Eligibility

Students from any of the schools within the Alaska Gateway School District may apply to be Student Advisor to the Regional School Board for the 2014-15 school year. Each applicant will complete an application form that identifies his or her current academic year of enrollment, academic status, and statement of interest.

- Students must be in proper academic standing equivalent to participation in athletics or other student activities.
- Students will be expected to maintain standards of behavior appropriate to participation in student activities.
- Student references must be provided from a fellow student, a teacher or another adult who works at the applicant's respective school, and the building principal.

Responsibilities

The Student Advisor is the student voice, both to the Board from students and from the Board to students. As such, the Student Advisor will:

- Provide student insight and perspective to the Regional School Board and District Administration.
- Serve as a formal link to the students of the District through student governments or communications networks.
- Report to students about the work of the school district and the Regional School Board.
- Create two-way communication by bringing student issues to the Board and communicating the issues and projects the Board is working on back to the students.

Below is an update pertaining to some of the issues I have been addressing since the previous Board meeting in September.

Biomass Boiler

As of October 9th, the biomass boiler is in full operation and providing heat to Tok School, the processing facility and greenhouse. We attempted started-up a couple of different days but noticed some small issues that the maintenance staff alleviated. With the pole barn for a drier storage area and half a year of wood chips already on hand, plant operations have the potential to be much smoother than all the problems that were created from our fuel supply last year. Once the weather becomes a little colder and the plant has been in operation for a couple weeks so all the potential glitches can be dealt with, we will begin producing electricity.

FY15 Budget

We are in the process of analyzing the District's budget in relation to the enrollment numbers. The results of the annual fiscal audit will be presented in a work session prior to the regular meeting. The twenty-day count began on September 29th and completes on October 24th. We will know exactly how the enrollment numbers will affect our projected budget by the next meeting.

Each site principal was emailed the Board approve Student Advisor application for a second time that included an extended timeline for submission. If any student candidates apply to be an advisor

Board Election

The tentative results pending voters that mailed in ballots close to the election deadline as well as the absentee ballots submitted are posted on the Division of Elections website:

Two of the board elections have clear winners regardless of the votes still to be counted. As of today, the remaining board election is actually tied with the 130 votes evenly split.

Calendar Update

There were no comments from staff, students or the public submitted about changing the in-services dates from October 16 and 17 to October 23 and 24 to coincide with the AFN conference.

Vehicle Purchase

The maintenance department is requesting bids for small and mid-size suburban type vehicles.

Resolution

Submitted the Board approved resolution on Alternate Routes to a Superintendency to AASB for consideration by the membership.

4AAC 52.250 and 4AAC 52.250

Wrote and article on two outdated Alaska Administrative Code (AAC) sections of concern for the District which are 4 AAC 52.250, section (d), concerning Special Education Aides, and 4 AAC 52.252, section (b), relating to Program Supervision in an attempt to begin the process of changing these regulations. The main issue of concern is "on-site" supervision.

Great Things

As written in the last Board report, this year one of our goals is to build positive relationships between staff members, students, parents and communities. One of our focuses in this area is to contact parents about the great things kids are doing in the classrooms and to promote school successes within each community. Therefore, an insert promoting some of the great things kids do in classrooms everyday will be produced each month a Board report is required. Articles will be taken directly from the principal's newsletters and/or submissions directly from principals. The first publication in the Mukluk is tentatively scheduled for October 16.

Principal Recognition and AMP Meeting

An administrative meeting was held on October 8 to acknowledge the school principals since Governor Parnell proclaimed October as principal recognition month and to provide information pertaining to the new on-line AMP testing to occur this spring. After an overview by district staff, the director from EED in charge of testing answered questions for about 45 minutes via Skype. We previously signed up to be one of five districts to hold an AMP day to assess our Internet system and computer software as well as provide the students with a practice testing opportunity before the high- stakes testing window opens.

This month we are preparing for the official 20 day student count, which began 09/29/14 and ends 10/24/14. The Federal Impact Aid Survey forms were sent out to all of the schools this week. These are sent out from the schools to all parents/guardians for completion. We anticipate these forms back in our office on or shortly after the 24th of October which is the end of the count period. These forms are used in conjunction with our Oasis report and for processing the Impact Aid Application which is due January 31, 2015. I am still submitting information to Washington D.C. for our Impact Aid Audit, very frustrating endeavor.

Our student count is currently the following:

As you can see by this chart our student count is down by 13 students, this number will change during the count period as it always does. We will not know where we with our budget until after the count is complete. We will look at the numbers again at that time.

