Tasks:

Unit 3 - Scene Study

Essential Questions:

How does an actor incorporate textual evidence into a performance?

What is empathy and why is it important to drama?

What is re-acting and how is it incorporated into a scene?

How can an actor incorporate feedback into a performance?

Learning Targets - I can:

Create a character using textual evidence from script to engage with other characters on stage.

Give constructive feedback to my peers on their performance(s)

Use feedback given during critique sessions to develop character.

Tasks:

Students will engage in feedback sessions during rehearsals

Students will perform a scene with a partner incorporating textual evidence and peer feedback.
