#### DHS Introduces its New Academy of Finance

Depew High School is excited to announce the creation of an Academy of Finance that will initiate in the 2014-15 school year.

Sponsored by the National Academy Foundation, this program is a unique opportunity for students at DHS to enroll in a program that offers opportunities beyond those normally seen in a classroom.

Students participating in the Academy of Finance will have opportunities to work directly with local business leaders to learn what it takes to be successful in the working world. This will occur through guest lectures, job shadows and field trips to area businesses. They will be required to complete a paid and unpaid internship with local business partners. In addition they will have opportunities to obtain college credit for courses taken within the academy. Students completing the Finance Academy program will obtain the communication skills, job seeking skills and curriculum mastery that will enable them to pursue the career of their choice, whether it be business related or within another field.

The Finance Academy is a three-year program beginning in the student's sophomore year. This year's freshman class will be the first to enroll for next year's program. ### Cayuga Heights New Gymnasium Sparkles

The opening of the new gymnasium wing at Cayuga Heights Elementary school is the last major piece of the 2011 Capital Improvement Project. The gymnasium, which has six basketball nets, padded bleacher seats and two staff offices, was ready for use when students returned to school after winter break.



An entrance hall, constructed off a classroom hallway in the back of the building, leads to the gym, two new

classrooms and a restroom area. The two new classrooms will be used in September 2014 since the building lost one classroom due to the construction of the entrance hall.

During athletic events at the Frank Constantino sports complex, the restrooms will be accessible through a back door near the athletic fields. A new concession stand was built which opens to the athletic fields for the sale of food and beverages during events.

Cayuga Heights will continue to use the building's original gym for physical education classes.

The new gymnasium space allows the district to properly address federal guidelines for physical education without having to use a multi-purpose room or classroom for that purpose.





#### Depew Well-Cats Program Offers Healthy Activities to District Staff

The district's wellness committee is striving to offer staff valuable health education activities and classes and informational materials throughout the year. The district

is proud of its workforce and considers its employees a valuable resource. The district has partnered with Independent Health to put various programming and activities into place this year. The overall goal is to provide resources that will encourage staff and their families to build healthy lives.

Participating in the wellness program is voluntary and open to all Depew Schools' staff members.

The Depew Well-Cats program is overseen by the Well-Cats Ambassador committee made up of staff from various buildings and departments. As a group, their focus is determining programs that are of interest to staff and implementing the wellness activities.

Selected activities for the 2013-14 year include a 2014 Zero Gain Program; Eat for the Health of It; Step-Out Well-Cat Walking Challenge and Know Your Numbers.

#### **Building on Last Year's Success**

In spring of 2013, the first wellness activity drew 187 district employees who participated in the Step-Out Well-Cat Walking Challenge. Staff walked over 8,000 miles in just four weeks!

Through sponsorships from Independent Health, two district employees were selected for a stay at the Biggest Loser Resort in Java Center and four staff members were selected to receive a YMCA Fit Star program membership.



# Message from the Superintendent Studying Trends, General Discussion Mark Early Budget Process

The Depew Union Free School District has begun the initial stages of the budget development process for the 2014 – 2015 school year. As I am sure you are aware, these continue to be uncertain times. Therefore, our goal

will be to continue to provide the School-Community with the necessary information to understand the constraints the District faces when developing a budget. Our strategy always begins with studying trends for our District and holding discussions with our community, so residents can make an informed decision on Tuesday, May 20, 2014.

You can stay updated on the process, through the District's website: www.depewschools. org, as the budget presentations will be posted online.

As we begin the early stages of the process, we will be reviewing the effects of two key pieces to the puzzle;

First, and most concerning, is the continuation of the Tax Cap legislation. This law limits the District's ability to raise the tax levy to approximately 2% or the consumer price index (CPI), whichever is less, plus allowable exemptions. This year, CPI is projected to only be 1.66%, thus the limit will be lower than the first two years of this law and thus significantly reduce our ability to raise revenue locally. Although the concept of a property tax limit is understandable and perhaps needed, it was done by the NYS legislature, while not providing any mandate relief to the school districts.

