# An Early Vantage Point

Every year it seems that the school year has grown longer and the summer has shrunk accordingly. This phenomenon grew more pronounced as 10 days were added to the HHS schedule in 1993. From the students' vantage point, longer school years were a step in the wrong direction.

'93-'94 was also the first year for ITV (Interactive Television) classes. ITV enabled students to take classes not otherwise available in HHS curriculum. Linked with Centre, Remington, Marion, and Peabody, students watched classroom antics in other schools and faxed their assignments to their teachers. ("The fax machine ate my homework!") From the teachers' vantage point, ITV was an excellent opportunity for high schoolers to expand their horizons and use new technology.

Quite a bit of remodeling was done in the summer before school. Halls were painted, rooms switched, and lockers added. Principal Glen Suppes announced that "We expect these lockers to last 50 years, just like the last ones." From the construction workers' vantage point, the remodeling was a great way to make some cash.

In late 1993, the Mid-Kansas League decided that it would disband after the school year. MKL schools, including Hillsboro, scrambled to find new homes. Hillsboro, Sterling, Moundridge, and Halstead looked to join the Central Kansas League. Peabody, Sedgwick, and Remington looked to join the Cottonwood Valley League. Trojan rival Wichita Collegiate was the school left in the cold. From the Collegiate administration's van-

tage point, league disbandment was a bad idea from the beginning.

Intramurals provided a chance for participating youth to socialize, get exercise, and have fun. 44 high schoolers played and enjoyed intramural sports. From the intramural volleyball players' vantage point, volleyball can be a lot of fun when no one takes it seriously.

