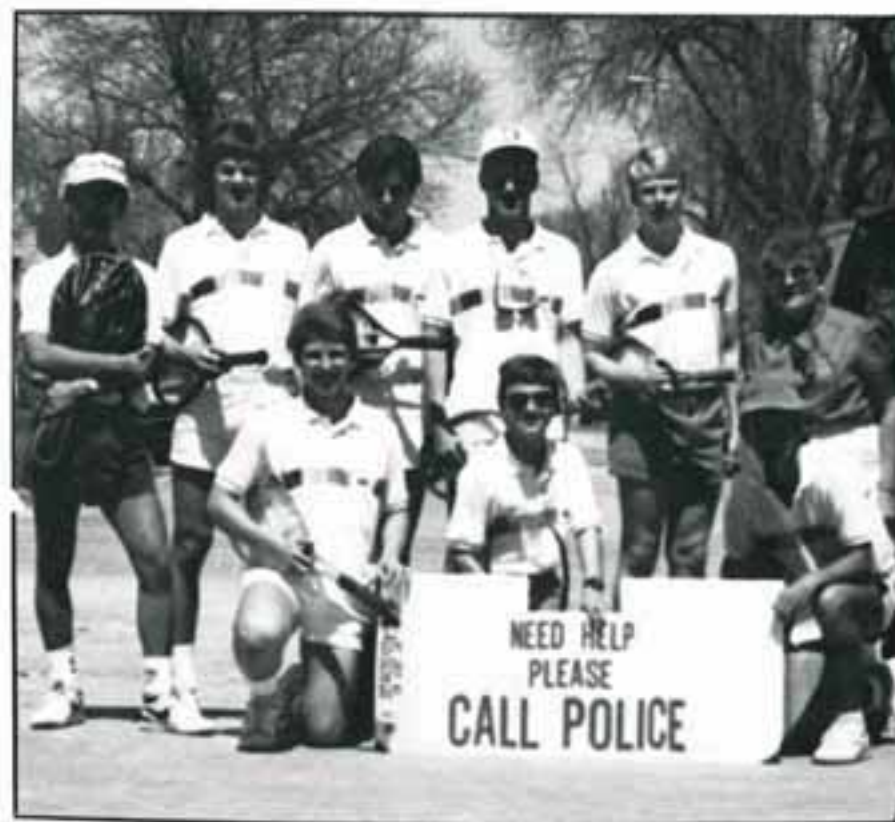
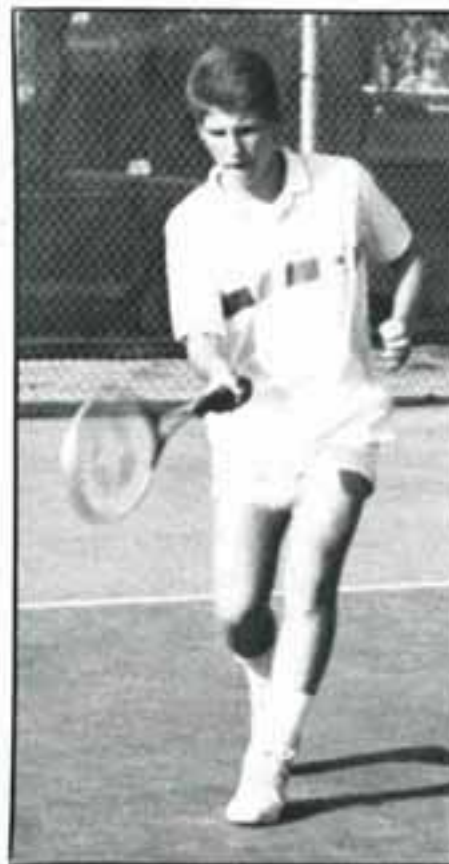

On Track

Because there were only five girls out for track, team scores were often low. However, the girls did have a fair amount of individual success and were able to place 8th at the Conrad Nightingale Invitational and fifth in the MKL Division II meet.

