IX. Finance Committee Report

A. Discussion and Possible Action on a Lot Line Adjustment for Parcel #111-0613-0633-000 (Simonson St.) in Exchange for Monetary Compensation from Adjacent Property Owner

The property owner to the south has made the following offer to purchase the most southerly area of land from the district at the Simonson Parcel we recently purchased from the village.

Mr. Nikolay, I believe the area we are negotiating is approximately 150ft x. 20ft or 3000 square ft We are prepared to offer 40 cents a square foot or \$1200.00 based apon the 3000 sq foot total., Jim.

I did confirm with the architect that the parking lot we are planning on putting in will not be adversely affected by this transfer of land. If approved by the board (and the special meeting vote last month did authorize the board to sell a portion of the lot) a lot line adjustment will be made when by Attorney Rumpf when he files our paperwork with the county.

B. Discussion and Possible Action to Enter into an Agreement with Cambridge Area Resource Team to (CART) for Social Worker Services

A copy of a proposed agreement with CART that would allow our Social Worker-Kristin Gowan to spend up to 8 hours a week in service to this community group. CART will pay the district \$10,000 annually for these services. CART has grown to the point where they need the guidance and support of a professional in the social service area and this will benefit the district in that Kristin will be providing services to many families that have children in the district. A copy of the proposed agreement is in your packet.

C. Update on Transportation Working Group Meeting #4

Included in your packet is a list of priorities and Final Recommendation that came out of the Transportation Working Group. The following is an update on the crossing beacon that will was a top priority with the committee:

- The beacon permit is in the hands of the Village and will be sent to DOT soon. Once received the turnaround is about 1 week and should be a formality as we have included the "approver" Deena Dramm in several meetings.
- The traffic beacon and pole will be order this week or next and could take up to 12 weeks although that is very unlikely because we only need one. This beacon will not have the cantilever arm like the one on USH 18; DOT feels they are unnecessary here because the width of the road is not like it is on USH 18 and they cost more.
- Mo will be meeting with another DOT employee to discuss placement and type of warning signs leading up to the flashing light beacon.
- When the flashing light beacon arrives Red Arrow will be contracted with (by the Village) to install the sign.
- The cost of the project is estimated to be \$ 22,837 and we will be seeking funding from the Foundation for the project.
- Next up: flashing lights to highlight speed zones around the schools- we will be working with DOT and the County on this project

X. Policy Committee Report

A. Action on Changes to Policy #374 Student Fund Raising

The proposed changes are these:

- 1. Funds raised by school affiliated groups are property of the school district
- 2. Defines two types of school fund raising groups; school affiliated and school related
- 3. Student grades or playing time should not be dependent on participation in fund raising
- 4. Set some guiding safety guidelines for door-to-door fundraising
- 5. Staff may fundraise at school only under very limited conditions
- 6. Students may not solicit staff during the school day
- 7. Great effort should be made to sell items of dollar value, and high % of funds stay in the district
- 8. Administration approved/denies fundraising requests
- 9. Boosters asked to report results of fundraisers to the district

XI. Curriculum Committee Report- Peg

A. Discussion and Possible Action on Purchase of English/Language Arts Curriculum at the Elementary School – Ready GEN

The committee will be discussing the purchase of a new ELA curriculum to implement at the elementary school in the 15-16 school year. Mr. Holt and elementary staff have been reviewing different reading programs over the last year and have settled on ReadyGEN. Mr. Holt, M. Scheider and Ms. Sullivan will be able to provide a great deal more information at the meeting.

B. Schedule Changes in the School for 15-16

We discussed a possible significant schedule change at the high school for 15-16 at the last board meeting. The changes at the MS and ES are very minor. The high school changes are summarized here and schedules are included in your packet.

