As with previous years I would like to take a moment to thank all of you for your continued support of the school and the children of this town. We are a wonderful town situated here on the border of Vermont and Massachusetts with a bright future ahead. You all have an open invite to schedule a tour of our school.

I would like to introduce to you the 2015-2016 Winchester School Board. Steve Thompson is the newest member, he was appointed to the board this past year. Steve has an extensive technology background and has been very helpful with guiding the board and district towards the future.

A four year veteran of our board is Jason Cardinale. We are excited he is running again for the 3 year opening on the ballot. Jason is a professional builder that has been instrumental in many of our building projects. He has helped the district save a substantial amount of money by using his knowledge and volunteer hours to do various projects in the school. He was part of the main team that directed the building of the playground. He is very conscious of the balance between education and funding and the fine line we walk as a school board.

Our longest sitting member of the board is Trevor Croteau who is in his 3rd term. Trevor was born and raised in Winchester and is a deputy of the county sheriff's department. He has added great continuity to the board and we rely on him often to give us insight when past topics resurface.

Kevin Bazan, who is now our Vice Chair, is in the 2nd year of his term and has proven he has what it takes to lead. Heading up our Policy Committee he has been critical in reviewing our school policies as well as presenting new ones.

The biggest change to the lineup of the board was losing Elisha Jackson. We lost a member who knew her way with the numbers. This was not a total loss however. What we lost on the school board side we gained for our SAU. We were very excited to welcome Elisha to our central office. Elisha served on the School Board for 3 years and had just started her new term. As our search for a new Business Manager continued on, we experienced a few applicants that didn't fit what we needed. After some long thought Elisha realized the person we needed was already there and put her resume in. As many of you know, Elisha has years of experience in the banking industry and brings a passion for working with children. She has volunteered to advise the Student Council and has already captured thousands of dollars in potentially lost grant dollars. 2016-2017 looks to be a great year.

Winchester School strives towards the goal of setting the pace for other NH schools. We need to be thinking outside of the box and providing for our students with a holistic approach. This year we were able to achieve that goal. We are the first in the state to institute the CEP lunch program. This program allows us to offer free lunch and breakfast to all the students in our district. It is a needs based program and we feel that our children need a healthy meal to keep their minds in tip top shape. A healthy child is a learning child.

Keeping with this thought of "outside the box", we have partnered with the town on projects. We were in dire need of some drainage repairs in the parking lot and along with the towns help we were able to fix the drain at a cost less than an outside contractor would have cost. By doing this we were also able to employ Town of Winchester employees and provide income for the town as well. Once the drainage was fixed we used funds from our building improvement capital

reserve fund to seal and stripe the parking lot. This year and subsequent years the board has made as one of its priorities to proactively maintain our aging structure and grounds.

Last year I touched based on sports and how they were alive and well in our school. I will tell you that this year the Tigers are roaring! Our new Athletic Director Rob Skrocki has helped streamline our sports and give our athletes the skills needed to win games. Soccer and Basketball are now separate girls and boys teams. This allows us the opportunity to compete with many more schools. We will continue into spring with the addition of baseball and softball teams for our middle school athletes. As long as we have kids participating, enjoying and excited we will continue to try to expand the sports we offer. Sports in Winchester are more than alive....they are growing and making a name for our little school. In partnership with ACCESS, and due to a change in their funding, the cheer program became part of the school sports program. It has been fantastic to have them at our home basketball games. I hope you have all enjoyed the season as much as I have. All of our teams have shown us they have Tiger pride!

Another important program that was started last year was Student Council. For the first time in years-we-had-and-election-and-a-group-of-young-people-learning-about-politics-and civic duties. It was a good start to reviving a program the students and staff missed. At the end of last school year, our Student Council president, Connor Hill, moved onward to Keene High School. This allowed our Vice President to step into the role of President. Noah Horton started the school year out organizing a successful election. New officers were elected and sworn in at our school board meeting. The student council cabinet consists of Madison Hodgeman secretary, Karlos Baez treasurer, Ashlyn Hill, Vice President and Noah Horton President. With the help of the school staff, Student Council ran a successful can drive to donate over 800 canned items to the local food pantry. The next project was a fund raiser and they were able to raffle off a cord and a half of wood and raised almost \$600! There are great things to come for student council and we have made a promise to our students that this program will continue.

