were ecstatic to begin their first year or another year here in Belt. As the bell rang at 8:02 a.m., the students gathered together in the gymnasium for the first assembly of the year. There have been changes for the 2016-17 school year. The two major changes to the handbook are the dress code and the bell times. School starts 5 minutes earlier (8:02) and ends 5 minutes later (3:30 except on Friday), but the extra time each day cuts two days off for the school year.

Over the last

few years at Belt School, the parking lot has been difficult for the students to park and maneuver around. A week before school began, the student parking lot was redone to look its best. Now it is easier to drive and park at the school.

Three teacher lseft the district since last year, including: Mrs. Gerke, Mrs. Stimpson, and Mrs. Williamson. Belt School has gained three new, enthusiastic teachers: Mrs. Haas, Mr. Nordquist, and Ms. McNally. Other teaching assignments have been rearranged as needed.

Belt gained thirteen new students, two

being foreign exchange students. Belt School is happy to welcome the new students and staff to the building.

Fall sports have already kicked off the middle of August. The Husky football team had their first home game of the season here in Belt on August 26th against CJI. Volleyball also just had their first game last night against Fort Benton. These two fall sports are off to a good season with the support of students, friends, family, and especially the Belt Cheerleaders. Husky team. The Huskies took advantage of their speed and scored on numerous big plays throughout the contest. The boys scored running 34 plays. Belt Bodner received a pass from Green on the 7 yard line. The extra point was added to the score after a successful

kick from Bodner. After a key stop on defense, the Huskies offense was intact once again. The Green to Bodner pass worked well for Belt, as Bodner ran for a 75 yard touchdown after the catch. The extra point conversion was added. The final play of the first quarter ended with a 3 yard run from Maki for an additional 6 points. By the end of the first, Belt had a comfortable lead at 20-0.

In the second quarter, the Green to Bodner duo struck again with a 65 yard toss adding to the Huskies' already superior lead. Belt was successful on the two point conversion when Maki found Hennes in the end zone. The swarming Husky defense was no match for the inexperienced Hawk offense as they could not find the pay dirt in the first half. Heading into the locker room, Belt's lead was 28-0.



After the halftime meetings, the home team continued to add to their margin, while the Hawks could not run with the pack. Stroop was the next to find the end zone for the Huskies as he received a pass from Green for a 48 yard run. Bodner's kick was good for the extra point to extend Belt's advantage. Maki found the goal line after a pass from Green. The two point conversion was added after Green found Bodner once again. By the end of the third stanza the opposing team still had no points while Belt accumulated 43.

In the final period of the ball game, the maroon and gold continued their scoring ways, while CJI did not find their way into the end zone.



Hennes captured his second touchdown of the game after Stroop tossed the ball into his hands. The two point conversion was unsuccessful but the final score was at 49 -0. The final horn blew, and the Huskies earned their first win to start out their season.

The Husky defense dominated their competition in completing the shutout. Linemen Heaton, Hennes, Myrstol, and Olson controlled the line throughout the game. Olson earned two sacks on the night. As for tackles, Green had six unassisted tack-

les, while Maki hoarded 17 assisted tackles on the night.

Green also acquired a fumble recovery to add to his stats.

Offensively the Huskies used a balanced attack to amass just over 400 total yards. Green completed 9 out of 11 passes for 230 yards, which averaged 25.6 yards per completion. He had five touchdown passes, the longest being 76 yards. The team accumulated 158 yards rushing and found the end zone once via the ground attack. Bodner in the open field was an animal with the ball. He hauled in six passes from Green and advanced the ball a total of 197 yards averaging 32.8 yards per catch. He scored

three times for Belt, including the two long pass plays.

The win puts Belt in a five way tie for first place in the conference standings. It's obviously early, but it was a rousing start to the season. Tonight the Belt Huskies will take on the Fort Benton Longhorns in Fort Benton. Kick off time is set at 7:00 pm.

Other Northern C games this weekend include: Centerville at Cascade, Chinook at Simms, Great Falls Central at Power/ Dutton Brady, and Hayes/ Lodgepole at Chester/Joplin/ Inverness.

Bond Initiative

August 25th, the students and staff were introduced to a few new facility upgrades. Many changes had students jumping in their seats, and the improvements have represented Belt Public Schools well. Although the small advancements are a big move for Belt school, many physical changes are essential to produce a safe, organized, and positive instructional facility.

Belt Public School is a great environment for learning when it comes to compassionate teachers, hardworking coaches, and the rest of the caring staff, but space is limited. Although the school is a welcoming domain, the students and staff face many challenges when it comes learning, issues such as: small classrooms in the elementary wing, narrow hallways, insufficient storage space, inaccessibility to weight and fitness rooms, and no dedicated area for school and community activities. At Belt Public School, the staff's main priority is making the school day a safe, secure environment for students and other co-workers. In the interest of security concerns, enhancements are planned to increase control over the entrances and exits to the building.

Many people have seen the

After being welcomed back on ongoing problems at Belt Public School, and some people believe that some of these issues can be resolved by undertaking construction on parts of the building. There are many changes needed to meet the educational expectations of the community.

With that as a backdrop, the school is looking for community support this fall in the form a bond initiative. Ballots will be mailed to district residents on September 15th and the bond election will close on October 4th at 8:00 p.m. The two major physical changes these bonds dents. This is a great opportunity would fund are additions and improvements to the elementary wing and construction of a multi-purpose room that would provide a venue for a host of community and school related activities.

Making these changes would allow Pre K and Kindergarten classes to return in the main building, creating a safer, enclosed environment in case of an emergency. Small changes like remodeling the restrooms in the elementary and high school would improve accessibility for less abled students.

An overriding concern is security. The idea is to build a lobby area where visitors can

comfortably wait for the office to buzz them in.

The administration wants to provide as much information as possible for the residents of the Belt School District. With that in mind, a public meeting was held last night in the school cafeteria. Another public gathering is scheduled for September 14th in the same location. The objective of these meetings is to gather public input and to disseminate information about the bond issues that will be voted on by district resifor the public to gain an understanding into the financial impact of the levies and the positive goals toward which the school is striving. All members of the public are encouraged to attend the upcoming meeting and provide input during this decision making process.



The 2016 school year hit students and teachers like a bolt of lightning. Students returned to Belt Public ments and homework assignments. In preparation for a successful year, several facility improvements have given the school a facelift.

The most obvious change is a fresh new student parking lot, but technological improvements have taken place as well as repair work being completed on the football field irrigation system.

Throughout the last school year, several people addressed the school and the Board of Trustees about facility upgrades. A few things were brought to their attention such as: the high school parking lot, pot holes, and a different technology sys-

tem was needed for clear communication, and for easy access to docu-After checking school funding, the Board of Trustees decided that changes were necessary.

They began with the high school parking lot. The lot was paved and repainted, making parking serene, and potholes around the school were filled. Last year, students went to the Board of Trustees and pleaded for a new water fountain system. been doing many fundraisers over the summer and are hoping to raise enough money to finance most of the trip.


As the freshman are just beginning to understand the high school and their new teachers, the