CHS staff spent many months studying the effectiveness of our current RtI model (Homeroom period four days/week during split lunch). Given that half the staff and half the students were not available for good quality intervention, a new model needed to be developed. Also, our Flight Crew members were asked to do more with Homerooms than in the past. This put a strain on Mrs. Parker and Mrs. Fujara (who assisted in planning Flight Crew activities). Over the past two years, this Homeroom time turned from intervention to grade monitoring and Flight Crew activities. While both are fine opportunities for students, we were missing the intent of the Homeroom--intervention block time. The model below was studied by a CHS Committee of teachers. This group recommended a new schedule that involved an intervention block that all students and staff had access to. The full staff agreed with the committee. The intervention time was placed by the entire staff after several meetings to discuss pros/cons. This new structure will allow all students and staff access to intervention at least two to three days/week. One day/week Flight Crew members will continue to deliver instruction/activities. Early in the year we will dedicate additional time to Flight Crew activities but as the year moves on, focus more time on academic supports. This new schedule adds two (2) minutes to our day. The PBIS Committee will discuss PBIS incentives over the summer (i.e. dismissal of some students after Hour 8, update language regarding lunch and extended lunch, etc.).



AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CAMBRIDGE SCHOOL DISTRICT AND CAMBRIDGE AREA RESOURCE TEAM

RE: PURCHASE OF SCHOOL SOCIAL WORKER SERVICES PERFORMED BY KRISTIN AASEN-GOWEN FOR THE 2015-16 FISCAL YEARS.

This is an Agreement by and among the School Board of the Cambridge School District and the Cambridge Area Resource Team, Inc. (CART). The participating parties agree to allow CART to purchase School Social Worker services from the Cambridge School District for the purpose of serving school district pupils, future pupils and their respective parents and guardians, as set forth below, pursuant the authority established in Section 120.13 of the Wisconsin Statutes, 120.13(19) of the Wisconsin Statutes et al. Each participating party agrees to the following:

I. Purpose

The participating parties intend to allow CART to purchase School Social Worker services from the Cambridge School District. These services shall be performed by Kristin Aasen-Gowen. In the event that Kristin Aasen-Gowen no longer holds the position of School Social Worker during the term of this Agreement, CART may terminate this Agreement, upon notice to Cambridge School District. Under such circumstances, CART will be responsible for a prorated share of the cost listed in Section IV below, based upon the number of work days completed at the time of the termination of Kristin Aasen-Gowen's contract.

II. Plan of Operation

- A. <u>Description of Duties</u>: Kristin Aasen-Gowen will perform School Social Worker duties, as set forth in the teacher contract dated August 24, 2015- June 3, 2016 for both the Cambridge School District and the CART. Kristin Aasen-Gowen's employment contract year, for the year covered by this Agreement, shall be considered as twelve months running from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016 and shall contain 186 working days.
- B. <u>Percentage of Contract Performed</u>: KRISTIN AASEN-GOWEN will perform twenty percent (20%) (i.e. 8 hours of work per week) of the employment contract year (as defined above in section II, subsection A) for the CART. This represents the equivalent of 37.2 working days. Kristin Aasen-Gowen will perform eighty percent (80%) of the employment contract year (as defined above in section II, subsection A) for the Cambridge School District. This represents the equivalent of 148.8 working days. The scheduling of individual work days will be agreed to by the parties. The schedule of Kristin Aasen-Gowen's work days for each of the respective parties is attached as Addendum A.
- C. <u>Shared Personnel Committee</u>: The participating parties will meet as needed to review the performance of the duties under this Agreement. The participating parties shall each perform their own individual evaluation of Kristin Aasen-Gowen. The participating parties will review each of the participating party's individual evaluation of Kristin Aasen-Gowen to monitor the status of this Agreement. The participating parties agree to share employment related information regarding Kristin Aasen-Gowen to effectuate this Agreement, and an addendum to Kristin Aasen-Gowen's contract, expressly permitting the sharing of information between the participating

parties, shall be prepared and executed.

III. Fiscal Agent

Cambridge School District will serve as the fiscal agent of Kristin Aasen-Gowen's contract.

IV. Budget/Funding

The CART shall pay \$10,000 toward the costs listed in the teacher contract between the Cambridge School District and Kristin Aasen-Gowen dated August 24, 2015- June 3, 2016.

The school district will bill CART in August and in January for half of the agreed upon amount.

V. Term

<u>Term of Agreement</u>: The sharing of Kristin Aasen-Gowen's contract shall be for the time period covered by July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016. The CART shall notify the Cambridge School District by February 28, 2016 if it intends to reapply for the continuation of this Agreement. The Cambridge School District shall notify the CART by March 15, 2016 if it intends to grant, deny or modify the request to continue or end this Agreement.

