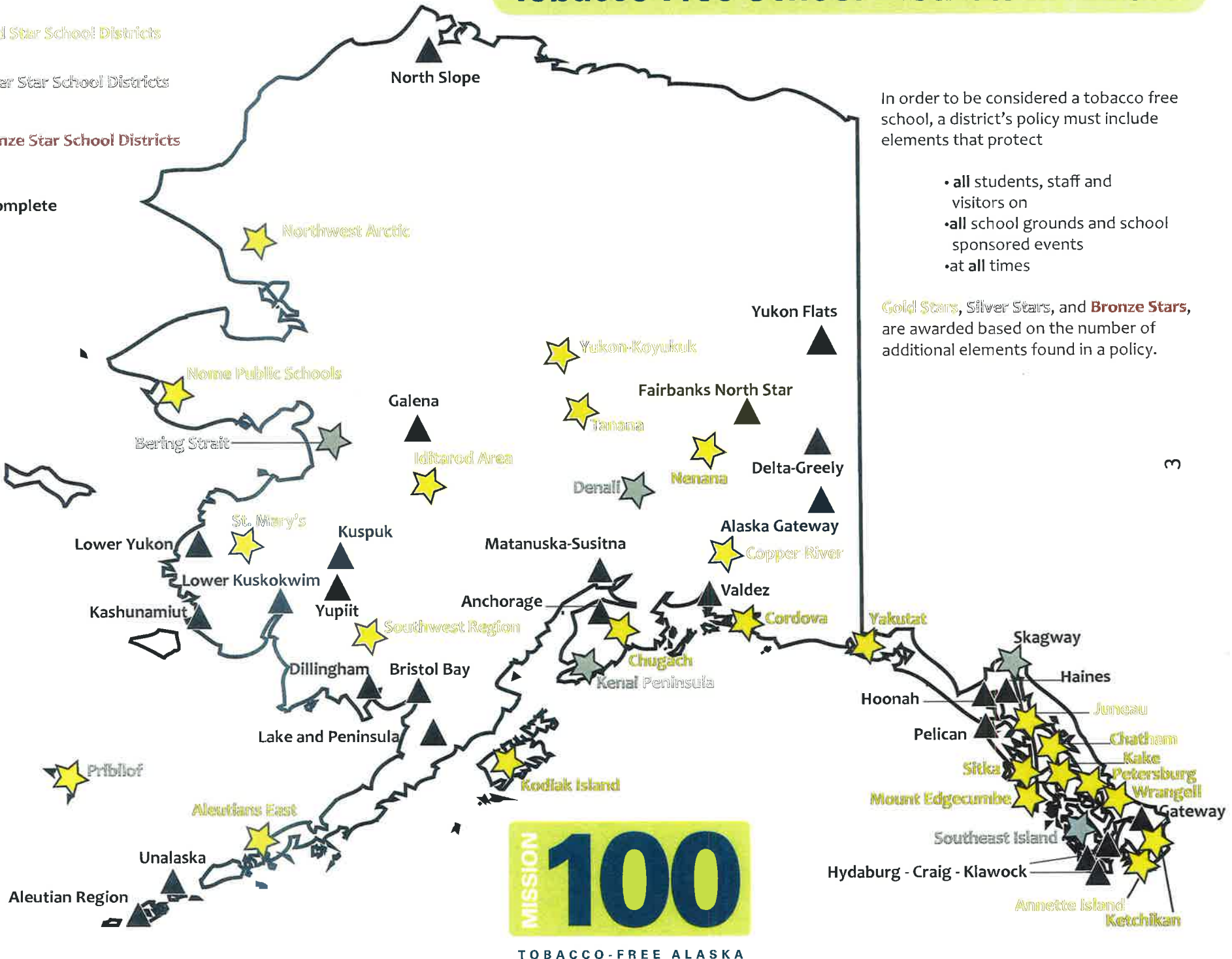

In order to be considered a tobacco free school, a district's policy must include elements that protect

- all students, staff and visitors on
- all school grounds and school sponsored events
- at all times

Gold Stars, Silver Stars, and Bronze Stars, are awarded based on the number of additional elements found in a policy.

District Tobacco Prevention Policies
 (As of February 2014)



Alaska Gateway School District's tobacco policies have been analyzed by the State of Alaska Tobacco Prevention & Control Program. The district's summary grade is: **INCOMPLETE** because the policy lacks one or more key elements to be considered a comprehensive tobacco free policy.

The model tobacco-free schools policy developed in 2012 with the Association of Alaska School Boards meets the Gold Star standard.

TITLE: Support of the Comprehensive Tobacco-Free School District Policy to protect the health of Alaskan students and communities

WHEREAS, More than 3 million high school students and 600,000 middle school students in the United States smoke cigarettes¹, including 1 in 6 Alaska High School Students²; and

WHEREAS, The younger people begin smoking cigarettes, the more likely they are to become strongly addicted to nicotine for a lifetime³; and

WHEREAS, The percentage of teens in Alaska using smokeless tobacco products at 8% has been consistently higher than the U.S. national average²; and

WHEREAS, Schools are often a vital and central gathering place for the entire community hosting sporting events, dances, funerals, potlucks, health fairs, concerts, community lunches, etc.; and

WHEREAS, The image of older youth and adults using tobacco influences younger children to try and start using, or older youth can serve as positive role models; and

WHEREAS, Communication is necessary to enforce a comprehensive tobacco-free policy⁴; and

WHEREAS, Tobacco use is an addictive disease and not merely a discipline manner⁵, teens should be provided options for treatment; and only a dozen Alaska school districts currently include progressive consequences regarding tobacco violations in their existing policy⁶; and

WHEREAS, Students who notice staff/visitors/general public who violate a tobacco-free policy have the right to safely report to a higher-standing authority; and

WHEREAS, A comprehensive tobacco-free policy includes all students, staff, visitors and the general public*;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the ATCA Youth Leaders coalition supports a Comprehensive Tobacco-Free school policy* in all districts around that state that promotes general health and welfare for students and all individuals in the school environment, protects future generations and reinforces tobacco-free norms and attitudes (AASB BP 3513.3 Tobacco Free Schools and BP 5131.62 Students: Tobacco).