Included in this report is the Certified Sick Leave Bank report. After the FY15 new teachers were added the balance is currently 205.5 days.

BDO our Auditors, are currently working on the draft audit for FY14. If the "bound" audit arrives in the next week I will make sure that board members have their copy before the work session on the 20^{th} . Otherwise they will be handed out before the work session.

The Business office is busy with quarterly reports including grants, 941 and the state esc report. There are also many State and Federal surveys due at this time of year also.

To: Superintendent & the Regional School Board From: Scott MacManus, Assistant Superintendent Activities Report for September-October

Current Projects:

- **Perkins Application** is complete and approved for funding. While this is a small grant, it is important because it allows us to fund our TechPrep program in Welding, where last year we had several students get their state welding certification and their Small Engines certification. These students also earn university credit toward an Associates Degree, through a negotiated Articulated Tech Prep Project
- NCLB Application is being completed and finalized. It is expected that this will be done by the end of the month.
- Evaluation Committee As has been reported prior, we are revising the district's teacher evaluation system, which is required by the state. The primary work of the committee right now is on the integration of Alaska Cultural Standards in the required system of evaluation in a way that is meaningful and results in improved teaching in the classroom. We focus on this integration into four key areas of the evaluation, which include Learning Environment, Instructional Planning, Instructional Delivery, and Professionalism.
- Assessment –Our required MAP, AIMSWeb, and Kindergarten Developmental Profile Testing for the Fall is nearly completed. This is a task that has become bigger over the past several years, and takes the efforts of several staff to complete. We are very happy to report that of our kindergarten students this year who participated in the Gateway Ready! Program, assessed higher than ever before, with our young students entering school better prepared than ever to learn.

Professional Development Activities

- October 1-3: Attended the ASA Conference in Fairbanks, where we were able to learn about the new initiatives that are being mandated by the state in terms of testing and CTE.
- October 15-17th As a part of our three Health and Wellness Grants, three of our staff are attending the Alaska School Health and Wellness Institute in Anchorage, where they will be representing the district and have been asked to present on AGSD's exceptional integration of our health programs.
- October 16-18 We are sending the principals from our two Focus Schools, Tetlin and Tanacross, to the Administrator Coaching Project in Anchorage.
- District Inservice this fall will be focused on the effective use of physical activity in the classroom, and will include training on the use of "adaptive physical activity" and Native Youth Olympics. Trainers from the Cook Inlet Tribal Council who coordinates the Native Youth Olympics, and will be in the district, as will Pam Skogstad, who works for the state as one of their physical education trainers.

The Maintenance Department had a very busy month. We have been getting everything ready for the winter, and trying to keep up with school work orders as they come in.

We worked on getting the bio-boiler ready to fire up and I have been trying to get a boiler inspector here all month, I have one coming here the 17th of October, he does not plan on inspecting the interior of the boiler, so we are firing it up as I write this report.

We finished the wood chip storage building, helped chip wood, built an artic entry way on the green house, installed a furnace in the green house, I am looking into buying a little wood boiler for the green house so if we have a cold summer or we have problems with the bio plant we won't be using diesel to heat it, instead we can use the scrap wood from the bio yard.

Hockey Rink: We sealed the concrete floor, painted the rifle range floor.

Tok School: We painted the gym office walls, ceiling and cabinets, worked on the exhaust system for the welders in the metal shop and fixed classroom cabinet drawers.

Tetlin School: We installed a new counter top in the kitchen and built an equipment room in the food storage area.

Dot Lake School: We replaced some of the tile in the custodian closet, replaced the swing set chains, heat traced and insulated the sprinkler system pipes.

Technology Board Report October 2014

The state ERate coordinator has recently finished her training in the new ERate changes and rules, and will be starting to offer audio training for state ERate folks in late October. I'll be attending these trainings to make sure we fully understand all the ERate changes.

There is a lump sum of money available through the ERate program for upgrading wireless infrastructure at schools that will almost certainly last no more than two years. I'd like to take advantage of this program for next year and see if we can upgrade wireless devices at sites to something more robust than our current Apple Airport solution.

This year we're are going to be doing our testing via computer. We are working on making sure we are ready to go on the technology side of things, and figuring out what the best way to get all the students tested in terms of logistics and timing will be.

Farm to School

For details on the greenhouse, please refer to Bonnie's report. We've wrapped up the two Farm to School mini-grants we received from the state. Alaska was also awarded a grant at the state level for a Farm to School conference. I've been approached by the Alaska State Division of Agriculture, (the conference organizers), about presenting at this conference in January to share what we are doing with our program.



