AGSD Wellness Policy

Revised September 2015

The School Board recognizes that schools are in a position to promote healthy lifestyle choices by students that can affect their lifelong wellness. Therefore the School District will provide environments that promote and protect children's health, well-being, and ability to learn by supporting healthy eating and physical activity.

Schools will provide nutrition promotion and education, physical education, and other school-based activities to foster lifelong habits of healthy eating and physical activity, and will establish linkages between nutrition education and school meal programs.

1. Nutrition Education and Wellness Promotion:

1.1 Grade Level Appropriate Curriculum:

District schools shall provide age-appropriate nutrition education as part of the health and physical education curriculum. This curriculum will respect cultural practices of the students, will be integrated into core subjects, and will provide opportunities for students to practice skills and apply knowledge both inside and outside the school setting. The district shall seek to provide evidence-based nutrition education that fosters lifelong healthy eating behaviors, and integrates into comprehensive school heath education.

Key partnerships with programs within as well as outside of the district will be utilized wherever possible to develop and deliver age appropriate curriculum to students. For example, the Farm to School Program will teach students both about nutrition as well as about what kinds of foods are produced within the state. Additionally, an ongoing partnership with the University of Alaska Fairbanks Cooperative Extension Office brings hands on agriculture, food, and nutrition education to students within the district.

1.2 Nutrition Linked to School Environment:

Classroom nutrition education shall be reinforced in the school dining room or cafeteria setting as well as in the classroom, with coordination among the nutrition service staff, administrators, and teachers.

Students shall receive consistent nutrition messages from schools and the district. These messages will be incorporated into the classrooms, cafeterias, outreach programs, and other school-based activities including programs offered by strategic district partners.

Schools will strive to establish or support an instructional garden within nutritional education and the core curriculum that provides students with experiences in planting, harvesting, preparing, serving, and tasting. The district greenhouse and food-processing center will be utilized as educational tools for delivery of these opportunities when possible and appropriate.

1.3 Nutrition Teaching Skills that are Behaviorally Focused:

Students in grades K-12 shall receive nutrition education that teaches the skills needed to adopt lifelong healthy eating behaviors. Skills will include how to read and analyze nutritional fact labels on foods, understanding macronutrients, (carbohydrates, proteins, and fats), and how your body uses them, and how they can be incorporated into a menu designed to provide a balanced and healthy diet. Students will also learn about how food is portrayed in advertisements as part of processes of evaluating foods and their nutritional value.

Student skill development will include an understanding of the positive effects of physical activity, including long-term health benefits and how physical activity and diet effect body weight.

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1.4 Staff Role Modeling of Healthy Behaviors:

To encourage staff to model positive behaviors and healthy eating, staff will be permitted to eat meals prepared by the Child Nutrition program for free if they eat with the students. This will provide students with examples of adults choosing to eat nutritionally balanced and healthy meals.

As part of both educational and health initiatives, the district has implemented an activity based learning program that incorporates physical activity into classrooms and the curriculum. This program has teachers model and lead physical activities with students throughout the school day, greatly increasing the overall amount of physical activity students are taking part in, and provides for an ongoing role modeling of healthy behaviors by staff.

1.5 Coordinated and Comprehensive Program Implementation:

Alaska Gateway is implementing a comprehensive health and nutrition program through a wide variety of intertwined programs and policies. These programs include the Wellness Policy, Farm to School Program, Physical Education program, Obesity Prevention program, and partnerships with outside organizations like the University of Alaska.

Because student health and wellness is an ongoing issue the Wellness Team serves as an ongoing group responsible for leadership and feedback on a wide variety of student health and nutrition topics. Pulling programs under the unified umbrella of this group's leadership provides for coordinated efforts between programs and assures that programs are working as part of a comprehensive effort rather than working in isolation. This effort serves to tie child nutrition into the overall health education and improvement efforts.

Although this group does not specifically follow the CDC Coordinated School Health Program, all key components of the program are included in the district's coordinated efforts.

1.6 Engaging Families to Provide Information and/or Solicit Input:

The district will inform and update the public, including students and families, regularly about the progress and status of the various student health, wellness, and nutrition programs and efforts.

The district publishes a monthly flier in the local paper in order to inform the public about the various efforts and programs that are ongoing within the schools and districts as a whole. Included in this flier will be regular updates on the nutrition and health programs. Additionally, the district web site and social media forums will be updated consistently with updates and information on the district health and wellness efforts. Various programs focused on the health and wellness of students conduct at least annual surveys to solicit input from families about habits, opinions, and knowledge.

1.7 Marketing of Healthy Choices:

Part of the marketing of healthy choices will be the inclusion of recipes and food items used in the Child Nutrition program. In addition to information about preparing these recipes, they will include full nutritional breakdowns. For food items that are sourced from within Alaska, information on the farm or processor the item was sourced from will also be included. Menus will also be color coded to denote items that are healthy choices, as well as items that are sourced locally. Healthy items like salad and fruit will be prominently displayed and marketed in the cafeteria areas.

The Child Nutrition Director will work with staff during Professional Learning Community, (PLC), meetings to help design student project ideas to create items like posters and videos that promote healthy foods.

1.8 Restricted Marketing of Unhealthy Choices:

No posters or marketing material for food items that do not fit National School Lunch Act Nutrition Guidelines will be utilized at school sites. No vending machines or food carts that include unhealthy food or drinks will be allowed on school grounds. School web and social media sites will not include any items that do not fit National School Lunch Act Nutrition Guidelines.