We have been lucky to be able to add these programs with very little cost. As you all know or can imagine, paying for education is difficult. The 2016-2017 budget didn't get set overnight. The size of the school is part of the equation. Over the last few years we have struggled with declining enrollment. I looked back to when I was first on the board 4 years ago and the enrollment numbers were 480+. Today we have 418 students enrolled in our preschool through 8th grade programs. As the state continues to fund education based on the enrollment numbers we are faced with some tough decisions. We do want you to know that we will do everything in our power to find the balance between an exceptional education and an affordable tax rate.

I am finishing this letter post deliberative session. As with each year there is always controversy and questions as to why we make certain decisions. I have spoken several times in this letter about balance. It's not just about balancing a checkbook but being able to balance our needs as a district within the financial constraints of an affordable budget. Next year we are faced with almost \$300,000 less in revenue from the state. This is nothing new and it's the hand we have been dealt in the past. When you combine this with an approximate \$300,000 increase to our High School tuition, raises for both Collective Bargaining Units and an overall increase in cost of operating our school, you must make some tough decisions.

Let's all stand tall and do our best to raise the children of our town. It is a village that raises a child. We all need to take ownership in our youth. They are the future leaders of our town.

As always, thank you for your ongoing support of the school. Aristotle once said, "All who have meditated on the art of governing mankind have been convinced that the fate of empires depends on the education of youth." Surely you can see why our goal today is to provide each student with the ability to become problem solvers for tomorrow.

Our year in review:

- Common Core. Many talk about it. What exactly is it? Some say it's a bad thing. How much do folks truly know about it?
- **Selectmen.** We meet with the Winchester Board of Selectmen the second Wednesday of the month to facilitate pooling resources and working together.
- Box Tops For Education. Free money for the school by sending in labels!
- Teacher of the Year. Lisa Lounder, our 7th /8th English Language Arts Teacher, was selected as a finalist as 2015's New Hampshire Teacher of the Year!
- C.E.P. All lunch and breakfasts are free at your WINchester School.
- **Preschool.** We need to get children into the school as soon as possible. We even made our preschool free!
- **Science lab**. The school realizes the importance and focus of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math).
- Alt Ed programing. We offer a program for high school students and adults.
- Stop sign. There is a stop sign at the corner of the school's property and Parker Street
- Unseasonably warmer weather and low oil prices. This assists our financial position
- C.A.S.T. Community and School Together

Common Core

In 2009, state leaders, including governors and state commissioners of education from 48 states, two territories and the District of Columbia, came together and decided to develop common, college- and career-ready standards in Mathematics and English Language arts. They worked through the National Governors Association Center for Best Practices (NGA Center) and the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) to accomplish this. The development process included defining expectations for what **every child should know and be able to do when they graduate from high school,** and then creating content standards for grades K-12 aligned with these expectations. We have all commented, or heard people comment, that some kids can't read the names on their graduation diplomas or youngsters at retail organizations can't make change without the assistance of a computer! The time to address this is now. There is a simple three-minute video that explains the Common Core, which one can see at http://www.cgcs.org/Page/378. If you hear someone state they are not in favor of the Common Core, please ask them "why?" and please do not accept the vague answer of "It's not right for America." Ask for specific reasons for why they feel it is bad.

Winchester Select Board

Throughout the last year, a Winchester School Board member and the Superintendent have met with the Winchester Selectmen to update progress at the school and brainstorm ways we can pool our resources. Clearly we do not want to send Winchester dollars out of town if we can possibly keep them here, and better yet, use the resources we already have to reduce the cost of completing various projects. Working together has already saved a lot of tax dollars.

Box Tops For Education

It seems like such a simple thing - clip labels off Progresso Soups, Ziplock Storage Bags or any General Mills product and send them in to the school. We can cash them in and use that money to purchase items or services for the school. We built a \$32,000 playground, mostly by cashing in Box Tops For Education labels, and we asked for zero dollars from tax payers! We can use the money anyway we want to support students. Please ask friends and family members from anywhere in the country to help us out by simply clipping and sending them to you — or us. We have people from Massachusetts and Maine sending the labels to our school on a regular basis! The more we received from Box Tops For Education, the fewer tax dollars we'll request from the town.

Teacher of the Year.

In the entire state of New Hampshire, our 7th/8th grade teacher, Lisa Lounder, came within a hair's breadth to becoming the state-wide teacher of the year! Lisa went through a series of interviews over the course of several months from a committee comprised of professionals from the Department of Education, and a major business. The group even came to the *WIN*chester School to interview those who have had

interactions with Lisa. It was an intense process. Mrs. Lounder's platform was focused on teaching children without a lot of financial support! Any student who has had Mrs. Lounder as a teacher will be able to comment on her impressive teaching skills. We are fortunate to have her sharing her talents with us.