Julie Hiebert, who received the most valuable team member award, led the team with 134 points. She received two gold medals at the league meet, for the 100 meter and the 200 meter dashes. She qualified for the state track meet at Wichita State University by placing second in the 200m and third in the 100m at regionals.

At the state track meet the last year, Julie won 4th in the 100m and 1st in the 200m. This year Julie finished 6th in the 100m and 6th in the 200m. Girls' javelin was a new event added this year, and Melissa Myers set the record with a throw of 65'2". She finished the season with a total of 21 points, and Rhonda Peters chipped in 19. All of the girls lettered this year, with Becky Weibert receiving a provisional one.

Julie Hiebert returned to the state track meet this year, finishing 6th in the 100m and 6th in the 200m. Last year Julie won the 200m and took 4th in the 100m.

Making Tracks

Although the boys' track team was small in numbers, head coach Don Penner pointed out, "They had good talent, and with our great facility and hard work—the boys' squad finished high in the meets." The team claimed two first place wins, one at the Sedgwick Quadrangular meet and one at our Hillsboro Invitational. At both the Conrad Nightingale Invitational and the Hesston Invitational the boys received fourth place and at regionals claimed fifth place.

Rich Loewen, who was voted most valuable team member, won both the 110 meter high hurdles and the 300 meter intermediate hurdles at the league meet and qualified for state by placing second at regionals in the intermediate hurdles with a record-breaking time of 39.7. During the season he also improved on his old high hurdles record, making the new record 15.2. Bob Cummings also qualified for state by winning first place in shot put at the regional meet. Another first place was picked up by the 4x400 meter

relay team of Kelly Thomas, Ty Reusser, Rich Loewen, and Jeff Kroeker as they set a new school record of 3:27.5. Quentin Guhr set a new record of 2:03.3 in the 800 meters, which gave him second place and a chance to compete at state. Gene Lanning also qualified for the state meet by claiming third place in the discus. Ty Reusser broke the record in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.3. Coach Penner summed up the successful regional meet by saying, "The Hillsboro regional was a very tough regional but our athletes responded with many career best performances and all but one individual qualified for the state meet at Wichita State University."

Overall, the track team took 6th at the state meet. Bob Cummings won 2nd in the shot put with a throw of 49'5". Rich Loewen finished 2nd in the 300m I.H., and the 4x400m relay team took 3rd. Gene Lanning won 6th place in the discus, and Quentin Guhr finished 10th in the 800m.