1.9 Wellness Team:

The Wellness Team, consisting of parent, student, teacher, administrator, nutritional staff, and partnering agency representation, will meet at least two times a year to discuss and provide feedback and guidance on projects and activities that effect student health and wellness, and to monitor and evaluate the ongoing implementation of policy. When necessary this group will be responsible for the creation of new policy, and modification of existing policies that focus on the health and wellness of students.

2. Standards for USDA Child Nutrition Programs and School Meals

2.1 School Breakfast Program:

All schools will provide breakfast through the USDA School Breakfast program. The school district shall encourage all students to participate in school meal programs and protect the identity of students who eat free and reduced priced meals.

2.2 Nutrition Standards for School Meals:

All meals served shall meet the regulatory stands set forth by the USDA. The current standards are as follows:

- a.) In the SBP, the above age-grade groups are required beginning July 1, 2013 (SY 2013-14). In SY 2012-2013 only, schools may continue to use the meal pattern for grades K-12 (see § 220.23).
- b.) Food items included in each food group and subgroup and amount equivalents. Minimum creditable serving is ½ cup.
- c.) One quarter-cup of dried fruit counts as ½ cup of fruit; 1 cup of leafy greens counts as ½ cup of vegetables. No more than half of the fruit or vegetable offerings may be in the form of juice. All juice must be 100% full-strength.
- d.) For breakfast, vegetables may be substituted for fruits, but the first two cups per week of any such substitution must be from the dark green, red/orange, beans and peas (legumes) or "Other vegetables" subgroups as defined in §210.10(c)(2)(iii).
- e.) The fruit quantity requirement for the SBP (5 cups/week and a minimum of 1 cup/day) is effective July 1, 2014 (SY 2014-2015).
- f.) Larger amounts of these vegetables may be served.
- g.) This category consists of "Other vegetables" as defined in §210.10(c)(2)(iii)(E). For the purposes of the NSLP, "Other vegetables" requirement may be met with any additional amounts from the dark green, red/orange, and beans/peas (legumes) vegetable subgroups as defined in §210.10(c)(2)(iii).
- h.) Any vegetable subgroup may be offered to meet the total weekly vegetable requirement.
- i.) At least half of the grains offered must be whole grain-rich in the NSLP beginning July 1, 2012 (SY 2012-2013), and in the SBP beginning July 1, 2013 (SY 2013-2014). All grains must be whole grain-rich in both the NSLP and the SBP beginning July 1, 2014 (SY 2014-15).
- j.) In the SBP, the grain ranges must be offered beginning July 1, 2013 (SY 2013-2014).
- k.) There is no separate meat/meat alternate component in the SBP. Beginning July 1, 2013 (SY 2013-2014), schools may substitute 1 oz. eq. of meat/meat alternate for 1 oz. eq. of grains after the minimum daily grains requirement is met.
- l.) Fluid milk must be low-fat (1 percent milk fat or less, unflavored) or fat-free (unflavored or flavored).
- m.) The average daily amount of calories for a 5-day school week must be within the range (at least the minimum and no more than the maximum values).
- n.) Discretionary sources of calories (solid fats and added sugars) may be added to the meal pattern if within the specifications for calories, saturated fat, trans fat, and sodium. Foods of minimal nutritional value and fluid milk with fat content greater than 1 percent milk fat are not allowed.
- o.) In the SBP, calories and trans fat specifications take effect beginning July 1, 2013 (SY 2013-2014).

p.) Final sodium specifications are to be reached by SY 2022-2023 or July 1, 2022. Intermediate sodium specifications are established for SY 2014-2015 and 2017-2018. See required intermediate specifications in $\S 210.10(f)(3)$ for lunches and $\S 220.8(f)(3)$ for breakfast.

2.3 Strategies to Increase Participation in Meal Programs:

Families are informed about and encouraged to participate in the various nutrition programs through a variety of means, including informational fliers and mailings, and the district web sites. The fact that all students are able to participate in the nutrition programs free of cost while the district works under the Community Eligibility program is a powerful incentive to participate, and helps maintain the confidentiality of students receiving free and reduced meals. Student input about meal items is solicited, with the feedback utilized to add, adjust or alter menu items as necessary. Bus and lunch schedules are designed to assure that they do not present a barrier to student participation. Meal and snack times are served at appropriate intervals that help assure students will be read to eat when food is being served.

2.4 Time to Eat:

After obtaining their food, students have at least 20 minutes to eat each meal. Meals are served in areas that are fully cleaned after each meal, and which are designed specifically as food consumption areas.

2.5 Ensures Nutrition Training for Child Nutrition Director and Staff:

AGSD will follow the prosed The HHFKA training guidelines that follow:

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED REQUIRED MINIMUM TRAINING/EDUCATION STANDARDS, FOR ALL LEA SIZES

New and Current Directors Each year, at least 15 hours of annual continuing education/training. Includes topics such as:

- administrative practices (including training in application, certification, verification, meal counting, and meal claiming procedures).
- any other appropriate topics as determined by FNS.

This required continuing education/training is in addition to the food safety training required in the first year of employment.

New and Current Managers Each year, at least 12 hours of annual continuing education/training. Includes topics such as:

- administrative practices (including training in application, certification, verification, meal counting, and meal claiming procedures).
- the identification of reimbursable meals at the point of service.
- nutrition, health and safety standards
- other topics, as specified by FNS

- free and reduced price eligibility.
- application, certification, and verification procedures.
- the identification of reimbursable meals at the point of service.
- nutrition, health and safety standards.
- other topics, as specified by FNS.