*A Comprehensive Tobacco-Free school policy as defined by "AASB BP 3513.3 Tobacco Free Schools and BP 5131.62 Students" includes students, staff, visitors, and the general public. It is in effect 365 days/year and 24 hours/day. The model policy recommended by the ATCA Youth Leaders coalition is adopted by the State of Alaska Tobacco Prevention and Control Program and the Association of Alaska School Boards (attached).

TOBACCO-FREE SCHOOLS/ SMOKING

BP 3513.3

Tobacco-Free Schools

Note: The federal No Child Left Behind Act prohibits smoking in district facilities. The following language extends this to prohibit tobacco use in school buildings, on school grounds and parking areas, at school events and in vehicles used for transporting students. The ability of the Board to adopt this following policy may be restricted by collective bargaining agreements.

The Board recognizes its responsibility to promote the health, welfare and safety of students, staff and others on district property and at school-sponsored activities. Ample research has demonstrated the health hazards associated with the use of tobacco products, including smoking and the breathing of second-hand smoke. As role models, district employees should demonstrate conduct that is consistent with school programs to discourage students from using tobacco products.

In accordance with law and to promote the health and safety of all students and staff, it is the intent of the Board to establish a tobacco-free environment. Consequently, it is a violation for students, staff, visitors, contractors and all others to use, distribute or sell tobacco, including any smoking device, on district premises, at school-sponsored activities on or off district premises and in district-owned, rented or leased vehicles.

Staff and/or all others authorized to use district vehicles to transport district students to school-sponsored activities are prohibited from using tobacco in those vehicles while students are under their care.

For the purposes of this policy, "tobacco" is defined to include tobacco in any form and/or any nicotine delivering devices. This does not include FDA approved nicotine replacement therapy products used for the purpose of cessation.

This policy shall be in effect and enforceable at all times regardless of whether or not school is in session. The Superintendent or designee shall post appropriate signs prohibiting tobacco use in accordance with law.

The Superintendent may develop administrative regulations as necessary to implement this policy, including provisions for notification of the district's policy, through such means as student/parent and staff handbooks, newsletters, inclusion on school event programs; disciplinary consequences; and procedures for filing and handling complaints about violations of the district's policy.

The Superintendent may consult with local officials to promote enforcement of law that prohibits the possession of tobacco by minors on or off district grounds.

Note: Federal law does permit the use of tobacco products in a private residence. The following language clarifies whether or not your district will permit smoking in district-provided housing.

This prohibition does/does not apply to any private residence owned or leased by the district for housing purposes.

TOBACCO

BP 5131.62

Note: AS 18.35.20 prohibits the designation of smoking sections for students. It is unlawful for minors to give, sell, use, or possess cigarettes or other tobacco products. AS 11.76.100-.105. Minors include all persons under 19 years of age.

Tobacco use presents a health hazard with serious consequences both for tobacco users and non-users alike. Students shall not be allowed to smoke, chew or possess tobacco or nicotine products on school property or during school hours, at school-sponsored events, or under the supervision of district employees.

For the purposes of this policy, “tobacco” is defined to include tobacco in any form and/or any nicotine delivering devices. This does not include FDA approved nicotine replacement therapy products used for the purpose of cessation.

Clothing, bags, hats and other personal items used by students to display, promote or advertise tobacco products are prohibited on district grounds, at school-sponsored activities or in district vehicles. Tobacco advertising is prohibited in all school-sponsored publications, in all school buildings, and at all school-sponsored events. District acceptance of gifts or funds from the tobacco industry is similarly prohibited.

Student violations of this policy will lead to disciplinary action up to and including suspension. The district [may] [shall] provide positive alternatives to suspension, such as in-school suspension, educational programs, school and community service, and promotion of cessation resources. Students may also be subject to removal from any or all extracurricular activities and/or denial or forfeiture of school honors or privileges (e.g., valedictorian, salutatorian, student body, class or club office positions, field trips, senior trip, prom, etc.). A referral to law enforcement [may] [shall] be made. Parents shall be notified of all violations involving their student and action taken by the school.

The District may provide instruction regarding the effects of tobacco use on the human body and may take steps to discourage students from tobacco use.

Staff responsible for teaching tobacco use prevention will be encouraged when funds/resources allow to collaborate with agencies and groups that conduct tobacco use prevention education and to participate in ongoing professional development activities that provide basic knowledge about the effects of tobacco use, effective instructional techniques and program-specific activities. As part of the district’s tobacco use prevention activities, the Superintendent shall recommend to the curriculum committee the use of evidence-based instructional programs as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, or approved by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Programs will be integrated within the health education program and be age- and developmentally-appropriate. Instruction should be provided at every level, pre-kindergarten through grade 12, with particular emphasis on grades six through eight.