C.E.P.

Is an acronym for the "Community Eligibility Provision." The CEP is a development from the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 that allows schools and local educational agencies (LEAs) with higher poverty rates to provide free breakfast and lunch to all students. CEP eliminates the burden of collecting household applications to determine eligibility for school meals, relying instead on information from other meanstested programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. We are the first school in the state of New Hampshire to pursue this program. Others are following suit. Our ongoing determination, and ability to analyze data and respond to the needs of students, has already helped our entire town.

<u>Preschool</u>

The best way to prepare for college is to prepare for kindergarten. There is no secret that students who are exposed to subject areas at an earlier age have a better opportunity for academic success. Consider the child who enters kindergarten with 1,000 words in his or her vocabulary. Now consider the child who enters kindergarten who has 6,000 words in his or her vocabulary, can count to ten, knows all the letters of the alphabet and can zipper his or her own jacket! We need to get children into the school as soon as possible to help parents teach them these fundamental skills. So important is our quest to help parents expose children to education, we made our preschool free!

Science Laboratory.

In order for students to learn hands-on science, we need a state-of-the-art science laboratory. Average-sized classrooms have obvious limitations, hence we have converted one of our larger rooms into a science lab. In the lab students will be able to conduct experiments more easily and learn about the science standards. We even have a 3-D printer in the laboratory (see cover picture) to expose children to the next generation of applicable science. Please let me know if you would like a tour of the lab.

Alt Ed Programing.

In the back of the school in our Ford Building we have been offering a program for high school students who may not be having success at high school, or to adults who are attempting to earn their G.E.D. Make no mistake, *nothing is as attractive to a new business coming to town than an educated workforce!* The more residents we can help earn degrees, the more opportunities the town will have. If you are interested, or

know of anyone interested in earning a degree on a convenient schedule, please give the school a call at 239-8061 x 552.

Stop sign.

There is a new stop sign at the corner of the school's property and Parker Street. Keeping children safe is our top priority. The Winchester Police are aware of the sign and frequently are positioned at the corner to ensure all who drive through the parking lot abide by the law. Too many drivers have been seen traveling through the lot too quickly. If you notice this occurring, I'm hoping you can help me keep children safe by writing down a license plate and a time, and submitting it to the school. Nothing is as precious as our children, and we shall never apologize for keeping them "too safe."

Unseasonably warmer weather and low oil prices.

This has been an interesting winter. The warm weather requires less use of oil and the lower prices assists our financial position when we do need to purchase oil. We have locked in oil prices at a low rate, which of course has a positive effect on the budget's bottom line.

C.A.S.T.

Is an acronym for "Community and School Together." Folks from local organizations and businesses meet the second Thursday of the month at 9:00 a.m. to discuss Winchester concerns and how we can work together to support the school and support the town. You are invited to join us. We usually meet at the Applewood Nursing Home and muffins and coffee is served! You input is important!

Your *WIN*chester School is the hub of the town. A lot happens at the school and a lot of what we do affects all residents. There is no question that this town has great potential and we can achieve great things when we work together. Please know your input is always welcome and strongly encouraged.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Winchester School Gymnasium at 7:00 PM on Thursday February 4, 2016, to consider the following articles in deliberative session, pursuant to RSA 40:13. The official voting of the business of the School District as determined at the deliberative session and the election of School District Officers will be held at the Winchester Town Hall on Tuesday, March 8, 2016 with the polls open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE ONE: To elect one (1) member to the School Board for a three (3) year term

To elect one (1) member to the School Board for a two (2) year term

To elect one (1) School District Clerk for a three (3) year term

ARTICLE TWO: Shall the Winchester School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget for the 2016-17 school year, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$10,992,912.18. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$11,335,129., which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Winchester School District or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only?

School Board does recommend this appropriation.

ARTICLE THREE: Shall the Winchester School District vote to approve the cost items included in the two year collective bargaining agreement reached between the Winchester School Board and the Winchester Support Staff Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing.

The estimated increase in the costs for wages and benefits (Social Security and NH Retirement System) under the collective bargaining agreement are as follows:

WINCHESTER SCHOOL BOARD DELIBERATIVE SESSION JANUARY 31, 2015 WINCHESTER GYMNASIUM

Moderator, Henry Parkhurst called the meeting to order at 9:00 am.