The trainings offered by the State Of Alaska from the yearly meetings to the online eLearning programs count both for the director and staff. In-service trainings also count towards these trainings. And there are trainings offered free of charge by NFSMI (National Food Service Management Institute).

2.6 School Meal Environment:

Each school site in the district provides a clean area designed specifically for meals. Staff supervision is provided in these areas during every meal. Efforts are taken to assure these areas are pleasant, and include posters and information about healthy food choices and proper nutrition. When necessary, the number of students participating in a meal at any one time is limited to assure there is sufficient space to comfortably eat. Meal times are scheduled to assure that students have at least 20 minutes to eat after getting their food.

2.7 Availability of Nutrition Information:

The Child Nutrition coordinator will share and publicize nutritional breakdowns of the food and menu items served in the meals and snacks. An online database of these items will be made available as part of the recipe publication process. Links to this information will be included in the regular menu publication.

3. Nutrition Standards for Competitive and Other Foods and Beverages:

All other foods and beverages made available on campus (including, but not limited to vending, franchise vendors, concessions, a la carte, student stores and fundraising) during the school day, between the hours of 12:00 AM and 30 minutes after the conclusion of the instructional day, shall meet nutritional requirements of the National School Lunch Act, Nutritional Guidelines for All Foods Sold in Schools also known as Smart Snacks at School (Federal Register/Vol. 78, No. 125).

3.1 Vending Machine Regulation:

All items sold through vending machines shall contain no more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and will contain no trans-fat. In schools where vending machines are present, they will be stocked with items that support the overall efforts of the district to promote the health and wellness of students.

3.2 School Stores:

<u>School</u> stores will only be permitted to sell items that meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and will not sell any item that contains more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and which contain no trans fats.

3.3 A la cart and Alternative Food Regulation:

Items that are sold a la cart, or which are available as alternatives to a standard full meal meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and will not contain more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and will contain no trans fats.

3.4 Class Parties and Other Celebrations:

In order to encourage healthy choices during celebrations, the AGSD Child Nutrition program will help provide guidance and recipes for healthy choices to serve at class parties and other celebrations. These choices should include things like fresh vegetables and other items that meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and which do not contain more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and which contain no trans fats.

3.5 Sugar Content on Foods Served Outside of Regular Meals:

Items such as snacks served or sold outside of the regular meals will meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and will not contain more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and will contain no trans fats.

3.6 Fat Content on Foods Served Outside of Regular Meals:

Items such as snacks served or sold outside of the regular meals will meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and will not contain more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and will contain no trans fats.

3.7 Sodium Content on Foods Served Outside of Regular Meals:

Items such as snacks served or sold outside of the regular meals will meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and will contain no more than 200mg of sodium per serving.

3.8 Calorie Content on Foods Served Outside of Regular Meals:

Items such as snacks served or sold outside of the regular meals will meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and shall not exceed 200 calories per package.

3.9 While Grains, Fresh Produce, and Unprocessed Foods:

AGSD is working to increase the inclusion of fresh and unprocessed foods through the Farm to School program, as well as a general goal of the Child Nutrition program. Included in these efforts is a school operated production greenhouse that provides fresh produce to school sites throughout the year. Additionally, the district is working with Alaskan farmers to provide whole grains in the Child Nutrition program. At least half of the grains served in district meals will be made from whole grains.

3.10 Food Not Used as a Reward:

Food rewards or incentives shall not be used in classrooms to encourage student achievement or desirable behavior.

3.11 Sugar in Beverages:

Beverages with added sugars are not served or sold outside of USDA meals during the school day.

3.12 Soda Served Outside of Meals:

Beverages with added sugars are not served or sold outside of USDA meals. Only milk, water, and 100% juice will be available at school.

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3.13 Milk Fat Content:

District schools will sell only low-fat or fat free milk.

3.14 Beverage Size Limits:

District schools will limit beverages served to the following sizes:

Water: No limit

Milk: 8oz serving maximum

100% Juice:

Elementary and Middle School: 4oz serving maximum

High school: 8oz serving maximum

3.15 Free Drinking Water:

District schools shall maintain clean, fresh, and free sources of potable water that are available throughout the day, and which are available where meals are served and in other areas throughout the school sites.

3.16 Fundraising Food:

In order to encourage healthy choices during fundraising events, the AGSD Child Nutrition program will help provide guidance and recipes for healthy choices to serve at fundraising events. These choices will include things like fresh vegetables and other items that meet the standards of the Child Nutrition program, and which do not contain more than 35% of total calories from fat and sugar, and which contain no trans fats.

4. Physical Education and Physical Activity:

4.1 Physical Education Curriculum:

The district has adopted a health and wellness curriculum that includes physical education standards, and has specifically adopted the SPARK curriculum for use in physical education classes. In addition to scheduled physical education time, the district has adopted an activity based learning program that incorporates physical activity into classroom activities throughout the day.

4.2 Elementary Physical Education:

Elementary students receive at least 75 minutes of scheduled physical education per week with highly qualified instructors. Additional physical activity time is provided by site teachers. Total physical activity time exceeds 150 minutes for elementary students.

4.3 Middle School Physical Education:

Middle School students will receive at least 90 minutes of physical education instruction weekly from highly qualified instructors. Site teachers provide additional physical activity time up to 120 minutes a week.

4.4 High School Physical Education:

High School students at remote sites will receive at least 110 minutes of physical education instruction from highly qualified instructors weekly. Site teachers provide additional physical activity time.

In order to graduate students must have at least one Physical education credit. Physical education courses are available to students yearly, and they are encouraged to take PE courses beyond the one credit required for graduation.