I feel confident in saying that The Gateway Greenhouse is an asset to our school district. We have welcomed several groups of students and teachers for tours and hands on educational opportunities. Our collaboration with the UAF Cooperative Extension is fantastic and is viewed as an invaluable resource, connecting us with those students and staff. All individuals involved with the greenhouse are working together to ensure its continued success, and I look forward to carrying on with my part.

I am 68 days into my dream job. It did not occur to me that this was my dream job until I was faced with the decision – to apply or not to apply. In the days leading up to my interview, many thoughts were swirling around in my mind. The questions those thoughts generated are being answered along the way, and I am very happy that I chose to apply.

The greenhouse was already full of growth when I arrived for my first day, harvesting had already begun. Spinach, carrots, red leaf lettuce, Asian greens, cucumbers, tomatoes, zucchini, summer squash, cauliflower, and broccoli were all being utilized in the Summer Food Program. I have been continually harvesting many of those items since my arrival, have sown seed myself, and have been harvesting from those plantings as well. There is such delight in the gathering of food grown from the tiny seeds I planted, delight in providing that food to our school kitchens, and even greater delight in seeing smiles on the faces of the students who visit the greenhouse.

Rita Abel and I have been working together to provide students in our district with educational opportunities that include visual and hands on learning. Rita comes to us by way of the University of Alaska, through the Nutrition Education Cooperative Extension Services. Students visiting the greenhouse spend some time with Rita, in a classroom setting, learning about things such as plant systems, what plants need to grow, and different types of plants. They also get to sample items from the greenhouse. When they arrive in the greenhouse there is always a little wave of awe, and then throughout the tour students are quick to share what their favorite veggie is. Carrots seem to be the #1 love of children, tomatoes the adult preference. I have been pleasantly surprised to find that most of the kids like raw vegetables, and they get so excited when they find out they get to pull their own carrot out of the soil or pick a snap pea from the vine. It's fantastic to see their excitement and it propels my excitement to a higher level. This dream job is surely a gift.

Highlights, from my perspective:

- ~When asked "What do you think a Horticulturist does?" Students replied plant sitter, gardener, and my favorite, gardeness.
- ~A student turned to his chaperone and stated "I love my day! This place is good!" ~When the Northway group was leaving, they all said Thank You in their native

tongue, tsin'ee.







TETLIN SCHOOL K-12 / SEPTEMBER 2014

Science of Molecules

Tetlin 6-12 students are studying biology and learning about cellular structures and functions. Much of the cellular fuel needs occur at the molecular level, and what better way to learn about molecules than to tear them apart!



Students studied the water molecule and learned that water (H2O) is made from a combination of two gasses. One of the gasses (Hydrogen) has tremendous potential to become an alternative fuel to oil based hydrocarbons. To tear apart the water molecule, students used an electrolysis chamber to pass electric current through water via an electrolyte that caused Oxygen to gather on the negative terminal (Anode) and Hydrogen gas to accumulate on the (Cathode). The gasses forming on the electrodes were collected in inverted test tubes. To Prove that the accumulated gas bubbles were something more than air, we employed the flame test. Students exposed the accumulated gas to the open flame of a burning splint, and the ensuing mini

Kindergarten Explores Geometry and Symmetry


Primary students have been using toys and math manipulatives to strengthen their math skills.

Toys such as blocks, Lincoln Logs, and Legos give the students an opportunity to plan and organize. They also help improve their fine motor abilities, and give them a chance to work cooperatively.

The Math as a Cultural Concept organizers loaned us their special made blocks that are cut into squares and right triangles. With these we explored the meaning of symmetry, and discovered that a right triangle is half of a square, and that we might want to engineer some amazing structures in the future.

In Science we are observing and describing millipedes, pill bugs, pond snails and guppies.

In Writing Class, we will compare and contrast these organisms and then learn to write about them with an enthymeme, which is a defended statement. Example - "I am not like a guppy because_____".







Mentasta Students Participate in a Gun Safety Class

The first week of school the students in 6th-12th grade participated in a gun safety course. The course instructor, Frank Entsminger, with the help of Angie David, came to the school to teach the safe ways of handling a firearm. For an hour a day Frank worked with the students

On the first day the kids learned how to properly hold several different types of firearms in safe positions as they walked. Also, the students learned that they should make sure that no one is anywhere in front of their aim or the barrel of the firearm, as well as how to check the gun for bullets when they are handed the firearm.