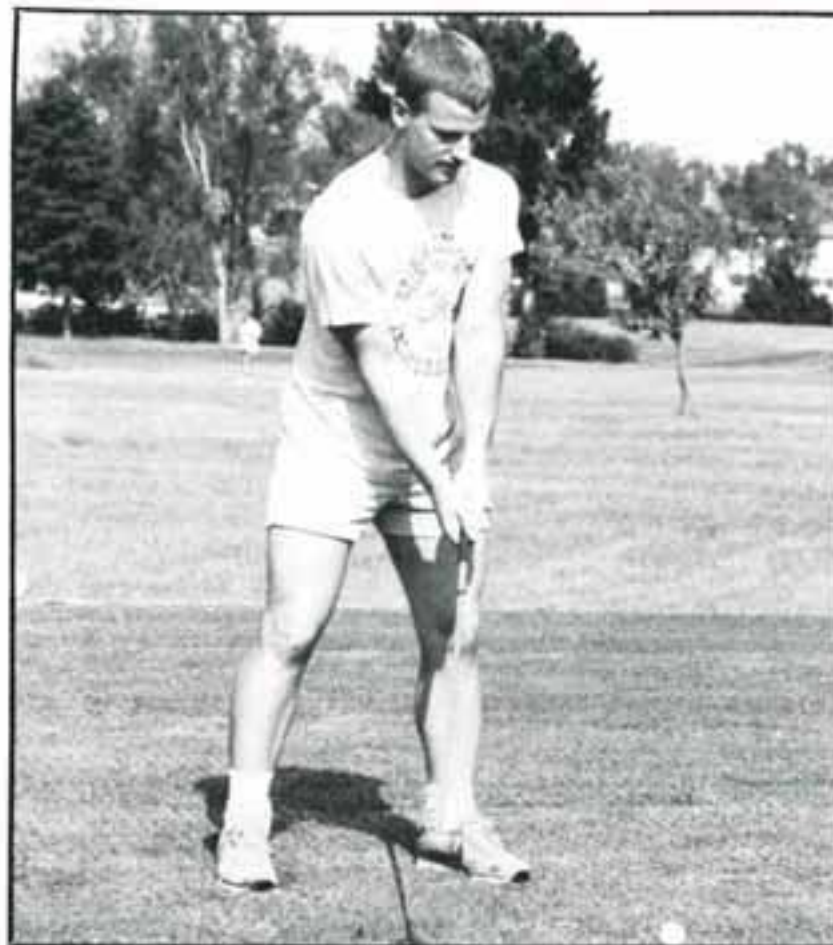