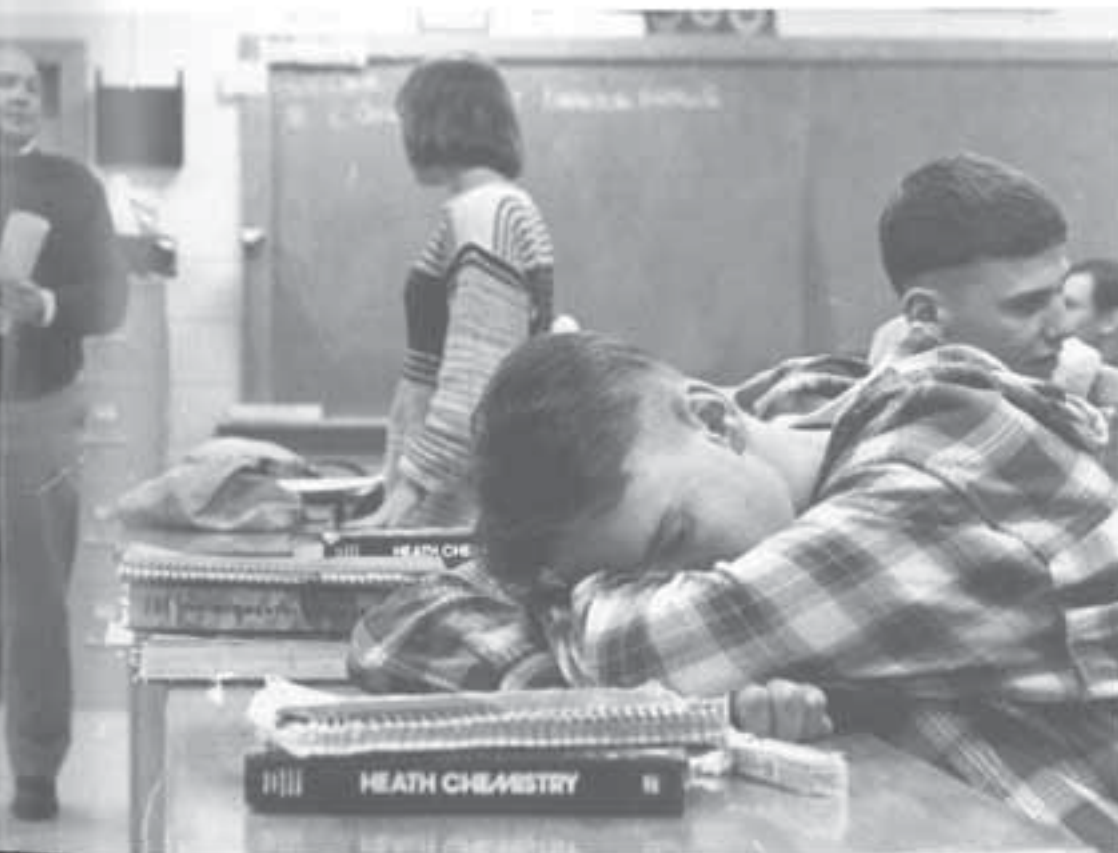

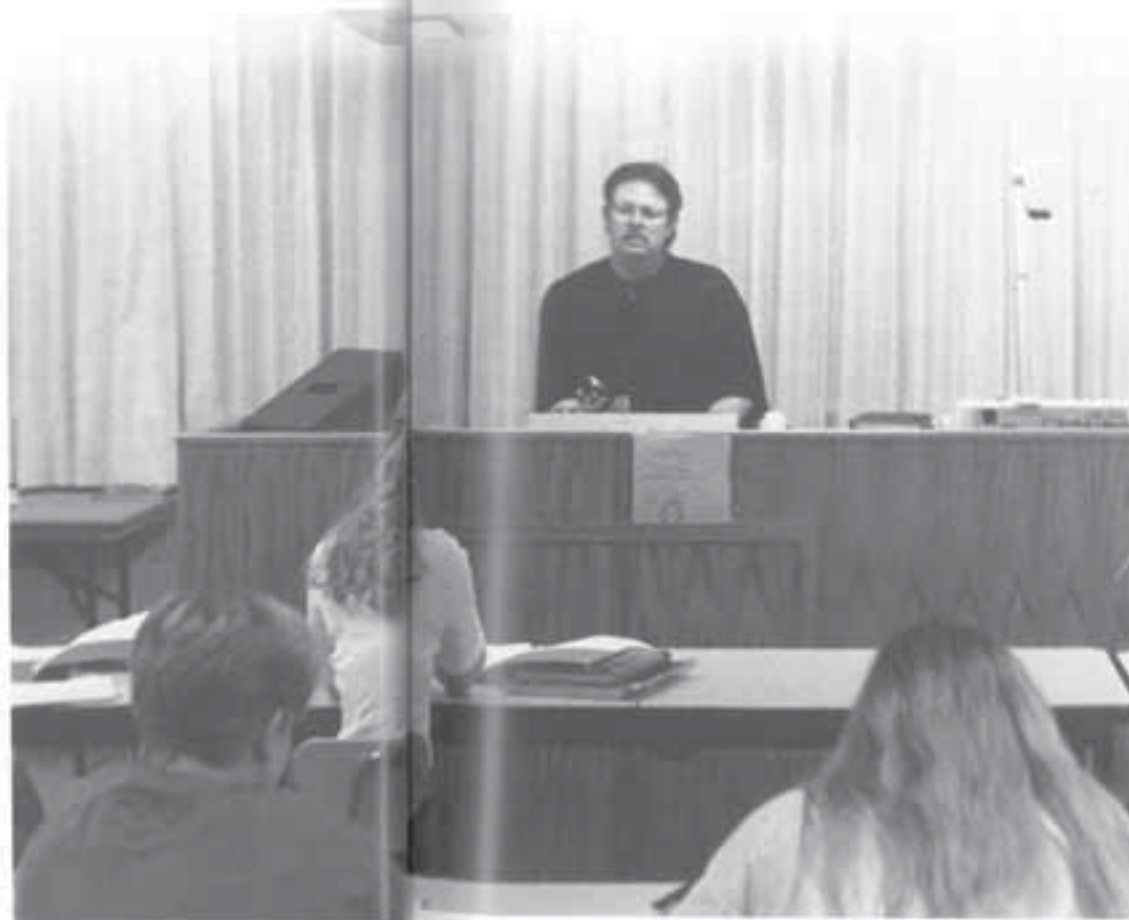

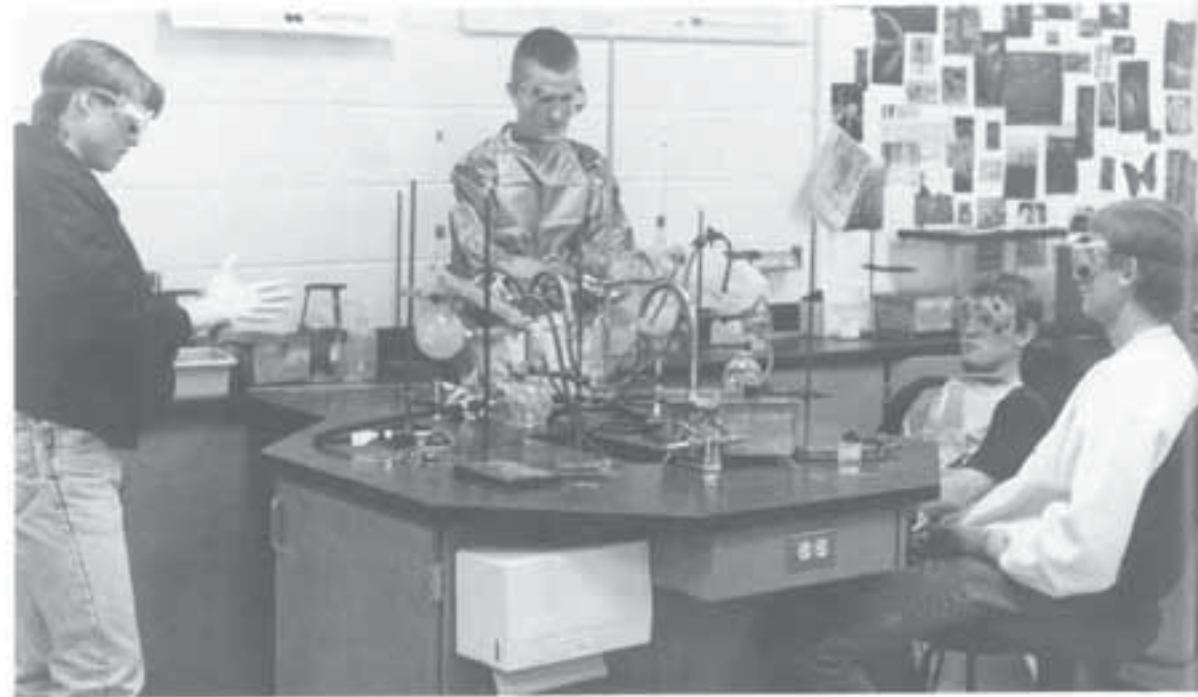

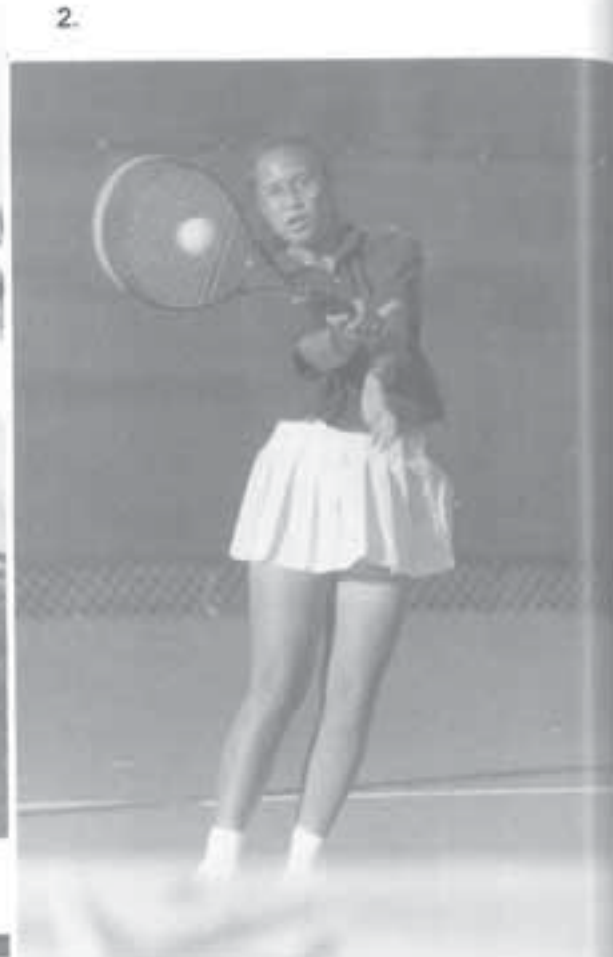

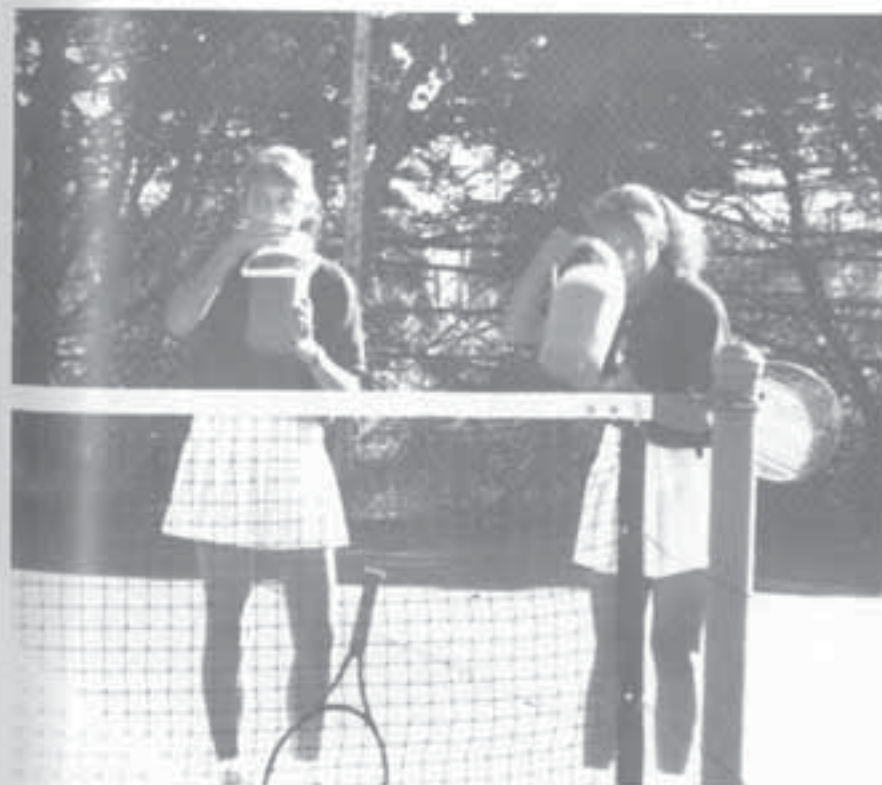

# Trojan Varsity Football: A REAL KICK

1993 looked bleak for the Trojan varsity football team with only four seniors participating. Despite this apparent setback, the young HHS squad played several good games in a season that saw head coach Don Penner's 200th win.

The team's record of 3-6, though not impressive at first glance, was indicative of a season full of player and team development. Everything seemed to come together in a 20-9 win against Moundridge and a 32-0 thwacking of Remington in the middle of the season.

Senior Brent Driggers was an offensive machine for the Trojans. In nine games, Driggers rushed for an average of 5.1 yards per carry and amassed 886 yards for the season.

Driggers also led the squad with 44 tackles and 37 assists for the season. Junior Nathan Galle contributed 44 tackles and 15 assists, while junior Chris Chisholm accumulated 31 tackles and 25 assists.

