Parameters for calendar development are as follows:

- 1 Minimum of 173 student contact days
- 2 Minimum of 185 teacher days (excluding holidays/vacations)
- 3 School opens and closes on designated days districtwide
- 4 Maximum of 9 inservice days that includes Parent-Teacher Conference Days not meeting the minimum day requirement
- Minimum of two Teachcher Workdays per AGEA Agreement(3 Workdays included within the FY17 Calendar)

A teacher who has acquired tenure in another <u>Alaska</u> district will acquire tenure in Alaska Gateway School District if the teacher's break in service was not the result of dismissal or nonretention and did not last longer than one year. A previously <u>Alaska</u> tenured teacher who has been employed by the district continuously for two consecutive school years and who is then offered a contract for the next succeeding school year shall achieve tenure at the beginning of the third year, provided the teacher performs a day of teaching services in the third year, and further provided the teacher received a satisfactory performance evaluation in the second year.

Note: A break in service which begins on or after the last instructional day of the school year but before the first instructional day of the next school year will be considered to have lasted no longer than one year if the teacher is employed on the first instructional day of the next consecutive school year. AS 14 20 150(d)

Congratulations to Assistant Superintendent Scott MacManus for being selected and hired as superintendent beginning July 1, 2016! Below is an update pertaining to some of the issues I have been addressing since the previous Board meeting in February.

Legislative Capital Projects

As of today, the legislature has not decided if each representative and senator will be receiving capital discretionary funds to disperse for community projects. The district's lobbyist will be traveling to Juneau next week in an effort to keep our projects represented.

Testifying to Senate and House Finance Committees

Provided requested testimony to the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Education pertaining to the Broadband Assistance Grant (BAG) and then to the House Finance Committee during the public comment period for the community of Tok at the Legislative Information Office. The senate subcommittee's proposal was to cut funding for the BAG Grant by \$917,300 which would only leave funding of \$1,800,000 for the program. However thru unanimous consent, the senate subcommittee restored all of the \$2,717,300 from last session. Hopefully, these funds remain within the State operating budget.

Last year, the District had 3 sites at 1.5 MB and 3 sites at 3 MB. This year, with a minimum of 10 MB at all sites, an increase of more that three and five times the connectivity, the internet bandwidth speed is much more user friendly and efficient. The Internet bandwidth connection costs our district 1.32 million dollars. We receive a discount of 1.19 million dollars through the federal E-rate program leaving a difference of \$130,000. Of this \$130,000, the BAG Grant provides approximately \$75,000 leaving the district's portion of \$55,000. For a \$55,000 cost to the district, we receive 1.32 million dollars worth of bandwidth connectivity. The BAG grant allows us to more than double the leveraged funding amount utilized towards the 90% federal match to provide for this level of connectivity. If we are discussing a bang for your buck and efficiencies of leveraged federal funding- this is it.

FY17 Operating Budget

Working with the CFO to develop the FY17 operating budget. There will be a Board work session before the meeting at 5:00 PM on Monday, March 21st to address any FY17 budget issues and/or make changes to before presenting as an Action Item within the agenda. A few options to consider within the recommended FY17 budget will include a discussion on student enrollment numbers within schools and programs to reflect adequate staffing needs. There is still pending legislation to increase the Base Student Allocation by \$50, as submitted in the Governor's budget, but also increase the percent the district pays for TRS and PERS. Increasing the percentage the district pays for TRS and PERS will be a significantly higher cost (4% TRS = approximately \$103,000) than the

revenue generated by a \$50 BSA increase of \$68,000. Just the 4% TRS increase is a loss of \$35,000 and that does not include any project increases to PERS. We will not have these details until, most likely, early April. We are also in the intermediate stages of closing out the current FY16 budget.

Districtwide Copiers

All copier/scanners were delivered and set-up at all sites within the district. Each site administrator ensured that the color-scanning feature was operational before the vendor departed. These new copiers will enhance our efforts to become as paper free as possible.

AGEA

AGEA has agreed to the terms approved by the Board during the February regular meeting:

The FY17 & FY18 Salary Scales include a 1.5% base salary increase for each year. Below is the "draft" wording agreed upon to include within sections of the Sick Leave Articles.