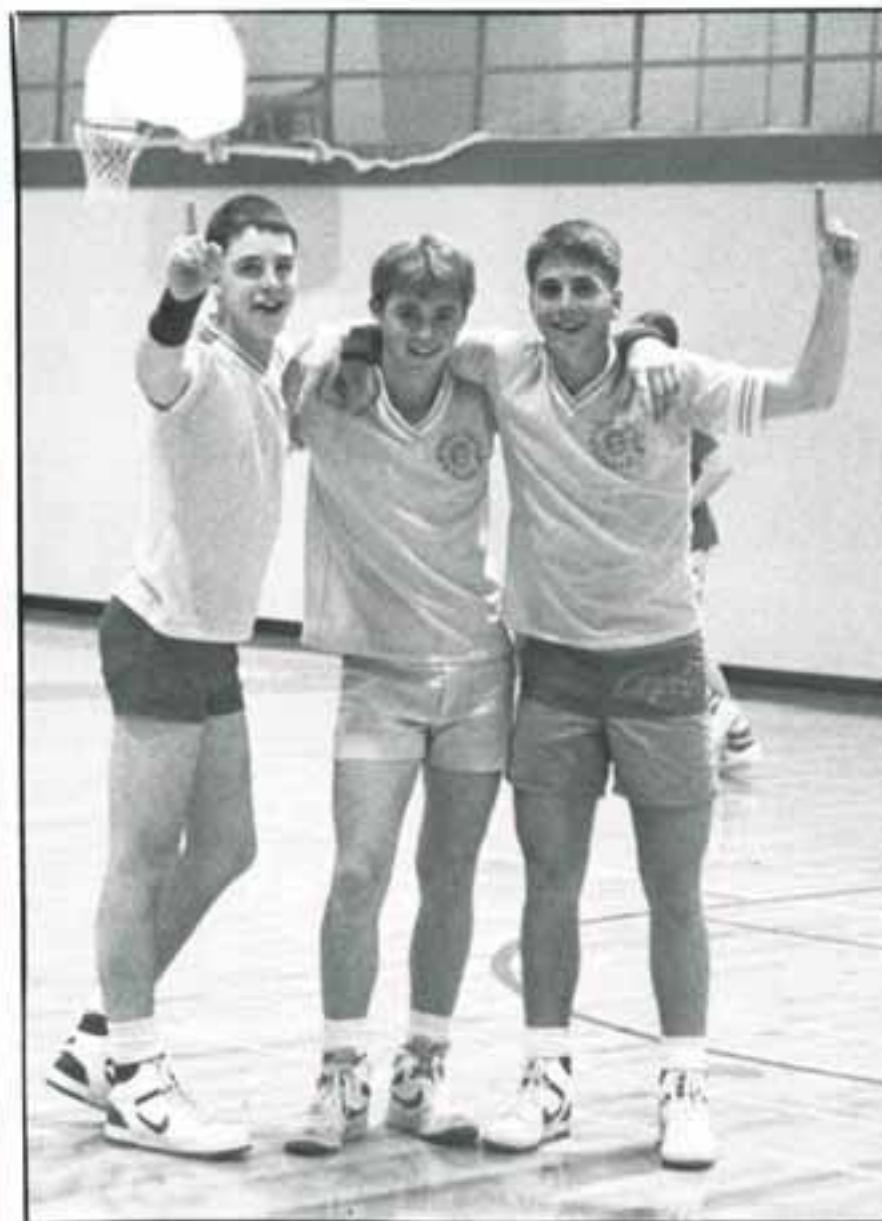

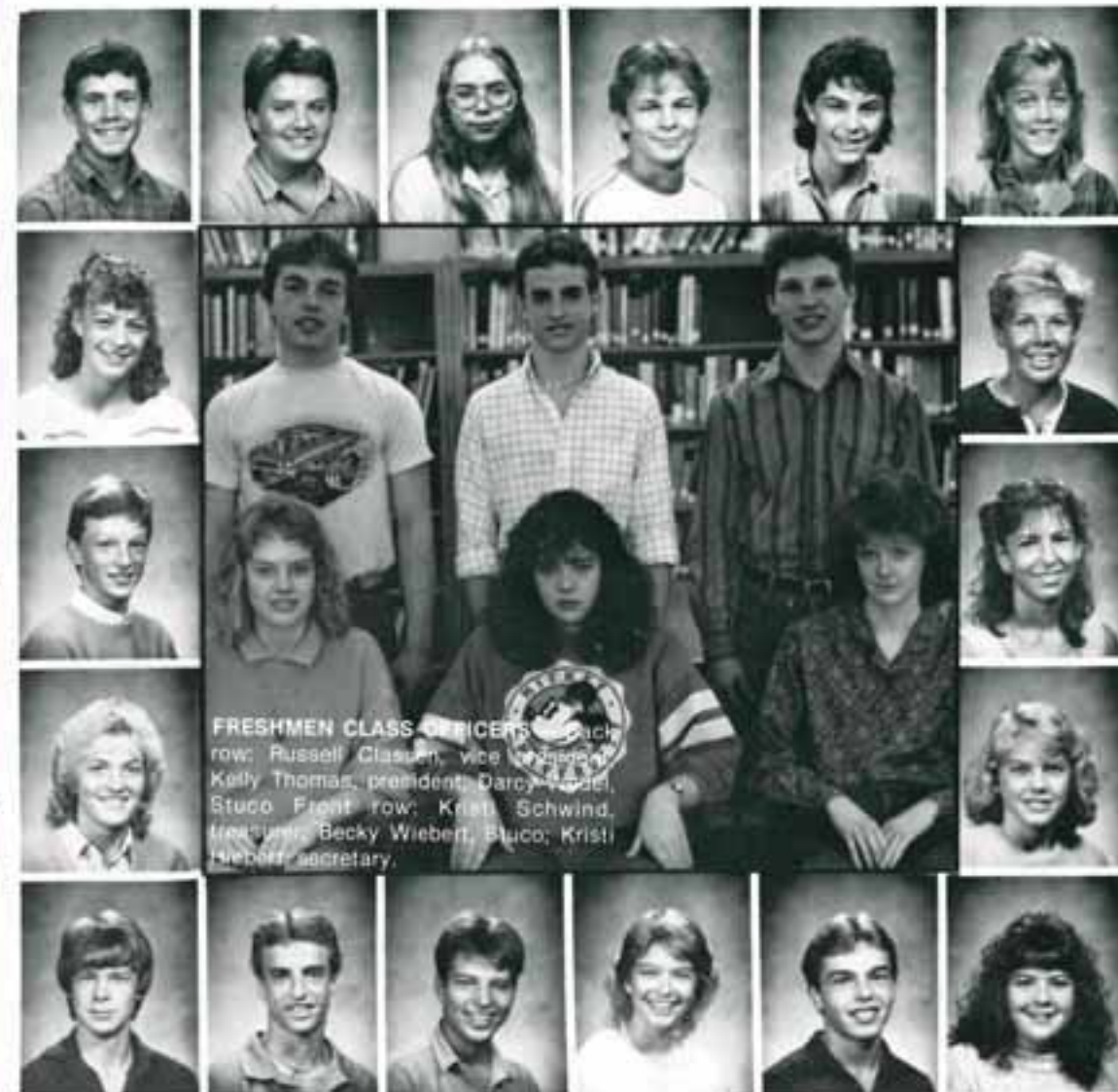