Observations and Visits to the Schools

AR 1240

For the purpose of school safety and to minimize disruptions to the instructional process, parents and other interested citizens who wish to ~~visit~~ **observe** schools and classrooms during school hours must:

1. Make arrangements with the site administrator at least two (2) days in advance of the scheduled ~~visit~~ **observation**;
2. Provide at least twenty-four (24) hour's notice to the teacher or staff person whose classroom the parent or citizen wishes to ~~visit~~ **observe**;
3. Limit classroom ~~visitations~~ **observations** to two (2) per quarter for ~~thirty (30) minutes duration~~ **no more than one hour** each;
4. Report to the site administrator's office upon entering the school building when school is in session.

General visits to the classrooms will be arranged through the site administrator for activities such as birthday parties, holiday events, group activities, presentations and other happenings open to parents and/or community members. Students from other school districts visiting family or relatives in the region are not allowed to visit the schools and classrooms without the specific permission of both the site administrator and teacher.

Visits to the Schools

BP 1240

The Regional School Board encourages parents/guardians and interested members of the community to visit the schools and view the educational program. The Superintendent or designee shall invite parents/guardians and the community to open house activities and other special events.

Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures to facilitate visits during regular school days and register all visitors at the school office when entering school grounds.

The Board recognizes the staff time and commitment required by school visits and encourages the staff to accommodate as many requests for visits as possible. To ensure minimum interruption of the instructional program, visits during school hours should be first arranged with the teacher and site administrator or designee in accordance with applicable negotiated agreement. If a conference is desired, an appointment should be set with the teacher during non-instructional time.

208 CLASSROOM VISITORS

Classroom visitation by parents or community people shall be cleared through the Unit Administrator who shall have the visitor(s) escorted to the classroom. Unless otherwise agreed upon by the Teacher, the Unit Administrator shall advise visitors that they may observe quietly and not interact with the students or the Teacher. The Unit Administrator shall take reasonable steps to ensure that classroom visitations are not disruptive.

Below is an update pertaining to some of the issues I have been addressing since the previous Board meeting in January.

FY16 Budget

The District's FY16 operating budget is in the initial stages of discussion. Of concern is the impact the Governor's budget submitted for education may have upon our finances for next year. If the one-time funding (32 million dollars statewide for education) that was approved in HB278 for education last session is eliminated, the financial cost to our District will be approximately \$178,000. The District may not be able to continue to fund our current staffing levels if a reduction of this magnitude is implemented. This year the forecast on the hill is one of limited resources and funding as reflected by the lower than projected price for a barrel of oil. However, we need to continue to stress the importance of education funding that was allocated last year especially since these previously approved funds are being utilized to build this year's budget.

Legislative Capital Projects

A list of legislative appropriations was approved during the January regular meeting and then grants were written for each of these requests. The appropriations were submitted to our state senator and representative thru a capital projects website named CAPSIS. These requests were also hand-delivered and discussed during a lobbying visit to Juneau. The new legislators for our area this year will be Senator Click Bishop (District C) from Fairbanks and Representative David Talerico (District 6) from Healy.

Lobbyist

The District Lobbyist and myself met with our senator and representative as well as a few other legislators to discuss the aforementioned capital projects requested by the District. After these conversations and if there are any discretionary funds available this year, we felt that the District is in a strong position with these requests to receive a portion of this funding. The legislators were appreciative of projects that save funds over an extended period of time and that these savings can be utilized to enhance the educational program being offered. The legislators were extremely excited to hear about the greenhouse in relation to processing and distributing food to all the schools and the partnership with the university to teach an agricultural curriculum. A number of pictures were shown in regards to the first year of this project. The District will be splitting travel costs with AP&T again this year. The District may be presenting to the energy legislative committee in March. Last year the District was awarded three Legislative Capital Projects totaling just over \$100,000.

District Calendar

A “draft” 2015-2016 District Calendar was distributed to the school administrators to share with the ASB/CSAC and staff for the purpose of review and to submit suggested changes. Any suggestions need to be submitted thru email attachment before the Board meeting in March. This will be an Action Item for the March Board meeting. Teachers are tentatively scheduled to begin work for the 2015-2016 school year on August 18th, which is the same Tuesday of the month as last year and allows the District to close school for FY16 on the Friday before the Memorial Day holiday. This calendar also provides for “Moose Days” in September as well as a full week for Spring Break in March. See attached “draft” 2015-2016 calendar.

School Broadband Assistance Grant

“The Alaska State Library has reviewed your FY2015 school broadband assistance grant (School BAG) application and has awarded State funds in the amount of \$236,548.20 to the Alaska Gateway School District to help bring the schools listed in your application up to or closer to 10 Mbps of download capacity.” At this time, the Technology Director is working with AT&T to upgrade all of or schools’ connectivity to at least 10 Mbps. An update will be provided at the Board meeting.

E-rate RFP

The technology department previously posted an RFP for the District’s Internet proposal. This RFP is for three years of Internet services beginning on July 1, 2015 and ending on June 30, 2018. The e-rate committee reviewed three company’s bids and GCI was selected as the vendor for the next three years. This recommendation will be an action item within the agenda.


Certified Contracts

Certified contracts were updated and plan to be hand-delivered to all the sites beginning February 20, 2015 with each teacher or administrator signing for receipt. Certified staff will have 30 days to sign an offered contract before it becomes null and void. All certified contracts were updated in the areas of salary, starting date, placement, daily rate, assignment, certificate areas and certificate expiration date. Since the job fair was moved to March this year, contracts will need to be distributed at least 30 days prior to this event so the District can post any vacancies for next year in time to offer contracts to selected candidates. Last year certified contracts were distributed on or about March 7, 2014.