1. FMLA/AFLA

Both the Association and District agree to abide by the provisions defined by the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and Alaska Family Leave Act (AFLA) for the duration of this agreement.

2. Sick Leave Bank

A District Sick Leave Bank Committee will be established to govern the operations of the certified sick leave bank. The Sick Leave Bank Committee will be comprised of five (5) members that include two (2) AGEA teachers, one (1) AGEA Principal/Teacher and two (2) members appointed by the District. The joint committee will develop criteria for the use of the sick leave bank and be responsible for reviewing and approving requests for sick leave withdrawal from the bank through a majority vote.

FY17 Academic Calendar

Two "drafts" of the FY17 Academic Calendar, as well as the FY15 and FY16 calendars, were distributed to all teachers, administrators and board members for review. All comments received from the sites will be included within the Board packet. The FY17 Academic Calendar is listed on the agenda as an Action Item.

Energy Savings

For the month of February the electricity billing at Tok School was \$8,831 for 29,000 kilowatts. This is the first time the billing has been in single digits ever for a winter month as well as the lowest total usage of kilowatts. The reduction is a product of the biomass plant's electrical generation as well as the installing of the automated facility operating software in Tok School last year and switching to LED lighting two years ago.

Alaska Teacher Job Fair

The Alaska Teacher Job Fair is scheduled for the 17th thru 19th of March this year instead of a late March or mid April date. Two Board members and three district office staff members will be attending this job fair at the Captain Cook hotel in Anchorage.

FY17 Teacher Contracts

Certified teacher contracts were updated and hand-delivered to all the sites beginning February 19, 2016 with each teacher or administrator signing for receipt. Each certified staff member offered a contract will have 30 days to sign and return to the district office. So far, 20 of the 34 offered contracts have been signed for FY17. The district does expect three or four certified resignations at some point before the end of March.

BACKGROUND

1. Assistant Superintendent's and Directors' reports submitted in written form

Report to the Regional School Board Alaska Gateway School District March 9=10, 2016 Prepared by LeAnn Young, Special Education Coordinator

The past month the special education department has been focused on ensuring that all student's Individualized Education Programs (IEP's) are being properly implemented and all students are receiving the services and the allocated aide time required. We have conducted several file reviews to ensure that spring deadlines are met. We currently have 50 special education students, 7 gifted and talented students and 4 students in the intervention process.

Trainings:

- Vivianne Huber, an autism specialist from SESA, will be in the district the week of March 21st and will offer on-site training in Northway, Tok and Mentasta.
- Special Education teachers and paraprofessionals participated in Boardmaker training on March 9, 2016. Boardmaker is a complete system for delivering personalized instruction and therapy while also measuring student progress. The district currently has 6 licenses in use for the Boardmaker program.
- LeAnn Young and Candy Thurneau have been participating in weekly teleconferences with TIENET to begin implementation of the new online special education data management system. We have sat in on several security trainings and will GO LIVE with staff in the one line training session on March 30th.

Specialists:

Several specialists who contract with our school district have conducted their required visits and have met with students and staff to cover services required in student IEP's.

- E-therapy continues to work well. There are 30 in our school district who have goals in the area of speech & language and are receiving services through E-therapy. This includes pre-school students in both Northway and Tok. We have E-therapy services 2.5 days per week.
- Deb Fortune, speech pathologist, was in the district the week of February 29th. She visited sites and worked with paraprofessionals and REACH Academy parents on providing quarterly supervision for students with speech and language goals. She will be return the week of April 25th.
- Chris McDonald, Occupational Therapist was in the district the week of February 22nd and will return the week of March 21st.
- Ruth Lyles, Physical Therapist, will be in the district for her 4th quarter visit the week of April 25th.
- Frank Satterwhite, Psychologist, was in the district the week of February 29th and will return the week of April 18th.

Current Projects:

- Candy Thurneau, Jason Fastenau and myself are working with TIENET to make a smooth transition from SEAS to this new data management program. We are currently working on the security groups and data entry.
- The date for Child Find has been set for Thursday, April 28th. We will have visiting specialists on staff that day to evaluate children. We are working with TCC, public health, Headstart and local schools to ensure this is a successful event.