4.5 Teacher/Student Ratio for Physical Education:

Physical education classes maintain the same teacher to student ratio as found in academic classrooms. Typical PE classes maintain a teacher to student ratio of no more than 1:20.

4.6 Facilities and Equipment:

The physical education program is provided with adequate space and equipment to conform to all applicable safety standards. This includes keeping the student numbers in activity areas down to safe levels.

4.7 Qualifications for Physical Education Teachers:

Physical Education classes will be taught by licensed teachers that are highly qualified in the subject. The district employs two full time itinerant Physical Education teachers. These individuals travel

between school sites to assure that all students have access to appropriately certified Physical Education teachers.

4.8 Training for Teachers:

Physical education teachers will receive professional development on a yearly basis. This can include conferences focused on physical education, and on-site or online training. All teachers will receive yearly training in Action Based Learning, a program designed to incorporate physical activity into the learning process, greatly increasing student activity during the day outside of formal physical education classes.

4.9 Waiver Requirements:

Schools shall not give physical education credit to students involved in sports. Sports and academic activities may not take the place of physical education.

4.10 Physical Breaks in Elementary Classes:

Breaks that include physical activity are included within the classrooms throughout the day. Additionally, the Action Based Learning program builds physical activities into the learning process, allowing students to move, stretch and participate in physical activities as they learn. Staff is trained on these activities yearly.

4.11 Structured Physical Activities Outside of the School Day:

Students at sites that have sufficient populations to support teams have the option to participate in sports activities outside of the school day. Several district sites run open gyms in the evenings, encouraging students to attend.

4.12 Community Use of School Facilities:

Schools are encouraged to negotiate mutually acceptable and fiscally responsible arrangements with community agencies and organizations to keep school spaces and facilities available to students, staff, and community members outside of schedule school use times.

4.13 Elementary Recess:

All elementary school students shall have a daily recess(es).

4.14 Restricting Physical Activity as a *Discipline*:

Staff members shall not deny participation in daily scheduled physical education (PE) and not more than 25% of recess as a form of discipline unless the safety of students is in question, i.e. bullying.

5. Evaluation:

5.1 Policy Implementation:

The superintendent or designee will ensure compliance with district nutrition and physical education policies on an ongoing basis, with compliance reached by the end of the first quarter of the school year. Site principals will be responsible for maintaining compliance for site specific items such as vending machine items.

The Child Nutrition coordinator will be responsible for maintaining compliance with nutritional standards and for the publication and sharing of information on an ongoing basis.

In the event that a policy is unreasonable, inappropriate, or unreachable, it will be the responsibility of the Wellness Team to review and update the policy.

5.2 Policy Evaluation:

The Superintendent or designee will designate one or more persons to be responsible for ensuring that each school within the district complies with this policy, and that school activities, including fundraisers and celebrations, are consistent with district nutrition and physical activity goals.

The Wellness Team will meet at least two times a year to review policy and examine data that has been collected on student health and wellness, and the effectiveness of district programs in these areas. It will be the responsibility of this group to keep the Wellness Policy and related policies and plans up to date and in compliance with district, federal, and state standards.

5.3 Progress Reporting:

The Wellness Team will prepare an annual report for the Superintendent, <u>School Board and public as required by law.</u> This report will include an evaluation of the program implementation and effectiveness, as well as recommendations for policy or program changes.

Purpose:

The Alaska Gateway School District's Gifted program is designed to ensure the provision of appropriate educational services for those students demonstrating such outstanding abilities that appropriate modifications or provisions the general classroom setting need to be supplemented to adequately address their needs.

I. Student Identification:

Students are identified by teachers or other staff based on classroom performance, standardized assessment scores, and/or parental referral as potential candidates for the gifted program. Referrals may be submitted to the principal by any of the following persons: Parents, teachers, administrators, counselors or parents.

Note: Students who have been identified in other school districts for gifted programs will need to meet the requirements of the AGSD program in order to qualify for services.

Screening:

Upon receipt of referral, the principal (&/or team) shall determine the need for further evaluation based on a screening of information to include a review of the student's cumulative file for report card grades, teacher anecdotal information, and standardized test scores. Also included will be documentation of efforts to meet the student's needs in the regular classroom and the results of those efforts. If the screening supports the probability of requiring services, the school will proceed with an evaluation. If the evidence does not support the referral the parents will be given notice of the District's decision not to proceed with an evaluation and the reason(s) for this decision.

II. Student Eligibility:

Evaluation

- 1. Written permission to evaluate must be obtained from parent(s)/legal guardian(s) prior to the initiation of any individual evaluation. The school will conduct the evaluation after obtaining parental consent to test.
- 2. The following assessment instruments may be utilized as appropriate to determine eligibility:
 - a. Nationally Recognized Current Standardized Achievement Assessments
 - b. Nationally Recognized Current Standardized Cognitive Assessments
 - c. Standardized Assessments related to Gifted Students

After a formal evaluation is completed by qualified personnel, the team will compile the information and determine whether the student is eligible for participation in the gifted program.

Criteria for Eligibility

A student must:

- Demonstrate superior achievement in the regular classroom that is so superior to other students that appropriate modifications or provisions in the regular classroom need to be supplemented to adequately address their needs. Documentation may include grades, state required assessments, standardized assessments, teacher observations and documentation of modifications attempted, samples of students work, etc.
- 2. Score at or above the 98th percentile in overall intellectual ability based on an individual intelligence (cognitive) test.

- 3. Score at or above the 97th percentile in at least 3 out of the six subject areas on an individual or group standardized achievement test.
- 4. Score in the gifted range on three of the four areas measured by the gifted assessment.