Alaska Teacher Job Fair

The Alaska Teacher Job Fair is scheduled for the 27th and 28th of March this year instead of a mid April date. Registration and all other arrangements have already been secured for the District as well as a ½ page ad in the brochure. The Board will need to decide which members will be attending to assist with the interviewing process.

The Alaska Gateway School District will utilize designated local funds to complete the project.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

The overall goals for this project are to reduce energy costs, reduce our carbon footprint, and increase our energy efficiency by using more of the energy already being produced. The District will convert low-grade waste heat already being produced into electricity rather than throwing away this useable energy. The Organic Rankine Cycle is a 40-60 kW system "based on a near frictionless gerotor expander that turns low temperature heat into electricity, opening up a new market in waste heat utilization and changing the technology landscape for solar thermal and geothermal installations. In many cases, the payback on these investments is less than two or three years." - Ener-G-Rotors The estimated saving from installing an Organic Rankine Cycle system at Tok School is approximately \$202,000* per year.

$$*24 \text{ (hours/day)} \times 270 \text{ (days/year)} \times 60 \text{ kW (produced)} \times 0.52 \text{ kW cost (local kW cost)} = \$202,176 \text{ (electricity savings)}$$

Review existing electrical needs of school:

According to the local utilities records, the school campus consumed 484,800 kW of energy for the period from April 2008 to March 2009. The peak demand for this period was 163 kW in January 2009. The maximum monthly energy consumption of 50,360 kW occurred in the month of February 2009. The minimum monthly energy consumption of 26,600 kW occurred in the month of July 2008.

Organic Rankine Cycle (ORC):

A closed-loop organic rankine cycle operates on a heat stream, in this case, from steam or hot water to operate a basic refrigeration cycle. Heat boils a refrigerant at a low temperature, the resulting vapor is used to power drive a specialized engine that is directly connected to a generator. Although these devices are being developed at a utility scale, they are also being made in a 50-80 kW range, which is very appropriate for this project.

The heat source for ORC at Tok would be the hot water boiler plant. Multiple ORC devices can be installed in parallel to increase the generation capacity of the facility if desired. A refrigerant condensing system needs to be provided, but some manufacturers are providing this system pre-packaged with the ORC generator. A field assembled condenser system is not a complicated system. ORC generators are very simple in concept and have very minimal moving parts. With basic training from the manufacturer, maintenance technicians certainly can be trained to operate, maintain, and repair these systems.

Project Timeline:

The project was approved and ranked as the number one priority at the Regional School Board meeting on January 19, 2015. The project would begin as soon as funding was awarded and be completed by September 15, 2016.

Waste Heat

Every year, billions of dollars of energy are thrown away as waste heat.

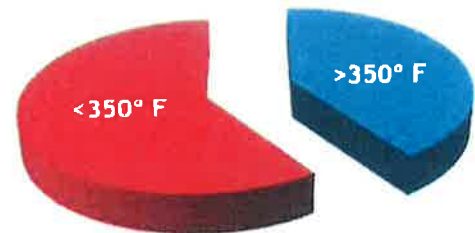
Heat is the natural by-product of energy conversion processes; both conversion of primary fuels to work or energy, and conversion of energy to work. Of the 100 quadrillion BTU's of energy the US consumes every year, 50 percent to 60 percent is lost as waste heat.



Though higher temperature waste heat in large quantities is often re-used to perform work or provide heat to buildings and processes, currently lower temperature heat is lost. **Before the GEN4 system, no technologies were efficient enough to convert low grade waste heat to electricity.** It was mostly discarded in cooling towers, ponds, the atmosphere, or discharged into the sewer.

Industrial BTUs Lost by Temperature



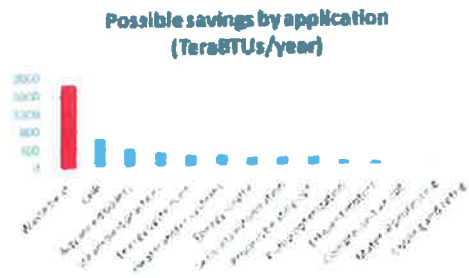

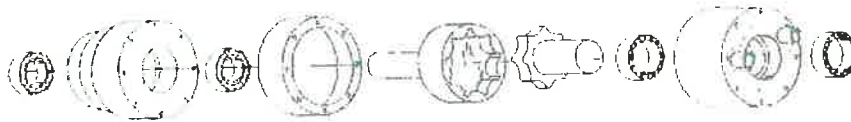

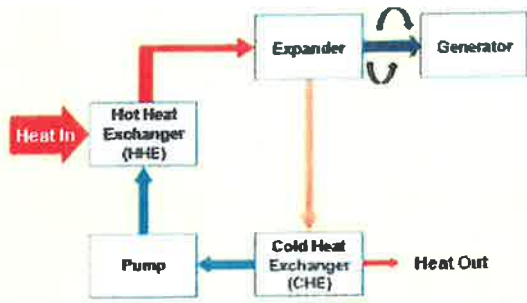

The initial project consisted of a biomass heating facility that contains an automated wood-fired boiler system that heats the existing K-12 School in Tok. Phase II is an extension of the Tok School Biomass Heating Project and consists of a bid alternate that was developed during the planning stage but was not installed because the initial project was completed as budgeted. The Scope of Work for this bid alternate would consist of:

Extending a hot water heating loop and related mechanical and electrical integration from the Biomass Heating Facility to a detached multipurpose building which houses an ice hockey rink, shooting range and an additional detached Zamboni garage. Both buildings are located on the Tok School Campus. This heat loop already provides heat to a green house and processing center constructed in the summer of 2013 with funds from a 2013 legislative appropriation. The green house and processing center grow, process and distribute produce Districtwide thru our lunch program.