Reimer Field, home of the Tabor College Bluejays, wasn't friendly to the Trojans. Hillsboro had an 0-4 home record and a 3-2 away record. One Trojan win came through a forfeit when Herington allowed an ineligible athlete to play in what

better and possibly won."

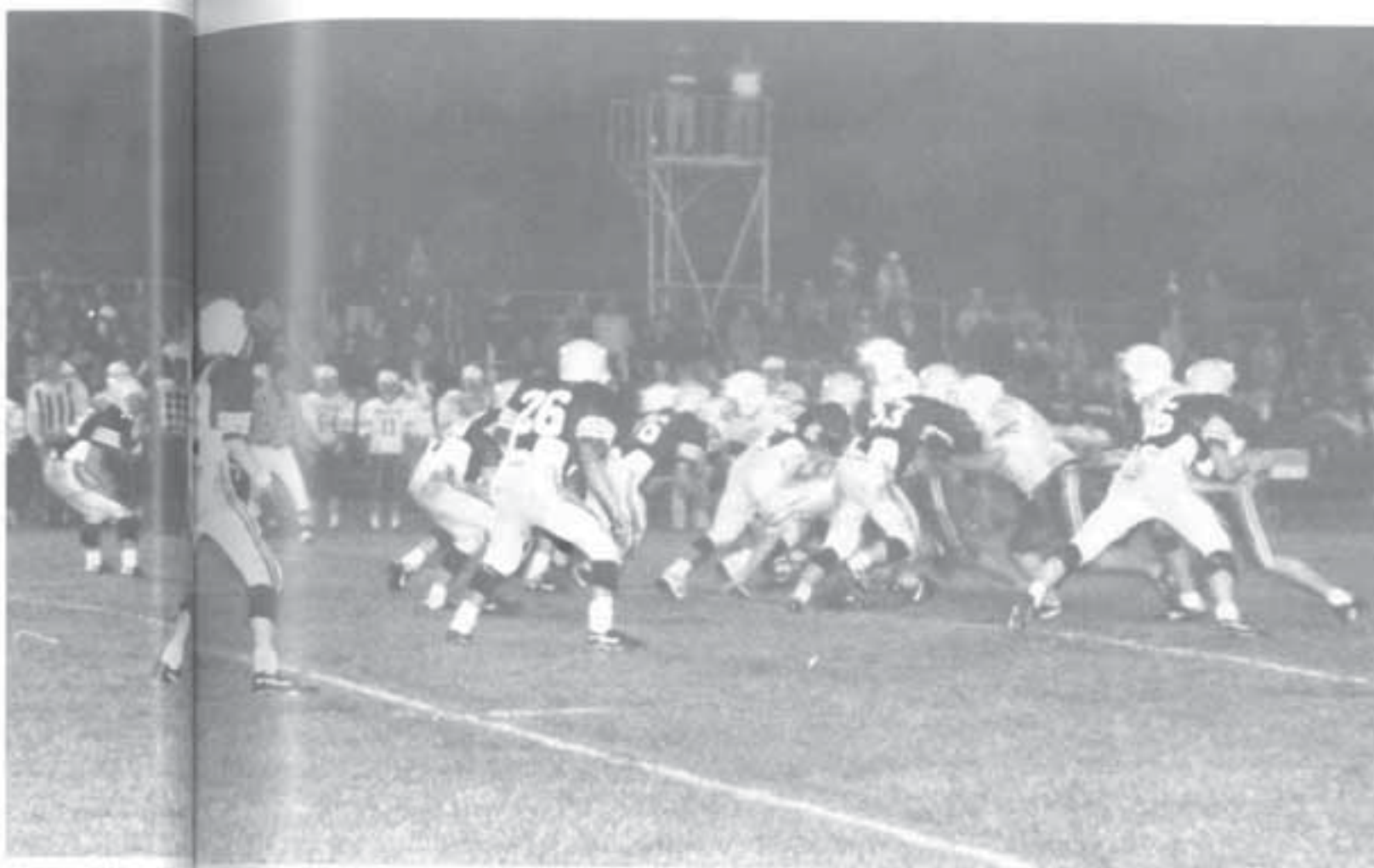
"It was tough losing to Marion, our cross-county rivals," added junior Brent Kyle.

Penner's 200th win was no small feat for high school football. Over 36 years, Penner's varsity teams have averaged 5.6 wins per season. He has a career .607 winning percentage.

"A lot of credit is due to the effort given by a squad that was small, young, and inexperienced at the varsity level," Penner said of the season. "We played a tough schedule, including four teams that advanced into the state playoffs. [The season] gave a lot of young players the opportunity to get varsity experience and to see what they need to prepare for in the off-season to compete in the years ahead."