III. Learning Plan

A gifted program will be offered to each eligible student to challenge and extend their learning. This plan will be reviewed at least every 3 years or at natural transition times such as when moving from elementary, to middle, to high school.

Grades K-5

At grades K-5, the gifted program is designed to provide high achieving students extra challenge and motivation for continued good work in the regular classroom.

The topics and challenges presented to the students are planned in coordination with classroom teachers on a semester basis.

Grades 6-8

Gifted students in grades 6-8 have the opportunity to select an enrichment course each semester from REACH Academy as approved by the site administrator. The course selected cannot be one that is provided by the regular education program and should serve to challenge and extend the students learning.

Grades 9-12

Gifted students in High School have the opportunity to select enrichment courses from REACH Academy or another distance delivery provider with approval from the site administrator. Gifted student's who are of Junior/Senior standing, may opt to take one college course each semester either as part of their regular class load, or in addition to it with site administrator's approval. All approved courses should provide challenge and enrichment to the student and may not be offered in the regular classroom setting.

Re-evaluation

The re-evaluations of the students gifted status shall include: 1) a review of existing evaluation data including information provided by the parent, current classroom-based assessments and observations, and teacher input; 2) on the basis of that review, the team will determine any additional data to determine the present level of performance, and need for continued gifted participation.

Students whose classroom grades do not reflect that they are achieving above their peers may be withdrawn from the gifted program even though their test scores may indicate that they continue to meet the eligibility requirements. Less than above average grades (B) will be considered an indication that the child is being challenged by the regular classroom work and does not need the additional challenge provided by the gifted program. Grades may be used as a determining factor for continuation in the gifted program.

Parent Notification and Participation

Parents will receive written notification when their child has been identified to participate in the gifted program and will be given the opportunity to decline participation. Notification will include a narrative description of the Enrichment Program being offered to the student.

Cost of Services

The evaluation and services of the gifted program will be provided at no cost to the parents other than those fees that are normally charged to children as a part of the regular education program.

Appeal Process

Parents wishing to challenge the district's gifted program, their child's gifted eligibility, or their child's gifted Plan may take the following steps:

Step 1: Review by the director of gifted program:

Parents should request in writing a formal review of their concerns by the director of gifted services (currently, the Director of Special Programs). The director will schedule a meeting with the parents to review concerns, confer with staff and render a decision. Parents will be informed of the director's decision within 5 school days of the meeting.

Step 2: Appeal to the Superintendent:

If parents disagree with the decision made by the director, they may appeal to the Superintendent. The appeal should be made in writing and should include all documentation of decisions up to that point. The Superintendent may request a meeting with parents and/or staff and will render a decision within 5 school days. The decision of the Board of Education is final.

So here are the budgetary numbers.....

The cost of the gear because it is outside is higher and it is \$23,277.09

However if we are doing this install in the middle of the winter that can definitely change things. I would budget for \$8,000 - \$10,000 in labor. I am going to factor in hotel, some other misc. material costs, per diem, and travel as well.

As far as shipping and electrical work to be performed I do not know those costs, or if electrical would even need to be required too badly so it is excluded in this price along with shipping.

Rough budgetary number is looking to be around \$35,000.00. This cost could jump up if there is high shipping costs, electrical cost, or if this happens in the winter when it is cold and work has to be performed outside. Also the price could reduce but there are some unknowns at this time and I don't want you to ask for a grant under what the total value would be!!

Without knowing the above mentioned details it would be safest to budget for \$35,000 - \$40,000. That would be a safe budgetary number. The District is still awaiting the official results of the Regional School Board election from the Division of Elections. The election results will not be certified until after the absentee ballots are counted. However, there are most likely not enough absentee or late ballots to overturn any of the current election results. The uncertified Division of Elections vote leaders for our District include: Lisa Conrad, Seat B/Section II, Jill Kranenburg, Seat C/Section II, Peter Talus, Seat D/Section II and Shauna Lee, Seat E/Section II. The four seats open for election this year were all from Tok. Congratulations to the three reelected Board Members and the one new Board Member! I look forward to working with each of you, as well as the continuing Board Members, in the best interest of the district's children, parents, and communities. Below is an update pertaining to some of the issues I have been addressing since the previous Board meeting in September.

Team Hollywood

The Alaska Gateway School District, in partnership with the Tok Lions Club, is bringing Team Hollywood Celebrity Streetball to Tok, Alaska on Friday, November 13, 2015. Team Hollywood will also conduct a health and wellness clinic, at no cost to attendees, on Saturday morning. This event is open to all communities. We would like to offer free admission for all children under the age of 19 as well as only charge adults \$1 a ticket. Usually the ticket price for attendance at a Team Hollywood Celebrity Streetball event is \$7 for children and \$10 for adults. In order to reduce the price of admission for students and community members, the district is attempting to raise \$4,000 in sponsorship. Letters were mailed to local and statewide organizations/businesses such as: Lions Club, Three Bears, Fast Eddy's, Young's Services, Northern Energy, AP&T, Burnham Construction, Mt. Sanford Tribal Consortium, Tok Native Association, Village Councils- Northway, Tetlin, Tanacross and Dot Lake- Summit Consulting, Tok Transportation, TCUC, Doyon, TCC and GCI. As of today, Three Bears has contributed \$2,000; Tok Lions and AGSD each donated \$1,000; and Burnham Construction and Tok Transportation contributed \$250. See attached "draft" flier.