The multipurpose building uses approximately 11,000 gallons of heating fuel each year at a current price of \$3.65 per gallon. This equates to an energy savings of \$40,150 per year at current heating oil costs. The payback for this project would be 8.7 years at the current fuel rates. However, fuel prices are predicted to increase to as much as \$5 per gallon within the next year. For example in 2000 heating fuel was \$1.20/gallon but increased to \$3.65/gallon in 2012. If fuel prices did average \$5 per gallon for the next 10 years, the saving per year would be \$55,000 with a payback of six years.

The only operation and maintenance costs for this project is the installation of piping for the hot water loop since the energy source is being provided thru excess heat created by the biomass wood-fired boiler. See attached construction documents and cost estimate produced by an architecture and engineering firm.

AGSD received a grant from the Alaska Energy Authority to build a biomass plant in 2009. AGSD received a \$325,000 legislative appropriation in 2010 to convert the heating plant into a combined heat and power (CHP) facility so electricity can be produced. In 2012 the District received a \$100,000 appropriation to build a green house and processing center, heated by the biomass plant, to grow, harvest, process and distribute produce thru the lunch program to all sites Districtwide.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

The Regional Residential Learning Center (RRLC) located on Tok School Campus will be designed as a net-zero facility focusing on energy efficiency. If funding were available thru the legislature, the goal of the District would be to build a 20-25 room dormitory with three or four classrooms to house interested 9th-12th grade students from the eight schools in AGSD. Students could live full time during the week at the RRLC and then be transported home for the weekend. Students from the RRLC would integrate into some of the classes at Tok School and students from Tok School would have the option of taking classes offered by the learning center. The students would also have the option of attending various length courses offered during the school year. The RRLC would offer summer academies that focus on enrichment activities such as advanced academics, fine arts, language, credit recovery, HSGQE preparation, STEM courses, elementary summer camps or even professional development for staff members. The Alaska Federation of Natives has supported the RRLC concept thru a resolution during their 2012 Convention and Citizens for the Educational Advancement of Alaska's Children (CEAAC) ranks RRLCs as one of the organizations prioritized initiative.

After a RRLC presentation to a class of high school students, letters were received on the subject with 83% of the students in support of building a RRLC and 17% not in favor of this project. Below is an analysis of the reasons high school students supported or did not support the concept of a RRLC.

The project will include building a new net-zero 10,000 square foot Regional Residential Learning Center (RRLC) on a campus that includes Tok School, Biomass Plant, multipurpose building, processing center and greenhouse. The RRLC would benefit from heat produced by the biomass boiler, surplus heat created as a byproduct of the electrical generation process of the Combined Heat and Power (CHP) system, and would also benefit from the electrical generation of the CHP.

The RRLC will have reduce utility demands through low energy building practices, such as super insulation, a location close to the biomass plant, natural ventilation, and day lighting. The RRLC will also incorporate energy efficient building technologies such as high-efficiency Led lighting, communication, and back-up HVAC systems. There are many anticipated benefits for creating a RRLC on the Tok School Campus. The primary benefits among these would be energy savings, enhanced academic opportunities for students districtwide, further implementation of AGSD's long term energy vision, and creating a demonstration center for the net-zero construction of a school.

Current Projects

- **AGSD Comprehensive Needs Assessment (CNA)** - is a new requirement for our ESEA (NCLB) application, and we just spent a significant amount time and effort working completing it. The CNA is a comprehensive review of surveys, performance assessment, and program evaluation that is done by the Combined Advisory Committee that meets once each year to review Title I, Title IC, Indian Education, and the districts professional development needs for the up coming year. This project will help the district to be even more intentional in its focus on staffing and instructional needs for students.
- **Kindergarten READY!**- The program is up and running, and we have 11 students in Northway, 13 in Tok, 4 in Tetlin, and 5 in Eagle. The young students in this program are working on the basic entry skills needed to be considered successful in Kindergarten, which includes among other things, the ability to count to 20, knowing the upper and lower case letters, and being able to spell their name. Parents also receive support from the program with educational toys, and training in how those toys can be effective tools of learning for their children.
- **Evaluation Committee** - We have been able to narrow our evaluation design focus down into three key areas, the Learning Environment, Instructional Planning & Delivery, and Professionalism. Within each of these areas, the committee is developing performance rubrics.

Professional Development Activities

- The next district-wide inservice is scheduled for February 13th. We will continue our focus this year on Action Based Learning and movement in the classroom, with practice opportunities. We are having a session on creating a Schoolwide culture of learning, working on our evaluation system and continuing the work being done on the alignment of standards.
- I took a team of district is sending a team of 7 teachers from across the district to the January EED RTI Institute, on Jan 22-23. Work shops included the New Teacher Evaluation System.

The Maintenance Department has been busy this last month doing a lot of training with new personnel, and going to the schools doing the preventive work orders.

We have had a couple schools have issues during this cold spell, parts of the buildings are getting a little cooler than they should be, and we have been working diligently trying to remedy the issues.