Next, the state aid picture is uncertain once again, which is the next largest funding stream. Over the past several years, aid has been held flat and even pulled back to 2007 funding levels. Furthermore, the state has placed a spending cap on aid for education, which is based on personal income growth. The right to a public education is constitutionally based in NYS. By limiting districts' ability to raise revenue and at the same time reduce funding support, the state is defunding schools and setting school districts up to diminish the sound basic education our children deserve and will eventually force insolvency for all schools.

As in years past, Depew is taking proactive approaches in addressing these budgeting calamities. We are beginning the process of designing a budget plan early, forecasting the district's long term financial position and continuing to utilize the Superintendent's Advisory Council, which is made up of key communicators within the school community. This group will continue to advise the superintendent on the key budgeting issues within the school community.

As you can clearly see, it will once again be a difficult budget planning process, but it is important to note that it is our continued commitment that the proposed budget will balance the needs of both the taxpayers and our children.

# Converting Used Markers to Diesel Fuel Cayuga Heights Project Collects Dried-Up Markers


Elementary students usually use a lot of markers during the school year. Fourth-grader Brooke Dehn hopes all those used, dried up markers will be donated back to the school instead of the trash can.

Since November, Cayuga Heights Elementary students and teachers have been collecting used markers (any brand) that are ready to be discarded. The markers will be sent to JBI Inc, a facility in Niagara Falls where they will be converted into clean liquid fuel. This fuel can be used to power vehicles, heat homes, cook meals and more!

Through the Crayola ColorCycle program, Crayola pays to ship the old markers to JBI, Inc. where the plastic pieces will be broken down and converted to diesel and other liquid fuels using JBI's Plastic2Oil® ("P2O") process.

Brooke, a student in Mrs. Lorenc's class, researched, coordinated and presented information about the

program to school officials. She created the collection bin that is set up in the front foyer at Cayuga Heights. The marker collection will continue throughout the year. The markers can be any brand, not just Crayola. By keeping the markers out of landfills, the project helps the environment and also helps create a clean energy fuel source, as well.



Cayuga Heights held their third annual fifth-grade National Geographic geography bee on Jan. 10. A preliminary test was given to all fifth-graders and the top nine students moved on to the competition. The students in third grade were exposed to this wonderful building of history and to various Arts and Crafts. Throughout the visit, students immersed themselves into the ideals of the Arts and Crafts movement, finding the joy and satisfaction of creating with their own hands.

Throughout this tour, students were constantly engaged in hands-on activities including making their own African Wishing Scrolls. Students had to write a wish on the scroll that were then rolled up and put into a decorative case that could be worn as a necklace. Another activity was learning about calligraphy and illuminating their initials into a colorful and elaborate design. Students were also taught how to create and bind a book that could later be used for a journal.



The senior winners of these regional contests, along with their high school instructor, receive an all expense paid trip to New York City to compete in the nationals at the National Automotive Technology Competition.



# Sensory Integration and the Benefits of Swinging

The occupational therapy department at Depew Schools is in the beginning stages of developing a pilot program that will



incorporate modalities to assist children who are having difficulty with sensory processing within the classroom. Children with sensory processing difficulties are unable to focus, fidget in their chair and have problems keeping their hands and feet to themselves.

This school year selected students come to the OT/PT room at Cayuga Heights Elementary first thing each morning for a quick "dose" of sensory input. In less than 10 minutes, each student moves through a set of stations that uses swinging, joint input and heavywork exercises. At the end of each week a simple checklist is filled out by the teacher, to determine whether or not the child's focus is better, less, or no change.

Swinging, jumping, spinning and rocking help a student's body organize and regulate their sensory systems. These movements can become calming and regulating tools. Studies show that rocking, spinning and other physical movement through space helps children's brain development and their ability to pay attention by stimulating the vestibular (inner ear) system.

Benefits of Using a Swing: Swinging is similar to rocking which most children and adults find comforting and calming. Those who are diagnosed with Autism, Asperger's Syndrome, ADHD, PDD, and other disorders can also benefit from using the swing. The repetitive, soothing and relaxing motion of a hammock swing provides closeness, which is a feeling that many autistic children like. Since children with ADHD need more motion than the average child, it is especially satisfying for them to swing.

The amount of vestibular input needed varies depending on the child. It is most important that the sensory processing needs of the child be monitored/controlled to determine what is right for them under the direction of an occupational or physical therapist.

The OT/PT department is excited to have begun this program and looks forward to helping students discover new ways to improve their focus, attention and behaviors in school.