Districtwide Copier Request For Proposal

The district is soliciting bids to replace the school copiers at all seven school sites as well as the central office. These upgraded copiers would be tied into a yearly contract for service and support at the rate of no less than 700,000 black and white clicks and 30,000 color clicks on a yearly cycle. The copiers were last replaced back in 2009 and exceeded usage expectations. However, these older copiers do not communicate well with current web based technology such as our newly implemented email system utilizing Gmail and are beginning to break down on a more consistent basis causing frustrations and wasted time for staff members. Board approval is required to proceed with the acceptance of any bids since this will be an expense considerably higher than \$10,000. If an adequate bid is submitted from one of the vendors, the new copiers should have a useful lifespan of five to seven years.

Wood Fuel Bids

The Biomass Committee met to discuss and agree upon a wood fuel contract to post within the community as well as distribute to all wood vendors and village councils throughout the district. The bids are due at noon on Friday, October 9, and another committee meeting is scheduled for 2:00 that afternoon to open the proposals. The committee will have suggestions for the full Board at the 5:00 Special Meeting on October 12.

FY16 Budget

We are in the process of analyzing the District's budget in relation to the enrollment numbers. The twenty-day count began on September 28th and completes on October 23rd. We will know exactly how the enrollment numbers will affect our projected budget by the next meeting. The results of the FY15 Annual Fiscal Audit will not be presented in a work session prior to the upcoming regular meeting because of a dispute at the state level in regards to PRS and TRS distributions.

The topic of closing small schools of under 25 students is being discussed in the hallways of the legislature. At the ASA meeting last month over a dozen superintendents met one evening after the conference day concluded to discuss a plan of action in an effort to dissuade this conversation. A resolution is included as an action item. Being an election year, I am not sure if the conversation of "closing schools" will be a viable topic for legislators attempting reelection bids. However, this is a conversation that will occur in the near future if the price of oil continues to generate revenue less than the amount required to balance our state's budget. CEAAC is also contracting a study to be completed regarding the effects closing small schools have upon students, families and communities.



Early education makes a world of difference for Alaska's children

OPINION: Few programs do as much to help Alaska's kids learn as a little schooling before kindergarten.

Many exceptional teachers begin class with an anecdote, an illustration to real life, a good story or mind puzzle to draw their students' interest into the lesson. With setting that hook in mind, I'll draw on a short story as a segue into the topic of early education.

My parents spent over two decades teaching low-income children in some of the smallest villages in Alaska -- remote areas of Alaska where teachers were difficult to find and retain. My mother believed in the power of literacy

and making sure kids had an opportunity to develop academic skills at an early age. One of her true passions was ensuring children had the option of a preschool program — especially because she taught kindergarten. My mother passed away this summer; however, her enthusiasm for early learning still resonates with me. Therefore, the next few paragraphs are dedicated to the most important issue of early education.

Evidence clearly indicates early learning programs increase all children's potential to be academically and socially prepared to begin kindergarten. According to the National Institution for Early Education Research, "High-quality preschool education can support early development in ways that yield long-term social and emotional benefits. A significant part of the long-term economic pay-off to public investments in high-quality preschool programs can come from their social outcomes, including the prevention of crime and delinquency."

As stated within a 2015 study completed by the Citizens for the Educational Advancement of Alaska's Children, children who attended a formal preschool are more likely to "have higher achievement test scores, repeat grades less often, need less special education, graduate from high school and attend college at higher rates. However, only 3 percent of Alaskan four-year olds are in state funded pre-K, far below the national average of 28 percent." (In 2015, 64 percent of all five-year old children entering Alaska public schools attended preschool. Of these students, 61 percent attended a federally funded, private or nonprofit preschool.) In support of pre-K education, Commissioner Alyce Hanley wrote, "Alaska has been recognized as providing high quality preschool opportunities for children, yet ranks near the bottom in being able to provide that chance to Alaska's children. The need is great, and our program is far too small." The percentage of children attending preschools in Alaska must be increased especially for low-income children who lack access or funds for other early education programs and who, at no fault of their own, enter kindergarten considerably less prepared than their middle- and upper-class peers.

In order to begin kindergarten as successfully as possible, all children must have access to quality preschool programs. As an example, my daughter turned 5 last month and has attended high-quality day care programs since she was 6 weeks old. This year my daughter and her classmates transitioned into preschool and most can already count past 50, spell and write their names, know the alphabet, can add and subtract single digit numbers as well as name all the colors and recognize continents. If children are Alaska's most valuable resource, we need to ensure that each and every single child has this type of opportunity no matter what region of our great state his or her parents live in or their income level. The state must assume a more active role to ensure that early education opportunities are available to all children, especially for parents that do not qualify for federally funded early learning programs and cannot afford the cost of a private preschool. Should this not be the expectation?



For the past six years in our district, the Alaska Gateway School District, based in Tok, if any community has a minimum of four children age 4 by Sept. 1, a preschool is established or continued directly within the public school. We learned through trial and error that the best place to locate a preschool program is within the public schools of our communities. Due to budgetary limitations, a noncertified aide, as opposed to a certified teacher, provides the instruction. The district also provides free breakfast, lunch and a snack for all early learning students. Our preschool programs do not generate any state funding and solely rely on a multiyear Alaska Native Education grant, Moore grant, partnership with Tanana Chiefs Conference as well as general operating funds to remain in operation. One of the reasons our district surpassed the state average in all areas of the Alaska Developmental Profile that is given to all kindergarten children entering public schools, is I believe, directly correlated to having 75 percent of these students enrolled within early learning programs. We believe so strongly in the effectiveness of preschools that this is one of the last programs the district would consider eliminating from the budget.