CCI came to Tok School to conduct a site inspection for the new upgrade and downloaded some programming, they are working on a schedule to come here and install the new system upgrade, I should know more by the next board meeting when they will be here or they might be here by then.

Northway School: We had a couple of issues.

The water line for the sink in the Principles office came apart, and we had water all the way into the hallway, it was cleaned up right away, and fixed.

The sewer line in the floor for the elementary class rooms came apart, when it was put together however long ago, they didn't do a very good job, the ice had to be thawed out and we had to replace the insulation in the floor, on the upside it was only grey water.

Tok School:

We have been installing exhaust ducting in the metal shop, for the welders and the plasma cutter, this should keep from setting off the fire alarm, when they do any welding or cutting.

Technology Board Report February 2015

The Internet vendor selection committee has met and made a recommendation to enter into a contract with GCI for our next contract period. I would like the board to approve entering into this contract for Internet services.

Once the board has approved entering into this contract I will finalize details with GCI to determine bandwidth levels at the various sites. We will apply for 10MB minimum to every site in the ERate process, but will likely start the year with less at most sites. If the state money to increase service to 10MB/s at sites comes through we will then be in a position to quickly take advantage of these funds.

We were awarded \$236,548.20 for broadband assistance at sites for this year. I have requested a timeline and implementation details from AT&T for this service, but am still waiting to hear back from them as of the time of this report submission.

Several of us will be attending the ASTE conference later in February. We have a team attending the leadership summit, which focuses on statewide issues in technology relevant to district leadership teams, as well as the general conference, which focuses on improving education through technology.

We are awaiting the release of the local caching server system that will be utilized during online testing this year. Once that is release I will begin the process of redoing what needs to be redone, and finishing the technology preparation work for testing.

Farm to School

For details on the greenhouse, please refer to Bonnie's report. Robbie has finished the financial paperwork to wrap up the federal Farm to School grant. I'll be working on the final written report for the grant this month.

We have decided to let the greenhouse freeze for several weeks to make sure we are clear of pest infestations. We think we've seen the last of the aphids, but we'd rather make sure we're starting the growing season bug free. We've got a number of starts going in the processing building already.

Board Report 2-3-15

Over the past couple of weeks several inquiries came in regarding qualifying for special education under the Other Health Impaired (OHI) disability. The State of Alaska Special Education handbook states:

To be eligible for special education and related services as a child with other health impairments, a child must

(1) exhibit limited strength, vitality, or alertness due to chronic or acute health problems such as a heart condition, tuberculosis, rheumatic fever, nephritis, asthma, sickle cell anemia, hemophilia, epilepsy, lead poisoning, leukemia, or diabetes, or a heightened alertness to environmental stimuli, due to attention deficit disorder (ADD) or attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD); to be eligible, a health impairment must adversely affect that child's educational performance;

(2) require special facilities, equipment, or methods to make the child's educational program effective; (3) be diagnosed by a physician as having a health impairment described in (1) of this subsection; and

(4) be certified by the group established under 4 AAC 52.125(a) (2) as qualifying for and needing special education services.

I have underlined and placed in italics the underlying theme that is somewhat confusing people. Whatever the child's disability is, it must adversely affect that child's educational performance, and this must be substantiated with data.

With statewide data provided by Mr. Poage I ran a spread sheet on AGSD intensive numbers. Currently our intensive count of 18 places us 13th in the state according to intensive numbers. By population AGSD is the 29th largest school district. Our percentage rate is 4.83%, with a high in the state of 8.59% and a low of 0% shared by five (5) districts. Mr. MacManus, Mr. Poage and I discussed these numbers and basically what it comes down to is the fact that it is what it is. The state sets the guidelines, we strictly follow them, and this is what we have.

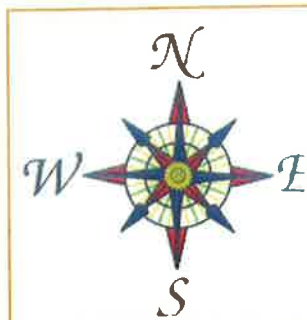

Students Practice Technology for Spring Testing

The Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) Technology Practice Tests are now available for teachers to use with their students. Mrs. Lundy has been assisting schools as they work to prepare their students for the spring tests by helping students access the Technology Practice Tests and providing guidance to teachers.

The purpose of the Technology Practice Tests is to familiarize students with Alaska's new computer-based test delivery system (called KITE) and to give them an opportunity to practice the types of questions that will be on the AMP assessments.

The Technology Practice Tests, however, are not meant to illustrate the rigor and complexity of the questions students will encounter on the test this spring.

Only a small amount of the content in the Alaska English Language Arts and Math Standards is represented on the Technology Practice Tests, and they should not be used to inform instruction.

January 2015 Biomass Report

January was a difficult month with multiple breakdowns and ongoing issues. The plant was down for approximately 15 days this month. All told the additional breakdown costs were probably around 15,500 dollars. Assuming that not producing electricity and heat for fifteen days cost about a grand a day. The first issue was an electrical control board, which was lost due to a steam leak pouring water vapor out over the low water control board. The second problem was a leaking seal below the fire tubes which cost two days in cool and restart time. Additionally to that we've got ongoing freezing problems in the condenser room where low pipes are freezing and breaking even while the system is at full steam pressure. Because of this chronic problem we have been keeping the condenser room at a higher temperature which has limited our kw production to about 32 kw. Currently we've got about twenty feet of pipe and valves frozen or broke. We are still running the system because the pipes are drain pipes and bypass pipes.