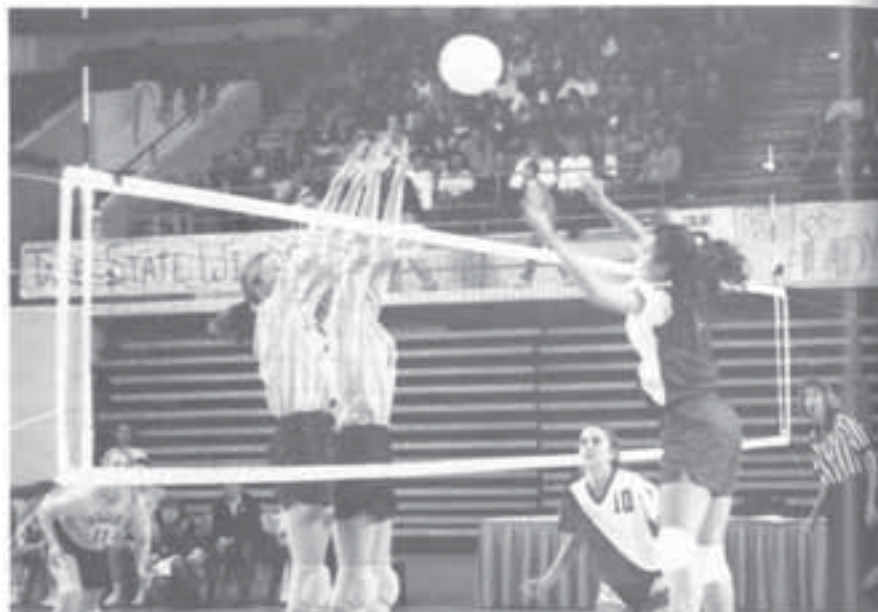

Hillsboro has traditionally strong basketball teams, and the '93-'94 Trojan varsity squad was no exception. Most of the young team had ridden the pine during '92-'93's 11-11 mark, but the talented and motivated players overcame that inexperience and a tough schedule with a 13-game winning streak. HHS vaulted to a 17-5 record in what developed into a turnaround season for Trojan boys' basketball.

Following two early-season losses against 4A teams Nickerson and Pratt, the Trojans triumphed against Peabody and kept winning. The streak saw another victory in Hillsboro's last Adolph Rupp tournament with victories over ranked teams from Lyons, Cheney, and Andover. HHS also defeated every MKL team

during the streak, including a 61-60 thriller over #1-ranked 3A team Wichita Collegiate.

However, it seemed that the Trojans peaked too early in the season. After finishing second in the Mid-Kansas League's last season with a 60-62 overtime loss to Collegiate, the team faced sub-state uncertainty. HHS trounced Smith Center 78-55 in the first round, but eventual state runner-up Beloit was waiting in the semi-finals. The Trojans played badly against the smooth Beloit team, which shot 60% to Hillsboro's 43%. Even Eric Clark's 22 second-half points could not avert disaster.

The team's only senior, starter Brent Driggers, brought leadership and stability to an often unpredictable team. Junior Eric Clark returned

to lead the team in scoring and assists. Brent Kyle and Jeff Kreutziger, also juniors, both had excellent introductory varsity seasons. Andy Kleiber, a sophomore who started for the Trojans, showed hustle and talent. Nathan Galle, Chris Chisholm, Nathan Jost, Chris Novak, C.J. Perry, Jon Fast, Eric Driggers, and Brent Frenzen completed the team.

Coach Darrell Knoll, who recorded his 100th win during the season in a game against MKL rival Sterling, is, like his players, hopeful about next season. "If we work hard about getting stronger both mentally and physically, I expect that we will do at least as much as we did this year," he explained.

HHS's junior varsity team, too, had another successful campaign. Averaging 67.7 points per game, the JV team won the Hillsboro JV tournament and the MKL championship. "We won more games than I thought we would," said assistant coach Darrell Kohlman. "We showed a lot of heart at times."

Finally, the Trojan freshman squad, under assistant coach Heath Marrs, also played well and lost only one game all season long. by Russ Clark