Currently 36 percent of Alaska's children are not enrolled in any type of preschool or early learning program. This percentage must be reduced so that teachers are providing grade-level lessons instead of utilizing important classroom instructional time to plan catch-up strategies. A chart created by the Alaska Department of Revenue illustrates that a \$5.2 billion operating budget is at the national average for the population density of our state. However, as reported by Andi Story in the Alaska Association of School Boards' 2015 June Commentary, "Nationally, the average that states spend on their children's education is 35 percent (compared to Alaska's 26 percent) of their budget." Does this percentage difference reflect there may be state funding to support a pre-K program for public education?

Since the future of Alaska is directly dependent upon the leadership of our children, we need to place considerable effort into further developing programs and strategies for children under public school age. The Alaska Council of School Administrators, which includes umbrella associations composed of the superintendents, principals and business managers, is currently in the process of approving a Joint Position Statement in support of pre-K education that states: "ACSA believes early childhood education must be a priority for all Alaskans who desire to increase the long-term success for all children." The Association of Alaska School Boards "supports and encourages districts and/or communities to develop early childhood programs, which include parent and family involvement."

As a state, we need to ensure that all kids have the opportunity to begin public school education as successfully as possible. The bridge to success begins with early education.

This month we are preparing for the official 20 day student count, which began 09/28/15 and ends 10/23/15. The Federal Impact Aid Survey forms were sent out to all of the schools this week. These are sent out from the schools to all parents/guardians for completion. We anticipate these forms back in our office on or shortly after the 23th of October which is the end of the count period. These forms are used in conjunction with our Oasis report due the first week of November and for processing the Impact Aid Application which is due January 31, 2016.

Our student count is currently the following:

As you can see by this chart our student count is up by 8 students. We are down in the brick and mortar schools and up in Correspondence. Correspondence numbers do not go through the formula. We only receive a flat 90% of Student Base Allocation per student. The student numbers will change during the count period as it always does. We will not know where we are with our budget until after the count is complete. We will look at the numbers again at that time.

Included in this report is the Certified Sick Leave Bank report. After the FY16 new teachers were added the balance is currently 132.50 days. Per section 314 of the certified agreement, when the sick leave bank falls below 150 days all members will donate one day at the beginning of the next school year. This will happen with the October payroll.

BDO our Auditors, are currently working on the draft audit for FY15. We will not be having a work session this month. Most if not all School Districts are in the same boat. There is a reporting issue with GASB 68 that is being worked out between the State and the Federal Government. I was told by Alex Beckman our Auditor that he has spoken with Juneau (Elizabeth Nudleman) and she assured him that Districts will not be penalized for being late with the audit given the situation currently. We have nine months to report to the Federal Government which is March 31st. The State has a deadline of November 15th, this has been lifted until the issue can be settled.

The Business office is busy with quarterly reports including grants, 941 and the state esc report. There are also many State and Federal surveys due at this time of year also.

All - We believe you have or will be shortly receiving an update letter from the Division of Retirement and Benefits (DRB) regarding a status update on the PERS and TRS report distribution. This email is intended to further update you regarding the impact and effect of that communication on your audit.

On Friday last week, our office was notified that the State of Alaska Division of Legislative Audit (DLA) is not in agreement with the Department of Law's assessment of the PERS / TRS on-behalf contributions. Our office agrees with DLA's assessment and is now planning on a unified approach in which we are considering the on-behalf payments to be a special funding situation, which is consistent with DLA's assessment. (You can now disregard any prior conversations regarding "contingency" on this matter).

Also in connection with the above, we were informed by DRB yesterday that they now have a new tentative date of "end of October" for final release of their audited allocation schedules, RSI, and footnotes, along with the final approved actuarial valuation reports. Our office continues to work diligently to finalize the necessary workpaper practice aid and footnote within this framework. We appreciate everyone's patience and cooperation as we work through these late changes.

To be clear, we are not able to release any audit opinions that include the GASB 68 modifications prior to finalization of the information from the State. In addition, we do anticipate some backlog in processing the necessary changes to the draft financial statements following receipt of the final reports from the State of Alaska.

Activities Report for September and October

o AGSD Biomass Projects – We have had several tours of the biomass plant this month. Groups from the Alaska Energy Authority, the University Cooperative Extension Office, and the US Department of Agriculture have visited our facility, and is being used as an example of how the communities in the Upper Tanana can work together to solve the primary problems of energy (heat and electricity), and food. Tony Lee, the plant manager, has been taking the lead in working with these groups, and has been an advocate for the district and the concept of using biomass to generate heat and power.

Inservice:

- October Inservice Focus will be on using our new evaluation system, RESPECT training (which focuses on conflict and situational de-escalation), Climbing Wall Certification that will extend in to the weekend, on using ClassBright as our curriculum management system, updating staff on the work that has been going on with the new evaluation system, and providing time for teachers to work together in grade-level groups.
- o **FY16 ESEA Application (Formerly known as NCLB)** was completed and submitted to EED and was "substantially" approved for funding. We are now in the process of revising the application, and are working through the compliance issues that change every year.
- o **Gateway READY!** I am pleased to report that we just received word from Senator Murkowski's office that AGSD was selected in a competitive round of funding for our Pre-School project that we submitted by the district last spring. We have been selected to receive \$659K over three years that will be used to enhance and update our preschool program, partnering with TCC. We are expecting to have that ramped up and ready by the beginning of the second semester.
- O Indian Education Annual Performance Report-There is a new report due to the USDOE on our Indian Education Funding, which was just completed and submitted. A primary problem with reporting progress on any of these grants right now is the state has not yet released last year's individual scores from the Alaska Measure of Progress (AMP), which is the new state assessment.
- **General** Much of this month's time has been committed to personnel issues. I have been working on and reviewing our employee training system, and The issue of attracting quality teachers in the current social and media environment which seems to thrive on bashing education is going to be coming more and more to the forefront, and create more and more difficulty in filling our positions.