In terms of the bio-plant nothing was really accomplished this month other than we've managed to repair and keep the plant operating despite a number of varied issues.

I see that the kids in our district are learning a lot about growing food already and they love hands-on participation.

She will be giving an hour a week until June. Virginia Burke came through my articles in the Mukluk and will be giving 2 ½ hours a week when her schedule permits.

Being able to come in and get my hands dirty has been a nice change this winter. I agree with Rita Abel's quote in the Newsminer article, "dirt is fun!" Although these recent cold temps had me wanting to curl up and hibernate, the moment I arrive at the greenhouse I am reminded how lucky I am to have this job.

New and Exciting at Tok School

Schools in small communities often become multi-use buildings, and Tok School is no exception. Together with Alaska Gateway School District and the PTSA, Tok School teachers and staff have been making strides in our efforts to fuse school function with community cohesion.

Last spring, Alaska Gateway School District secured a Carol M. White Physical Education Program grant, which allowed us to hire two new P.E. teachers – Mike Cronk and Codie Malloy – who act as itinerants, traveling the district to bring purposeful movement and training to schools throughout AGSDs schools. This also allowed for purchase of skis, bicycles, new weight equipment, and many more manipulative equipment to assist students in an enjoyable and productive Physical Education experience. Continuing our focus on healthy lifestyle, we also built the Gateway Greenhouse last summer, which the district utilizes in distribution of breakfast and lunch meals. Food from the greenhouse is harvested and directly added to the lunch menus, finding its way to the trays of Tok School students every day. Says Bonnie Emery, the greenhouse's head gardener, "I feel confident that the Gateway Greenhouse is an asset to our school district...Our collaboration with the UAF Cooperative Extension is viewed as an invaluable resource, connecting us with community."

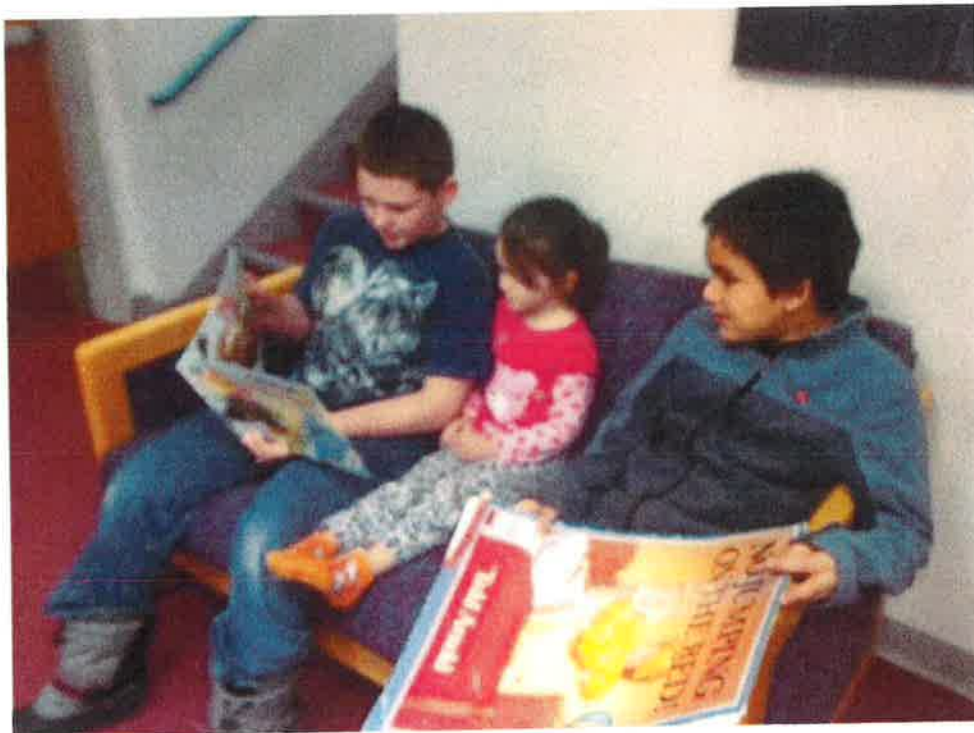
As part of our efforts to become more mindful consumers, Tok school has also begun weighing our food waste at lunch time, allowing students to estimate the amount of food waste for each day and awarding prizes to those who guess closest to the correct waste amount. Since the induction of this program, our food waste has decreased by several pounds per day.

Another exciting development in Tok School is our establishment of annual Native Youth Olympics games. Students enjoy competing in events such as the Stick Carry, the Alaskan High Jump, and the Seal Hop. The NYO events are exciting and enjoyable for the community as well as students and staff. NYO is a mechanism for fusion of physical movement, healthy peer competition, and an understanding and appreciation for Native history and culture; the games are a rich and relevant source of learning and teaching here at Tok School and in outlying schools.

Community involvement is prevalent even in curriculum execution, as evidence by Mrs. Weisz's 4th grade Book Buddy program, in which students are paired with students attending Deb Berg's Sunshine Pre-School. Students in Weisz's class venture to the library hand-in-hand with their book buddies, choosing books and reading aloud to the eager pre-schoolers. The welcoming atmosphere of the school and the kindness demonstrated by each student create an atmosphere where incoming kindergarteners feel welcome and appreciated, and the opportunity for 4th grade students to read aloud is helpful in development of reading fluency and confidence.

Tok School is proud of our community integration, and we hope to continue to serve both students and families in our town in a manner that represents the best our teachers and staff have to offer.

