## HAPS opens 'innovation' door

The Hope Academy of Public Service opened the door to the 'school of innovation' concept for the HPSD this year.

Supported by community involvement, including a \$5,000 innovation lab grant from Georgia-Pacific Co. - Hope, the new grade 5-8 open enrollment academy provides a rigorous curriculum in a project/collaborative-based environment. The school on the Augustus Garland campus has 157 students, and is the model for the development of additional academy structures within the HPSD.

The Georgia-Pacific Co. grant funded the purchase of 3D printer technology for the innovation lab at HAPS, which will allow students to build prototype parts for specific projects.

A public service curriculum is under development through a partnership with the William J. Clinton School of Public Service in Little Rock. The

graduate student team includes Zack Huffman, University of Mississippi, BA in public policy leadership; Caroline Dunlap, University of Vermont, BS in environmental studies; Crystal C. Mercer, University of Arkansas at Little Rock, BA in theater arts and dance; and, Andrew Trevino, University of Colorado at Boulder, BA in political science and University of Arkansas at Little Rock William H. Bowen School of Law student. Other potential higher education partnership opportunities include the University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana. The "school of innovation" concept may also expand with the proposed development of academies at Beryl Henry Elementary School and Yerger Middle School. The proposed BHE campus will focus upon the cultural and digital arts and the proposed YMS campus will focus upon agricultural sciences. A target date has not been set for the two "open enrollment" projects.

#### 'Strive for Five'

## Student attendance challenge takes first steps to cut absences.

A districtwide initiative to improve student attendance in class is showing positive results. Initial reports from the first nine-week grading period of the 2016-2017 school year shows student support for the "Strive for Five" initiative. The initiative has been particularly significant at Hope High School, where 42 students maintained perfect attendance with no absences or tardies, and 452 students were absent between one and five days. The goal of the initiative is to reduce absences and tardies to fewer than five per semester. At Beryl Henry Elementary School, 142 students qualified for reward incentives. Incentives range from special privileges to lunch with Superintendent Bobby Hart and participation in drawings for prizes.

#### **BHE** makes state list

Beryl Henry Elementary School has been named an Arkansas School Recognition Program campus by the Arkansas Department of Education.

Beryl Henry Elementary School is among 201 schools statewide that were recognized by the Arkansas Department of Education. BHE was named as one of the schools in the top 6-10 percent of academic growth. Hope Schools Superintendent Bobby Hart congratulated the BHE staff and students on the accomplishment.

"We all celebrate your success and are proud of the efforts from all," Hart said.

The Arkansas School Recognition Program is designed to reward public schools that experience high student performance and high student academic growth, according to the ADE announcement.