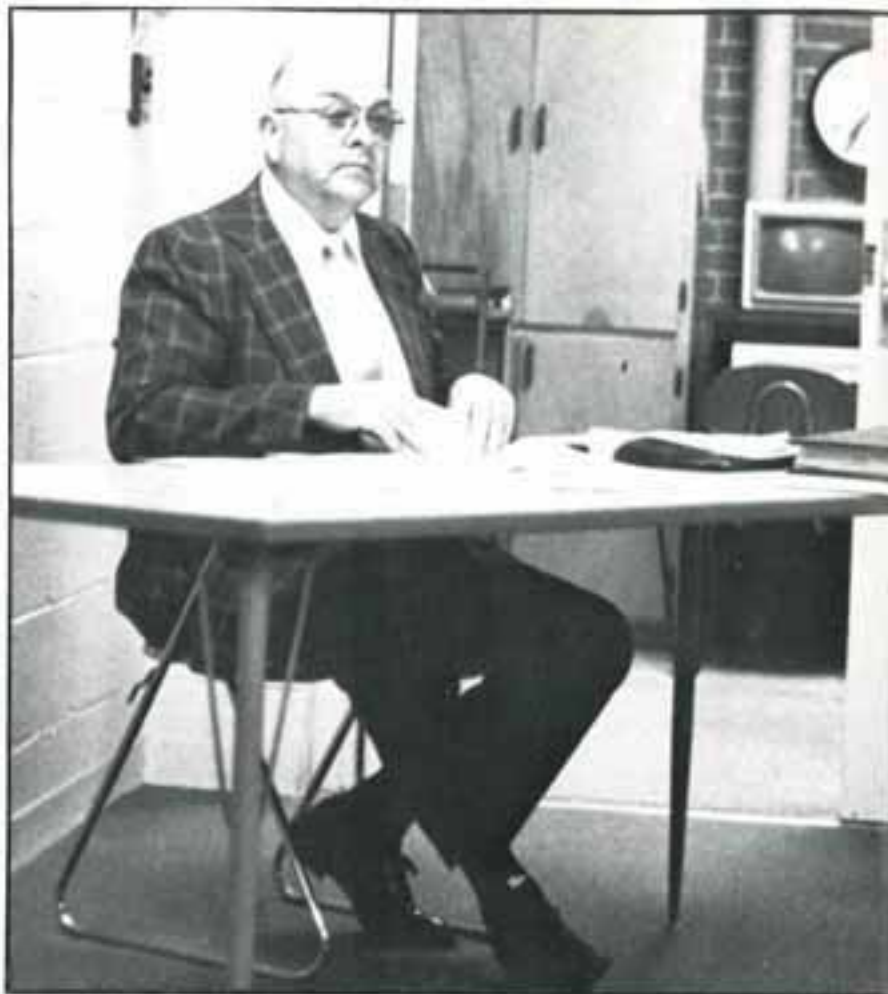