Any work performed outside of August 24 and June 3 will be outside the scope of this agreement and will be strictly between CART and Kristin Assen-Gowan. Any compensation for said work will be agreed upon by CART and Kristn-Aasen Gowan and will not involve the Cambridge School District in any manner.

VI. Disclaimer Clause

If any provision of this Agreement, or addendum thereto, is held to be invalid by operation of law, by any tribunal of competent jurisdiction, or by an administrative ruling of the Wisconsin DPI or if compliance with or enforcement of any sections, or addendum thereto, should be restrained by such tribunal, the remainder of this agreement shall not be affected thereby. In the event that any provision is invalid or enforcement or compliance therewith has been restrained as above set forth, the parties shall enter into immediate negotiations for the purpose of arriving at a mutually satisfactory replacement for such article or part.

SCHOOL DISTRICT OF CAMBRIDGE

Student and Other Fund Raising

At times, it is desirable to have students and/or parent groups involved in fund raising to enhance the educational opportunities of the students. It is also believed that students who participate in fund raising for their organization may increase their connection to the organization and may develop skills and experiences that will benefit them in their adult lives. Fund raising should only occur when budgeted funds are not available, and should be conducted in a manner that does not put undue pressure on citizens and business people to support the School District of Cambridge with additional funds. All funds originating from a school affiliated fund raising project or activity shall become the property of the school district and are subject to control and discretion of the board of education (through administrative staff) as to their use and distribution.

For the purpose of this policy, the following definitions shall apply:

<u>School affiliated organization</u>: any school based unit such as grade, class, school sponsored club or organization, school sponsored team, etc. Funds related to these groups are accounted for in the districts activity funds.

 All fundraisers during school hours must abide by the USDA Guidelines related to nutrition and frequencyschools may allow up to two fundraiser that are exempt from nutrition standards per student organization per school year

<u>School related organization</u>: any non-school based, but school associated unit such as a parent group, booster club, alumni organization, school/community recreation program, etc. Funds related to these groups are generally not accounted for in the district's activity funds.

- Community-wide sales campaigns should be studied carefully to insure that projects sponsored are of good aesthetic taste and provide dollar value for the items sold. Efforts should be made to insure that most of the money raised stays in the school district.
- School related organizations are strongly encouraged to abide by this policy and are requested to submit an end of fundraiser report to the district that describes what the fundraising activity was and a financial summary of the activity.

Fund Raising Criteria

- Student participation in fund raising events will be strictly voluntary and quotas will not be assigned.
- Student academic grades or playing time shall not be dependent on participation in fund raising
- Door to door sales are prohibited for students in grades K-8. For safety reasons, door to door sales will be limited to acquaintances of the students in grades 9-12. In addition, students should never go door-to-door by themselves. Instead, a buddy system or parent accompanying the student is recommended. Whenever possible, school identifying clothing, nametage, ID, or uniforms should be worn.
- Staff may not fundraise for outside groups or individuals during the school day or use school email, or other school property for this effort. Staff may post, or leave, fundraising brochures in the teacher's lounge.
- · Collaboration with local businesses in fund raising activities is encouraged.

- Fund raising activities that incorporate educational features such as business plans, use of student talents, etc. are encouraged.
- No individual and/or group may solicit funds or participate in fund raising activities for solely personal gain on school premises, nor use the name of the school or any school club, organization, or class for this purpose.
- When involved in fundraising, students may not solicit staff during the school day.
- All receipts and disbursements derived from fund raising must be processed through the appropriate audited activity account

Fund Raising Approval

All groups seeking to raise funds for "needed" equipment items should first check with the building administrator, business manager or district administrator to see if the item(s) could be funded within the current or following subsequent year's budgets.

All school affiliated groups wishing to raise funds will submit a completed "request for fund raiser" form to the building principal for subsequent Board of Education approval at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board, with the following exceptions: approval. Administration should deny all requests that do not comply with this policy. Organizations may appeal the decision of school administration to the school board.

