- EOC LITERACY- NEEDS ASSESSMENT: A comprehensive assessment shows that areas of need in our combined population and subpopulations (economically disadvantaged and students with disabilities) to be Literary and Practical passages. Students need to be able to read and comprehend manuals. Open Response Items are very low.
- 2. Attendance rate: For the past three years Mena High School has increased from 93.4% in 2009-2010 to 97.9% in 2011-2012.