H. Parkhurst read the Warrant introduction and reviewed housekeeping items for the meeting. The School Board, Town officials and School personnel were introduced.

ARTICLE ONE:

To elect two (2) members to the School Board for three (3) year term To elect one (1) School District Moderator for a two (2) year term To election one (1) School District Treasurer for a three (3) year term

H. Parkhurst introduced two candidates for a 3-year term on the School Board; Elisha Jackson and Richard Horton; for School District Moderator, Henry Parkhurst and School District Treasurer, Angel Jackson.

The Public reviewed the warrant articles and H. Parkhurst asked if there was a motion to accept the Warrant as a whole.

G. Barrett Montgomery MOVED to accept the whole Warrant as presented, SECONDED by: Keith Nordberg

Bill McGrath asked if there were any projected changes regarding the number of classes in grades three to eight from the last budget to this one.

R. Horton advised no changes in the number of classes.

Bill McGrath advised he has a concern with that; used to have 480 students Kindergarten through eighth grade and now down to 440. He looked at DOE Administrative rules for grades three to five, 30 students or fewer per educator; Middle School/Senior High is 30 or fewer; 30 is the maximum. His concern is based on the guidelines, we are probably looking at two teachers in grades three and one. From grade five to six would have eleven students per teacher; looks like we are overstaffed. His biggest concern is, are there paras and aids in all of those classes?

- R. Horton advised the paras we have are required by law. They are written into a student's IEP.
- J. Lewis explained; there are not designated aids in each classroom. It depends if a child requires it.
- R. Horton Guideline is more of a maximum guideline. We try to do what's best for the students and 18-20 students in a classroom is challenging; need to be sure students get a quality education. Wedgewood is being redone; we expect an influx of students. This is the current list; doesn't mean it won't change.
- J. Lewis Sixth grade position is a one-year position. If every student was identical, your argument has merit. But they are not the same. We need to focus on what the child's needs are, not just the numbers.
- Bill McGrath advised as a Selectman he sees \$16,000 in the budget for Sports. If given a choice between that and utilities, feels people will pick sports. All the time people come before the Selectmen, they can't pay their water bill and you are increasing Sports.

Bill McGrath asked about Line 163 – Superintendent's Salary. The note says 70% and 30% is on line 199, but that says postage. He is confused.

R. Horton advised the 30% is in Line 190. This is the second year of the budget format done this way to be sure everyone knows where everything is; that was a typo.

Jeremy Miller asked to address Article Twelve in order that the vote could be taken on the whole Warrant. Explained the language in Article Twelve as printed would be inaccurate. He requested to make a change now.

H. Parkhurst advised they need to vote on the whole Warrant. He called for the question.

G. Barrett Montgomery advised he would accept a friendly amendment for a change in language and Keith Nordberg, who seconded the original motion, agreed.

Jeremy Miller MOVED to Amend Article Twelve to read: Shall the Winchester School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purpose of providing partial funding of K-12 enrichment programs for school-aged children of Winchester and Ashuelot administered through ACCESS (All Children Cared for Educated, Supported & Successful); SECONDED by: J. Cardinale

Gus Ruth asked does the budget have to be posted with the Warrant.

T. Croteau advised he would say, yes.

Gus Ruth advised he saw the posting at the Town Hall and it said draft; why wasn't an official budget posted?

R. Horton – It is the Budget Committee's budget that was posted.

VOTE on Amendment to Article Twelve - MOTION PASSED.

Gus Ruth wondered if the whole meeting was legal without a proper posting.

R. Horton advised it is the Budget Committee's budget, not the School Board's budget.

Gus Ruth thinks it should be the School's responsibility. Thinks the articles should be discussed individually.

Amy Hill encouraged voters to vote down the whole warrant, so they can discuss individual articles.

- H. Barrett Montgomery Does the School Board have a fix for Mr. Ruth's observation? If so, he would accept it as a friendly amendment.
 - T. Croteau advised whatever was posted was posted. There is nothing they can do at this point. If at some point there is something someone needs to do, then they will need to do it.

Gus Ruth thinks they need to talk to the attorneys.

T. Croteau would probably agree with you. The Budget Committee form was given to the School Board to sign and post. Advised he doesn't have an answer to the question. He is not an attorney.