On the second day the students learned how to hold and aim with different types of firearms with and without a scope; they had different types of sights including a peep site. Sue Entsminger joined the students, as well as Rachael Sanford and Angie David on the second day. They helped supervise the students as they learned these careful techniques. The students also learned that guns have variations of actions, loading mechanisms, and the fact that most guns have clips while some are single shot and others are "tube feed."

On the third day the students learned the different stances of which a person would perform as they aimed the firearm such as; standing, kneeling, and lying down on the ground. Kids from Mrs. Lundy's class came in to join their fellow older classmates. They did every stance as they aimed down the sights. Every one got to participate and use every gun that was brought to the class

The kids respectfully asked a few questions when the class was over. There is going to be another day of gun safety class where the kids will actually go out and hunt for duck and grouse. The kids

learned a lot through this class and they thank all the participants who took time to teach Mentasta kids gun safety.

On October 2nd the Mentasta students drove out to the Mentasta Lake to test out their aiming. Sue and Frank Entsminger brought three different types of guns. Two single shot bolt action 22s, one with a peep sight, and a tube fed bolt action 22 with a scope. In a matter of a couple hours the kids had all got the chance to shoot at least two guns each. Each kid got two bullets for each gun they shot. As they aimed down their sights the kids were constantly reminded the ways of safely handling the firearms. The kids did great, they listened well and no one got hurt. There were several students capable of hitting the bull's-eye. They were encouraged to try with a little bit of a prize competition. If any of the kids were to hit the eye of the deer on the paper target they received a dollar bill. Jaylee Adams was one of the only ones to hit the bulls eye, let alone the fact that she hit it twice. Mathew as well hit the eye and they both got the prize they earned. We thank Sue and Frank for taking time to give these kids this opportunity, and thanks to Sarah Demit for helping out by transporting the kids down and back safely.

On September 30th the Mentasta School struggled with a two-hour power outage. The students had to improvise for their Tuesday morning P.E. class. Instead of letting this power outage interfere with the fun of a gym class, the kids had plenty of fun playing multiple games with hula-hoops. These games were thought of as they went on. These games were very creative and the kids actually enjoyed this time they had in the midst of a power outage.

ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

OPTIONAL Assessments

PLAN-Will be administered to 10th grade students in October. It takes approximately 3.5 hours and will be administered during the school day. It is not mandatory but highly suggested. It is the pre-ACT test.

Measure of Academic Progress (MAP)-2nd-12th These assessments are given 3 times per year for students in grades 2nd-12th and in the spring for Kindergarten and 1st. Data generated from these assessments is very valuable to homeschool teachers and can be used to create a valuable educational experience for your kids. It is a computerized adaptive assessment that can help pinpoint where students are ready to advance and where they need help. The main purpose of this assessment is to assist you with instructional decisions.

AIMS Web The district offers AIMS WEB testing 3 times per year for students in Kindergarten and 1st grade. The data generated from these assessments is very valuable to homeschool teachers and can be used to create a valuable educational experience for your kids. It is highly encouraged that you take advantage of these tools.

MANDATORY Assessments

Alaska Kindergarten Developmental Profile-Please submit to LeAnn Young by October 24th.

CCRA-There are 3 College/Career Readiness Assessments (which is how the state is now referring to ACT, SAT, and Work-Keys tests). One of them MUST be taken by the time a student graduates. The state will pay for students to take one CCRA test in high school (ACT, SAT, or Work-Keys). If a student wants to take any one of these tests again to obtain a higher score, the student will need to pay for the

WORK-KEYS-This test will be administered to 11th and 12th grade students on December 9th at Mentasta School, on December 10th at Tok School and on December 11th at Northway School. Students in Alaska can earn a career readiness certificate (CRC) by taking Work-Keys assessments in three key areas: Reading for Information, Applied Math, and Locating Information. Work-Keys as a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success. Students in grade 12 have the option of retaking the Work-Keys assessment if they want to achieve a higher score.

The ACT and SAT are optional but highly encouraged for college entry. The ACT will be given locally. Students wishing to take the SAT will need to arrange that on their own. The SAT assessment is administered in Fairbanks. ACT-For 11th/12th Saturday, October 25th, March 3rd and 31st during school day at Tok School and Saturday, April 18th

Alaska Measure of Progress (AMP) Our previous assessment, the Standards Based Assessment (SBA) was administered for the final time in April 2014. The new custom assessment, Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP), will be administered for the first time in spring 2015 and will hopefully be computer based, barring any technological issues. There is a testing window from March 30th-May 1st.