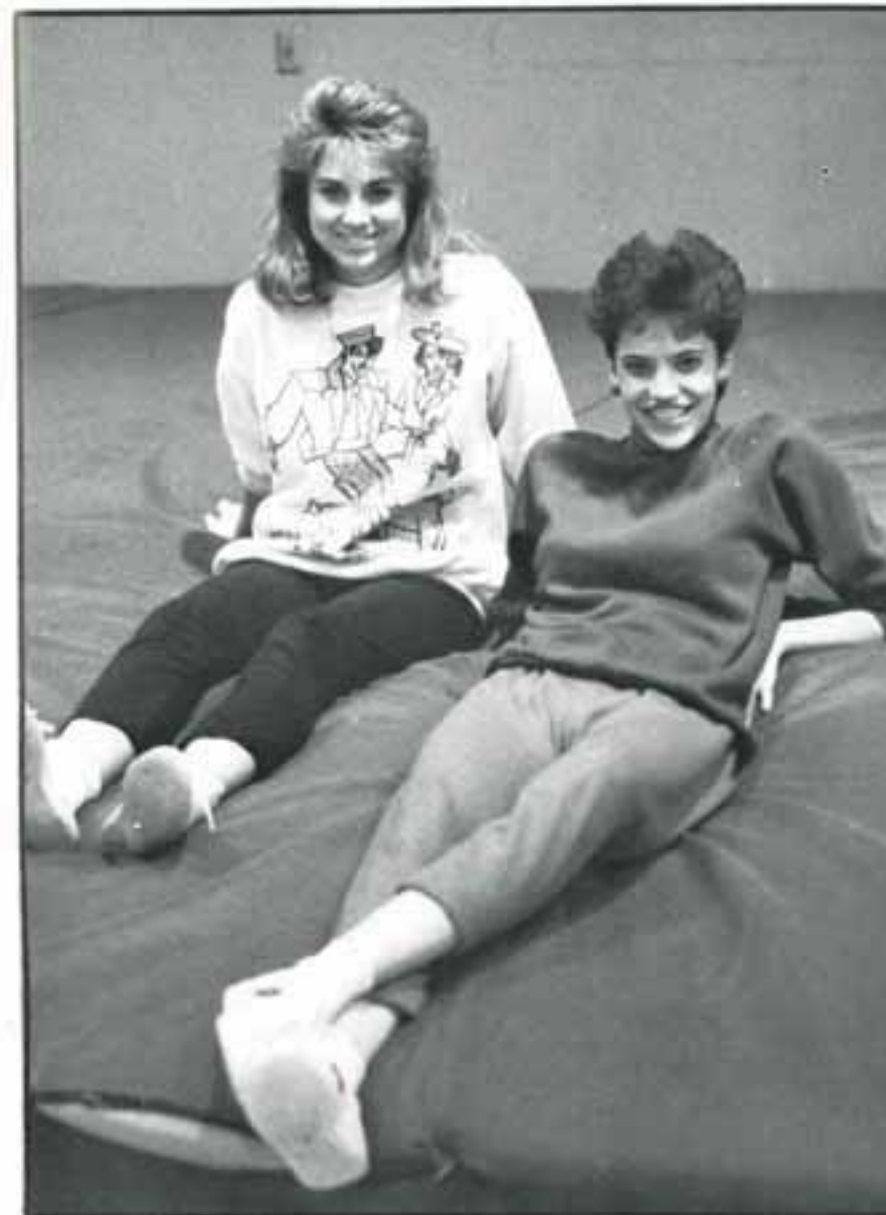

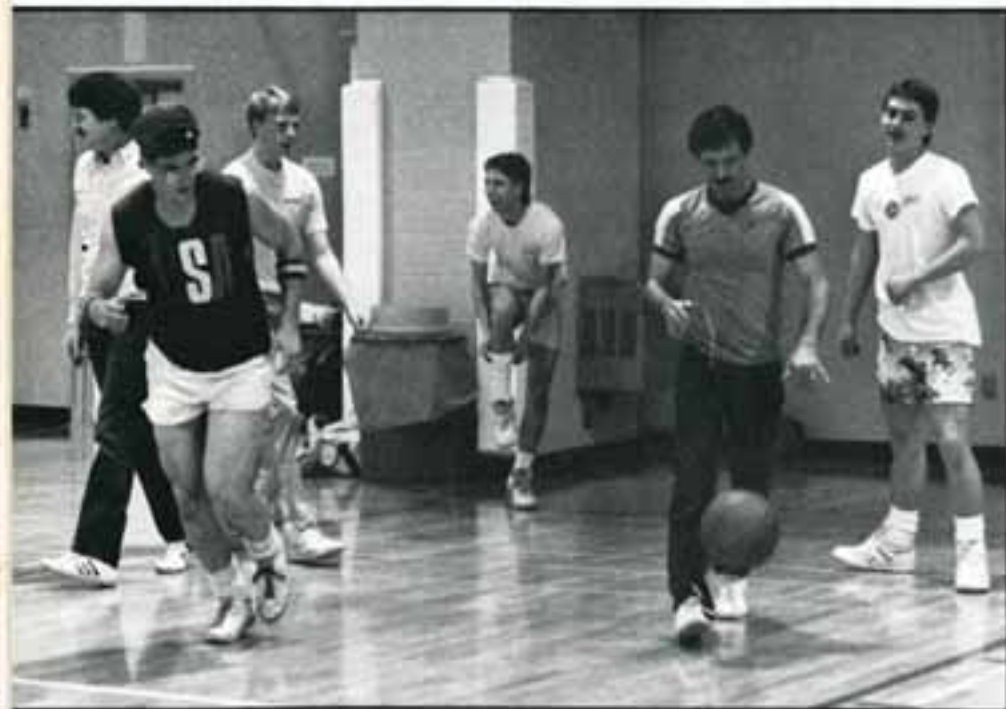