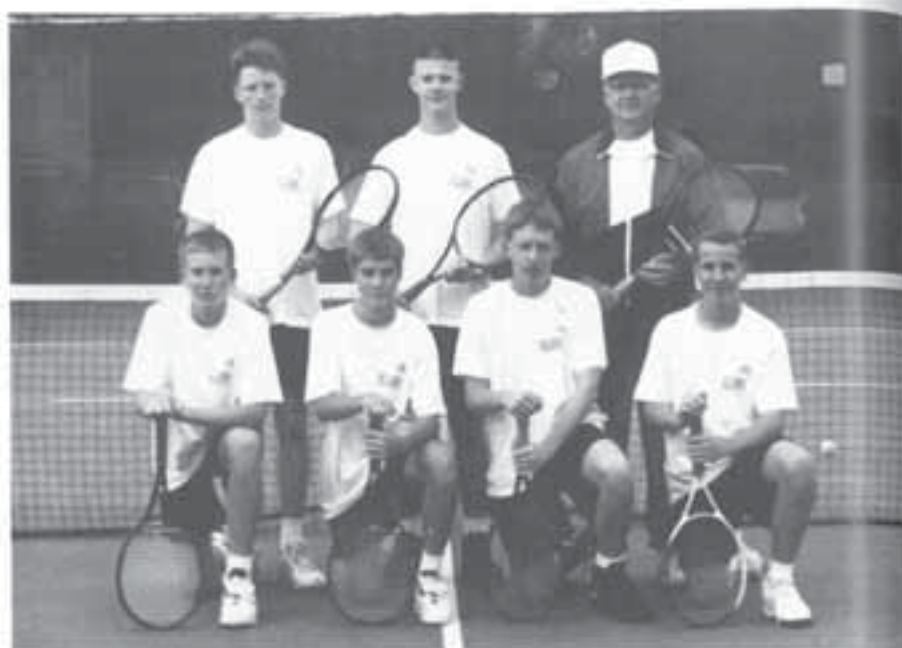

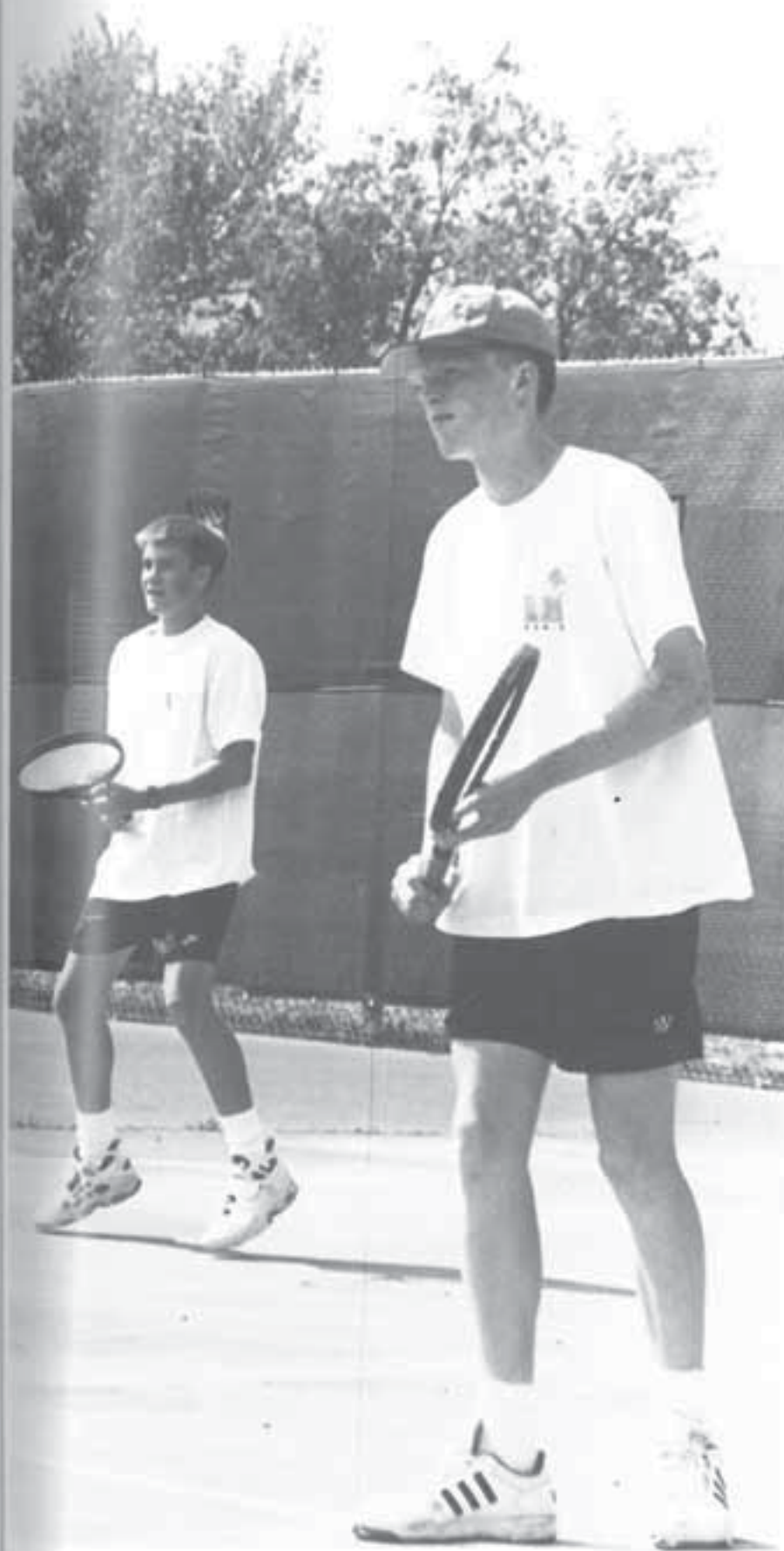
Even after this disappointment, the netters found themselves looking forward to next season and an improved squad.