A. Fund raisers involving sales of items to students only will be approved by the building principal.

- B. "Traditional" annual fund raisers such as the FFA pancake breakfast and citrus sale, CA-HI magazine sale, class pizza sale, etc. will not need to submit a request. The building principal will determine whether the fund raiser is "traditional" in nature.
- C. Activities that involve services to the community (i.e. car washes, yard clean-up activities, food stands or concession stands) may be approved by the building principal. Prior to approval, the principal should take into consideration the service/product, appropriateness of the activity, supervision needs, safety concerns, produce/service pricing and age appropriateness of the activity.

A group of CES staff went to a PD offering (on their own time) to hear from the author of this program. CES Vertical team discussed this program as it relates to guided reading and differentiation. Currently this program has the support from CES staff, Mr. Holt and Mr. Schneider. It is an all inclusive reading, writing, grammar, spelling and phonics program that is wrapped around by rich literature. Our IMC and book room will complement this program nicely. 6 schools in WI are now exploring this program (none were as of last meeting).



» Overview

Mt. Ephraim School District, a small district located in Camden County, New Jersey just across the Delaware river from Philadelphia, hired Leslie Koller to be the new superintendent in January 2013. Koller was charged with addressing declining rigor in classrooms, low teacher morale, and new state requirements. And because the Common Core assessments were scheduled for 2014-2015, she had a year to turn the district around.

» Challenge


When Leslie Koller stepped into the role of superintendent, she immediately faced many challenges. For three years, teachers had not received new contracts or professional development. Student achievement was falling due to lack of rigor in the curriculum. The Common Core Standards were to have rolled-out over three years beginning in 2011-12 with final implementation completed by the end of school year 2013-14. By September 2013, the district should have been 2/3 of the way through implementation, but the process had never been started. First and foremost Koller wanted to elevate student outcomes and secondly, she had to implement the new standards in one year.

"When learning to read words with short vowel sounds our previous language arts series focused on blending word families. At first I was concerned that Reading Street required students to blend words with varied ending sounds right away and not just word families. Following the program my students met the challenge and had a very successful year."

» Solution

"When the 2013-14 school year started, I launched a communication plan to parents, teachers, and students," said Koller. "Parents were used to many of their children making honor roll. I told them that we were purchasing new curricula that were correlated to the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). The first year we were purchasing a new language arts program and the following year we would purchase new math curriculum. I warned them that the new language arts program, Pearson's Reading Street, was very rigorous and that students would be facing more challenges this year."

Koller gave her Kindergarten through 6th grade teachers everything they needed to implement the program with fidelity. Teachers received professional development throughout the year, both in-person and online. Koller encouraged them to stick with it for the entire year, and by the middle of the school year teachers saw the value in it. "This curriculum promotes foundational thinking skills for true research and logical reasoning," explained Susan Mosebrook, 5th and 6th grades language arts teacher.

» Results

Worried about learning gaps due to implementing CCSS in one year instead of three, Koller was surprised to find that student outcomes did not suffer. "We have the greatest gains that we have had since 2008-09, which is the earliest date I have on record. We have made up some of the losses and then some," said Koller. Based on state-level test scores, in one year, 3rd-6th grade students reaching proficient or advanced increased 7 percentage points, 5th grade alone increased 4 percentage points, and 6th grade increased 23 percentage points (see Figure I).

"As tough as the year was, the curriculum became the one positive as teachers were able to see it working and students rising to the challenge. I think it reinforced their own faith in the kids and in their ability to teach at a higher level," said Koller. Student growth was seen at every grade level. "Before Reading Street and Common Core, we celebrated the two or three students who exited Kindergarten as readers. Now, we are celebrating an entire class of readers," said Terri Bergin, Kindergarten teacher.

Writing in Ready GEN


Shift Toward Writing to Sources

Each writing lesson in a module focuses on one writing type—narrative, informative, or opinion—all in service of the Performance-Based Assessment that students will be assigned at the end of the module. Explicit instruction guides students through the writing process, and begins by linking reading and writing. Students analyze good writing models from the anchor and supporting texts they are reading, and examine and explore writers' styles and techniques.

Grammar and Conventions: The Routines and Activities section of the Scaffolded Strategies Handbook provides discrete lessons focusing on grade-level-appropriate, complex grammatical structures as part of the instruction on language conventions. These discrete lessons can be taught in any order, realizing that mastery of language conventions develops along a non-linear progression.