RE: September 2015 Board Report

The Maintenance Department was shorthanded half of the month for moose season, and a lot of my crew did not come back, I am down to just a couple of guys trying to finish up the summer maintenance list and all of the work orders coming in from the schools.

Northway School: We have been working on getting the air out of the heat system, and we did the preventive work orders.

Northway Teacher's House: We drained and cleaned the water tank, and fixed a leak in the heat system.

Tetlin School: We worked on the heat system and did the preventive work orders.

Dot Lake School: The sprinkler system tripped and popped 2 sprinkler heads, one in the gym, and one in the attic, we had to replace wet insulation in the attic, and vacuum up water in the gym. ATS informed me that they no longer put the cold weather chemical in the sprinkler system because it is corrosive, this could be the reason the sprinkler heads are breaking, ATS is looking into this for me.

Eagle School: We installed a new score board during the last board meeting in Eagle.

Hockey Rink: We are doing a little extra work to spruce it up. We are taping, mudding and painting the walls and ceilings in the dressing rooms, it is making them look a lot better than just painting. We painted the bleachers blue and red, we also fixed the toilet and the sink. We are building a floor and insulating the walls in the scorer's box, this should help with keeping it a little warmer for the clock operator.

Report to the Regional School Board Alaska Gateway School District October 8th, 2015 Prepared by LeAnn Young, Special Education Coordinator

The past month the special education department has been focused on ensuring that all student's Individualized Education Programs (IEP's) are being properly implemented and all students are receiving the services and the allocated aide time required. Several sites have recently hired additional paraprofessionals to meet the required aide time. We currently have 57 students with special needs in the district and another 6 in the intervention or referral process.

Trainings:

- LeAnn Young attended the new Special Education Coordinator meeting in Anchorage in mid-September. It was a good experience and it was a great opportunity to network with others around the state. The training was beneficial and informative.
- Candy Thurneau, Scott Holmes and LeAnn Young recently participated in a PowerSchool Special Education TIENET presentation. We are looking into options to replace our current program called SEASweb to develop IEP's. The information gained from this presentation was very enlightening and we are extremely interested in using a program that would be compatible with our current student database system.
- Special Education Services Agency (SESA) will be presenting a day-long training for special education paraprofessionals on October 10th in conjunction with district in-service. All paraprofessionals from AGSD have been invited to attend.

Specialists:

All Specialists who contract with our school district have conducted their initial visit and have met with students and staff to cover services required in student IEP's.

- E-therapy is working well at all sites for students who have goals in the area of speech & language.
- A speech pathologist will be in the district the week of October 19th. She will be visiting all sites and will be working with paraprofessionals on providing quarterly supervision for students with speech and language goals.
- The occupational therapist will be in the district the week of October 26th, 2015.

Current Projects:

I am working on streamlining paperwork and special education processes. There is a need in the district to have a special education handbook for each site and I have begun compiling information that would be included in this. The hope would be to have something in place for next school year.

Technology Board Report October 2015

We've received funding on everything except Internet so far for ERate. Although this is the first time I've seen partial/selective funding of a 471, I've been told this is kind of the new normal for districts in year one of new Internet contracts. The folks that process ERate applications had a deadline to have a certain percentage of applications funded for the first time this year. In order to meet this deadline they funded the application that were low effort, and left the ones that needed to be closely scrutinized for later. Large contracts like our Internet fall into the "closely scrutinized" category.

I've finished the paperwork necessary to accept the funding for the items that we've received a decision on, and am working on a reply to a new round of questions for our Internet service. I've also started working with GCI to move forward on the wireless upgrade we were recently funded for. This upgrade will provide an enterprise level wireless system to every site. This system will be centrally managed, and is extremely robust compared to our current wireless solution. The wireless solution we went with is not only much more cost effective in terms of "bang for our buck", it has the added advantage of not requiring a yearly contract like other high-end wireless implementations. This means we do not need to keep paying every year to keep our wireless functional at sites.

I will be working on our 470 ERate application for next year in the coming months. I plan to apply both for new battery backup units for our networking centers and new network switching gear. The switches control the flow of traffic internally. Most of our switches are approaching if not over 10 years old at this point. Although this is not necessarily a bad thing given our fairly simple needs, upgrading switches will allow us to put in a devices that are capable of providing power over the network lines. This opens up many possibilities including network-based security cameras and Internet Telephone systems known as Voice Over IP, or VoIP phones. VoIP phones work without requiring traditional telephone lines. I've begun moving towards a VoIP solution because ERate is eliminating funding for traditional phone subsidies. The loss of these subsidies will hit us at the rate of approximately \$60,000 a year if we do not make any changes to the way we do things.

Also on the ERate front, I've finished the paperwork necessary to close out last year's ERate program and get us refunds on systems that are not automatically discounted.

We've seen a number of serious and repetitive problems happening with our copies at sites this year, resulting in a lot of downtime on machines people are counting on to prepare educational materials. Given that we last replaced copiers in 2009, this is no doubt due to the fact that these heavily used machines are simply wearing out. As such, I believe it is time to refresh our copiers.




I have been planning a lot of fun art, cooking, and science projects for this year. In science we will be studying butterflies, soils, worms, and chemical and physical changes.