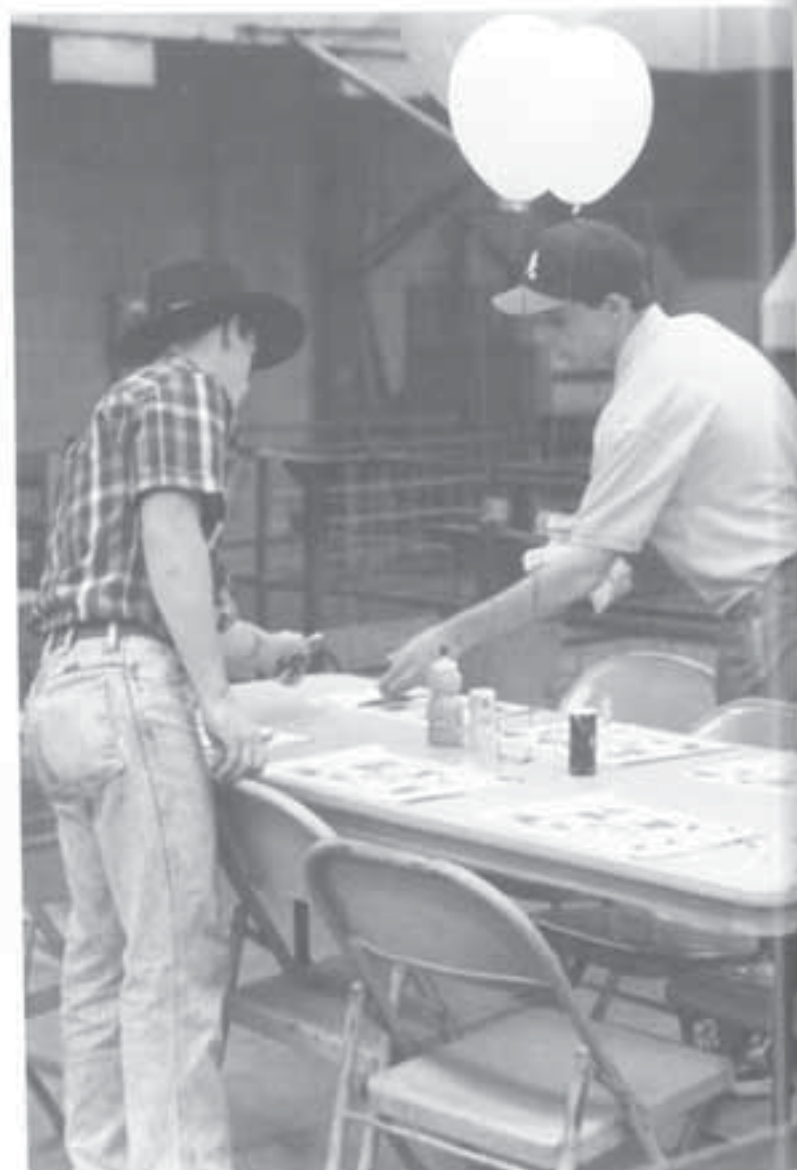

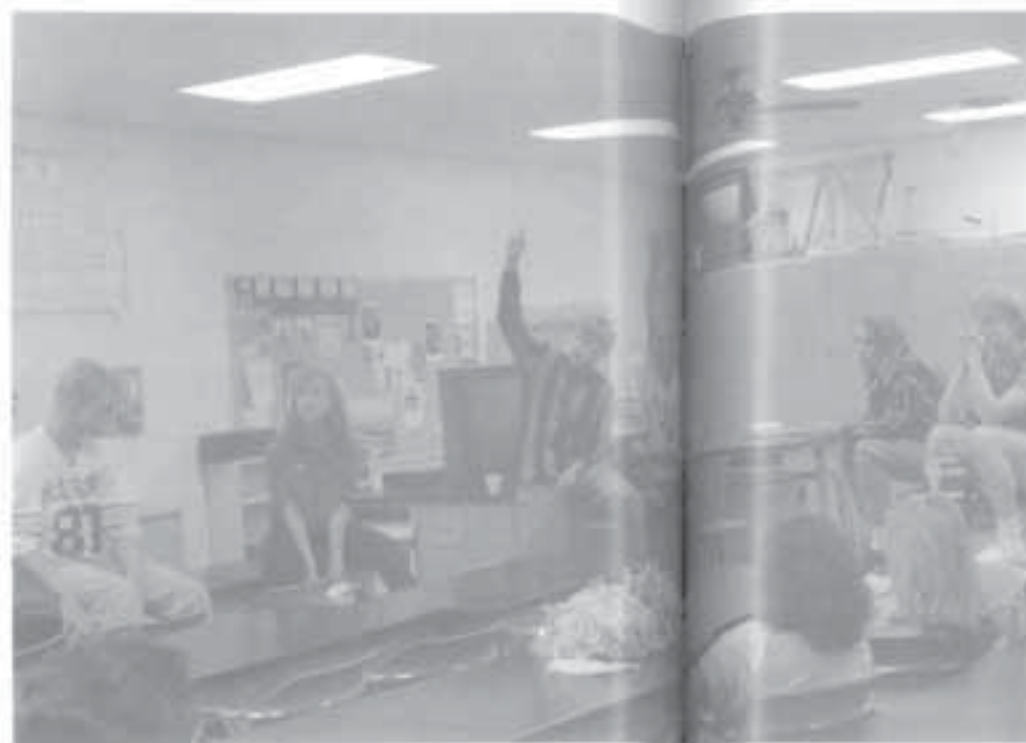