Technology Board Report March 2016

I have been working on our applications for ERate discount services for next year, and should have the primary applications completed by the time of the board meeting. In addition to the primary services like Internet and Telecommunications, I'm applying for what they call Category 2 services as well. Category 2 is only funded for the next several years, and covers things like switching hardware and wireless at an 85% rate for us. There is a limit on the amount of money we can receive through this program, but we only have a few year window we can spend it during. Because of this I'm looking at what we need in terms of infrastructure upgrades, and applying for those items if they are covered by the program. This year we put the new wireless system in place. I'm applying for switches and new battery backup units for next year. I might also request some additional wireless access points.

As I've mentioned previously, non-Internet services like local and long distance phone service to sites is being gradually phased out of the ERate program at a rate of -20% discount a year. This year we are at the 50% discount level, down from our original 90% discount. In several more years these services will not be discountable at all.

I'm including three bids we received for 80 more of the Dell 11" Chromebooks with touchscreens. I recommend we go with the Dell bid, as they are the least expensive for the same product. The new devices would go to Eagle, Tanacross, Northway, Dot Lake, Tetlin, and Tok. If possible, I'd like to consider buying an additional 10 devices that we can have on hand for the employee buy requests that happen at the beginning of the year, as well as things like raffle giveaways. This would give our programs and staff access to a much better volume discount than they could get otherwise.





RE: February 2016 Board Report

The Maintenance Department for the month of February was busy going to the schools and doing the preventive work orders and work orders coming in from the schools and for the hockey rink.

I spoke with the Mayor of Eagle concerning the water system they are trying to put in for the city well, he said he is still waiting for the quote, we are working on other possibilities, I will have more information on this subject for the board meeting

I have heard that there is some concern about the Tok School sprinkler system, I had to shut off the dry system due to rotten pipes that are leaking too much air and would have eventually set the system off and could have caused lots of money in damage, it still has a wet system on line along with 170 smoke detectors, 10 duct detectors and 13 heat detectors, each air handler unit has two duct detectors, a couple of the air handler units have bad detectors and need replaced, these detectors are obsolete and need to be replaced with a new style, I have been working with Arctic Fire to find a new version that will be compatible, he has been busy and will be here to replace them as soon as he can. The dry system has been on the CIP list for a three years now, but in the mean time I have been having the maintenance crew do repairs in the summer, the last time it was repaired was two years ago.

Siemens was here and did a walk through with Jason Roslansky, Jason Fastenau and myself, they are going to help us with finding a new camera system, and they are also going to get me a price on installing door locking devices that use cards, I am hoping to have the quote before the board meeting on the 21st, if not I will have it by the April board meeting.

February 2016 Biomass Report

Work at biomass for the month of February proceeded with no major issues. The boiler and turbine ran for the entire month of February other than the 17'th through 19'th due to a blown stack sensor. Tree hauling has also proceeded well.

Fuel has not caused any glassing problems for the entire month.

Design work and material lists have been developed and nearly completed for the installation of the new steam generator.

School power bill dipped down into the single digits for the first time ever.

Curriculum and Instruction Coordinator
Board Report for 3/21/2016 Meeting

The past month has been very busy with more work on the new teacher evaluation tool, websites, educational technology, professional development, and curriculum.