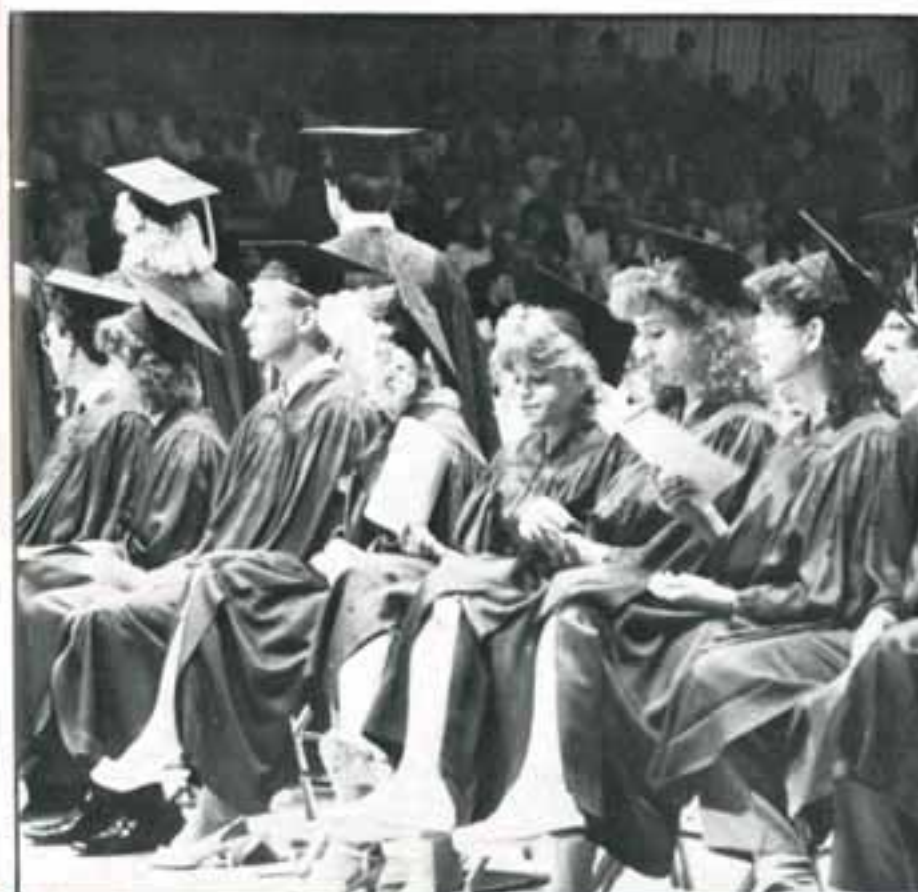