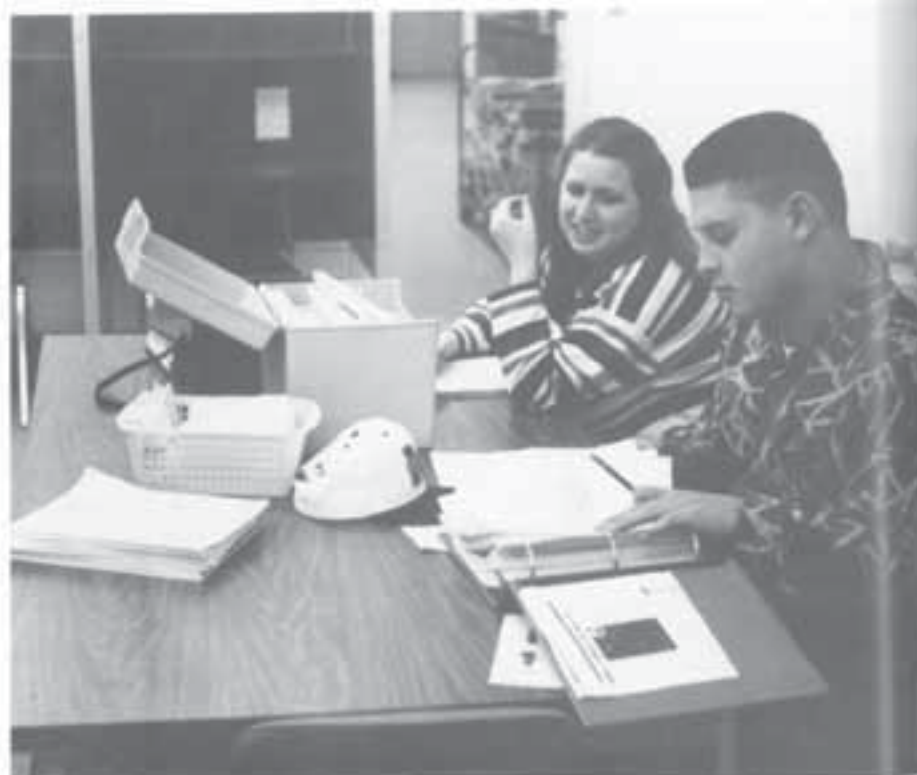

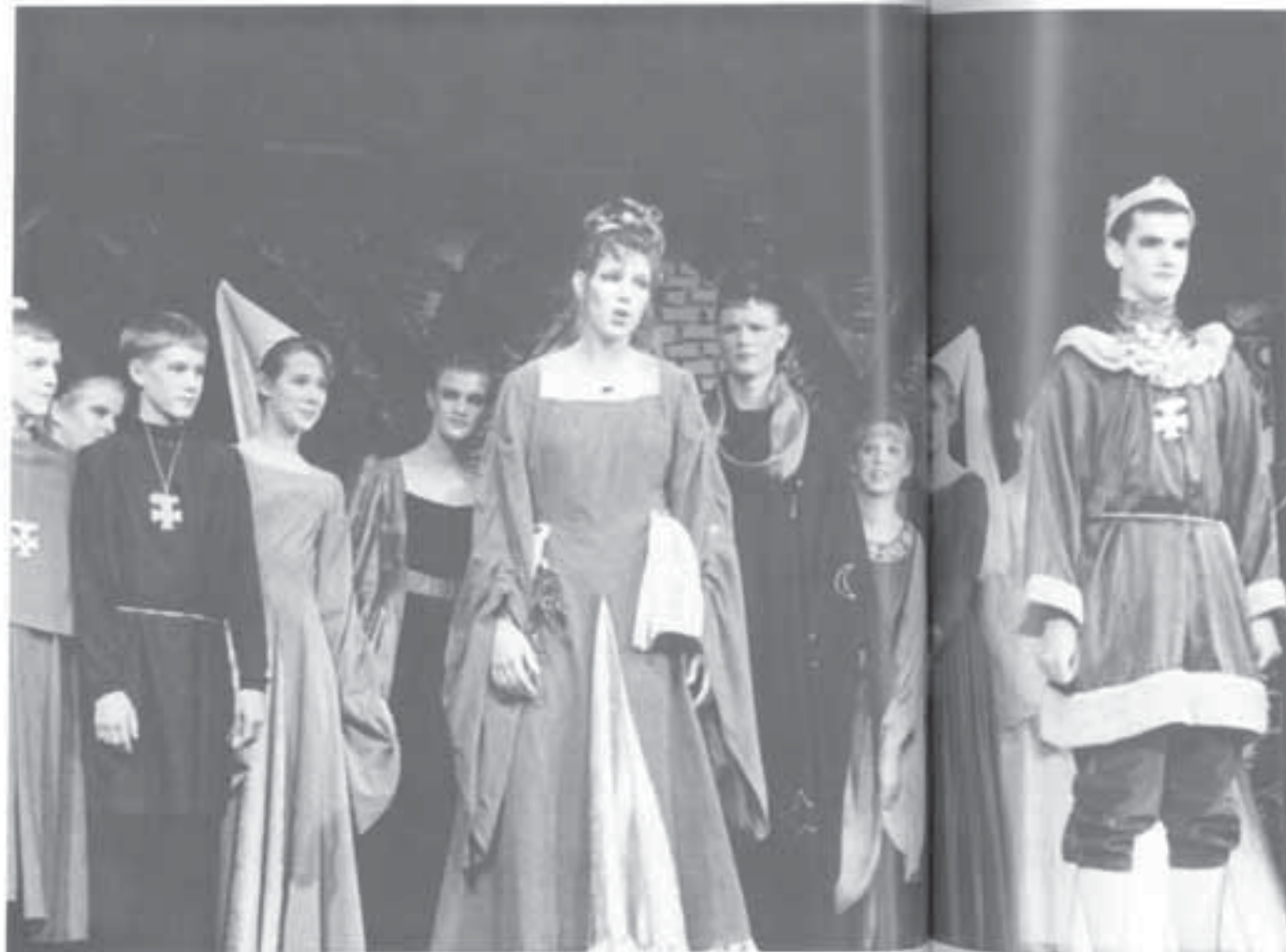