Gus Ruth – If the attorney says it is an illegal meeting, will need to post another meeting

- H. Barrett Montgomery MOVED that the fact that the warrant was marked draft is an inconvenient, technical/clerical error. Feels they need to treat the technical error as a technical error and proceed; SECONDED by: Jill Beaman
 - H. Parkhurst advised there is no such thing as a mere technical mistake as far as the DRA is concerned.
 - H. Parkhurst reviewed the document. Did state draft budget; not for official posting; Mr. Ruth is correct.
 - R. Horton reviewed the form; it says 20 days after the meeting and this is the meeting.

Sherman Tedford asked the voters to vote the whole Warrant down so they could discuss individual warrant articles. They were advised of the meeting. If the DRA and State want to challenge it, that is up to them. He doesn't want to waste more time on it.

Sherman Tedford called for the question; asked the voters to vote down the whole warrant.

H. Barrett Montgomery believes the Amendment precedes the Motion on the Warrant.

VOTE on Amendment – MOTION PASSED

MOTION to Approve Articles One through Twelve as a Whole - MOTION FAILED.

H. Barrett Montgomery asked that candidates present themselves to the group.

- H. Parkhurst advised this is a deliberative session; not a candidates' night. Ruled out of order.
- G. Barrett Montgomery MOVED to challenge H. Parkhurst's ruling not to allow candidates to speak; NO SECOND.
- H. Parkhurst ruled G. Barrett Montgomery out of order.

ARTICLE TWO: Shall the Winchester School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget for the 2015-16 school year, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$10,999,999. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$11,008,398, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Winchester School District or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only? The school board does recommend this appropriation. The budget committee does recommend this appropriation.

R. Horton MOVED to approve Article Two as Written; SECONDED by: J. Cardinale,

Amy Hill advised it came to her attention just two weeks ago that the Reading Recovery Program was cut from the budget. She wants to amend Article Two to add back the \$70,000 in the budget. She spoke to the Reading Recovery program. Advised it allows them to get kids in their early years; could help them and keep them out of the system.

R. Horton advised they are looking at getting a Reading Specialist to service the whole school.

Amy Hill feels Reading Recovery is a structured program that meets early childhood needs. Will we be taking away from already structured programs? Can we not take away the program and tweak what we have. If a child can't read well, it affects everything.

J. Lewis advised the program has been very successful, but with 12 students he feels they are pushing it. Need the biggest bang for their buck. It would be great if all parents read to their kids before they came to school. Amy Hill advised a Reading Specialist was news to her. If taking this money out, is there money for a Reading Specialist?

J. Lewis advised yes, part-time.

Amy Hill – What is the budgeted amount for a Reading Specialist?

Sherman Tedford advised it is a bottom line budget; as Administration they can move money anywhere they want. Nothing is set in stone.

Amy Hill advised if they switch money around, she is fearful they will take Reading Recovery away because they don't know the plan.

R. Horton advised the school is changing rapidly. They know there is a need for a Reading Specialist and additional support. The Reading Recovery Program was designed for six students per semester. The plan is to bring in a part-time reading specialist.

Amy Hill – Doesn't know where the money will come from. What will happen to these kids? Susan Rice feels they do need a Reading Recovery program. If they save just one child from going to Keene as a Special Ed student, our program is working.

Rhonda Taylor is a Special Ed and Reading Recovery teacher. Advised they wish they could service 12 students each year. Explained the Reading Recovery program is an incredibly valuable program. She highly recommends putting the money back in the budget. Explained there are many children who have needed the services over the years. Reading Recovery teachers are incredible resources for classroom teachers.

Joan Franklin is a trained Reading Recovery teacher working in the classroom. Advised it is a wonderful thing; very different than a conversation for a Reading Specialist. Reading Recovery is a specific program, not necessarily Special Ed, but need more selective training.

G. Barrett Montgomery advised he would support a motion to restore the \$70,000 because if it is in the budget it can be spent, if it is out it is not available to be spent. Good argument to keep programs that would modify the needs in the high school; would prefer to see a higher budget than to have the monies moved from the bottom line.

Gus Ruth asked what line the Reading Recovery was in, in the budget.

E. Jackson advised it is not a separate line item. It is a bottom line budget; if they put the monies back, it doesn't require the Board to use those funds.

Sherman Tedford advised putting \$70,000 back in would add 12 cents to the tax rate. If they put it back, and he is not against that, he feels the default budget would pass.