- on February 12, we held a district-wide inservice at Tanacross School. Due to ongoing interest on the part of staff, we had contracted last fall to have Responsive Classroom do a one day overview workshop for us at our February inservice. In anticipation for the event, we ordered an excellent Responsive Classroom publication, *The Power of Our Words*, for all staff attending the event. Martha Hanley, an expert trainer with Responsive Classroom spent the day with AGSD staff at Tanacross giving us a peek into what the Responsive Classroom model and practices can bring to our classrooms. The model addresses assessment and instructional strategies that work to help build a healthy, happy classroom and school environment. The workshop was given high marks on the staff evaluation, and several staff have indicated strong interest in further Responsive Classroom training.
- On February 11, the new Curriculum and Instruction page went live as a link within the Curriculum department page on our agsd.us website. Currently it is in as a link, but soon it will replace the content there as the landing page. The site comprehensively lists district curriculum resources and materials, as well as instructions to teachers for how to access much of it within the Classbright system. K-12 core curriculum as well as k-12 technology is included, as well as Classbright tutorial videos for teachers, Google help for teachers, and pages with attached resources and curriculum for the AGSD initiatives and special programs. This new page serves several purposes; 1) To make our curriculum transparent to parents, community and other stakeholders, 2) To make our curriculum clear to new teachers, and 3) To have a central, open place for any AGSD staff to get more information about our programs. Currently, the page can be reached by going to the agsd.us page, then under the Departments menu to Curriculum and Instruction it is listed as a link. For the time being it can also be accessed separately at http://agsdcurriculum.weebly.com/
- February 20-23 nine staff from AGSD attended the ASTE (Alaska Society for Technology in Education) Conference in Anchorage. This is a fantastic professional development opportunity each year for teachers to learn about current practices across the state for integrating technologies into instruction, as well as a chance to learn what's new in the field. Alaska Gateway has a strong association with ASTE Scott MacManus is a past board member, Jason Fastenau currently serves as the ASTE Treasurer, I just finished two terms as the Interior Region Representative, and Scott Holmes is now stepping into that role. It's encouraging to see such a high participation from our district in the association and at this event it is a loud and clear demonstration as to how very important these practices are to our staff and our classrooms.
- I am currently in the process of making initial edits to our Teacher Evaluation Handbook to reflect new regulations, and our new teacher evaluation tool. Once initial edits are made, we have set a timeline for reconvening the Evaluation Committee to begin to work through the document and make final edits for board approval.

- First lets just address the food situation. Since I started there have been a lot of changes. People in general are not susceptible to change. It is nothing new that people complain about school lunch. It is nothing new we serve canned food, although what people do not know is that the canned foods we serve are either in 100% juice not syrup (there may be 1 or 2 that aren't available in juice but are in light syrup) or reduced sodium. There is just change and people don't like it. The facts are that there are limits for calories, fats, and sodium that can be used in school meals. This being said, when I had my State review, within a month of being hired it was apparent that things weren't being implemented as they should. This was the beginning of the change. Some cooks were equally pleased with the change and it has been a hard road of getting all the cooks on the same page and cooking what is on the menu. Not saying that there are still some days that something is cooked that are not on the menu, but there is a BIG difference than there was a year ago.... Yep it has been a year already. I wrote an article in the mukluk to address some of the concerns. I also added the state regulations, the caloric intake kids who are active and non-active need, and the fact that this is an option for kids not required, i.e. parents can pack their kids a lunch if they think the food is in adequate.

- There was a plane to Eagle in which I filled with fresh and canned foods among other things.... Exciting day for our Eagle staff and students! Can't wait to visit when the road opens!!







The Gateway Greenhouse March 2016 Board Report

The natural light is quickly returning and daytime temperatures in the greenhouse have been as high as 107 degrees. It is still too early to have sides opening, but the upper vents and fans can be turned on during the hottest part of the day. Although the sun is making for high temps, it is still not high enough or long enough in the sky to provide enough light for optimal growth at this time. Having said that, I can report that spinach, leaf lettuce mix, beans, peas, cucumber, zucchini and tomatoes are all growing in the greenhouse at this time. Three varieties of peppers will be transplanted into the greenhouse in a few weeks.

I have determined that transplanting tomatoes was done too early. The plants are growing but would have been better left under the artificial light in the processing building for a few more weeks. I am not discouraged because I still have around 30 tomato starts under the artificial light. I am glad I transplanted some into the greenhouse because it has given me a comparison on which I can base future planning.

We have received results from the soil samples that were sent for testing, a copy of which will be sent with this report. We are still waiting for the rundown of those results and the recommendations, which will be sent to us from the UAF Cooperative Extension office. I am hoping to be able to include that information in my April board report. I'm working on a list of maintenance issues and will be submitting that by the end of March. I will include that information in my April board report as well.




Student 4-H leaders visited Fairbanks for the Western Regional Leadership Forum.






