V. Action on Agreement with Cambridge Counseling Clinic for On-site Services- Krista

We have sought out a partner to provide private counseling in our school buildings. There are often students that need mental health services beyond what our school counselors can provide. Often times these services are not delivered because the family is unable to get regular transportation to the clinic. This agreement with Cambridge Counseling Clinic will simply provide a space for the therapy to take place in our schools. We don't see this as a common occurrence but feel it will help some of our students get these needed services that they may otherwise not receive.

There is no cost to the district nor would we be charging the clinic for using our facility. The Counseling Clinic is fully insured and we would require proof of insurance annually.

VI. Presentation on Youth Risk Assessment- Denise Parker

Denise Parker, CHS Counselor will be delivering a brief presentation summarizing the results of the Dane County Youth Assessment Survey that was administered to students in grades 7-12 in February of 2015. She will discuss data gathered from the assessment regarding student's living situations, physical health, sexual activity, tobacco use, alcohol use, marijuana use, emotional health, bullying, perceptions of school, perceptions of community and faith. Students were asked to fill out the assessment voluntarily and there were some students who did not want to participate and a few who were opted out by their parents.

Taken Off Amended Agenda: Consider Awarding Diploma to Veteran, Peter Ball, Under ss 120.13 (37)

This item will be deleted from our Agenda as Peter Ball applied for the same thing in the State of Illinois and got it through them. I left it on here just because I thought you might find it of interest and we could have another request in the future.

Peter Ball does not meet all of the criteria for the diploma under the statutes. The criteria he does not meet is that he is not yet 65 years of age-he is 61. I checked with the Department of Public Instruction that the Board could still use their discretion and decide to issue Mr. Ball a diploma. His paperwork all seems to be in order and is included in your packet. Below are the relevant parts of the statute in question.

AWARDING HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMAS TO VETERANS.

Notwithstanding s. 118.33 (1) and (1m), award a high school diploma to a person who meets all of the following requirements:

- 1. Is at least 65 years old, or is at least 55 years old and has a service-connected disability.
- 2. Attended high school in the school district or attended high school in this state and resides in the school district.
- **3.** Left high school before receiving a high school diploma to join the U.S. armed forces during a war period under s. 45.01 (13).
- **4.** Served on active duty under honorable conditions in the U.S. armed forces or in forces incorporated as part of the U.S. armed forces.

VII. Declaration of Educational Standards

Included in the state budget were new requirements that school districts post and declare the district's curriculum standards to be in effect for the coming school year.

Our posted agenda and this statement should satisfy the requirement. Tracy should read this:

Student Academic Standards: Per requirement of Section 120.12 (13) of the state statutes the Board of Education is providing notification that the School District of Cambridge Board of Education has adopted the Wisconsin Model Academic Standards for science and social studies and the Common Core Mathematics and Reading/Language Arts Standards. The district also has incorporated into science instruction the Next Generation Science Standards. The district is also using the Career/College Readiness Standards as a basis for curriculum review and revision during the 2015-16 school year.

Here is the statute:

DECLARATION OF EDUCATIONAL STANDARDS.

- (a) Annually, prior to the beginning of the school term, notify the parents and guardians of pupils enrolled in the school district of the pupil academic standards, adopted under s. 118.30 (1g) (a) 1., that will be in effect for the school year. The school board may provide the notice required under this paragraph electronically, including by posting the notice or a link to the pupil academic standards on the school district's Internet site.
- (b) Annually, include as an item on the agenda of the first school board meeting of the school year a notice that clearly identifies the pupil academic standards adopted by the school board under s. 118.30/ (1g) (a) 1. that will be in effect for the school year.

VIII. Board Finance Committee Report- Mr. Adas

A. Resolution to Withdraw from the Local Property Insurance Fund- Mark Worthing

Due to the reduction in cash reserves in the Local Government Property Insurance Fund and the property values of municipalities across the state being updated (and increased), premiums for the property insurance through this State insurance fund increased on average 85%. The premium for Cambridge increased around 150% from 2014-15 to 2015-16. Cambridge is part of a consortium called SIRMC for its insurance needs. SIRMC decided the best course of action to deal with this would be to seek bids to see if a more economical policy could be found. SIRMC is currently reviewing bids that have been submitted and is anticipating choosing one of the bids on September 1, 2015. In order for the school district to cancel its policy with the LGPIF, the board must vote on a resolution to withdraw. Passing the resolution before an alternative provider is chosen will allow Cambridge to change immediately after the decision is made.

Curriculum Committee Report- Ms. Sullivan

A. Discussion and Possible Action on Purchase of Bicycles for Physical Education Curriculum

As part of our curriculum changes in our physical education classes we would like to add classroom sets of bicycles in the MS and HS. We would like to start at the middle school as Beka Johnson has experience with these in another district. With all of the wonderful trails in such close proximity to the schools we think the adding of bicycling to the PE and summer school curriculum will be a huge fitness benefit for our students and also very exciting for the students.

The cost of helmets and bicycles for Phase I (MS) is \$10,439. The money has been added to the curriculum budget for this year. Peg was extremely supportive of the purchase. We seek the Board's approval for this exciting purchase. Keith will be on hand to answer any questions you may have.

The Cambridge Schools will:

Coordinate referrals through the office staff and designated therapist of Cambridge Counseling

Obtain a release of information from the potential client(s) to facilitate communication and required paperwork between the client(s), Cambridge Schools and Cambridge Counseling prior to obtaining services

Provide a location for the therapist and client to meet

In addition the Cambridge Counseling intake paperwork will need to be filled out by the potential client(s) and insurance verification will need to be completed prior to scheduling an appointment.

The therapist will function as a clinician in an outpatient setting. Either party may terminate this relationship with a 30 day written notice.



Other Items

The Lake Ripley Ride had 176 participants and a wonderfully successful day. The riders were very happy with the specialty food items at rest stop. 100% of the riders who responded to the survey said they would recommend the Lake Ripley Ride to a friend.