Amy Hill Moved to Amend Article Two to change the total to \$11,069,999; SECONDED by G. Barrett Montgomery;

VOTE on Amendment to Article Two – MOTION PASSED.

VOTE on Article Two as Amended - MOTION PASSED.

R. Horton MOVED to restrict reconsideration of Article Two; SECONDED by: T. Croteau, MOTION PASSED.

Susan Rice spoke to Article Three. Advised she is a sixth grade Para professional. All support staff is deeply committed to all Winchester students; includes Kitchen and Custodians. She asked for voters' support.

R. Horton spoke to Article Three; involved as a Board member and part of the Negotiations team. Feels support staff do a fantastic job. Raises in Article are still much lower than contracts in the area. It is a struggle to keep contracts filled and

get more paras in the district.

VOTE on Article Three – MOTION PASSED.

G. Barrett Montgomery MOVED to restrict reconsideration of Article Three, SECONDED by: R. Horton, MOTION PASSED.

ARTICLE FOUR: Shall the Winchester School District, if article #3 is defeated, authorize the governing body to call one special meeting, at its option, to address article #3 only? (Majority vote)

- R. Horton MOVED to approve Article Four as written; SECONDED by: J. Cardinale, MOTION PASSED.
- G. Barrett Montgomery MOVED to remove the word *only* so if Article Four and Article Six were defeated, we would only need one meeting.

R. Horton advised they are two separate subjects; different contracts.

Gus Ruth - Does the school fund the special meeting?

R. Horton - yes.

E. Jackson spoke to Article Five. Explained the total being raised includes NH Retirement system. Some is mandated, although teachers definitely do deserve the increase.

VOTE on Article Five – MOTION PASSED.

R. Horton MOVED to restrict reconsideration of Article Five; SECONDED by: J. Cardinale, MOTION PASSED.

- Henry Parkhurst feels perhaps preventative measure is better than needing to do it all later.

Bill McGrath – When he was on the School Board, they talked about pupil population going down in Keene. The School Board was going to look at cutting costs. Have the rates gone down?

R. Horton advised no. The Board did ask about money that was returned to taxpayers from Keene. Explained Winchester received the rates this year, but Keene sent the wrong rates, they were actually higher. Keene High School cut 12 teacher positions. Our rate includes that cost savings. Sherman Tedford doesn't see how this warrant article can be informational only; voted to send the kids to Keene years ago.

- K. Bazan advised the intent is to get those figures in the hands of voters of Winchester and have them make that decision.
- G. Barrett Montgomery feels there are several options for students; they could pursue a trade school, art programs, etc. He is not convinced Keene is the all-purpose school to send kids to.

VOTE on Article Nine – MOTION PASSED.

Budget Committee member in audience advised no.

Sherman Tedford asked if the ACCESS Program can incorporate the Reading Recovery Program.

E. Jackson advised the school would actually be fiscally responsible for the funds; that's why we needed to change the verbiage.

Jeremy Miller reviewed the handout on Article Twelve – What will \$30,000 pay for?

- H. Parkhurst asked if a student could be denied; are all students eligible to be part of the program?
- H. Parkhurst asked if the play that was here a couple of weeks ago, was part of ACCESS.

Jeremy Miller advised it was a partnership between the School, ACCESS and our community.

H. Parkhurst - The play was wonderful.

Jeremy Miller advised they don't turn anyone away due to financial inability to pay.

Sherman Tedford – Is \$30,000 the only funding you would get?

Jeremy Miller explained they do receive other Grants; apply for State and Federal Grants. He is tasked with finding funding for our school programming, drug prevention programming, community programming, etc. Jeremy Miller advised have heard repeatedly that we need communication from Keene High School and if we just had somebody who could do that work, who could help us. We base our decisions on what the community need is. Advised he does apply for Grant funding.

VOTE to approve Articles Ten, Eleven and Twelve as amended - MOTION PASSED.

G. Barrett Montgomery asked to recall his original Motion with the Amendments that had been approved of a technical or logistical nature and all of the subsequent motions or votes that we have had since then.

Henry Parkhurst that's already done; the people have already voted all of the Articles. We do not need to redo this whole Warrant.

- G. Barrett Montgomery advised there were technical issues of whether draft copies were the original copies, etc. Wanted to take up the housekeeping of that by saying this body reapproves what they approved but was turned down in the overall Motion.
- H. Parkhurst Yes, but we have concluded our business for the day.