All texts are aligned to the complexity requirements outlined in the Common Core Standards, ensuring that all students interact with appropriate grade-level texts. Why do we like ReadyGen?

ReadyGen is an integrated literacy program focused on reading, writing, speaking and listening. It is built on a collaborative learning model in which teacher and students work together throughout the in instructional process to grow students' understanding and expand their knowledge. Teachers activate the learning process through instruction, modeling, scaffolding and re-teaching as needed. Students collaborate with one another and with the teacher to analyze, question, evaluate and respond as they practice and apply what they have learned. Metacognition is a critical piece of this learning process.

ReadyGen actively engages students in literacy experiences, with authentic, rigorous texts serving as the core of all instruction. How can we be assured students are learning?

- Assessment opportunities include:
 - Baseline: Used at the start of the year to establish a "starting point" for each student. Identify where students are at.
 - Formative: Integrated throughout every module. Teachers really liked "If...then" which is laced throughout the process.
 - Performance-based: Each module concludes with a PBA. Such tasks allow students to apply skills and show mastery. Rubrics are provided. (Progress monitoring!)
 - Assessment book: Provides base-line end of unit assessments. Also on-line component to allow teachers to manipulate assessments!
 - o We will continue with our F & P assessments (running records) as well.

Explain the reading instruction.

The reading instruction includes vocabulary development, test-based conversation (especially on the anchor text), reading/language analysis (students learn figurative language, sentence structure, dialogue, word choice, purpose, genre, etc.), written response to writing, accountable independent reading and reading wrap-up (sharing). Phonics is laced and can operate separately...but most within vocabulary development. Very holistic!

How is writing integrated within the reading program?

Writing is the tool for enhancing reading comprehension and learning from text. Each writing lesson in a module focuses on at least one writing type as specified in the CCS—narrative,

informational/explanatory or opinion—all included with performance-based assessments. Explicit instruction guides students through the writing process—through linking reading and writing. Writing lessons are focused on one or more grammar, usage, and mechanics conventions. Independent Writing Practice is great...linked with PBA.

Nikolay Middle School

- On May 21, our 6th graders visited the Sterling North Museum in Edgerton. This was the culmination of their study of author Sterling North's book <u>Rascal</u>.
- Our annual *Run Swim Run* event was a huge success with every student in attendance on May 22 participating in the event! With donations from the event itself and the bake sale sponsored by our FACS classes, we were able to make a donation of \$970.00 to the Cambridge Area Resource Team (CART)!
- We had wonderful weather for our 6th grade World's Fair on June 3. This meant several elementary classes were able to walk over and enjoy our 6th graders' presentations....and culinary efforts! The evening portion of the event included the 6th grade band and choir performances all portions of the event were well attended.
- Both PBIS teams will meet in the coming days/weeks to work on our Tier 1 and Tier 2 behavior intervention supports systems. One of the areas targeted for a "boost" is our communication with parents around PBIS practices and procedures.
- We held our 1st Annual Blue Jay Games on the last day of school. In years past, our 7th and 8th grade classes had separate 4th quarter incentive trips to the Kalahari Waterpark and Six Flags Great America, respectively. Our PBIS team determined last summer to focus on a school-wide 4th quarter incentive, rather than individual class incentives.
 Overall, the feedback has been positive about our celebration held at CamRock 2. It seems the students enjoyed simply hanging out a bit with some structured events during the afternoon. We are already working on tweaks and adjustments for next year!

Pupil Services

Throughout May, we conducted 3 Non-Violent Crisis Intervention (NVCI) training
refresher courses. The refresher is a 4-hour class for those staff who received the 8hour training last August. With Deanna Tomczak trained as a NVCI trainer in our district,
we were able to establish a certification/re-certification cycle without sending staff out
of district for training. Each building has a trained crisis
team of at least 6 staff. All building level administrators are trained.

Our K-12 Pupil Services team met for a full day on June 10 to: examine the delineation
of roles/responsibilities; determine goals/priorities for the 2015-16 school year; discuss
our current communication systems within the team and to other staff; discuss access
to mental health resources; review the Child Protection Unit Second Step materials; and
discuss the Healthy Classrooms Foundations grant.


Cambridge High School:


Offense Type