Alaska's New Assessments

Alaska will assess students in English language arts and math in grades 3 through 10 in the spring, as it has done for many years. But there are some improvements.

Before, students took separate tests in reading, writing, and math for three days in a row. Combined, the tests had up to 185 questions. The tests were untimed but, typically, students spent two or more hours on each test.

Now, students will take just two tests: English language arts and math, with a combined total of 140 questions. The tests are still untimed. But schools don't have to give the tests on back-to-back days. **The plan for REACH Academy is to have a window of days that are available in early April for you to bring your children in to test.**

The Alaska Measures of Progress are more challenging and more engaging than our old tests. Students will have fewer multiple-choice questions. Instead, students will have to analyze the question, perform multi-step tasks, solve problems, and apply what they know to new situations. That's the kind of thinking that employers and colleges look for.

Students will take the tests on a computer. In math problems, students might drag and drop items or plot points on a graph. In answering an English language arts question, students might highlight text or put sentences in order. Using computers, students actively participate in the test.

Students can become familiar with the new tests before they take them. With technology practice tests, students will learn to answer questions using the computer's tools.

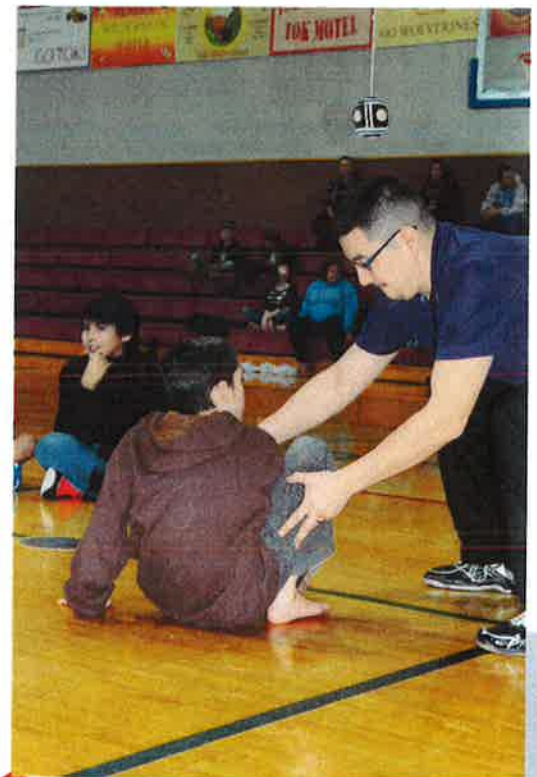

Gateway Greenhouse, built in 2013, is entering its first full year of growing. The goal: provide fresh vegetables to the Alaska Gateway School District, which serves about 375 students in the communities of Tok, Dot Lake, Eagle, Tetlin, Tanacross, Mentasta Lake and Northway.

Students get to take part, learn about cultivation and experience the joy of eating fruit and vegetables picked on the spot.

Six 25,000-Btu heating units and heat loops through soil keep the 30-by-96 foot greenhouse warm using excess heat from Tok School's wood-fired boiler.

Jason Fastenau, technology and farm school director for Tok School, said even at minus 50 degrees the greenhouse is kept above freezing.

In January, scarce lettuce, celery and spinach can be found in the greenhouse, but things are ramping up for the growing seasons. Tomatoes, cucumbers and more celery have been started. Barley is being sprouted, eventually destined for the compost pile. "We're trying to improve soil and improve it organically," Fastenau said. Last season, strawberries, corn, melons, broccoli, peas, cucumbers, cabbage, carrots and "a lot of tomatoes" were grown, according to Fastenau.

Fastenau said current operations involve lots of experimentation. He is trying to determine what students like best and wise uses of soil. The broccoli was delicious, but slow growing and space intensive, he said.

District funds, a legislative appropriation and an Alaska Department of Natural Resources Farm-to-School grant all helped pay for the roughly \$35,000 greenhouse, which is run in conjunction with University of Alaska Fairbanks Cooperative Extension Service.

Rita Abel is a nutrition education instructor from Tok's Cooperative Extension office. When classes from village schools visit, Abel runs greenhouse classes for preschool to high school students.

Abel's ambition — aside from increasing fruits and vegetables in students' diets — is for students and adults to "experience pulling the fruit or vegetable right off the vine."

Abel said it's working. Students were thrilled to pick peas and rainbow carrots last year, and teachers and principals were astounded with the produce returned to village schools.

Class curricula vary. Preschoolers might learn about beneficial bugs, while high school classes might explore science and biology topics. One teacher simply wanted her students to understand the word produce and the act of harvesting.

Hard numbers on the amount of produce generated aren't available from 2013, partly because the full growing season wasn't utilized. Fastenau said more extensive tracking will begin this year. The ultimate goal, according to Fastenau, is to locally provide 20 percent of Gateway School District's food.

"We have enough extra heat to do a number of additional greenhouses, should we chose," Fastenau said.

Equally important, the greenhouse offers an increasingly popular and long-absent learning environment in school systems: introducing kids to the value of fresh fruits and vegetables and how to procure them.

And, as Abel puts it, "dirt is fun."

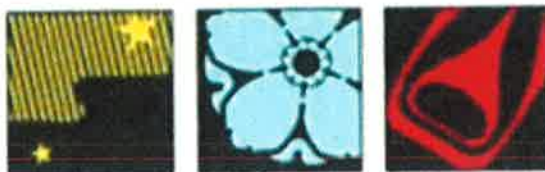