Recent Visitors

Amanda Michelle Todd By Shannon




Her full name is Amanda Michelle Todd. She was born on November 27, 1996. She passed away October 10, 2012 at the uge of 15. She killed herself at her home in Port Coquitlam, British Columbia, Canada, On September 7, 2012, Todd posted a 9-minute YouTube video entitled "My Story: Struggling, bullying, Suicide and Self-harm," which showed her using a series of flasheards to tell of her experiences being bullied. The video went viral after her death, resulting in international media attention. The video has had more than 17 million views as of April 2014. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police and British Columbia Coroners Service taunched investigations into the suicide. Since then the Canadian government has focused on cyberbullying. We took a field trip to Fairbanks this month and we able to visit the Museum of the North. We toured the many exhibits and saw things that we interesting and educational. Of course, the snack bar was the most interesting stop on the tours for most kids. We saw the movie "Dinosaurs of Alaska" that demonstrated how the fossils are found and excavated by students and volunteers from the University of Alaska. We hurried off to play Glo-Golf and then ate at Subway. The kids and chaperones bedded down after a swim at the local pool at a church in Fairbanks that had invited us to stay. They were very cordial and accommodating and the kids were... for the most part, well behaved. We awoke and prepared for the grand finale at Cold Stone Creamery where the staff

Dear Superintendent Poage:

Thank you for your letter dated January 22 to Governor Bill Walker referencing the proposed closure of the Northway Maintenance Station. He has asked that I respond on his behalf. I want to assure you these decisions are not made lightly and we understand that these reductions will impact communities.

As you are aware, all state agencies are working with reduced operating budgets due to low oil prices. Maintenance activities performed by the Department of Transportation & Public Facilities (DOT&PF) are funded by the Unrestricted General Fund budget, not by federal funds, so reductions to the state budget directly impact maintenance. Of DOT&PF's Unrestricted General Budget, 96 percent goes toward direct maintenance services and four percent goes to support services. When we reduce the budget, maintenance activities are reduced.

During the fiscal year 2016, DOT&PF's General Fund budget was reduced by 12.5% (\$34.6 million). The department did its best to minimize the impacts to direct services. At this point, there is no cushion left to absorb cuts. Significant budget reductions in the fiscal year 2017 and beyond will impact the services that DOT&PF provides.

The Alaska Highway, and all roads maintained by the Northway Maintenance Station, will remain open. The impacts to travelers will be the speed of response by DOT&PF staff after major storms. Day-to-day activities will not be significantly affected.

Alaskans are feeling the impact of budget reductions, but I assure you that we are working hard to minimize the impacts as much as possible. DOT&PF is committed to doing the best job possible with the resources provided to keep Alaska's infrastructure safe.

AMP scores, local tests, grades, and classroom projects combine to provide a full picture of a student's knowledge and skills. This information is used by schools as part of their preparation to provide instruction that meets students' needs. Taking the AMP assessment also provides students with experiences with the types of questions that measure the complex skills included in Alaska's standards.

Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) 2016 Why should my child take AMP?

What is my child tested on in the spring?

Each spring schools give the state assessment to students in grades 3 - 10. This test gives students the opportunity to show their understanding of important skills in English language arts and math at their grade level.

Does my child have to take the standardized test?

Schools are required to test all students in order to provide information to parents, teachers, and districts about the learning of each student as well as the performance of the school and district. Parents have the right to make educational decisions for their child; please check with your district for the local procedure for documenting non-participation.

I heard AMP was not the state test anymore. Is this true?

Alaska is seeking alternatives to our current assessment for the 2016-2017 school year and beyond. This new assessment will also measure the Alaska English Language Arts and Math Standards. It will build on the two years of student learning information provided by AMP and be an important next step in Alaska's work to prepare students for opportunities after high school graduation.

If it is not going to be the test anymore, why should my child take it this year?

This spring will be the second time Alaskan students take the Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) assessment. You and your child's teachers will be able to compare your child's score last year with their score this year. AMP scores, local tests, grades, and classroom projects combine to provide a full picture of a student's knowledge and skills. This information is used by schools as part of their preparation to provide instruction that meets your child's academic needs.

Taking the AMP assessment this spring also provides your child with an opportunity to experience the types of questions that measure the complex skills included in Alaska's standards.

What has been done to fix the problems with AMP for this spring?

The main problem with the AMP test in 2015 was the lack of information on the reports. Revised AMP reports for 2016 will include more detailed information on ELA and mathematics topic areas, such as "operations and algebraic thinking" in math and "word meanings" in language arts. Student reports will also include two years of AMP results.
