Intervention: The staff at Cutter Morning Star Elementary School conducted a needs assessment by analyzing results from interim assessments, local common assessments, Augmented Benchmark, ITBS, attendance rates, and Focus Walks data in grades K-6. Results for both the combined population and each subpopulation were examined to identify specific areas of weakness. Data analysis identified the following focus areas for improvement: content reading open response and practical reading open response. We examined our instructional strategies and classroom structure/grouping and are modifying our curriculum, instruction, common assessments and professional development practices to better meet the needs of all our populations, particularly the African American and Economically Disadvantaged subpopulations. Grade level teams meet weekly with Instructional Facilitators, several times weekly as a grade level team, and as an entire faculty as needed, in the bookroom that houses our Assessment Walls so that we can review interim assessment data, WRAP, Progress Monitoring, and classroom assessment data for the purpose of making decisions regarding the direction and focus of our classroom instruction. Higher order thinking skills and high expectations for all students will be the areas that we address extensively. We will select appropriate interventions and use funds that address these needs.

Intervention: The staff at Cutter Morning Star Elementary School conducted a needs assessment by analyzing results from interim assessments, local common assessments, Augmented Benchmark, ITBS, attendance rates, and Focus Walks data in grades K-6. Results for both the combined population and each subpopulation were examined to identify specific areas of weakness. Data analysis identified the following focus areas for improvement: content reading open response and practical reading open response. We examined our instructional strategies and classroom structure/grouping and are modifying our curriculum, instruction, common assessments and professional development practices to better meet the needs of all our populations, particularly the African American and Economically Disadvantaged subpopulations. Grade level teams meet weekly with Instructional Facilitators, several times weekly as a grade level team, and as an entire faculty as needed, in the bookroom that houses our Assessment Walls so that we can review interim assessment data, Progress Monitoring, and classroom assessment data for the purpose of making decisions regarding the direction and focus of our classroom instruction. Higher order thinking skills and high expectations for all students will be the areas that we address extensively. We will select appropriate interventions and use funds that address these needs.
